

There's a beautiful statement of God's endless love and compassion hidden in the longer form of today's Gospel passage:

three times Jesus asks Peter if he loves him, which gives Peter to affirm that love three times; and in turn Jesus takes the opportunity to call Peter three times to his mission of feeding and caring for the flock.

It's all meant to be a parallel of course – to Peter's three denials.

The Cross and Resurrection overflow with forgiveness and reconciliation.

The violence represented by the Cross is forever changed into compassion:

Peter would have felt a failure, a traitor.

Jesus gives him the loving opportunity to turn his denials into professions of love and calls him to the highest office amongst the apostles.

Are we an Easter people? Does peace break into people's lives because of us?

REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES... BY: BERYL CATES

There has always been a debate about this picturesque addendum to John's gospel. Exegetes argue that among the early Christians there were divisions about Peter's leadership and it was written by an unknown author onto the gospel to stress Jesus' had delegated Peter Leader of the early Church. (Cf 1 Co 3-4 Luke 5:4-7 Matt 16:18).

Peter and his six companions had fished all night from their boat on the Sea of Galilee or Tiberius and caught nothing. Dawn was breaking and the tired and disappointed men were rowing back to shore when they heard a voice shout from land. "Have you caught anything, friends?"

When they called back, "No!" they were told to let their net down on the boat's starboard side. With professional fishermen among them, the men needed no advice about fishing, yet, surprisingly, they did what was asked. The net quickly sagged beneath the weight of 153 fish and astounded the men looked at the one on the shore. "It is the Lord," the disciple Jesus loved cried excitedly. Who was this disciple with such a privileged place in Jesus' heart? It was once believed John the evangelist and author of what is attributed to a St John in the New Testament, but using today's more reliable forms of research, scholars, particularly linguists, believe the Apostle wrote none of them. Who the beloved disciple was remains a mystery.

Realising who it was on the shore, impetuous Peter grabbed his cloak as he had practically nothing on (NRSV says naked) and wrapping it around him, jumped into the water and waded to shore. The others followed to where Jesus had breakfast for them, bread and fish cooked over a charcoal fire and bread.

What followed is hallowed in Church history. It is hoped on the sacred occasion Peter wasn't still wet and clutching his dripping cloak around him for decency's sake. But then perhaps not.

For our part, are not life's most definitive moments when we're stripped of all self-pretence and see ourselves as we really are, particularly after some irresponsible and unworthy act? When we cannot pretend what we did was something alien to us, atypical to the persona we like to think is ours? When we stand naked before God, regretful and remorseful, without a sodden cloak of an excuse to cover us? The ceremony was not in any magnificent Cathedral with soaring spires, clustered pillars and light streaming in through stained windows onto mosaic floors. Clergy in appropriate vestments and dignitaries from over the world present. Orchestra, choristers and soloists offering worship to God in music and song. It was on a lonely seashore, the congregation in dirty workaday clothes possibly wet, and to the sound of water

lapping on the seashore and squawking of sea birds.

After they had eaten Jesus asked Peter: "Simon, son of John do you love me more than these others?" Love Jesus even more than the beloved disciple? We know Peter's answer and the solemn commitment given him to guide beginners on the spiritual path – "Feed my lambs."

Peter's love was questioned again, and then again, until Peter's third affirmative came with a protest: 'Lord, you know all things, you know I love you." Then Jesus further commissioned him: "Feed my sheep". Support, instruct the faith-filled and guide them through any argument, dissention and discord that erupts among them (1 Cor 1:12 Gal 2:11 Acts 15:39 1618 etc.).


The symbolism in the number of fish Peter and the men caught following Jesus' direction was highly significant. It was believed at the time that 153 was the number of varieties of fish in the Lake representing all the people in the world. Now in the great, swirling, teeming lake of the world there more varieties of cultures, customs, languages and religious traditions than Peter and his companions would have imagined possible, Today's successor of the first fisherman-Pope stands concerned with all, reaching out to those of other faiths and traditions while directing the universal Church through a reformation arguably as great as any in history. An awesome ministry and only the bearer of it knows the honour and burden of it

It is regrettable Scripture gives us less than we would like about our first Pope's missionary work. In Luke's *Acts*, the first twelve chapters record the healing and teaching ministries of Peter and other apostles, but the remainder of the book is about Paul. Peter would have remained mainly in Jerusalem for his ministry was *to the Jews* though he did go to Antioch where he had the well-known difference with St Paul (Gal 2:11-13).

Whatever the argument it healed quickly, in second epistle attributed to St Peter, Paul was referred to as "our dear brother Paul." Peter's dedication to the living spirit of Jesus is without dispute. The love he proclaimed never flagged, despite being imprisoned, chained, flogged, and suffering disputes from within and without, until death, when tradition says he was crucified.

As Jesus was human and divine, so too, his Church. Despite its all-too-human failures, in the living spirit of its Master it has continued its incalculable influence for good in the world. Ever extending its vast global works of charity and leading people to find God in their lives, uplifting evolving humankind into the Transcendent. Ever in progression and in need of renewal as now, when shamed by the gross transgressions of a well-publicised minority, with deep spirituality, wisdom and gentle strength, Peter's successor is guiding it through its period of humiliation, reassessment and amendment... the traditional time in history of preparedness for deeper, richer enlightenment and renewal.

REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAYS SCRIPTURES...

EASTER AS OPENING THE DOORS OF HELL

Henri Nouwen once commented that he used to be resentful whenever he was interrupted in his work until he realised that, often times, interruptions were his real work.

There's a lesson here: We're often resentful when our plans are interrupted. Sometimes these interruptions are minor, an unexpected call while working or watching television. Sometimes though they're major: an unplanned pregnancy that interrupts our career, an economic hardship that derails our plan for being a writer or an artist, a family situation that prevents us from pursuing a dream, or a loss of health that puts everything on hold.

Countless things, big and small, perennially conspire against our agendas and sabotage our dreams. Often we're resentful and think to ourselves: "If only! If only this hadn't happened! Now I have to wait to go back to school, to resume my career. Now I'll never have a chance to fulfil my dream." Sometimes in middle age, or even earlier, this resentment takes a more radical form: "I've wasted my life, been a victim of circumstance, given in to the demands of others, and now I'll never get the chance to do what I really wanted."

What initially is experienced as an unwanted interruption can, in the end, be our real agenda.

But the opposite is also true: Sometimes instead of resentment there's gratitude because we realise that the interruptions, so unwelcome at the time, were really salvific and, far from derailing our real agenda, were our real agenda.

A couple of examples might help explain this: I'm sure all of us have known individuals or families where an unplanned pregnancy suddenly turned all plans (economic, career, travel, new house) upside down. Initially there was resentment. Later on the unwanted interruption turned into a much wanted and loved child who helped create a happiness that dwarfed anything that might have resulted had original plans not been derailed by that interruption.

The British historian, A N Wilson, in a biography of C S Lewis, describes how Lewis' life as a teacher and writer was, during virtually all of his productive years, interrupted by the demands of his adopted mother who made him do all the shopping & housework & demanded hours of his time daily for domestic tasks. Lewis' own brother, Warnie, who also lived in the household, (and who generally refused to let his own agenda be so interrupted) laments this fact in his diaries & suggests that Lewis could have been much more prolific had he not had to spend countless hours doing domestic chores.

Lewis himself, however, gives a different assessment. Far from being resentful about these interruptions, he's grateful and suggests that it was precisely these domestic demands that kept him in touch with life in a way that other Oxford Dons (who never had to shop and do housework) were not. Wilson agrees and suggests that it was precisely because of these interruptions, which kept Lewis' feet squarely on the ground, that Lewis was able to have such empathic insights into the everyday human condition.

As these examples illustrate, what initially is experienced as an unwanted interruption can, in the end, be our real agenda.

Of course, this isn't always true. Our lives are not meant to be left entirely to circumstance. We're meant to make choices too, hard choices at times, to actively shape our own destiny. It can be unhealthy, fatalistic even, to simply accept whatever happens. It can also lead to considerable bitterness and disappointment with our lives. We have God-given dreams and talents and must, in the name of the God who gave them to us, fight too for our agenda.

However, we must also look for the hand of that God in our interruptions. These often appear as a conspiracy of accidents through which God guides and tutors us. If we were totally in control of our own agendas, if we could simply plan and execute our lives according to our own dreams with no unwanted demands, I fear that many of us would, slowly and subtly, become selfish and would, also slowly and imperceptibly, find our lives devoid of simple joy, enthusiasm, family life, and real community.

Baptism means derailment. Christ baptises Peter on the rock when he tells him: "Your life is now no longer your own. Before you made a profession of love, you fastened your belt & walked wherever you liked. Now, others will put a belt around you & take you where you would rather not go." To submit to love is to be baptised, namely, to let our lives be forever interrupted. To not let our lives be interrupted is to say no to love.

C S Lewis once said that we'll spend most of eternity thanking God for those prayers he didn't answer. I suspect we'll also spend a good part of eternity thanking God for those interruptions that derailed our plans but baptised us into life and love in a way we could never have ourselves planned or accomplished. We do not live by accomplishment alone and sometimes what's best for us can only be learned in the absence of sufficient evidence.

FR RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION: HEAVEN NOW ~ DIVINISATION

If we could glimpse the panoramic view of the biblical revelation & the Big Picture of which we're a part, we'd see how God is forever evolving human consciousness, making us collectively ever more ready for God. The Hebrew prophets & many Catholic & Sufi mystics used words like espousal or marriage to describe this divine-human love affair. That's what the prophet Isaiah (61:10; 62:5), many of the Psalms, Paul (Eph. 5:25-32), & the Book of Revelation (19:7-8; 21:2) mean by "preparing a bride to be ready for her husband."

The human soul is being gradually readied so that actual intimacy and partnership with the Divine are the result. It's all moving toward a final marriage between God and creation. Note that such salvation is a social and cosmic concept, not just about isolated individuals "going to heaven." The Church was meant to bring this corporate salvation to conscious and visible possibility.

But how could divine espousal really be God's plan? Isn't this just poetic exaggeration? If this is the agenda, why were most of us presented with an angry deity who needed to be placated and controlled? Why would God even want to "marry" God's creation? If you think I am stretching it here, look for all the times Jesus uses a wedding banquet as his image for eternity, and both he and John the Baptist call Jesus "the bridegroom" (Mark 2:19-20; John 3:29). Think how strange that is! Jesus is not marrying anyone, is he? The very daring, seemingly impossible idea of union with God is still something we're so afraid of that most of us won't allow ourselves to think of an actual intimate relationship with God. Only God in you, "the Holy Spirit planted in your heart," can imagine such a possibility (Romans 8:11 and throughout Paul's letters).

The Eastern Fathers of the Church were much less afraid of this realization; they called it the real process of human "divinisation" (theosis). In fact, they saw it as the whole point of the Incarnation and the very meaning of salvation. The much more practical and rational church in the West seldom used the word, despite Peter's teaching (1 Peter 1:4-5 and 2 Peter 1:4). John also was quite clear about divine union being the final goal in much of his Gospel: "I pray not only for them, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, so that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me" (John 17:20-21). It is important not to confuse divine union with human perfection. The choice for union is always from God's side; our response is always and forever partial and feeble.

Jesus came to give us the courage to trust and allow our inherent union with God, and he modeled it for us in this world. Union is not a place we go to later—if we are good; union is the place from which we come, the place from which we're called to live now. We wasted centuries confusing union with personal perfection. Union is God's choice for us in our very imperfect world. Divine Love has no trouble loving imperfect things! That is just our human problem. If God could only love perfect things, God would have nothing to do.


