all serve to keep human beings away from what is deepest within them.

As Jesus offers himself as our bread of life we have to first ensure that we know what true and deep hunger for the things of the Spirit is about. Otherwise he's food that we won't be interested in receiving. Fr Colin





Bread for the Soul

We are more than physical people beginning and ending in the here and now but incarnate spirits, destined to live for ever in the happiness and wonder of life unlimited in God. Spirit animates the body, allowing it express and engage itself with what is of earth. Jesus said, "It is the spirit that gives life..." (John 6:64). Spirit charges the brain's activity particularly when it is in any of its thinking, grieving, intuiting, praying, willing, wondering and dreaming moods. It directs the pen of the writer, the scalpel of the surgeon, the hands of the taxi driver and those of priest and well—wisher tracing the sign of the cross in a blessing. It loves and loves being loved, responds to life's beauties and absurdities and recognising humour in life moves the whole self to laughter.

Without the spirit's presence the body is a designer collection of molecules, in themselves unable to feel anything. It is not uncommon to hear our physical, biological, pleasurable sexual activity is primarily of the brain – of the spirit. "The creative range of spirit is earthed in this relational structure of the sexual body, the point of the aphorism is inescapable" (Tony Kelly CSsR "Expanding Theology").

But the physical self is no slouch. The atoms in our bodies have a prehistory which puts the most brilliant author of the wildest imaginative inter-galactic fantasy into the kindergarten class. All we call "creation", in our planet home and every element in our physical selves, science tells us was forged in the blazing heat of a primal fireball that exploded 20 billion years ago, the *Big Bang*. We are stardust. So heady are our molecules' astral ancestry, so indescribable their navigation from the reaches of the firmament to us, science itself is dizzy with its discoveries. A scenario moreworthy of the boundless creativity of the awesome, limitless Creator God than any human spirit at its imaginative best.

Nature offers its parable of no death only change. A body in its casket to us is "dead", human life no longer animating it. But every cell is alive and being activated to promote and continue life in creation as surely as the brittle, brown leaves fallen from a tree are becoming life-giving fertiliser invigorating life in grasses, trees and farm crops..

The spiritual saying, In life there is death, should be, in death there is life.

Jesus never dismissed earthly existence as of no account. The gospels tell over and over of his concern and practical help for people afflicted by life's ills and tragedies. And he said a follower of his will "go and do the same" (Luke:10: 37) for others. To do what he lived and taught of "love of neighbour" is enlivenment for the soul and its relationship with its Maker.

Jesus chided those following him for their spiritual dullness in not grasping his teaching. He had astonished them by feeding five thousand hungry people with five loaves of bread and a few fish ,and he knew they now clamoured around him, not to hear more about his teaching of "spirit and life", but more free food. They failed to grasp he was spiritual bread that could nourish their underfed spiritual selves in a way that would open in them a new dimension in living and meaning in dying. The writer of John' gospel attributes the most profoundly moving and beautiful words in Scripture. to Jesus as heavenly bread. "I am the bread of life, living bread.... Who comes to me will never be hungry... Do not work for bread that cannot last, but work for bread that endures to eternal life." (continued on page 9)

(continued from page 8...): It is thought provoking that the fourth gospel, with so many meaningful references to Jesus being the *living bread of life* should have no account of the Last Supper and the words Jesus spoke during that memorable meal. What the evangelist told of that sad, final meal is that before the men took their places, Jesus did something his followers would long remember, and so should we. No slave or servant present, he took the role of one and washed the men's tired dirty feet. There is no mention of anyone in turn offering to wash Jesus' feet. The lesson to servitude is clear.

In today's debate whether divorced and remarried people should receive Holy Communion it is interesting not only did Jesus wash Judas' feet as in John's gospel, but in Luke's account of the Last Supper gave him Holy Communion well aware of his smouldering intent of treachery (Luke 22:62). A priest was once heard say that Judas' sin was *he could not believe he was forgiven*. Forgiveness was there awaiting him make it his own. Always awaiting us no matter how badly we lapse from Jesus ideals and are at our worst. Jesus not only gave Judas Holy Communion but also to Peter and the disciples knowing of their later cowardly desertion of him during his darkest hour.

The Church selects who may or may not approach the priest and his assistants offering "the body of Christ" and "the blood of Christ" to participants in Eucharistic worship, but if we truly believed what we say we do with our "Amen" who is worthy to receive it anyway? Through our earthly existence we are still, developing, frail, instinctual creatures and few can deny even when we're at our best, there are times when we need the Master's washing and cleansing and that heavenly bread to nourish and strengthen us in our human striving towards the destiny that awaits us.

Perhaps this can be helpful in our search for what to say to some of our own children and young people who no longer go to church and who tell us that the reason they don't go is that they don't find the Eucharist meaningful. We hear that lament all the time today: "Why should go to church, it doesn't mean anything to me?" That objection is simply another way of saying what young Christian de Cherge said to his mother at his first communion: I don't understand this. Perhaps our answer then could be along the lines of the response of his mother: You don't have to understand now, later you will understand.

The British theologian, Ronald Knox, speaking about the Eucharist, submits this: We have never, he claims, as Christians, been truly faithful to Jesus, no matter our denomination. In the end, none of us have truly followed those teachings which most characterize Jesus: we haven't turned the other cheek. We haven't forgiven our enemies. We haven't purified our thoughts. We haven't seen God in the poor. We haven't kept our hearts pure and free from the things of this world. But we have, he submits, been faithful in one very important way; we have kept the Eucharist going. The last thing Jesus asked us to do before he died was to keep celebrating the Eucharist. And that we've done, despite the fact that we have never really grasped rationally what in fact we are doing. But we've been faithful in doing it because we grasped the wisdom in what Christian de Cherge's mother to her son: You don't have to understand this; you just have to do it.

REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES

This is the work of God, that you believe in the one he sent.

A PRIMAL UNDERSTANDING OF THE EUCHARIST

Christian de Cherge, the Trappist Abbott who was martyred in Algeria in 1996, tells this story of his first communion. He grew up in a Roman Catholic family in France and on the day of his first communion he said to his mother: "I don't understand what I'm doing." She answered simply: "It's okay, you don't have to understand it now, later you will understand."

Jesus, no doubt, must have given his disciples the exact same advice at the Last Supper, at their first communion. When he offered them bread and said, "This is my body," and then offered them wine and said, "This is my blood," they would not have understood. There would have been considerable confusion and bewilderment: How are we supposed to understand this? What does it mean to eat someone's body and drink someone's blood? I suspect that in the face of their non-understanding, like Christian de Cherge's mother, Jesus would have also said: You don't have to understand it now, later you will understand.

Indeed in instituting the Eucharist at Last Supper, Jesus didn't ask his disciples to understand what they were doing, he only asked them to faithfully celebrate it until he returned. Their understanding of what they were doing in celebrating the Eucharist only developed as they grew in their faith. But initially, Jesus didn't ask for much of an understanding, nor did he give them much of an explanation for what he was celebrating with them. He simply asked them to eat his body and drink his blood.

Jesus didn't give a theological discourse on the Eucharist at the Last Supper. He simply gave us a ritual and asked us to celebrate it regularly, irrespective of our intellectual understanding of it. One of his more-explicit explanations of the meaning of the Eucharist was his symbolic action of washing his disciples' feet.

Little has changed. We too aren't asked to fully or even adequately understand the Eucharist. Our faith only asks that we are faithful in participating in it. In fact, as is the case for all deep mysteries, there is no satisfactory, rational explanation of the Eucharist. Nobody, not a single theologian in the world, can to anyone's intellectual satisfaction, adequately lay out the phenomenology, psychology, or even spirituality of eating someone else's body and drinking his blood. How is this to be understood? The mind comes up short. We need instead to rely upon metaphors and icons and an inchoate, intuitive understanding. We can truly know this mystery, even as we can't fully understand it.

During my seminary and academic training, I took three major courses on the Eucharist. After all those lectures and books on the Eucharist, I concluded that I didn't understand the Eucharist and that I was happy enough with that because what those courses did teach me was how important it is that I celebrate and participate in the Eucharist. For all the intellectuality in those courses, their true value was that they ultimately said to me what Christian de Cherge's mother said to him on the day of his first communion: You don't have to understand now, later you will understand. Contained in that, of course, is the fact that there is something profound here that is worth understanding, but that it's too deep to be fully grasped right now.
