SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD SEVENTH SUNDAY IN THE EASTER SEASON 13 - 5 - 18'The season of glad song has come' (Song of Songs 2:12)

While Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday clearly speak of the presence of Jesus and his power in our lives, the feast of the Ascension seems to speak instead of absence: Jesus leaves his disciples, he leaves the world - they feel bereft of his presence.

But the Ascension is very much an Easter feast. It is integrally a part of the Easter Season, and its meaning for our lives can only be understood in reference to Easter itself:

The risen Jesus is no longer *physically* present in the world which challenges us to consider how he is present. The Ascension, as it were asks us 'to look elsewhere': The risen Jesus is no longer *physically* present in the world, but he is present:

- in the depths of our prayer and contemplation;
- in the person who needs our love, our forgiveness, our compassion
- in the person who is judged, condemned, and shunned;
- in ourselves in our times of pain, of vulnerability, of rejection and dejection.

When seen with Easter eyes, when seen as an Easter feast, the Ascension is not about the departure of Jesus but rather about his arrival. Fr Colin

RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION:

REALITY IS COMMUNION

In the beginning God says, "Let us make humanity in our own image, in the likeness of ourselves" (Genesis 1:26). The use of the plural pronoun here seems to be an amazing, deep time intuition of what Christians would later call the Trinity—the revelation of the nature of God as community, as relationship itself, a Mystery of perfect giving and perfect receiving, both within God and outside of God. The Body of Christ is another metaphor for this bonding. "Reality as communion" is the template and pattern for our entire universe, from atoms to galaxies, and certainly in human community.

We come to know who God is through exchanges of mutual knowing and loving. God's basic method of communicating God's self is not the "saved" individual, the rightly informed believer, or even a person with a career in ministry, but the journey and bonding process that God initiates in community: in marriages, families, tribes, nations, schools, organisations, and churches who are seeking to participate in God's love, maybe without even consciously knowing it.

Community seems to be God's strategy and God's leaven inside the dough of creation. It is both the medium and the message. It is both the beginning and the goal: "May they all be one . . . so the world may believe it was you who sent me . . . that they may be one as we are one, with me in them and you in me" (see John 17:21, 23).

Thomas Merton wrote, "The Christian is not merely 'alone with the Alone' in the Neoplatonic sense, but he is One with all his 'brothers [and sisters] in Christ.' His inner self is, in fact, inseparable from Christ and hence it is in a mysterious and unique way inseparable from all the other 'I's' who live in Christ, so that they all form one 'Mystical Person,' which is 'Christ.'" [1]

There is no other form for the Christian life except a common one. Until and unless Christ is experienced as a living relationship between people, the Gospel remains largely an abstraction. Until Christ is passed on personally through faithfulness and forgiveness, through concrete bonds of union, I doubt whether he is passed on by words, sermons, institutions, or ideas.

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A MEETING FOR OUR PARISH AND SCHOOL RE THE COLES RE~DEVELOPMENT



As you probably know Coles is planning a major redevelopment of its Lindfield store which will involve a new supermarket with apartments above being built on the site of the current store and the outdoor carpark. Balfour Lane would be re-located to the western perimeter of the present carpark as part of this development.

We are grateful to Coles who have had regular meetings with us and have taken into account our needs and concerns (particularly for our school) as they have developed their plans. We have a Parish and School Committee involved in this process and a sub-committee consisting of our Principal, Lou Dogao, Anthony Cassidy (Chair of the Committee and our Parish Facilities Coordinator) and myself has met regularly with Coles representatives.

Coles is now preparing to submit a DA to Council and have kindly agreed to present to our parish and parish school community. This meeting will take place on Wednesday 23rd May from 7:30 – 9:00pm in MacKillop Hall.

The intent would be to provide high level information in regard to:

- Current status of the project
- Programme
- Context of the proposed Coles development (eg Community Hub, urban design, traffic overview, history of the site, trees, heritage, gateway development/plaza)
- Plans, of the proposed new laneway and the Coles development
- Q&A

THE PRAYERS AND RESPONSES OF MASS


GLORIA:

GOSPEL REFLECTIONS

Mothers are marvellous. Daily, they *feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, heal the sick** and settle disputes in ways that would send Solomon to counselling classes.

They work 14-16 hour days, on call the remainder. Of all Jesus' miracles, there is one they never question ~ the loaves and fishes. They perform it usually after sport weekends, more frequently during school holidays. Warnings about sleep deprivation make them yawn. It is part of the mothering role. They can be fully alert and yet quietly asleep, hanging out washing, vacuuming, ironing, even going through the checkout in the supermarket. They appreciate cold soggy left ~ over toast for breakfast, help St Anthony keep his reputation for finding things when it seems shaky, live dual roles of wife and mother and when *needs drive*, careerist as well.

Like fathers, they haven't many role models among the canonised saints. Hagiographers feature mainly abbesses, virgins, martyrs, widows, members and foundresses of religious orders but few mothers who gave their lives to exceptionally challenging families. Considering the early Church Fathers' scathing opinions of women and attitude to sex, small wonder there's a big empty space where there should be theology on motherhood.

Theologians now venture into writing about sex and marriage – idealistically ~ but come near a labour ward and there's not one to be seen. How can anything be so momentous, sacred and reverential, at the same time be so screamingly painful, bloody, messy and undignified? And nurturing new life, so exhausting, smelly, frustrating, dirty and relentlessly demanding? But with the giving there is heart-warming receiving, gladdening and uplifting the maternal heart, maturing it in the Transcendent beyond all imagining.

Mothers live in union with Sophia (Wisdom) about whom the ancient writers raved about in the Wisdom books and whom Jesus recognised (Luke:7~35 Matt 11:19, I Co:2~7, Wis. 7:23)). Sophia existed before creation (Prov 8:22~31), portrayed as mother, female beloved, hostess, teacher, disciplinarian and dispeller of justice. (Wis 7:27) Mothers' roles exactly.

On this day we celebrate too the motherly attributes in God. The unfailing tenderness, yearning love of a mother for her child, readiness to comfort and heal when one is hurt, ever wanting what is best for her loved child, is of the femineity in God. Where else? But in our prayers and worship paternity attributed almost entirely to Mother Mary that gentle tenderness and caring help that is godly. We've even prayers and hymns that suggest she is more merciful than God and when things are tough, powerful enough to persuade God to come around to a more lenient view of things – ours naturally. Have we not made our beloved Mary more celestial than human?

The evangelists will forgive us asking why Scripture has given us nothing about our Mother Mary's parents and Mary's early childhood. We use names for her parents we've taken from a strange document attributed to a Syrian in the second century, *The Protoevangelium of St James*, but we really know nothing of them and how they came to have a child conceived without sin.

Mary was child mother probably illiterate, whose labour ward was a stranger's stable far from her mother and women friends when she had her first overwhelming experience of giving birth. Who lived years of confusion, anxiety and fear for her loved son's safety. Humiliated, and terrified when he was thrown out of his home synagogue and the villagers attempted to murder him. Who went with his extended family to bring him home, thinking *"he was out of his mind* (Matt 12:48). Broken hearted she watched him die in agony, a heretic, blasphemer, not fit to live. When next Scripture speaks of this magnificent woman it she is joined in prayer with those who had cowardly deserted her and her son in his darkest hours. (Acts 1:14)

Biblical scholar John L McKenzie SJ. "For some time respect for reality demands that we leave Mary in the hands of her sisters. I do not know whether she will be in better hands than in the hands of men...the men who created a plaster doll out of Mary should not hesitate to step aside" John L. McKenzie "The Mother of Jesus in the New Testament". During Eucharistic Worship we pray for all mothers, grans, carers, co -creating and nurturing new life. We remember those for whom today brings heartache. Mothers whose children have gone on before them and are awaiting them in the heavenly state. Mothers with handicapped children whose spirits even now are resplendent in God. Mothers

struggling to rear children on their own and would-be mothers yearning for children and unable to conceive. Perhaps saddest of all, mothers whose children can and yet don't make contact on this day.

REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES

"You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

A SPIRITUALITY OF THE ASCENSION

The Ascension throws some important light on the mystery of love and intimacy. What's the Ascension?

It's an event inside of the life of Jesus and the early church, a feast-day for Christians, a theology, and a spirituality, all woven together into one amorphous bundle of mystery that we too seldom try to unpackage and sort out. What does the Ascension mean?

Among other things, that the mystery of how we touch each other's lives is strangely paradoxical in that the wondrous life-giving power of arriving, touching another's life, speaking words that nurture, doing actions that build up, and giving life for another, depends also upon eventually leaving, being silent, absorbing rather than actively doing, and giving our goodbye and death just as we once gave our presence and our life. Presence depends too upon absence and there's a blessing we can only give when we go away.

That's why Jesus, when bidding farewell to his friends before his ascension, spoke these words: "It's better for you that I go away." "You will be sad now, but your sadness will turn to joy." "Don't cling to me, go instead to Galilee and I will meet you there." How might we understand these words? How is it better that someone we love goes away? How can the sadness of a goodbye, of a painful leaving, turn to joy?

This is something that's hard to explain, though we experience it daily in our lives. Allow me an example: When I was 22, in the space of four months, my father and mother died, both still young. For myself and my siblings, the pain of their deaths was searing. Initially, as with every major loss, what we felt was pain, severance, coldness, helplessness, a new vulnerability, the loss of a vital life-connection, and, the brutality and finality of something for which there is no preparation. There's nothing warm, initially, in any loss, death, or painful goodbye.

Time is a great healer (though there's a lot more to this than simply what washes clean or is anaesthetised by the passage of time). After a while—for me this took several years—I didn't feel a coldness any more. My parents' deaths were no longer a painful thing. Instead their absence turned into a warm presence, the heaviness gave way to a certain lightness of soul inside me, their seeming incapacity to speak to me now turned into a surprising new way of having their steady, constant word in my life, and the blessing that they were never able to fully give me while they were alive began to seep ever more deeply and irrevocably into the very core of my person. The same was true for my siblings. Our sadness turned to joy and we began to find our parents again, in a deeper way, in Galilee, namely, in those places where their spirits had flourished while they were alive. They had ascended and we were the better for it.

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
