Life in her village in northwestern Zimbabwe wasn't easy for 12 year old Thandolwayo.

Thandolwayo lives with her grandparents and attends the local school which has just 35 students.

Every morning Thandolwayo would walk seven kilometres and risked being attacked by crocodiles as she collected contaminated water for her family. She'd then go to school feeling exhausted.

Thandolwayo's grandparents sell pearl millet bran to fishermen and farmers for animal feed. They also sell chickens - but the income it brings isn't enough to support the family.

Thandolwayo's hope to be a nurse seeme almost impossible to realise, until Caritas Hwange helped the village to install two solar powered pumps and two 10,000 litri water storage tanks. The pumps draw the water up from the river to the storage tan

Thanks to Caritas' support, water is now on tap in the village, benefitting the whole community - and Thandolwayo can concentrate on her education.

"Now I can bathe every day, the distance to collect water for the family has been reduced," Thandolwayo says. "We now drink clean, safe water and diseases are no longer affecting us."

The plentiful water supply has also triggered new ventures. Water is being used to mould bricks for building houses and to pound maize to sell. Plans are underway to establish a community garden and a fish pond, to generate a better income.

"Hope is important because it makes me work harder so that I achieve what I want to be when I grow up," Thandolwayo says

FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT 10 – 3 – 19

This week : Deut 26:4-10; Rom 10:8-13; Lk 4:1-13 Next week: Gen 15:5-12, 17-18; Phil 3:17-4:1 Lk 9:28-36

What are our priorities? That's the great question and challenge of Lent: what matters most? what do we give our time to? what do we give our energy to?

Is it to what brings us life, to what nurtures the spiritual life within us? to what brings about just, compassionate & loving relationships with our fellow human beings?

The temptations of Jesus were temptations to the *illusions* of what brings life: power, instant gratification, expecting God to live life – and solve life – for us.

Lent can be just another 40 days on the calendar – a bit of February, all of March, a few days of April – business as usual. *Busyness* as usual.

Or it can be a time of retreat. A time when we make some room for self-reflection, for prayer, for re-examination of those priorities upon which we base our living.

But what the next 40 days will be - or won't be - is entirely up to us.

RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION:

THE JOURNEY OF CONVERSION

Surely the biblical writer who most helps us discover the Christ Mystery is the Apostle Paul. Letters by Paul or influenced by him form one third of the New Testament. Paul is a foundational teacher for what became Christianity. [1] Yet he hardly ever quotes Jesus. Paul never met Jesus. He did, however, encounter the risen Christ.

This is not as strange as it may seem at first. After all, the Jesus that you and I participate in, are graced and redeemed by, is the risen Christ who is no longer confined by space and time. God raised up Jesus and revealed him as the "Anointed One" or the Messiah (Acts 2:36). I believe it was not until the Resurrection that Jesus' human mind fully realised he was the Christ. It seems to have been an evolving awareness, as "he grew in wisdom, age, and grace" (Luke 2:52) and lived in faith just as we do.

The entire biblical revelation involves gradually developing a very different consciousness, a recreated self, and eventually a full "identity transplant" or identity realisation, as we see in both Jesus and Paul. The sacred text invites us, little by little, into a very different sense of who we are: We are not our own. Your life is not about you; you are about Life! We gradually find ourselves part of the Great Vine, eventually realising that we have never truly been separate from that Source (John 15:1-5). Once we are consciously connected to the True Vine, our life will bear much fruit for the world.

Paul seems to understand this well because it happened rather dramatically to him. He writes, "I live no longer, not I, but Christ lives in me" (Galatians 2:20). Like Paul, the spiritual journey leads us to know that Someone Else is living in us and through us. We are part of a much Bigger Mystery. We are recipients, conduits, and gradually become fully willing participants in the Christ Mystery (which is not to be equated with simply joining the Christian religion).

No biblical writer had yet named what theologians now call "Trinity," but Paul has a deep intuitive conviction about the Trinitarian flow—Love—passing through him. He comes to know that he is hardly "initiating" anything, but instead it is all happening to him. This is the same transition we all must make. Like the divine conception in Mary, we will eventually realise it is being done to and within us much more than us doing anything. All God needs is our "yes," it seems, which tends to emerge progressively as we grow in inner freedom.

This understanding gives us an utterly different sense of self; this person is truly a "sounding through" (per-sonare) much more than an autonomous being. This identity transplant is true conversion. It is not about joining a new group or church; it is coming to know a new and essential self that is interconnected with everyone and everything else. Just as in Paul's conversion, it takes quite a while for the scales to fall from our eyes (see Acts 9:18), with plenty of help from friends like Ananias (Acts 9:17) and others, lots of failures (1 Corinthians 11:17-22), and long quiet retreats in "Arabia" (see Galatians 1:17). His is the classic pattern of real but gradual transformation.

ENTERING INTO THE SEASON OF LENT . . .

LENTEN 'LECTIO DIVINA' Once again our diocese has provided books with guided reflections for the Sunday Scriptures of the Lenten Season. These are available today in both foyers of both our churches. It can also be accessed on the diocesan website: www.bbcatholic.org.au

WEEKDAY MASS IN LENT is a wonderful way to enter in this season – to draw on the richness of the daily Scriptures and to draw closer to the Lord and each other through sharing in the Eucharist.

THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION AND LENT

Since Lent is the time of Easter preparation please make use of the *whole* of Lent to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, which is celebrated each Saturday (see p. 6). When Easter arrives our Lenten preparation is over so please note that there will be NO opportunities for the celebration of of Reconciliation once Holy Week begins, including no Reconciliations at the normal Saturday time on Holy Saturday.

There will also be a celebration of the **Second Rite** (Communal Rite) **of Reconciliation** on **Wednesday 10th April** (Wednesday before Holy Week) at **7:30pm**.

This celebration is for our two communities and will take place in **at Killara** (since the Advent celebration took place at Lindfield).

A LIGHT IS ON FOR YOU

Once again our diocese and its parishes will be offering a time on the Fridays of Lent as a quiet reflective space during which time the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available.

In most churches this will be offered on a Friday evening. In our parish this will be offered on Friday mornings between 8-9am at Killara (following the morning Mass and during the quite prayer time of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. It will not however take place on the second Friday of April as that is when we have our Healing Mass.

IN THE WAKE OF THE CARDINAL PELL VERDICT:

A further letter to us from our Diocesan Administrator, Fr David Ranson

Many years ago, amongst the Wurrundjerri people in Victoria, as it was most likely was with other Aboriginal peoples, it was the sacred task of the women in the tribe during the grey, wet winter months to carry the fire. Fire meant life. In the drizzle and the damp of the winter months, it was, of course, not possible to start fires at every new camp-site. The fire had to be carried. This was achieved by maintaining hot coals in shell cones bartered from the coastal people, like the Bunnarong. Upon setting up camp, the coals could be enflamed into life. It is not difficult to imagine what a vital and important duty it was to carry those shells with the coals inside them, carefully and with a great sense of responsibility.

At times, those coals must have looked like nothing but ash. The challenge to breathe life into the embers must have seemed almost impossible. We can imagine the anxious hope those women must have experienced as they looked for the tiniest spark that could be coaxed into a glow and then into a fire so that their family and kin might have light and warmth and sustenance.

The ashes that mark the beginning of Lent for this year, the charcoal that we are place on our head, are surely the sign of how most of us feel in the wake of the disturbing events of last week when such a senior figure of our Church as Cardinal Pell has been found guilty of sexual assault. This development has turned our own confidence into ash. We are left with the ash of fear, the ash of anger and bitterness, the ash of resentment and regret, the ash of hurt and pain, the ash of shame, the ash of loneliness. We are burnt, perhaps even scorched. We feel the desolation of the bush after a mighty fire has raged through it, and all seems lost, pointless, in the aftermath. We are left dazed, confused, wondering how on earth can anything be rebuilt. And do we even want to? This is a Lent as perhaps we have never experienced. Yet, this is the season by which its very invitation strips us of our pretences, and our illusions, and our defences, so that we might live with hearts more open in a self-giving to one another. As the German martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, the call of Jesus when he encounters us is, "Come and die." We die to something in order to rise to something. We cannot follow Jesus without being prepared to die. Something must die if we are to follow him. And what must die? What must die is a life lived in the "illusion of self- sufficiency," to quote from Pope Benedict several years ago. What must die is a life that is guarded, defended, self -protected. What must die is a life enclosed in on itself, a life that places self-preservation and self promotion as the means to happiness.

In the way of Jesus, happiness can only be achieved when we forget about ourselves – even for a moment – yes, even when, and especially when, everything would have us turn inside ourselves and enclose ourselves in protection and defence, and when we become alive to the needs of the one who stands before me. Our future lies in the freedom to be able to listen to another, and the freedom to give myself to others. Freedom is never the experience of freedom from something.

Christian freedom is always a freedom for something – ultimately the freedom to be able truly to love, and to be able to continue to make those

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decisions to love, to hope, and to trust even in the face of all that would threaten to negate such choices. In so doing, we turn away from the places of captivity in our life and turn towards the places which liberate our hearts. We turn from what holds us in the grip of fear and stretch out to the horizon of possibility; we turn from the somnolence that covers our days like a pall and we awaken to fresh energy and purposefulness. We say 'no' to that which leads us into the pain of isolation and say 'yes' to that which offers the prospect of communion with others. We turn from death to life. This is a pathway into vulnerability and through our vulnerability into a radical hospitality to one another. For it is when our vulnerability has become a place of hospitality then we have entered the saving mystery of Jesus' life and mission. This is such a paradox at the centre of the Christian perspective. It is such a difficult prospect, as difficult as taking up a cross upon our shoulders and dying.

Lent, therefore, is not just a time to wallow in our ashes. Lent is the time to stand before the desolation of the fire that has ravaged our hopes and our confidence, and to wonder at how we might rebuild. It is a time to sift through the ash to look for the spark of fire which is still there. We look for the coal that is still warm, that still contains the glow. Where is the spark that still glows amidst the ashes? How do we keep breathing life into this glowing coal, so that from it many fires can yet still be sparked? That spark of fire is our hope, our desire to keep moving forward, what remains of our dream, our trust, our courage, our faith. Lent urges us to retrieve this spark and to kindle it anew. That coal we protect, we keep working with until it springs a flame; we fan it. This is the true significance of repentance.

We are guardians of a dream still burning within the coals we carry. The dream of Jesus of Nazareth - fire for our world, purifying and warming fire. A dream nurtured and maintained by our constant vigilance over it; its coal kept burning by our attentiveness to its promise. But just as coals won't keep alight on their own, we can never presume the vitality of this dream we nurse. Sometimes, painfully and all too late, we discover that the maintenance of the hot coals requires that we must sacrifice all that would make us forget them. This is the invitation of the Spirit given to us in such dramatic fashion this Lent in the face of our shock and distress at recent *(continued on page 8)*

PARISH PILGRIMAGE IN HONOUR OF ST MARY OF THE CROSS MACKILLOP SUNDAY 31ST MARCH

Please be part of our **parish pilgrimage** to the shrine of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop at North Sydney on **Sunday 31st March.**

THE ROUTE:



Bring a picnic lunch to share in Hyde Park (we'll gather on the grass as close to the Archibald Fountain as possible -12 noon).

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We will then move to the statue of Our Lady outside the northwestern corner of St Mary's Cathedral (12:40pm)for an introductory prayer and a reflection from the writings of Mary MacKillop.

At two further stops along the way – St Patrick's at Church Hill and St Francis Xavier's at Lavender Bay– we will again stop for a short time of input and prayer.

Then at the chapel of Mary MacKillop itself at **7 Mount St, North Sydney** we will gather for our parish Mass at 3:30pm.

WHAT IS A PILGRIMAGE? *Pilgrimage* has a strong tradition in our Catholic faith. It is like a prayerful journey – as we walk we interact with our fellow pilgrims as fellow disciples, chatting and talking; but we also have those times and spaces for prayer and reflection. The pilgrimage walk is like a sacrament of the journey of our life helping us to focus once again on God who is the goal of that journey. It is like a mini-retreat 'on foot'.



WHO CAN COME? We hope that this will be a day for **ALL** the parish. Children and adults are all welcome.

WHAT IF IT'S A BIT TOO FAR FOR YOU TO WALK? For those who might find it difficult to do any or all of the walk there is the option of course of joining us at points along the journey – at Church Hill (near Wynyard) rsh (not too far from either North Sydney or Milsons Point Stations) or

or at Lavender Bay church (not too far from either North Sydney or Milsons Point Stations) or just for the Mass itself at Mount Street (again not far from North Sydney Station).

But if you can walk all the way please do it -a pilgrimage is a wonderful way to pray with our bodies rather than just with words.

CHANGES TO OUR SUNDAY MASS PROGRAMME THAT WEEKEND As we hope that the majority of the parish will take part in the pilgrimage we will have less Masses in the parish that weekend – there will be no 10:15am Mass or Sunday evening 6pm Mass at Lindfield on 31^{st} March.

WHAT ABOUT WET WEATHER?

In the event of really bad weather we will cancel the pilgrimage, including the Mass. If it's pouring rain on Sunday morning then it will be obvious that this is the case. However if the weather simply looks doubtful and we decide that cancellation is the best choice we will advise of a late decision re cancellation in two ways:

- a. A sign will go up on the changeable sign at the front of Holy Family church at Lindfield by 9:30am on the Sunday if the pilgrimage is cancelled
- o. We will leave a similar message on the parish website by 9:30am.

If there is no notice given either on the sign or on the website then the pilgrimage will be going ahead as planned.

If we can enter the possibility of Lent for which the symbol of ash is central, then the flame which bursts forth on Easter night in six weeks' time will have profound meaning for us. It will be the sign of the fire rekindled from the ashes in our life: the Fire of the Risen Christ which, even as the shadows encircle it, no darkness can extinguish. We will need that Fire as we move through the subsequent winters of our life as a community of Catholic Faith to warm and sustain us. May those women of ancient years in our land teach us in our own time of Lent our responsibility and our possibility.
