Today we enter Jerusalem with Jesus and so enter into Holy Week, the holiest week in our calendar. As we reflect on the Passion of Jesus today's liturgy calls us to set this week aside as no other week. We do not prepare for Easter holidays – we prepare for the Easter holy days.

We enter into the most wonderful week of our year, a week with liturgy rich in its symbolism and its power to touch our hearts and give life to our spirits. But it's up to us whether we give the Easter liturgy the chance to do that to us, and within us.



Let's enter together into the entirety of the Easter Triduum, from the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, through the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday morning and the Solemn Liturgy in the afternoon, and climaxing in the celebration of the Mass of the Easter Vigil and the joyful celebration of the resurrection at 7:30pm on Holy Saturday evening.

The days of the life-giving death and resurrection of Jesus are fast approaching. Let's enter into them and be renewed as individuals and as a parish. Fr Colin

#### RICHARD ROHR'S MEDITATION:

#### IRREPLACEABLE "THISNESS"

Each mortal thing does one thing and the same; Deals out that being indoors each one dwells; Selves—goes itself; myself it speaks and spells, Crying what I do is me: for that I came. —Gerard Manley Hopkins [1]

Franciscan philosopher-theologian Blessed John Duns Scotus (1266-1308) taught extensively on the absolute uniqueness of each act of creation. His doctrine of haecceity is derived from haec, the Latin word for "this." Duns Scotus said the absolute freedom of God allows God to create, or not to create, each creature. Its existence means God has positively chosen to create that creature, precisely as it is.

Each creature is thus not merely one member of a genus and species, but a unique aspect of the infinite Mystery of God. God is continuously choosing each created thing specifically to exist, moment by moment. This teaching alone made Duns Scotus a favourite of mystics and poets like Gerard Manley Hopkins and Thomas Merton, who both considered themselves "Scotists"—as do I. I studied this largely unknown genius for four years in college, which is why I quote him so often.

Duns Scotus taught that you cannot know something spiritually by saying it is a not-that, by negation or distinguishing it from something else. You can only know anything by meeting it in its precise and irreplaceable thisness and honouring it there. Each individual act of creation is a once-in-eternity choice on God's part. The direct implication of this truth is that love must precede all true knowledge, which was at the heart of all Franciscan-based philosophy.

In a word, this is contemplation: to look at reality with a primary gaze of love. Contemplation has been described as "a long, loving look at the Real." [2] Nondual consciousness is learning how to be present to what is right in front of me, to the Now, exactly as it is, without splitting or dividing it, without judgment, analysis, or resistance. We must say yes before we offer any no!

In other words, our mind, heart, soul, and senses are open and receptive to the moment, just as it is. This allows us to say, "Just this," and love things in themselves, as themselves, and by themselves, regardless of how they benefit or make demands on us. Is there any other way to truly love anything?

Spiritual knowledge is to know things subject to subject (I-Thou), whereas rational knowing is to know things subject to object (I-it). There is, of course, a place for both; but most people have never been taught how to see in this deeper, nondual way, center to centre and subject to subject—and that is the seeing that changes our lives.

❖ AN ECUMENICAL PALM SUNDAY: this year for the third time we have the wonderful opportunity to enter into Holy Week with our brothers and sisters from Lindfield Uniting Church. At 10:00am (not 10:15am) TODAY (Palm Sunday) 25<sup>th</sup> March. We will gather in the forecourt outside MacKillop Hall next to the school. From there we will process with our palms to the church while our brothers and sisters from Lindfield Uniting Church will then set forth to walk up the highway to their church on the

corner of Provincial Road. Please be part of this wonderful beginning to Holy Week.

- ❖ GATHERING AT THE ONE TABLE OF THE LORD ON HOLY THURSDAY: This year we will once again have a single celebration of Mass on Holy Thursday so that on the very night that Jesus gathered with his disciples for the Last Supper we too can gather as one parish around one altar. #### OUR PARISH FINANCES - A RATHER URGENT MESSAGE

Our Second Collection (which provides all the income for the running costs of our parish) is currently tracking \$20,000 behind compared to the same point last year. And last year at this point we were tracking \$20,000 behind compared to the previous year. As you would appreciate we can't possibly continue to experience such a decline in income when expenses – as we all know – grow annually.

In addition, the First Collection, which provides for Fr Colin and Fr Thomas, as well as for the health and retirement costs of the clergy, is tracking \$5000 behind compared to last year.

- could you make a small increase to the amount you give? If everyone was able to do this each week it would cumulatively make a big difference.


#### HOLY SATURDAY

SINCE IT IS THE PRINCIPAL CELEBRATION OF THE ENTIRE CHURCH YEAR we will have a single celebration of the Easter Vigil for the whole parish. ## ...we need your help.....

There are a several simple ways you could help us to celebrate the great feast of Easter:

- A holy forest: on Holy Thursday night we again want to create a beautiful 'Garden of Gethsemane' at the Altar of Repose at Killara. To do that could we ask you to do some garden trimming and drop us off your offcuts – they can include plenty of large leafy branches up to 2 metres tall, palm fronds etc. We also need a loan of large pot plants if that's possible. If you can help please drop your foliage off to the parish hall at Killara – either on the Wednesday night of Holy Week, or on Holy Thursday morning before 11am.
- Setting up: then we need helpers to set up the Garden of Gethsemane at 11am at Killara on Holy Thursday.
- Easter Flowers: While the flowers for the churches are normally provided by volunteers, at Easter the parish pays for the flowers since there are a much larger quantity needed. If you would like to help by making a donation towards the cost of the Easter flowers for our churches please contact the Parish Office.
- Easter Party: and finally there will again be an 'Easter Party' in THE Shirley Wallace Parish Centre following the Easter Vigil. Please bring a plate and drop it off to the hall before the Easter Vigil begins. Please also see the notice on page 6 about other ways we need help with the Easter party.



EASTER OFFERINGS



After the Mass each month there will be a sausage sizzle (gold coin donation) to which all are welcome.


We hope this will particularly help our young families to take part since the combination of an earlier start time plus food afterwards means that the kids are ready for bed at a reasonable hour once you get home.

# Love Story

Allowing the Christian Creed to touch and change our lives

### Part 4:

#### Out of love

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the scriptures.

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father. he will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

These words remind us that this wonderful love story was lived out as a real drama in the history of our world, in the life, suffering and death of one like us. And the importance of that is that it means that that loving working of grace takes place in our life too, in our history, in our joys and griefs, in our life and death.

Behind each of those three simple words – Jesus' <u>life</u>, <u>suffering</u> and <u>death</u>  $\sim$  lies the richness of the love story:

- \* a **life** of helping people to allow faith to touch their hearts, not just their heads, moving people from the law to the Spirit; a life of accepting the sinner and outcast, not merely by *telling* them they were loved, but by loving them. A life of calling people to shape their whole being around love for their neighbour.
- \* a **suffering** that comes to so many good people through misunderstanding, prejudice, closed-mindedness and hard-heartedness. And yet a suffering that did not retaliate with violence or with anger or with a desire for revenge, but only forgiveness. A suffering underlain by faith and by peace.
- \* a **death** that reminds us that our final destiny is not in this world, that all our plans and achievements will one day pass, that our destiny is so much greater than what we do, and consists rather in what we become. A death too that was a final act of loving fidelity, of handing himself over to the Father: *'into your hands I commit my spirit.'*

We profess the love story lived out in that life, suffering and death, the love story which touches all those parts of our own life because he *rose again on the third day*. The Resurrection is God's love saying yes to Jesus' life of loving service, yes to his non-violent encounter with suffering, yes to his final act of fidelity in handing his life over into the Father's hands. All that is good and noble is affirmed in the Resurrection, the highpoint of this love story.

This can be hard for some to manage, particularly when the church is in darkness for the Vigil. We will instead turn to face the main church door where the fire will be lit just outside. The light of the Paschal Candle will then be brought into the church and spread amongst our tapers (which will be provided) — a beautifully increasing glow of light filling the church and representing the light of Easter spreading in our midst.

**AND FEASTING!** ... Following the Easter Vigil everyone is once again invited to stay on and share beer, wine, tea, coffee and supper together. All drinks will be provided. Please bring a plate of food if you are able (which can be dropped off to the Shirley Wallace Parish Centre before the Easter Vigil).

ACTION: If there is slavery-free chocolate in your supermarket buy it and commend the shop manager. Remember it must have one of these three symbols on the wrapper:








#### PLEASE BE THERE. PLEASE BE HERE.

(continued from page 16): the time of his arrest until the moment of his death, her body too was humiliated, led around by others, stripped, prodded, and stared at by curious passers-by. Indeed, like Jesus, she died thirsty, with a sponge held to her lips by someone else.

This was her passion. She, the one who had spent so many years doing things for others, now had to submit to having things done to her. But, and this is the point, like Jesus, she was able in that period of her life, when she was helpless and no longer in charge, to give life and meaning to others in a deeper way than she could when she was active and doing so many things for others.

There's great lesson in this, not the least of which is how we view the terminally ill, the severely handicapped, and the sick. There's a lesson too on how we might understand ourselves when we are ill, helpless, and in need of care from others.

The cross teaches us that we, like Jesus, give as much to others in our passivities as in our activities. When we are no longer in charge, beaten down by whatever, humiliated, suffering, and unable even to make ourselves understood by our loved ones, we are undergoing our passion and, like Jesus in his passion, have in that the opportunity to give our love and ourselves to others in a very deep way.

#### REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES ....

"All of you will have your faith shaken, for it is written: I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be dispersed. But after I have been raised up, I shall go before you to Galilee."

#### THE CROSS AS REVEALING THE PASSION

We speak of one section of the Gospels, that which narrates Jesus' life from the Last Supper until his death and burial, as chronicling his "Passion." On Good Friday, the lector begins the Gospel reading with the words: "The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to John." Why do we call Jesus' suffering his passion?

Generally this is not properly understood. We tend to think that "passion" here refers to intense sufferings, as in "passionate suffering". This is not wrong, but misses a key point. Passion comes from the Latin, *passio*, meaning passiveness, non-activity, absorbing something more than actively doing anything. The "Passion" of Jesus refers to that time in his life where his meaning for us is not defined by what he was doing but rather by what was being done to him. What is being said here?

The public life and ministry of Jesus can be divided into two distinct parts: Scholars estimate that Jesus spent about three years preaching and teaching before being put to death. For most of that time, for all of it in fact except the last day, he was very much the doer, in command, the active one, teaching, healing, performing miracles, giving counsel, eating with sinners, debating with church authorities, and generally, by activity of every sort, inviting his contemporaries into the life of God. And he was busy. He is described at times as being so pressured by people that he didn't even have time to eat. For almost all of his public life Jesus was actively doing something.

However, from the time he walked out of the last supper room and began to pray in Gethsemane, that activity stops. He is no longer the one who is doing things for others, but the one who is having things done to him. In the garden, they arrest him, bind his hands, lead him to the high priest, then to Pilate. He is beaten, humiliated, stripped of his clothes, and eventually nailed to a cross where he dies. This constitutes his "passion," that time in his life and ministry where he ceases to be the doer and becomes the one who has things done to him.

What is so remarkable about this is that our faith teaches us that we are saved more through his passion (his death and suffering) than through all of his activity of preaching and doing miracles. How does this work?

Allow me an illustration: Some years ago, my sister, Helen, an Ursuline nun, died of cancer. A nun for more than thirty years, she much loved her vocation and was much loved within it. For most of those thirty years, she served as a den-mother to hundreds of young women who attended an academy run by her order. She loved those young women and was for them a mother, an older sister, and a mentor. For the last twenty years of her life, after our own mother died, she also served in that same capacity for our family, organising us and keeping us together. Through all those years she was the active-one, the consummate-doer, the one that others expected to take charge. She relished the role. She loved doing things for others.

Nine months before she died, cancer struck her brutally and she spent the last months of her life bed-ridden. Now things needed to be done for her and to her. Doctors, nurses, her sisters in community, and others, took turns taking care of her. And, like Jesus from
