The parable of the good Samaritan may seem to have a simple message – be good to people in need – but in fact its message is more complex and challenging than that:

whereas we tend to think of the injured man as 'the neighbour' who is in need of help Jesus turns the meaning of the parable on its head

and reveals the Samaritan as the neighbour who acts as justice & charity demand:

and the surprise in that is that it was the Samaritan:

the Samaritans were historically a breakaway group – racially impure, doctrinally suspect: they were foreigners, they were heretics: Jesus' confreres would have nothing to do with them:

so the surprise and the challenge in the parable is that it's *the Samaritan* – the person of different faith, culture, nationality – who is revealed as the one who acts as a neighbour, who has depth of character:

and so we're challenged in this parable not simply to be good to those in need – a lesson we should hardly need to hear – but to challenge our presuppositions and prejudices and to re-evaluate our judgement of the Samaritans (those who are different to us) in our own lives.



Church News from around the world

FIRST WOMEN MEMBERS OF VATICAN DEPARTMENT THAT OVERSEES RELIGIOUS ORDERS APPOINTED

Pope Francis has named the first women members of the Vatican department that oversees religious orders.

On 8 July 2019, it was announced the Pope had named a raft of new appointments to the board of the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life, including seven women.

A Vatican spokesman confirmed to The Tablet that they are the first female members to hold such a position on the body.

The women chosen include the following superiors general from religious orders: Kathleen Appler of the Daughters of Charity, Yvonne Reungoat, of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians (Salesian Sisters), Françoise Massy of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary, Luigia Coccia, of the Comboni missionary sisters, Simona Brambilla, Consolata Missionary Sisters, M. Rita Calvo Sanz, of the Order of the Company of Mary Our Lady. He also named Olga Krizova, general president of the Don Bosco Secular Volunteer Institute.

The appointments also mean that women will, for the first time, have a say over the direction of a Vatican department with a remit that includes the life of religious sisters.

The Pope's latest move comes soon after he chose the first women consultors to the Synod of Bishops, and to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. The latest appointments, however, give the women executive rather than simply consultative roles.

Throughout his pontificate, the Pope has slowly set about trying to appoint more women to positions in the male-dominated Vatican. He named the first ever woman consulters to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, along with two female undersecretaries at the Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life. He also chose the first female deputy director of the Holy See Press Office, Paloma Garcia Ovejero - although she resigned her position at the end of last year.

CHRISTIANS THE "MOST PERSECUTED" RELIGIOUS GROUP by Ruth Gledhill

The British government should consider sanctions on countries where Christians are persecuted, according an independent review for the Foreign Secretary.

The report, by the Church of England Bishop of Truro Philip Mounstephen, recommends the UK "be prepared to impose sanctions against perpetrators of Freedom of Religious Belief (FoRB) abuses."

It also recommends the government explore how social media strategies can promote religious freedom and counter religious hate, and that a standard definition of FoRB be established. Foreign Secretary Jeremys Hunt said that if he became prime minister, he would make sure all the recommendations were acted on.

It is estimated that one third of the world's population suffers from religious persecution in some form, with Christians constituting "by far the most widely persecuted religion," the report says. Examples include the removal of crosses, the destruction of Church buildings and other Church symbols and the killing and abduction of clergy.


The report details how the eradication of Christians and other 33 minorities on pain of "the sword" or other violent means was revealed to be the stated objective of extremist groups in Syria, Iraq, Egypt, north-east Nigeria and the Philippines.

"The main impact of such genocidal acts against Christians is internal displacement and exodus. Christianity now faces the possibility of being wiped-out in parts of the Middle East where its roots go back furthest. In Palestine, Christian numbers are below 1.5 percent; in Syria the Christian population has declined from 1.7 million in 2011 to below 450,000 and in Iraq, largely through the 'ethnic cleansing' of ancient Christian communities from the Nineveh Plains, Christian numbers have slumped from 1.5 million before 2003 to below 120,000 today. Christianity is at risk of disappearing, representing a massive setback for plurality in the region. It is that plurality which has been a key for security and stability in the region for hundreds of years."

SEARCHING FOR A NEW MATURITY

"Be in the world, but not of the world!" Great advice, but not easy to follow. We struggle with this tension. On the one side, the temptation is to keep ourselves pure and unstained by the world, but at the cost of excessively separating ourselves from it, not loving it, not leaving ourselves vulnerable as Jesus did to feel its pains, and not modeling how someone can live inside the world and still have a vibrant faith and church life. The other temptation is the opposite: To enter the world and love and bless its energy, but to do so in a way that ultimately offers nothing in the way being salt and light for the world.

We will never be free of this tension. Such is the price of paradox. However in order to live within it more healthily, we need a certain theology and spirituality to guide us and we need a greater personal maturity to sustain us.

What kind of theology and spirituality can help us? What kind of personal and collective maturity is being asked of us?

In terms of a theology and a spirituality, what we need is a vision that holds in proper tension our love for the world and our love for God. One may not be sacrificed for the other; they must be brought into proper relation.

We need to be able to love the world in such a way that we bless and honour its goodness, its energy, its colour, its zest, and its moral strengths, even as we stand where the cross of Jesus is forever being erected and speak prophetic words of challenge in the face of the world's moral deficiencies, injustices, self-preoccupation, proclivity to greed, and less-than-full vision. But prophecy is predicated on love. Unless we first honour and bless what is good in the world we don't have the moral right to criticise it.

We need to be in solidarity with the world in everything but sin, blessing it with one hand, even as we hold the cross of Christ with the other.

But that's not easy. We don't just lack the vision, we also lack the moral and emotional strength needed to imitate Jesus. He could walk with sinners, eat with them, embrace them, forgive their sins, feel the pain and chaos of sin, yet not sin himself. He could challenge the world, even as he blessed and enjoyed its energies.

And the struggle to do that is not abstract, but earthy: Mostly we can't live as Jesus did simply because we lack the maturity to walk amidst the temptations, distractions, and comforts offered by the world without either losing ourselves in them,

selling out our message, or unhealthily withdrawing into safe enclaves to huddle in fear, against the world, protected from it, but at the cost of denigrating its goodness, energy, colour, and zest.

It's no accident that our church communities sometimes look fearful, grey, sexless, and uninviting in comparison to the freedom, colour, eros, and energy that's manifest in the world. We remain religious, but often at the cost of being unhealthily fearful, timid, frigid and depressed.

But Jesus was never fearful, timid, frigid, or depressed. We often are because we need to protect ourselves, given that we haven't got Jesus' maturity. And our timidity has its own wisdom, but ...

in the 16th century, Ignatius of Loyola looked at the church and thought a new maturity was needed. He founded the Jesuits in response. We need that today.

Someone needs to found a religious community with no rules because, for its members, none would be needed. Everyone would be mature enough to live out a poverty, chastity, and obedience that does not need to be externally prescribed and over-protected by symbols that set it apart. Attitudes and behaviour would be shaped from inside and would emanate from a commitment to a community, a vision, and a God that puts one under an obedience that is more demanding than any outside rule. The community would be mixed, men and women together, but strong enough to affectively love each other, remain chaste, and model friendship and family beyond sex and without denigrating sex. The community would be radically immersed in the world. Its members, sustained by prayer and community, would be free, like Jesus, of curfews and laws, to dine with everyone, saints and sinners alike, without sinning themselves. This community would give itself to the world, even as it resisted being of the world.

Perhaps that's naive, but whenever I voice this fantasy to an audience the reaction is always very strong.

Where can I find it? I'll join tomorrow!

The world needs mature Christians who, like Jesus, have the strength to walk inside the world, right inside the chaos of sin itself, without sinning themselves. Like the young men in the Book of Daniel, Christians must be able walk around inside the flames without being consumed themselves, safe, singing sacred songs in *the heart of the blaze*.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: THE EDGE OF THE INSIDE

Prophets, by their very nature, cannot be at the centre of any social structure. Rather, they are "on the edge of the inside." They can't be full insiders, but they can't throw rocks from outside either. A true prophet must be educated inside the system, knowing & living the rules, before they can critique what is non-essential or not so important. Jesus did this masterfully (see Mt 5:17-48). This is what Martin Luther King, Jr.taught the US, what Gandhi taught British-occupied India, and what Nelson Mandela taught apartheid South Africa.

Only with great respect for and understanding of the rules can a prophet know how to properly break those very same rules—for the sake of a greater purpose and value. A prophet critiques a system by quoting its own documents, constitutions, heroes, and Scriptures against its present practice. This is their secret: systems are best unlocked from inside, and not by negative or angry people.

Holding the tension of opposites is the necessary education of the prophet, yet Christianity has given little energy to what Paul says is the second most important charism for building the church (1 Corinthians 12:28; Ephesians 4:11). Prophets must be skilled in nondual thinking, but churches have primarily trained people in the simplistic choosing of one idealised alternative while denigrating the other. This has gotten us nowhere.

After Christianity became the established religion of the Empire

in the fourth century, the priestly mentality pretty much took over in both East and West, and prophets almost disappeared. When the Church held so much power, prophets were too threatening to the status quo. The clergy were at the top of the hierarchy in the full company of their patrons—kings and princes—and even began to dress like them. Emperors convened and presided over the first seven Councils of the Church. What does this tell us?

For the next 1700 or so years, most of the preaching and interpretation of Scripture was from the perspective of power, from primarily European, educated, quite comfortable, and presumably celibate males. I am one myself, and we are not all bad. But we are not all—by a long shot! Where are the voices of women, people of colour, LGBTQ folk, the poor, and differently abled? How would they read the Gospel? Without these voices included, even central, I see little future for Christianity.

My spiritual father, St Francis of Assisi, saw this problem in the thirteenth century and called people to live on the edge—of the Church, of the dominant economy which always protects the top, of patriarchy, of the "system"—through universal solidarity and chosen simplicity. Pope Francis is evoking the same Gospel spirit, and I pray for his success and protection. What a surprise that the ultimate establishment figure took the name of such a radical saint. It shocked the world because we do not expect prophecy from popes. There is hope!



As planned, we now have two separate 'Tap and Go' machines for contributions and presently they are located on the shelf **in the side foyer** of Lindfield church.

The machines are clearly labelled – one allows for contributions to the **First Collection** (which provides for Fr Colin and Fr Thomas and for the sick and retired priests of the diocese) and one for the **Second Collection** (which provides all the operating revenue for our parish).



A New Name for an Old and Faithful Hall

Having discussed this with the Parish Pastoral Council, and having invited comment from the community last Sunday, we are going to name our parish hall at Killara 'St Joseph's Hall' We do this to acknowledge and pay tribute to the pioneering members of the faith community at West Lindfield

The Catholic community at Killara had its first home when, as part of the Bradfield Park migrant accommodation facility (on the site of the former RAAF base), one of the huts became the first Catholic Church – 'St Joseph's – with Fr Hugh Law as priest. At this point the West Lindfield Catholic community was still formally part of Lindfield parish though in due course it became the separate Parish of West Lindfield (re-named Killara Parish in 1967) and in 1963 the present church of the Immaculate Heart of Mary was built.

A wonderful expression of the supportive interrelationship between the Lindfield and Killara Catholic communities which has existed since the very beginning is that the former Lindfield parish paid for the purchase of the site where Immaculate Heart of Mary Church and presbytery now stands at a cost of £11,700, with an expectation of only £3,700 being repaid at a separate date. The cost of building the beautiful new church and presbytery was paid for by the generous fundraising of the local community.

In 2010 of course the two parishes came together once more as the Parish of Lindfield-Killara, giving a new expression to the deep interconnection which has

existed since the very beginning.

By naming our Hall at Killara **St Joseph's Hall** we pay tribute those pioneers in our faith who worked so hard in the early days of the Killara community. It also stands as a challenge to us, in our present generation, to continue the good work which they began. *Fr Colin*
