THE FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD CANDLEMAS



Hot summer days. Sunlight streaming on golden beaches. It can be very hard for us as Australians to get our head around the symbolism of today's feast, whose ancient name is Candlemas (the Mass of Candles). It is difficult to get our head around this feast in a country where, if we lit a candle on one of these summer days, we'd be hard-pushed to even be able to see its light given the stiff competition the sun would be putting up!

But when the Church came to choose a day to celebrate the birth of Jesus it chose a day just following the shortest and darkest day of the northern hemisphere's winter: 25th December. Christmas gave vivid expression to the prophet Isaiah's declaration that 'the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light'.

Candlemas, coming forty days later, was still situated deep within the northern winter's dark days but contained the promise of Easter whose light was now on the horizon just as Spring was nearing on the calendar. The 'Mass of Candles' gave powerful expression to the Church's faith that Jesus is a light for us in our darkness, and to the Church's challenge that we be a light in the darkness that comes into other people's lives.

Although we live in another hemisphere and in a different Season to Candlemas' origins our Australian context perhaps allows it to pass on another message:

to ensure that the light of Jesus in our lives is not overwhelmed by brighter and more obvious lights in the same way that candlelight is consumed and diminished by the brightness of our flamboyant summer sun. Can we keep sight of Christ's gentle light? Fr Colin

So much is messy that we can readily recognise the desire to do something to help with the mess. The Feast of the Presentation, with its scene of Mary and Joseph coming to the Temple to do what was required to handle the messiness is something we can all identify with.

The Law also required an offering to redeem the firstborn son. The first of everything – crops, cows, sheep – was to be given to God (see Exodus 34). To keep it back, an appropriate offering had to be made instead. And, there is so much joy around a birth that to give something to say, "Thank you" seems entirely appropriate – but not gift could ever by as precious as the baby is.

It is so hard to give God the first of everything. Time gets swallowed up in busy-ness or exhaustion. Attention is taken up with worry about this or fretting about that. Money never goes as far as it should.

We would like to do something to fix that too. Get our priorities straight. Feel less of a failure. Do things like we think we are supposed to. We'd like to do enough. The Feast

> Candlemas marks the turning point of the Christian Year. Not just because is falls as the first signs of Spring are often in the air – snowdrops appearing, some hints of warmer, and lengthening, days. It is the point where we stop; looking back on the celebrations of Jesus' coming at Christmas and looking forward, moving towards Jesus' passion. We turn from birth towards death and resurrection. At this pivot point in the year we see all the mess and muddle and failure that is to come in the life of any new baby, and for Jesus in particular. But it is frames with light. Requiescat in pace.....Rest in peace Beverley ('Bev') Gledhill

Born to this life 30 June 1935 Born to eternal life 18 December 2024

Singing & acting were always passions of Bev, & the media business was in her blood. Her father was a journalist, her uncle a radio announcer, her aunt an ABC producer in radio. She was a natural performer; singing when she was in kindergarten, even at that early age deciding on a career in musical theatre. When she was nine, she was taking part in radio broadcasts to schools. Her niece Linda says Bev had a voice like Vera Lynn.

Leaving Perth at 15, she started at the ABC in Sydney, assembling scripts. Soon her skills were noted, and Bev became the first woman director working in Australian television.

Television started in Perth in July 1959, Bev being headhunted to train cameramen & TV staff. Over many years, as producer & director Bev was involved with many shows, starting with Woman's World, then Café Continental & then Mr Squiggle for 10 years. Bev also produced Sydney Tonight with Mike Walsh. In the late 1960s, she worked with Professor Julius Sumner Miller producing Why Is It So? Bev spent 10 years producing & directing The Inventors before moving to Channel 9 to produce What Will They Think Of Next?

Bev maintained her links to international inventors through her work as the Australian delegate to the International Exhibition of Inventions in Geneva, in 1985 being awarded an Order of Australia for her work with inventors. She was recognised in 2001 by the international inventors' exhibition with a gold medal & diploma recognising 'her exceptional contribution to the promotion of inventions and services rendered to inventors'.

Bev was part of our parish for 60 years & lived her faith passionately. For many years she worked tirelessly as a volunteer at Lourdes retirement village to ensure the frailer residents were brought to Mass in the chapel. She herself was a devoted daily Mass goer, still coming with her carers until the last fortnight of her life. We trust that she now lives in the embrace of the Lord she served so well.

OUR NEXT PARISH SYNODAL ASSEMBLY



As you know, as a parish we're trying to follow the synodal pathway of discernment in the Holy Spirit which has been put before the Church by Pope Francis.

We had a wonderful inaugural gathering last May but we were sadly unable to have our planned second assembly due to the diocese's assembly as part of the north Shore Deanery discernment.

However, we will now return to our own on-going parish discernment and our first of two gatherings this year will be on **Sunday 9th March** from 11:15am - 1:30pm.

Be assured that this will not be in the format of the Deanery discernment - we will return to last May's format of an open-ended agenda and much mutual listening.

2025: A Jubilee Year

Pope Francis has proclaimed 2025 a Jubilee Year

"Jubilee" is the name given to a particular year; the name comes from the instrument used to mark its launch. In this case, the instrument in question is the *yobel*, the ram's horn, used to proclaim the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur). This (Jewish) holiday occurs every year, but it takes on special significance when it marks the beginning of a Jubilee year. We can find an early indication of it in the Bible: a Jubilee year was to be marked every 50 years, since this would be an "extra" year, one which would happen every seven weeks of seven years, i.e., every 49 years (cf. Leviticus 25:8-13). Even though it wasn't easy to organise, it was intended to be marked as a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation, and involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields.



Quoting the prophet Isaiah, the Gospel of Luke last Sunday described Jesus' mission in this way: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord," (Luke 4:18-19; cf. Isaiah 61:1-2). Jesus lives out these words in his daily life, in his encounters with others and in his relationships, all of which bring about liberation and conversion.

The Jubilee Year began on Christmas Eve. We'll continue to provide information to you here in the bulletin on what will be happening in our own diocese and in our parish in 2025.

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EXPLORING FUTURE DIRECTIONS FOR WOODS COTTAGE

As you know, in 1985, the parish established Woods Cottage as a residence for those with a mild intellectual difficulty and this wonderful service continues to this day. In 2015 we handed over the management of this service to CatholicCare Broken Bay while the parish committee continued to manage and maintain the building itself.

The Parish Management Committee now proposes that the house and the invested funds all be placed in the hands of CatholicCare to better provide for the continuation of this service in the years ahead. This proposal has the support of the outgoing Parish Pastoral Council and the Parish Finance Committee.

We now propose to have a Parish Meeting to consider this issue. This will take place following the 10:15am Mass on Sunday 16th February and we hope that you can be there to be part of this discernment.


