Reflecting on Easter ... PartIII... ...the message of the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday

Well, it will come as no surprise if I were to say 'It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas', given that that's the theme I've been trying to explore over the three days of this Easter Triduum.

And what I've been trying to say is that all the deepest messages of the feast of Christmas, (which struggle to make themselves heard through the secular wrapping of tinsel which engulfs it), finally get to make themselves heard when we reach Easter. Santa Claus may have conquered Christmas, but even the Easter Bunny is no match for the drama of these three days.

Christmas celebrated the belief which stands at the heart of Christian faith: that the Word became flesh; that enormity, that outrageousness, of the belief that God became a human being, became all that we are. Easter confronts us with what that means. Easter is Christmas grown up.

Holy Thursday, as it celebrated the fellowship meal that is the Christian form of worship, confronted us with the call to be *a community* of faith. Not the secular world's community - which is a commodity which can bring occasional benefits to us when we so choose; but a *Christian* community - which is modelled on the self-sacrificing, self-giving love of the Cross: community in the sense that what I give to it is more important than what it gives to me.

Good Friday anchors Christmas even more deeply in human life as it speaks of human malice, human cruelty, and suffering. But it offers the word of hope that this is where the Word becomes flesh: that while faith doesn't excuse us from suffering, or remove suffering from us, it does say to us that if we have eyes to see the grace of God, then the taste of, glimpses of resurrection are to be found if we're ready to look for them in ways other than what we expected or wanted.

And now we come to the Day of the Resurrection, the day which has the final word about what Christmas celebrated. Christmas was about a baby. And a baby's demands, while constant, are simple: to be

warm, to be fed, and to have one's nappy changed.


The Risen Jesus is not a baby. And his demands on us, to say the least, have grown up. He is the Lord. The Lord of our life. The one to whom all is given. Well that's the theory at least. *In fact* he has to fit into our very busy schedules. He's certainly gazumped by sport. But in so many other ways as well. Different ways for each of us.

But this day says that that Risen Lord asks *everything* of us: that we literally be a new creation, not just more of the old one. That the path of integrity, compassion, honesty, justice, mercy - the meaty ways that love actually takes flesh - really describes what we strive for in our lives as disciples. Hiccups along the way certainly, plenty of them, but that at least *striving* for these things is what drives us, what's most important to us.

The undemanding babe of Bethlehem has become the rather more demanding Lord of the universe, Lord of my life: that's what this day proclaims. And so the invitation is there: to become a new creation, or not. To be different. In our own way, to make God flesh. And all through those choices which are the way that Easter can change our world: generosity of spirit, community of heart, integrity and honesty, compassion, justice and mercy. Love made flesh, not love as just a nice word in the head. And thus Easter will again become Christmas and the Word will continue to take flesh and dwell among us.

GOD'S RESURRECTING POWER AS ULTIMATE TRUTH

As children we believe in fairy tales & nurse the naive idea that there is somewhere a divine magic which can, & will in the end, swish away all evil, injustice, & pain & make a happy ending to everything.

The older we get, the harder it is for us to believe that. Reality is shock therapy. After seeing all the magic around us deconstructed and more than enough unhappy endings, we begin instead to believe George Orwell who said that "if you want a picture of the future, imagine a boot stamping on the human face forever."

But who's ultimately right, the child or Orwell? What should we live our lives by, the child's belief in magic or Orwell's pan-adult realism? What's to be the end of our lives and of human history, divine magic or a boot in the face? At the end of the final day, what's reality and what's naiveté?

The more adult & sophisticated we become the greater the temptation to opt for the view of Orwell. We wish, of course, that it wasn't so, that there was somewhere a divine magic that could make for happy endings, but, stoically or bitterly, we accept that things are otherwise. When all is said and done, the facts seem to say that darkness triumphs over light, loneliness over community, self-interest over love, egoism over altruism, injustice over justice, bitterness over compassion, tastelessness over beauty, & death over life. To believe the opposite, it would seem, is to be naive, whistling in the dark, setting oneself up for a massive disillusionment.

An acceptance of reality demands realism and this, in its turn, demands a certain despair. We don't so much, to nuance Thoreau, live lives of quiet desperation as we live lives of quiet, practical despair. This takes various forms: For some, this is the unconscious attitude that, since nothing ultimately means anything anyway, we should try at least to get our share of riches, comfort, and pleasure in this life. For others, this expresses itself in a simple bitterness, that life isn't fair and we have been short-changed. In its higher expressions, this shows itself (to use Albert Camus' beautiful phraseology) in "metaphysical rebellion." in an attitude which believes that ultimately selfishness, injustice, and death are paramount, but we can create some temporary dignity and meaning by fighting these in the meantime.

In the end, however, no matter how noble its visage, despair is despair. When there is no power or magic beyond our own a boot in the face is our final destiny.

The resurrection of Jesus, however, exposes this supposed realism for what it is, a naiveté. In the resurrection of Jesus, things are turned upside-down and the supposed hard-facts are blown to hell, literally. What looks like naiveté is in fact final truth and what looks like hard truth is naiveté.

If we believe in the resurrection, then Orwell is wrong and the child is right, the hard empiricists are wrong and the pious are right, those who stopped believing in magic are wrong and those who profess the creed are right, fairy-tales are more true than the law of entropy, the law of love is more binding than the law of gravity, the Holy Spirit is more of a physical force than all the winds in the world, and the infinite horizon of eternity rather than the mortal limit of our world is what we need to look to and run our lives by.

What's important in all of this is not who's right and who's wrong, but what ultimately who we should guide our lives by. What is the ultimate truth? For a believer, that truth is not the empirical facts, further deconstructed and hardened, by the Enlightenment, but God's power as revealed in the resurrection of Jesus. If the resurrection happened, and it did, the faith of hundreds of millions of men and women cannot be sustained for 2000 years on a wish or a lie, then to believe in divine magic and happy endings is right. To believe in the resurrection is to believe Julian of Norwich's wonderful dictum: And all shall be well and all shall be well and every manner of being shall be well. In the resurrection of Jesus we see that final end of the story, our story and the story of human history, will not be a boot in the face but, as we always sensed as children, the wonderful triumph of light, love, justice, graciousness, beauty, joyous-embrace, and God.

If we believe in the resurrection of Jesus, we can stare the empirical facts in the face, no matter how bad, and know that injustice, selfishness, violence, loneliness, chaos, and death are only an interim chapter in the story.

Beyond all pain and present frustrations, there is Someone who loves us more dearly than does any fairy-godmother and that Someone, God, has a magic wand that is infinitely more powerful than any fairy-tale has ever imagined.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION TRINITY: ALIVENESS

Greatly ought we to rejoice that God dwells in our soul; and more greatly ought we to rejoice that our soul dwells in God. Our soul is created to be God's dwelling place, and the dwelling of our soul is God. . . . And I saw no difference between God and our substance, but, as it were, all God; and still my understanding accepted that our substance is in God. —Julian of Norwich [1]

I find the "fidget spinner" toy a helpful illustration to understand the Trinity. When still, a fidget spinner clearly has three different lobes; however, when it spins we lose sight of the distinct wings and simply see unbroken movement or flow. Even more significant than the qualities of the individual members of the Trinity is the flow between them. At the Trinitarian level, God is a verb more than a noun, God is a flow more than a substance, God is an experience more than a deity sitting on a throne. And we live naturally inside that flow of love—if we do not resist it.

Infinite love is planted within humans

Infinite love is planted within humans and all of creation. Everything is attracted to everything: life is attracted to life; love is attracted to love; God in you is attracted to God in everyone and everything else. This is what it means for everything to be created in the image of God (Genesis 1:26-27). God placed this alluring attraction of life toward life in everything that God created. Thus, we might say the Trinity is the soul of creation.

Once we allow the entire universe to become alive for us, we are living in an enchanted world. Nothing is meaningless; nothing can be dismissed. It's all whirling with the same beauty, the same radiance.

This is nothing I can prove to you. This is nothing I can make logical or rational. It can only be known experientially in the mystery of love when you surrender yourself to it, when you grant subjectivity or a blessed I-Thou relationship to every other thing—a plant, an animal, a single tree, the big blue sky, "Brother Sun, Sister Moon," as my Father Francis of Assisi put it. The contemplative mind refuses to objectify things. It sees similarity, likeness,

symbolism, communion, connection, and meaning everywhere. It becomes a fully symbolic universe. Use whatever words you want, but with this vision you will live in a fully alive and congenial universe where you can never be lonely again.




