Joday's feast celebrates the great mystery which lies at the heart of our Christian week - the celebration of the Eucharist.

There's no coincidence about the fact that this feast comes just one week after Trinity Sunday and just two weeks after the end of the Easter Season:

because in the Eucharist we encounter the God who is Trinity, and it's through the Easter mystery that we first experience God as Frinity:

the Father who reaches out in love to the world,

the Son who reveals the face of the Father,

who gathers us into unity and draws us,

the Spirit, the bond of love between the Father & the Son


as a communion of human beings, into the communion which is God.

The Eucharist is the very mystery of God breaking into our midst.

The Eucharist is our being drawn into the deepest inner life of God who is communion, who is Trinity.

The Eucharist is our call to live in the image and likeness of the God who created us: as a communion, as a loving fellowship, as a Church.

ON THIS FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI

.....A EUCHARISTIC PROFESSION OF FAITH

We believe in the Eucharist as the supreme sacrament, the one in which, by the power and working of the Holy Spirit, the whole unfolding of God's life and love in the world (in the incarnation, the suffering, death and rising of Jesus) is made present in the midst of the Church.

We believe that as the Church acts in the name of Jesus in celebrating the Lord's Supper ('This is my body, this is the chalice of my blood') that through the power of the Spirit Jesus is made present in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood – the same Jesus who is the revelation of the Father's love; the same Jesus who lived and died as a total gift of fidelity and love returned to the Father; the same Jesus whose *sacrifice* lay in his giving of himself to the Father and to his brothers and sisters even to the point of death; the same Jesus who in his Resurrection receives the gift of the Spirit fully and pours it out on his followers. As Jesus is made present in the Eucharist *all* of this mystery of who Jesus is is also made present. And it therefore comes to us as both gift and challenge:

- the gift of the Father's love to us ~ the gift of Jesus himself;
- the *challenge* to become what we receive, to imitate the mystery we celebrate:

to become ourselves a sacrifice of love to the Father and to our neighbour,

to become the Body of Christ, to become communion, as we share in communion: as we share in the body of Christ; to be made into a communion of love as brothers and sisters because of our sharing in the communion of love which is the Eucharist.

As the theologian Henri de Lubac said, 'The Church may make the Eucharist, but the Eucharist also makes the Church.'

3 Food for the soul

REFLECTING ON THIS SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURES...

The Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." (1 Cor 11:23-24))

EUCHARIST AS GOD'S PHYSICAL EMBRACE

There's a story told of a young Jewish boy named Mortakai who refused to go to school. When he was six years old, his mother took him there, but he cried and protested all the way and, immediately after she left, ran back home. She brought him back to school and this scenario played itself out for several days. He refused to stay in school. His parents tried to reason with him, arguing that he, like all children, must now go to school. To no avail. His parents then tried the age-old trick of applying an appropriate combination of bribes and threats.

This too had no effect.

Finally, in desperation they went to their Rabbi and explained the situation to him. For his part, the Rabbi simply said: "If the boy won't listen to words, bring him to me." They brought him into the Rabbi's study. The Rabbi said not a word. He simply picked up the boy and held him to his heart for a long time. Then, still without a word, he set him down. What words couldn't accomplish, a silent embrace did. Mortakai not only began willingly to go to school, he went on to become a great scholar and a Rabbi.

What that parable wonderfully expresses is how the Eucharist works. In it, God physically embraces us. Indeed that is what all sacraments are, God's physical embrace. Words, as we know, have a relative power. In critical situations they often fail us. When this happens, we have still another language, the language of ritual. The most ancient and primal ritual of all is the ritual of physical embrace. It can say and do what words cannot.

To my mind, that is the best understanding there is of Eucharist. Within both my undergraduate and graduate theological training, I took long courses on the Eucharist. In the end, these didn't explain the Eucharist to me, not because they weren't good, but because the Eucharist, like a kiss, needs no explanation and has no explanation. If anyone were to write a four hundred page book entitled, The Metaphysics of a Kiss, it would not deserve a readership. Kisses just work, their inner dynamics need no metaphysical elaboration

The Eucharist is God's kiss. Andre Dubos, the Cajun novelist, used to say: "Without the Eucharist, God becomes a monologue." He's right. A couple of years ago, Brenda Peterson, in a remarkable little essay entitled, *In Praise of Skin*, describes how she once was inflicted by a skin-rash that no medicine could effectively soothe. She tried every kind of doctor and medicine. To no avail. Finally she turned to her grandmother, remembering how, as a little girl, her grandmother used to massage her skin whenever she had rashes, bruises, or was otherwise ill. The ancient remedy worked again. Her grandmother massaged her skin, over and over again, and the rash that seemingly couldn't be eradicated disappeared.

Skin needs to be touched. This is what happens in the Eucharist and that is why the Eucharist, and every other Christian sacrament, always has some very tangible physical element to it—a laying on of hands, a consuming of bread and wine, an immersion into water, an anointing with oil. An embrace needs to be physical, not only something imagined.

GK Chesterton once wrote: "There comes a time, usually late in the afternoon, when the little child tires of playing cops and robbers. It's then that he begins to torment the cat!" Mothers, with young children, are only too familiar with this late afternoon hour and its particular dynamic. There comes an hour, usually just before supper, when a child's energy is low, when it is tired and whining, and when the mother has exhausted both her patience and her repertoire of warnings: "Leave that alone! Don't do that!" The child, tense and miserable, is clinging to her leg. At that point, she knows what to do. She picks up the child. Touch, not word, is what's needed. In her arms, the child grows calm and tension leaves its body.

That's an image for the Eucharist. We are that tense, overwrought child, perennially tormenting the cat. There comes a point, even with God, when words aren't enough. God has to pick us up, like a mother her child. Physical embrace is what's needed. Skin needs to be touched.

God knows that. It's why Jesus gave us the Eucharist.

FR RICHARD ROHR OFM'S MEDITATION: THE VOICE OF GOD

Among human beings, who knows what pertains to a person except the spirit of the person that is within? Similarly, no one knows what pertains to God except the Spirit of God. We have not received the spirit of the world but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the things freely given us by God. And we speak about them not with words taught by human wisdom, but with words taught by the Spirit, describing spiritual realities in spiritual terms. —1 Corinthians 2:11-13

If you can trust and listen to your inner divine image, your whole-making instinct, or your True Self, you will act from your best, largest, kindest, most inclusive self. I would also like to add "your most compassionately dissatisfied self" because the soul's journey invites us to infinite depth that we can never fully plumb!

Rather than consuming spiritual gifts for yourself alone, you must receive all words of God so that you can speak them to others tenderly and with subtlety. If any thought feels too harsh, shaming, or diminishing of yourself or others, it is not likely the voice of God but the ego. Why do humans so often presume the exact opposite—that shaming voices are always from God and graced voices are always the imagination? That is a self-defeating ("demonic"?) path.

If something comes toward you with grace and can pass through you and toward others with grace, you can trust it as the voice of God. One holy man who recently came to visit me put it this way: "We must listen to what is supporting us. We must listen to what is encouraging us. We must listen to what is urging us. We must listen to what is alive in us." I personally was so trained not to trust those voices that I often did not hear the voice of God speaking to me, or what Abraham Lincoln called the "better angels of our nature."

Yes, a narcissistic person can misuse such advice, but someone genuinely living in love will flourish inside such a dialogue. That is the risk that God takes—and we must take for the sake of a fruitful relationship with God. It takes so much courage and humility to trust the voice of God within. Mary personifies such trust in her momentous and free "Let it be" to the Archangel Gabriel (Luke 1:38). Don't you suppose that Gabriel sounded just like her own mind? She never talks about such an angel again.

We must learn how to recognise the positive flow and to distinguish it from the negative resistance within ourselves. It takes years of practice. If a voice comes from accusation and leads to accusation, it is quite simply the voice of the "Accuser," which is the literal meaning of the biblical word "Satan." Shaming, accusing, or blaming is simply not how God talks. God is supremely nonviolent. God only cajoles, softens, and invites us into an always bigger field and it is always a unified field.

A NOTE RE THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION


We apologise that we have had to change the date of our Confirmation celebrations from what was previously advertised.


GLORIA:

We have also articulated our priorities to help focus our revitalisation efforts:


NURTURE – our existing parishioners
