27 - 5 - 18

This week: Deut 4:32~34, 39~40; Rom 8:14~17; Mt 28:16~20 Next week: Ex 24:3~8; Heb 9:11~15; Mk 14:12~16,22~26

With last Sunday's celebration of Pentecost we brought the Easter Season to a close. On Monday we moved back into the Ordinary Time of the Church year.

However, the first two Sundays of this Ordinary Time are always celebrated as great feasts – today, Trinity Sunday, and next week, the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi).

Trinity Sunday celebrates the God we experience in the Easter mystery: the **Father** who reaches out in love to the world in the incarnation, death and resurrection of the **Son**, who by the power of the **Holy Spirit** draws us with him to share in the life of the Father.

Ordinary Time reminds us that we discover God and that we minister God's love to others in the ordinary: in the simple things, where we live, where we work, just by who we are and how we relate.

Ordinary Time calls us to be a people filled with the life of the Trinity who bring that life to others.

# TODAY'S CELEBRATION - - THE SOLEMNITY OF THE TRINITY FATHER, SON, HOLY SPIRIT

Trinity Sunday comes immediately on the heels of the Easter Season and brings us to face the mystery of the God in which we believe: one God, a Trinity of Persons.

Today's celebration follows the season of Easter because *it's in the Easter mystery* of the life and death and resurrection of Jesus that we encounter the mystery of God's inner being;

the *Father* who reaches out in love to the world, the *Son* who shows us the face of the Father, the *Spirit* who fills us with the life of God in Jesus.

The Trinity is not a geometrical puzzle: it is about the living God, whose inner life opens to enfold and involve us:

The Father, who reaches out in love: calls us to lives that open in selflessness to others;

the Son, who reflects the face of the Father: calls us to reflect that Face in who we are and what we do:

the **Spirit**, who sanctifies the world:

calls us to move outwards to that world & to bring to it the touch of God (something we can do only if we're in touch with that Spirit).

The Trinity then isn't to be a 'fact' about God, outside of ourselves, and divorced from life.

It's a mystery to be lived.

It's about a personal God **who invites us in**, and who calls us to **live** the mystery of the Trinity in our own lives, through our lives to bring that mystery of communion and loving outreach to others.

As such today is not a 'feast', here today and gone tomorrow.

It confronts us with the heart of our faith.

It asks us to reflect on that faith.

It asks us to renew that faith.

It sends us out to allow that faith (and that God) to touch the world. Fr Colin

## GAUDETE ET EXULTATE 'REJOICE AND BE GLAD'

Continuing the extracts from Pope Francis' new letter, Gaudete et Exultate. To read the full letter yourself go to our parish website and you'll find the link in the hotlink box on the homepage.

The Pope then moves on to another barrier to true holiness: the ancient error of pelagianism – believing that we have to merit or earn God's grace:

The Catechism of the Catholic Church also reminds us that the gift of grace "surpasses the power of human intellect and will" and that "with regard to God, there is no strict right to any merit on the part of man. Between God and us there is an immeasurable inequality". God's friendship infinitely transcends us; we cannot buy it with our works, it can only be a gift born of his loving initiative. This invites us to live in joyful gratitude for this completely unmerited gift, since "after one has grace, the grace already possessed cannot come under merit". The saints avoided putting trust in their own works: "In the evening of this life, I shall appear before you empty-handed, for I do not ask you, Lord, to count my works. All our justices have stains in your sight". *n. 54* 

This is one of the great convictions that the Church has come firmly to hold. It is so clearly expressed in the word of God that there can be no question of it. Like the supreme commandment of love, this truth should affect the way we live, for it flows from the heart of the Gospel and demands that we not only accept it intellectually but also make it a source of contagious joy. Yet we cannot celebrate this free gift of the Lord's friendship unless we realize that our earthly life and our natural abilities are his gift. We need "to acknowledge jubilantly that our life is essentially a gift, and recognise that our freedom is a grace. This is not easy today, in a world that thinks it can keep something for itself, the fruits of its own creativity or freedom". n.55

Only on the basis of God's gift, freely accepted and humbly received, can we cooperate by our own efforts in our progressive transformation. We must first belong to God, offering ourselves to him who was there first, and entrusting to him our abilities, our efforts, our struggle against evil and our creativity, so that his free gift may grow and develop within us: "I appeal to you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God" (Rom 12:1). For that matter, the Church has always taught that charity alone makes growth in the life of grace possible, for "if I do not have love, I am nothing" (1 Cor 13:2). *n. 56* 

Not infrequently, contrary to the promptings of the Spirit, the life of the Church can become a museum piece or the possession of a select few. This can occur when some groups of Christians give excessive importance to certain rules, customs or ways of acting. The Gospel then tends to be reduced and constricted, deprived of its simplicity, allure and savour. This may well be a subtle form of pelagianism, for it appears to subject the life of grace to certain human structures. It can affect groups, movements and communities, and it explains why so often they begin with an intense life in the Spirit, only to end up fossilised... or corrupt. n.58

Once we believe that everything depends on human effort as channelled by ecclesial rules and structures, we unconsciously complicate the Gospel and become enslaved to a blueprint that leaves few openings for the working of grace. Saint Thomas Aquinas reminded us that the precepts added to the Gospel by the Church should be imposed with moderation "lest the conduct of the faithful become burdensome", for then our religion would become a form of servitude. n.59

The choir spent the week with host families from our parish and were treated to some fabulous activities such as paddle boarding and sightseeing trips to Sydney Harbour and beyond! They also worked hard, with a number of workshops at Holy Family School, St Pius, North Sydney Demonstration School and our BLAST & Fusions youth groups. They also lead a team building workshop for CHU Insurance.



This all culminated in two sensational concerts for the Lindfield Killara Parish last Saturday.

The choir attracted a fair amount of press coverage, being interviewed by the ABC and Sydney Morning Herald during the week.

Some of the choir members shared their personal stories with their audience. Behind those beautiful smiles, warm hugs and enthusiasm lies a childhood of poverty and heartbreak. The African Children's Choir provides disadvantaged young people with

the opportunity to change their lives and the lives of their community.

More than \$14,500 was raised for the choir to support their efforts in continuing their education when they return home. We also had 15 families/individuals come forward to become a sponsor for a child's education.

It was a fabulous experience, with thanks to Fr Colin for welcoming the idea and to the many, many people who helped make the week a success.

And a postscript from Fr Colin: A huge thank you to Fran Grant, ably assisted by Jean Shatek, without whom this wonderful visit would never have happened. Their dedication and hard work in the lead up to and during this wonderful visit was phenomenal. Fr Colin



### A FORUM ON THE ABUSE CRISIS ~ TO BE HELD HERE IN OUR PARISH ~

Our Parish Pastoral Council has been working to arrange a forum on this important topic so that we can hear how our Church, and in particular our own diocese, responds to child protection these days, how instances of abuse are now dealt with, and to provide a forum for questions.

This has now been arranged for Tuesday 26th June 7:00~9:00pm in St Brigid's Hall.

The panel participating in the forum will include Very Rev. David Ranson, our diocesan Vicar-General; Ms Jodie Crisafulli, our Diocesan Child Protection Officer; Aaron Tang, a member of our own parish and a lawyer who worked with the Royal Commission; and Stephen Crittenden, the former ABC religious journalist who was the principal policy officer and lead writer of the Royal Commission's final volume on religious institutions.

We are also working on securing an independent chair for the forum.

Julie Blyth will be available as a counsellor on the night should that need arise for anyone. Julie was a Royal Commission counsellor and has been working in the field of child sexual abuse (including within churches) for around 28 years.

We hope that this evening will be of help to all who are distressed by these crimes both within the Church and within wider society.

### CARING FOR EACH OTHER DURING THESE WINTER MONTHS

- \* if you have a cold or the flu, or feel that it might be coming on, please refrain from receiving from the chalice;

下期 CCC 期刊主題青年年之神 恩浩蕩 3/6 截稿 (continued from p.12...) grandmother massaged her skin, over and over again, and the rash that seemingly couldn't be eradicated disappeared. Skin needs to be touched. This is what happens in the Eucharist and that is why the Eucharist, and every other Christian sacrament, always has some very tangible physical element to it—a laying on of hands, a consuming of bread and wine, an immersion into water, an anointing with oil. An embrace needs to be physical, not only something imagined.

G.K. Chesterton once wrote: "There comes a time, usually late in the afternoon, when the little child tires of playing policeman and robbers. It's then that he begins to torment the cat!" Mothers, with young children, are only too familiar with this late afternoon hour and its particular dynamic. There comes an hour, usually just before supper, when a child's energy is low, when it is tired and whining, and when the mother has exhausted both her patience and her repertoire of warnings: "Leave that alone! Don't do that!" The child, tense and miserable, is clinging to her leg. At that point, she knows what to do. She picks up the child. Touch, not word, is what's needed. In her arms, the child grows calm and tension leaves its body.

That's an image for the Eucharist. We are that tense, over-wrought child, perennially tormenting the cat. There comes a point, even with God, when words aren't enough. God has to pick us up, like a mother her child. Physical embrace is what's needed. Skin needs to be touched. God knows that. It's why Jesus gave us the Eucharist.

### EUCHARIST AS GOD'S PHYSICAL EMBRACE

There's a story told of a young Jewish boy named Mortakai who refused to go to school. When he was six years old, his mother took him to school, but he cried and protested all the way and, immediately after she left, ran back home. She brought him back to school and this scenario played itself out for several days. He refused to stay in school. His parents tried to reason with him, arguing that he, like all children, must now go to school. To no avail. His parents then tried the age-old trick of applying an appropriate combination of bribes and threats. This too had no effect.

Finally, in desperation they went to their Rabbi and explained the situation to him. For his part, the Rabbi simply said: "If the boy won't listen to words, bring him to me." They brought him into the Rabbi's study. The Rabbi said not a word. He simply picked up the boy and held him to his heart for a long time. Then, still without a word, he set him down. What words couldn't accomplish, a silent embrace did. Mortakai not only began willingly to go to school, he went on to become a great scholar and a Rabbi.

What that parable wonderfully expresses is how the Eucharist works. In it, God physically embraces us. Indeed that is what all sacraments are, God's physical embrace. Words, as we know, have a relative power. In critical situations they often fail us. When this happens, we have still another language, the language of ritual. The most ancient and primal ritual of all is the ritual of physical embrace. It can say and do what words cannot.

Jesus acted on this. For most of his ministry, he used words. Through words, he tried to bring us God's consolation, challenge, and strength. His words, like all words, had a certain power. Indeed, his words stirred hearts, healed people, and affected conversions. But at a time, powerful though they were, they too became inadequate. Something more was needed. So on the night before he death, having exhausted what he could do with words, Jesus went beyond them. He gave us the Eucharist, his physical embrace, his kiss, a ritual within which he holds us to his heart.

To my mind, that is the best understanding there is of Eucharist. Within both my undergraduate and graduate theological training, I took long courses on the Eucharist. In the end, these didn't explain the Eucharist to me, not because they weren't good, but because the Eucharist, like a kiss, needs no explanation and has no explanation. If anyone were to write a four hundred page book entitled, The Metaphysics of a Kiss, it would be not deserve a readership. Kisses just work, their inner dynamics need no metaphysical elaboration.

The Eucharist is God's kiss. Andre Dubos, the Cajun novelist, used to say: "Without the Eucharist, God becomes a monologue." He's right. A couple of years ago, Brenda Peterson, in a remarkable little essay entitled, *In Praise of Skin*, describes how she once was inflicted by a skin-rash that no medicine could effectively soothe. She tried every kind of doctor and medicine. To no avail. Finally she turned to her grandmother, remembering how, as a little girl, her grandmother used to massage her skin whenever she had rashes, bruises, or was otherwise ill. The ancient remedy worked again. Her

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
