## PALM SUNDAY - AN ECUMENICAL OPPORTUNITY ~



Once again we will gather together with the congregation of Lindfield Uniting Church for a common ceremony of palms for our principal Sunday morning celebration of Palm Sunday at Lindfield after which we will process together to our individual churches for our own liturgies.

The arrangements will be that Mass will begin at 10:00am (NOT 10:15am) on Palm Sunday 14th April, for the ceremony of palms and the procession. Please note that palms will only be available

## FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT LAETARE ('REJOICE') SUNDAY

This week: Joshua 5:9-12; 2 Cor 5:17-21; Lk 15:1-3, 11-32 Next week: Is 43:16-21; Phil 3:8-14; Jn 8:1-11

The parable of the Prodigal Son is perhaps the most beautiful and powerful in all the Gospels. It's rich with meaning and not a single word or image is wasted – every part of it has something to say and no matter how many times we hear it we can hear something new if we remain open to it. Just a few of those non-wasted words and images are:

- from them. If we keep our culture alive we can feel strong."
- the elder son never directly acknowledges a relationship: he begins his tirade towards his father by saying: 'Look, all these years...' and he refers to his brother as 'this son of yours.' In other words he never calls his father 'father' and he never calls his brother brother'.

• the son thinks of all the ways he can try to convince his father to take him back, but as he makes his approach the parable says of the

• by contrast the father only ever uses relational words: of the first son he says 'this son of mine was lost and is found' and in response to the elder son's tirade he begins: 'My son, you are with me always...but this brother of yours'



Twenty-one year-old Michaela is helping to build a social enterprise for people with chronic illnesses at The Purple House in Alic Springs. Featured in Project Compassion 2014, the First Australian-run Wellbeing Project, uses its profits to connect and care for dialysis patients who are far from home.

As a Purple House trainee, Michaela completed a Certificate IV in business management. She was also recently promoted from administration trainee to permanent employee, working on The Wellbeing Project.

The young Alywarr woman cares for patients as they receive dialysis and helps them to feel at home and remain hopeful during treatment. Patients in turn pass on traditional knowledge to Michaela.

The program is run by the Western Desert Nganampa Walytja Palyantjaku Tjutaku Aboriginal Corporation, with support from Caritas Australia. First Australians are twice as likely to experience chronic kidney disease, and four times more likely to die from it than other Australians\*.

With the help of staff like Michaela, the Aboriginal-controlled service gives patients the opportunity to stay connected with their culture. They do this through traditional healing practices and income-generating activities, such as making bush balms and soaps.

Profits are invested back into supporting patients receiving remote care and help to get people on dialysis back on country.

In addition to completing her studies, Michaela has obtained a driver's licence, and is building her leadership skills running workshops solo.

"Hope means having something to look forward to," Michaela says. "I enjoy building relationships with the patients and learning

This is Lent's call to us as it invites us to a change of heart: to replace our sense of acting out of duty, obligation and regulation (and our judgement of others on that same basis) with a starting point that is based on relationship: a relationship with God, and a relationship with our brothers and sisters. ## Nourishment for the journey...

#### RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION: GROWING IN CHRIST ~ RELINQUISHING EGO

God's seed is in us. If it were tended by a good, wise and industrious labourer, it would then flourish all the better, and would grow up to God, whose seed it is, and its fruits would be like God's own nature. The seed of a pear tree grows into a pear tree, the seed of a nut tree grows to be a nut tree, the seed of God grows to be God.—Meister Eckhart (1260–1328) [1]

James Hollis reflects on what it means to "die before we die" like the seed falling into the ground:

In the second half of life the ego is periodically summoned to relinquish its identifications with the values of others, the values received and reinforced by the world around it. It will have to face potential loneliness in living the life that comes from within rather than acceding to the noisy clamour of the world, or the insistency of the old complexes. [2] It will have to submit itself to that which is truly larger, sometimes intimidating, and always summoning us to grow up. . . . And how scary is that, to each of us? . . . No wonder so few ever feel connected to the soul. No wonder we are so isolated and afraid of being who we are.

Yet, paradoxically, the very achievement of ego strength is the source for our hope for something better. We need to be strong enough to examine our lives and make risky changes. A person strong enough to face the futilities of most desires, the distractions of most cultural values, who can give up trying to be well adjusted to a neurotic culture, will find growth and greater purpose after all. The ego's highest task is to go beyond itself into service, service to what is really desired by the soul. . . .

During the second half of life, the ego will be asked to accept the absurdities of existence, that death and extinction mock all expectations of aggrandisement, that vanity and self-delusion are the most seductive of comforts. . . . How counterproductive our popular culture—with its fantasies of prolonged youthful appearance, continuous acquisition of objects with their planned obsolescence, and the incessant, restless search for magic: fads, rapid cures, quick fixes, new diversions from the task of soul.

The relinquishment of ego ambition, as fueled and defined by first-half-of-life complexes, will in the end be experienced as a newfound and hitherto unknown abundance. One will be freed from having to do whatever supposedly reinforced one's shaky identity, and then will be granted the liberty to do things because they are inherently worth doing. . . . One can experience the quiet joy of living in relationship to the soul simply because it works better than the alternative. The revisioned life feels better in the end, for such a person experiences his or her life as rich with meaning, and opening to a larger and larger mystery.

Vocation, even in the most humble of circumstances, is a summons to what is divine. Perhaps it is the divinity in us that wishes to be in accord with a larger divinity. Ultimately, our vocation is to become ourselves, in the thousand, thousand variants we are. As all of the great world religions have long recognised, becoming ourselves actually requires repeated submissions of the ego.

#### REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES

He said to his father in reply, Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders.'

#### THE PRODIGAL SON'S BROTHER

Recently, while giving a series of lectures, I was confronted by a rather angry man who accused me of being soft on hell, God's judgment and God's justice. Though angry, he was, in his own way, a good man, one who had given his life in duty to his family, his church, his country and his God.

"I cannot accept what you say," he shouted at me. "There is so much evil in the world and so many people are suffering from other people's sins that there must be, after this life, some retribution, some justice.

"Don't tell me that all these people who are doing these things—from molesting children to ignoring all morality—are going to be in heaven when we get there! What does that say about God's justice?"

His lament is, in fact, quite an old one. The prophet Isaiah had the same kind of wish. For him it was not enough that the Messiah should usher in a time of peace and freedom for good people. Along with rewards for the good, he felt, there needed to be too a "day of vengeance" on the bad (Isaiah 61:2).

Interestingly, in a curious omission, when Jesus quotes this text to define his own ministry, he leaves out the part about vengeance (Luke 4:18).

There are too many of us in the church and the world today, in both conservative and liberal camps who, like this man, have the same burning need. We want to see misfortune fall upon the wicked. It is not enough that eventually the good should have their day. The bad must be positively punished.

If we are conservative, we wish this especially on those who neglect their religious duties or do not follow the sixth commandment. If we are liberal, we want God's vengeance on the perpetrators of injustice. All ecclesial camps today agree that justice demands that sin and wickedness be positively punished. We only disagree on what constitute sin and wickedness.

To my mind, this desire for justice (as we call it) is, at its root, unhealthy and speaks volumes about the bitterness within our own lives. All these worries that somebody might be getting away with something and all these wishes that God better be an exacting judge, suggest that we, like the older

brother of the prodigal son, might be doing things right, but real love, forgiveness and celebration have long gone out of our hearts. We are bitter as slaves and are quite outside the circle of the dance. Julian of Norwich once described God in this way: *Completely relaxed and courteous, he himself was the happiness and peace of his dear friends, his beautiful face radiating measureless love like a marvelous symphony.* 

This is one of the best descriptions of God ever written. I often meditate on it and, to be honest, most times it makes for a painful meditation. Far from basking in gratitude in the beautiful symphony of relaxed, measureless love and infinite forgiveness that makes up heaven, I feel instead the bitterness, self-pity, anger and incapacity to let go and dance that was felt by the older brother of the prodigal son.

I am sitting in the banquet room, amongst all that radiance and joy, pouting, waiting for the Father to come and try to coax me beyond my sense of having been cheated. Such is my feeling. ... I am not happy in the presence of messianic celebration, but, given that life is unfair, I have every right to be unhappy! Such too is most people's feeling!

Alice Miller, the great Swiss psychologist, suggests that the primary task of the second half of life is that of grieving. We need to grieve, she says, or the bitterness and anger that come from our wounds, disappointments, bad choices and broken dreams will overwhelm us with the sense of life's unfairness. Her solution is simple: Life is unfair. Don't try to protect yourself from its hurts—you've already been hurt! Accept that, grieve it and move on to rejoice the dance.

In the end, it is because we are wounded and bitter that we worry about God's justice, worry that it might be too lenient, worry that the bad will not be fully punished, worry that there might not be a hell.

But we should worry less about those things and more about our own incapacity to forgive, to let go of our own hurts, to take delight in life, to give others the sheer gaze of admiration, to celebrate and to truly join in the dance. To be fit for heaven we must let go of our bitterness.

Like the older brother, our problem is ultimately not the excessive love that is seemingly shown someone else. Our problem is that we have never fully heard or understood God's words: "My child, you have always been with me and all I have is yours, but we, you and I, should be happy and dance because your younger brother who was dead has come back to life!"

# THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION AND LENT

Since Lent is the time of Easter preparation please make use of the *whole* of Lent to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, which is celebrated each Saturday (see p. 6). When Easter arrives our Lenten preparation is over so please note that there will be NO opportunities for the celebration of of Reconciliation once Holy Week begins, including no Reconciliations at the normal Saturday time on Holy Saturday.

There will also be a celebration of the **Second Rite** (Communal Rite) **of Reconciliation** on **Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> April** (Wednesday before
Holy Week) at **7:30pm**.

This celebration is for our two communities and will take place in **at Killara** (since the Advent celebration took place at Lindfield).

#### A LIGHT IS ON FOR YOU

Once again our diocese and its parishes will be offering a time on the Fridays of Lent as a quiet reflective space during which time the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available.

In most churches this will be offered on a Friday evening. In our parish this will be offered on Friday mornings between 8-9am at Killara (following the morning Mass and during the quite prayer time of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. It will not however take place on the second Friday of April as that is when we have our Healing Mass.


- we will have the grand opening of our new Youth Centre 'The Basement' (the old meeting room under Holy Family Church) after the Mass

# PARISH PILGRIMAGE IN HONOUR OF ST MARY OF THE CROSS MACKILLOP TODAY SUNDAY 31ST MARCH



Bring a picnic lunch to share in Hyde Park (we'll gather on the grass as close to the Archibald Fountain as possible -12 noon).

We will then move to the statue of Our Lady outside the north-western corner of St Mary's Cathedral (12:40pm) for an introductory prayer and a reflection from the writings of Mary MacKillop.

At two further stops along the way – St Patrick's at Church Hill (approximately 1:25pm) and St Francis Xavier's at Lavender Bay (approximately 2:45pm) – we will again stop for a short time of input and prayer.

Then at the chapel of Mary MacKillop itself at **7 Mount St, North Sydney** we will gather for our parish Mass at 3:30pm.

**WHAT IF IT'S A BIT TOO FAR FOR YOU TO WALK?** For those who might find it difficult to do any or all of the walk there is the option of course of joining us at points along the journey – at Church Hill (near Wynyard) or at Lavender Bay church (not too far from either North Sydney or Milsons Point Stations) or just for the Mass itself at Mount Street (again not far from North Sydney Station).

But if you can walk all the way please do it - a pilgrimage is a wonderful way to pray with our bodies rather than just with words.

CHANGES TO OUR SUNDAY MASS PROGRAMME THIS WEEKEND As we hope that the majority of the parish will take part in the pilgrimage we will have less Masses in the parish that weekend — there will be no 10:15am Mass or Sunday evening 6pm Mass at Lindfield on  $31^{st}$  March.

#### WHAT ABOUT WET WEATHER?

In the event of really bad weather we will cancel the pilgrimage, including the Mass. If it's pouring rain on Sunday morning then it will be obvious that this is the case. However if the weather simply looks doubtful and we decide that cancellation is the best choice we will advise of a late decision re cancellation in two ways:

- a. A sign will go up on the changeable sign at the front of Holy Family church at Lindfield by 9:30am if the pilgrimage is cancelled
- b. We will leave a similar message on the parish website by 9:30am.

If there is no notice given either on the sign or on the website then the pilgrimage will be going ahead as planned.

To sum up: if by 9:30am we choose to cancel the pilgrimage because of weather then:

- 10:15 Mass will be celebrated as usual
- 6pm Mass will be celebrated as usual
- The 3:30pm Mass at Mary MacKillop's chapel will be cancelled.



#### Works underway at Lindfield presbytery



drainage works underway. Currently none of the groundwater (on the steep slope on which the presbytery is located) or roof run-off water is captured leading to on-going mildew problems in the house, inability of present guttering to cope with overflow and all water draining ultimately onto the neighbour's property. current works will capture all roof run-off and groundwater flow and drain it to the street.

The current works will total \$35,000 with a further \$10,000 when the guttering itself is

replaced. In all, the essential repairs and maintenance will total \$90,000 of which we have raised just under half (\$42,000 from our parish appeal).



#### COMING NEXT WEEKEND!!



As we move increasingly in the direction of being a cashless society a number of churches have introduced the option of a tap-and-go machine for contributions.

Several parishes have taken this up and our Parish Finance Committee has approved making this service available in our parish.

Initially we will have just one machine in just one of our churches (at Lindfield) to see if this service is one parishioners wish to make use of.

It will be for contributions to the Second Collection (which runs the parish) only. At this stage contributions to the First Collection

(which supports the clergy of the parish) will remain possible only via the plate or previously arranged electronic contributions.

The machine will be available in the foyer **as of Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> April.** Each tap authorises \$10 to be taken from your account. Thus if you wanted to contribute, say \$30, you would tap three times.
