'Wherever I am my servant will be there too.'

Is that true? Are we to be found where Jesus is?

From the Gospels it's clear that Jesus hangs around

the poor,

the outcast,

the socially unacceptable person,

and above all, around the ones everyone else calls sinners.

Today's question is: do we?

Jesus' band of followers included extortionists, political extremists and prostitutes: the sort of people that many of his followers today tend to despise and judge.

'Wherever I am, my servant will be there too.' Not long after saying that Jesus' arms were stretched wide on the Cross. His love wasn't abstract – it was very concrete.

This Sunday of Lent asks us whether love is just a four-letter word for us or whether it takes on very real flesh and blood in our life: whether it's true that 'wherever I am, my servant will be there too.'

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RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION:

NATURE IS ENSOULED

"By the word of the Lord the heavens were made" (Psalm 33:6). This tells us that the world came about as the result of a decision, not from chaos or chance, and this exalts it all the more. The creating word expresses a free choice. The universe did not emerge as the result of arbitrary omnipotence, a show of force or a desire for self-assertion. Creation is of the order of love. God's love is the fundamental moving force in all created things: "For you love all things that exist, and detest none of the things that you have made; for you would not have made anything if you had hated it" (Wisdom 11:24). —Pope Francis [1]

Acknowledging the intrinsic value and beauty of creation, elements, plants, and animals is a major paradigm shift for most Western Christians. In fact, many in the past often dismissed such thinking as animism or paganism. We limited God's love and salvation to our own human species and, then, in this theology of scarcity, we did not have enough love left to cover all of humanity! To be honest, God ended up looking quite stingy and inept. Hardly "victorious," as our Easter hymns claim.

The word profane comes from the Latin words pro, meaning "in front of," and fanum, meaning "temple." We thought we lived "outside the temple." Without a nature-based spirituality, it was a profane universe, bereft of Spirit, so we had to keep building shrines and churches to capture and hold our now domesticated and tamed God. Soon we did not know where to look for the divine, as we made God's presence so limited. We became like fish looking for water, and often arguing about who owned the water!

Note that I'm not saying God is all things (pantheism), but that each living thing reveals some aspect of God. God is both greater than the whole of our universe, and as Creator inter-penetrates all created things (pan*en*theism). No exceptions.

When you can enjoy this, "the world becomes a communion of subjects more than a collection of objects" as the "geologian" Fr Thomas Berry (1914-2009) said so wisely. [2]

When you love something, you grant it soul, you see its soul, and you let its soul touch yours. You must love something deeply to know its soul. Before the resonance of love, you are largely blind to the meaning, value, and power of ordinary things to "save" you—to help you live in union with the source of all being. In fact, until you can appreciate and even delight in the soul of other things, even trees and animals, I doubt if you have discovered your own soul either. Soul knows soul.

OUR PARISH FINANCES – A RATHER URGENT MESSAGE

Our Second Collection (which provides all the income for the running costs of our parish) is currently tracking <u>\$20,000 behind</u> compared to the same point last year. And last year at this point we were tracking \$20,000 behind compared to the previous year. As you would appreciate we can't possibly continue to experience such a decline in income when expenses – as we all know – grow annually.

In addition, the First Collection, which provides for Fr Colin and Fr Thomas, as well as for the health and retirement costs of the clergy, is tracking **\$5000** behind compared to last year.

Please consider if you can help. Some possibilities include:

- could you make a small increase to the amount you give? If everyone was able to do this each week it would cumulatively make a big difference.

GOOD FRIDAY STATIONS OF THE CROSS: 10AM in both of our churches.




SOLEMN LITURGY OF THE LORD'S PASSION: 3:00PM in <u>both</u> of our churches



There are a several simple ways you could help us to celebrate the great feast of Easter:


- A holy forest: on Holy Thursday night we again want to create a beautiful 'Garden of Gethsemane' at the Altar of Repose at Killara. To do that could we ask you to do some garden trimming and drop us off your offcuts they can include plenty of large leafy branches up to 2 metres tall, palm fronds etc. We also need a loan of large pot plants if that's possible. If you can help please drop your foliage off to the parish hall at Killara either on the Wednesday night of Holy Week, or on Holy Thursday morning before 11am.
- Setting up: then we need <u>helpers</u> to set up the Garden of Gethsemane at 11am at Killara on Holy Thursday.
- **Easter Flowers:** While the flowers for the churches are normally provided by volunteers, at Easter the parish pays for the flowers since there are a much larger quantity needed. If you would like to help by making a donation towards the cost of the Easter flowers for both our churches please contact the Parish Office.
- **Easter Party:** and finally there will again be an 'Easter Party' in THE Shirley Wallace Parish Centre following the Easter Vigil. **Please bring a plate** and drop it off to the hall before the Easter Vigil begins. Allowing the Christian Creed to touch and change our lives

Part 3:

And so the Creed resolutely makes those proclamations of love, proclamations of love because they're proclamations of our faith that God is love, that human nature is good, that God's very being is fully and totally gifted to humanity in Jesus:

and thus he is begotten not made,

God from God, true God from true God.

And lest there be any mistake: Through him all things were made. All things were made through him who was begotten, not 'made'.

And to Arius' further claim that the very being ('substance') of the Divine Son in Jesus was *similar* to the Father's, but not the *same* as the Father's (because the Son – in Arius' view - was God only by adoption, not by nature) the Church responded resolutely that Father and Son were indivisibly the One God, of one Being, in the language of the philosophy of the day: of the *same* substance':

'consubstantial with the Father'.

This one word $(\dot{o}\mu oo \dot{o} \sigma o \sigma [homoousios]$ in the original Greek, the rather clumsy *consubstantial* in the new translation of the Creed) is one of the most famous and important words in the history of Christian faith. In just one word we profess:

- that God is *one*: the Father and the Son are one, one God, one divine nature (*ousios, 'substance' or 'being'*).

- that God is *love*: that it is **the very God** who reaches out and gifts us in the Incarnation, nothing less than God, nothing less than the very being of God: *True God from True God*: it is the very being of God, the 'substance' of God, nothing less than God, that is joined to our lowly human nature in Jesus.

~ and so we 'become God' – are drawn into God ~because God has become one of us.

A seemingly wordy section of the Creed is revealed as an eloquent profession of love, a profession of faith in God's love for us: a rejection of any half-hearted version of the story in which anything or anyone less than God takes on our humanity and draws it into the very life and being of God. The Creed professes not only that God is love, but also that **we are lovable**, worthy of love. It's a profession of faith in humanity, in human nature, as much as it's a profession of faith in God. And all because it refuses to accept that it is anything or anyone less than *true God* who becomes flesh in Jesus. We are worth the very best, the Creed proclaims. And that whole love story is captured and contained in that one odd little word : *consubstantial. Fr Colin (to be continued next week)*

GOSPEL REFLECTIONS

Mouth drying, heartbeat quickening anxiety rising. ... Jesus needed no extraordinary prescience to realise if he continued to criticise publicly some of his his religion's Mosaic laws and time-honoured traditions that a terrible confrontation with the religious establishment awaited him. A warrant was out for his arrest, he had been in and out of hiding, and now, *the hour has come..*

"*My soul is troubled...*". Should he pray, "*Father save me from this hour?*" Ask for release from his mission enabling perhaps a more placatory meeting with the hostile religious leaders? As it was he had no illusion as to his condemnation and sentence. Was this a temptation to which Luke referred after his account of Jesus' desert temptations (cf Luke 4:13)? If it were, he overcame it. No, "*it was for this reason I came to this hour.*"

Greeks, who came to Jerusalem for the Passover, made a point of meeting the itinerant prophet about whom all Israel was talking. Their interest was more than perfunctory. Exegetes say that they were converts to monotheism and had adopted some of Judaism's beliefs and were interested in knowing Jesus' interpretation of the Torah, and religious traditions. They approached Phillip for a meeting, hoping perhaps for a miracle, instead heard Jesus repeat a theme that runs through his teaching, as pertinent today as then. To find the Divine within, the God-seeker must *lose to find, die to live*. Put to one side the seeker's own interests and desires when another's more urgent, necessary and debilitating needs cry for attention. Consider the welfare of another and others before one's own.

"Follow me...." Jesus said, the living embodiment of all he taught.

The cost. Renunciations wrench and hurt. Continually detaching oneself from comfort and ease to support another wearies the body and strains the soul. To day after day go *that extra mile* with another mile always stretching ahead without succumbing to sour martyrdom but with light -hearted humour – black humour has a place – is difficult without soul's sight held on the Divine within. Without that interior empowerment the giving is impossible when no love is returned, help taken as a right, thankfulness not expressed or felt.

At one time advice was that God sent suffering *to try us.* God does not send suffering. Life keeps a ready supply of that for anyone. Personality clashes, nature's onslaughts, the vagaries of the weather, our own stupid mistakes and the demands from our roles in evolving humanity are constants. God is Love, comforting, reassuring and consoling us through all that befalls us. Uplifting us into a higher mode of consciousness of God and all in God through the endurance and pain.

"Unless a wheat grain falls to the earth and dies..." While dying to itself in the darkness of the earth, the seed is absorbing moisture and nutrients, germinating new life to thrust as a shoot through the earth's surface into the sunlight. There to mature into a plant laden with seeds, multiples of the one from whence they came. So too the suffering soul. In its joyless state it is growing, maturing, breaking through layers of self-centredness, opening to new life in heart-lifting awareness of the presence of God. And in the interconnectedness of all things, which the Buddhist believes and science affirms, pulsate invisible spiritual energies to others close and beyond. "It yields a rich harvest."

Most of us are sprinters rather than stayers in the giving stakes: easier to default at that extra mile, declare it all too hard, too demanding on the self, too much to ask of the aching feet and weary soul. *(continued on page 13):*

The following by Gerald Heard was quoted by Thomas Keating OCSO in "Invitation to Love":

"A certain scientist devoted his life to developing a strain of butterfly that in its combination of colours would be the most beautiful ever seen on this planet. After years of experimentation the scientist was certain he had a cocoon that would produce his genetic masterpiece.

On the day the butterfly was expected to emerge, he gathered his entire staff. All waited breathlessly as the creature began to work its way out of the cocoon. It disengaged its right wing, its body and most of its left wing. Then just as the staff was ready to cheer and open the champagne, they saw with horror the extremity of the left wing was struck in the mouth of the cocoon. The creature was desperately flapping its other wing to free itself. As it laboured, it grew more and more exhausted. At last the scientist, unable to bear the tension, took a scalpel and cut a tiny section from the mouth of the cocoon. With one final burst of strength, the butterfly fell free onto the laboratory table. All reached for the champagne. Then there was silence. Although the butterfly was free, it could not fly....

The struggle to escape from the cocoon is nature's way of forcing blood to the extremities of a butterfly's wings so that when it emerges from the cocoon it can enjoy new life and fly to its heart's content. In seeking to save the creature's life, the scientist had truncated its capacity to function. A butterfly that cannot fly is a contradiction in terms."



Dr Hodge's article was published as the Archdiocese of Sydney released the first in a series of videos defending the Church's assets after the articles in the Fairfax press. The first video highlighted as "irreplaceable" services provided by the Church to Australians through its extensive network of healthcare, education and welfare across the country, and also considered the effect on society if those services were to be diminished or eliminated.

DEBATE OVER CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA 'MOVING TO IRRATIONAL EXTREMES'

An Australian Catholic academic has warned that "irrational prejudice" against the Catholic Church, if stoked by the mainstream media, would lead to serious social tensions.

The Senior Lecturer in the Faculty of Theology and Philosophy at the Australian Catholic University, Dr Joel Hodge, wrote that Australia had to be especially careful "because we have a long and documented history of anti-Catholic bias".

Dr Hodge, writing on the Australian Broadcasting Corporation's Religion and Ethics website on 6 March, questioned whether debate around the Church had become so polarised, particularly over child sexual abuse, that it was moving towards irrational extremes.

"By no means am I advocating that the Church be exempt from robust public scrutiny," he wrote. "I am also not wishing to divert attention from historical abuse and grievous cover-ups in the Church. I firmly express support for the survivors who have bravely stood up to seek justice and healing.

"Rather, I want to avoid prejudicial scrutiny that only leads to misdirected blame. This misdirection allows all parties to avoid proper accountability.

"Take the recent six-month investigation by *The Age* and the *Sydney Morning Herald* into the properties of the Catholic Church. The investigation sought to highlight issues around the transparency and accountability of the Catholic hierarchy... Yet, despite the purported aims of the investigation, there were some obvious flaws. These flaws highlight how resources and attention are being irrationally misdirected against the Church and could be better deployed.

"For example, the Catholic Church was treated as one entity by the investigation, whereas, in fact, it is many different entities in Australia -- dioceses, religious congregations, parishes, school, hospitals, aged care, social services and so on. To lump all these agencies together -- like lumping all the assets and agencies of the federal, state and local governments -- is misleading."

Dr Hodge said much of the reported Church property ~~ churches, hospitals, schools, aged care and social services facilities ~~ could not be liquidated. *The Age* also questioned the Church's tax-free status.

"One is left wondering, then, what was the real point of the investigation?" Dr Hodge wrote.

"... With any debate related to the Catholic Church in Australia, more explicit statements of prejudice rear their head. I'm not referring here to the rightful condemnation of the Church in relation to child sexual abuse. I'm speaking of irrational prejudice which, if stoked by the mainstream media, will lead to serious social tensions. In Australia, we should be especially careful because we have a long and documented history of anti-Catholic bias.

"It is not my intention here to defend, much less justify, the Church's past actions or to protect it from deserved criticism... I do not seek to divert attention away from the ...
