Food for the spirit

REPENT

He ordered them not to tell anyone. But the more he ordered them not to, the more they proclaimed it.. (Mt 7:36)

“Repent and believe in the good news!”

These are the first words out of Jesus’ mouth in Mark’s gospel and they are meant as a summary of the entire gospel. But what do these words mean?

In English, the word “repent” is often misunderstood. It seems to imply that we have already done something wrong, regret it, and now commit ourselves to live in a new way. Repentance, understood in this way, means to live beyond a sinful past.

Biblically, this is not quite what is meant. In the gospels, the particular word used for repentance is *metanoia*. Literally this means to do an about face, to turn around, to face in an entirely new direction. But what direction?

Robert Barron, then a young theologian out of Chicago, offered a simple, yet profound, understanding of this. In his view, within each of us there are two souls, a little soul (a *pusilla anima*) and a great soul (a *magna anima*). On any given day we tend to identify more with one or the other of these and we are a very different person depending upon which soul is reigning within us.

Thus, if I take my identity from my little soul I will inevitably feel bitter & angry. It is here, in the *pusilla anima*, where I am petty, afraid, aware of my hurts, & constantly nursing the sense of having been cheated & shortchanged. In my little soul, I’m paranoid & defensive. When I relate to life through it, I’m shortsighted, impatient, despairing, & constantly looking for compensation.

But I also have within me a great soul. When I let it reign, I become different person altogether. I am relating out of my great soul at those moments when I am overwhelmed by compassion, when everyone is brother or sister to me, when I want to give of myself without concern of cost, when I am able to carry the tensions of life without a breakdown in my chastity, when I would willingly die for others, and when my arms and my heart would want nothing other than to embrace the whole world and everyone in it.

All of us, I am sure, have had ample experience of both, identifying with the great soul and with the petty soul inside us. Sometimes we operate out of one, sometimes out of the other.

When Jesus asks us to “repent,” to do *metanoia*, what he is asking is that we cease identifying ourselves with the little soul and instead begin to live out of our other soul, the *magna anima*. The very etymology of the word *metanoia*

implies this. It takes its root in two Greek words: *meta*—beyond; and *nous*—mind. Literally, *metanoia* means to move beyond our present mindset, beyond our present way of seeing things.

When one looks at the miracles of Jesus, it is interesting to see that so many of them are connected to opening up or otherwise healing someone’s eyes, ears, or tongue. These miracles, of course, always have more than a physical significance. Eyes are opened in order to see more deeply and spiritually; ears are opened in order to hear things more compassionately; and tongues are loosened in order to praise God more freely and to speak words of reconciliation and love to each other. To put it metaphorically, what Jesus is doing in these miracles is attaching the eyes, ears, and tongue to the great soul so that what a person is now seeing, hearing, and speaking is not bitterness, hurt, and pettiness but rather compassion, gratitude, and praise.

Many of us are familiar with a famous passage in Thomas Merton within which he describes a revelation he had one day while standing on the corner of Fourth and Walnut in Louisville. Among complete strangers in the middle of a shopping district on a very ordinary day, Merton had the sense that his eyes, ears, and tongue were all at once attached to a bigger soul:

I was suddenly overwhelmed with the realization that I loved all of those people, that they were mine, and I, theirs, that we could not be alien to one another even though we were total strangers. It was like waking from a dream of separateness.

... Then it was as if I suddenly saw the secret beauty of their hearts, the depths of their hearts, where neither sin, nor desire, nor self-knowledge, can reach the core of their reality, the person that each one is in God’s eyes. If only we could all see each other that way all the time! There would be no more war, no more hatred, no more cruelty, no more greed. I suppose that the big problem would be that we would all fall down and worship each other.

(Merton, *Conjectures of a Guilty Bystander*, pp 153–154)

To repent is let the great soul, the image and likeness of God, reign within us so that, like Merton on the corner of Fourth and Walnut, we are so overwhelmed with compassion that indeed we do turn and face in a completely new direction.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: LIGHT BY WHICH WE SEE

Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves. difference.

—Step 4 of the Twelve Steps

*Father Richard helps us understand that a moral inventory
or "shadow work" is a necessary part of the spiritual life:*

I am convinced that some people are driven to addictions to
quiet their constant inner critic, but it only gives them
another thing to hate about themselves. What a vicious
cycle! Moral scrutiny is not to discover how good or bad we
are and regain some moral high ground, but to begin some
honest "shadowboxing" which is at the heart of all spiritual
awakening. Yes, "the truth will set you free" as Jesus says
(John 8:32), but first it tends to make us miserable.

People only come to deeper consciousness by intentional
struggles with contradictions, conflicts, inconsistencies,
inner confusions, and what the biblical tradition calls "sin"
or moral failure. The goal is actually not the perfect
avoidance of all sin, which isn't possible anyway (see 1 John
1:8-9; Romans 5:12), but the struggle itself, and the
encounter and wisdom that come from it. Law and failure
create the foil, which creates the conflict, which leads to a
very different kind of victory than any of us expected. Not
perfect moral victory, not moral superiority, but *luminosity
of awareness and compassion for the world*. After thirty
years in "perfect" recovery, alcoholics are still imperfect
and still alcoholic, and they know it, which makes all the

So shadowboxing, a "searching and fearless moral
inventory," is for the sake of truth, humility, and generosity
of spirit, not vengeance on the self or some kind of complete
victory. And while seeing and naming our actual faults
allows us to grow and change, it may be experienced as an
even greater gift by those around us.

Our shadow self is not our evil self. It is just that part of us
that we do not want to see, our unacceptable self by reason
of nature, nurture, and choice. That bit of denial is what
allows us to do evil and cruel things—without recognising
them as evil or cruel. Ongoing shadowboxing is absolutely
necessary because we all have a well-denied shadow self.
We all have that which we cannot see, will not see, dare not
see. It would destroy our public and personal self-image.

Jesus says, "Take the log out of your own eye first, and
then you will see clearly enough to take the splinter out of
your brother's or sister's eye" (Matthew 7:5). Step 4 is
about dealing with our own log first, so we can stop
blaming, accusing, and denying, and thus displacing the
problem. It's about seeing truthfully and fully. Note that
Jesus does not just praise good moral behaviour or criticise
immoral behaviour, as we might expect. Instead, he talks
about something caught in the eye. He knows that if we see
rightly, the actions and behaviour will eventually take care
of themselves.

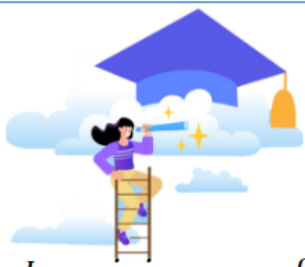

Saint of the Week

St John Chrysostom



St John Chrysostom was born in the 4th century in Antioch. He is considered an early church father, and is known for his eloquent speaking and preaching. John Chrysostom also was an author, and wrote against many heresies (false beliefs). He served as a priest and bishop in Constantinople. John Chrysostom was later excommunicated by the emperor's wife as a result of disagreements over her unjust acquisition of wealth.
