## **SELF REFLECTION: TEMPTATION**

In reflecting on Luke 4:1-13, we see that Jesus, despite being the Son of God, faced real temptations just as we do. His example shows us that with God's help, we too can overcome the temptations we face, trusting in His Word, strength, and grace.

- When I face temptation, do I rely on God's strength or my own willpower?
- How often do I turn to Scripture or prayer when I'm struggling with temptation?
- Do I sometimes try to control situations or outcomes, instead of trusting God's plan?
- Am I allowing the Holy Spirit to guide me during moments of trial and challenge?
- How can I better prepare spiritually to face temptations in my everyday life?

## Lord,

As I face the challenges and temptations in my life, help me to trust in Your strength and not my own. Guide me with Your Word and the Holy Spirit, that I may resist the lies of the enemy and stay faithful to Your will. May I grow closer to You through every trial, and may my heart remain fixed on Your truth. Amen.

## FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading: Deuteronomy 26:4-10 (JB)
A reading from the book of Deuteronomy
The confession of faith of the elect.

Moses said to the people: 'The priest shall take the pannier from your hand and lay it before the altar of the Lord your God. Then, in the sight of the Lord your God, you must make this pronouncement:

"My father was a wandering Aramaean. He went down into Egypt to find refuge there, few in numbers; but there he became a nation, great, mighty, and strong. The Egyptians ill-treated us, they gave us no peace and inflicted harsh slavery on us. But we called on the Lord, the God of our fathers. The Lord heard our voice and saw our misery, our toil and our oppression; and the Lord brought us out of Egypt with mighty hand and outstretched arm, with great terror, and with signs and wonders. He brought us here and gave us this land, a land where milk and honey flow. Here then I bring the first-fruits of the produce of the soil that you, Lord, have given me." You must then lay them before the Lord your God, and bow down in the sight of the Lord your God.'

## **GOSPEL**: *Luke 4:1-13 (JB)*

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus was led by the Spirit through the wilderness where he was tempted.

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit through the wilderness, being tempted there by the devil for forty days. During that time he ate nothing and at the end he was hungry. Then the devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to turn into a loaf.' But Jesus replied, 'Scripture says: Man does not live on bread alone.'

Then leading him to a height, the devil showed him in a moment of time all the kingdoms of the world and said to him, 'I will give you all this power and the glory of these kingdoms, for it has been committed to me and I give it to anyone I choose. Worship me, then, and it shall all be yours.' But Jesus answered him, 'Scripture says:

You must worship the Lord your God,

and serve him alone.'

Then he led him to Jerusalem and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said to him, 'throw yourself down from here, for Scripture says:

He will put his angels in charge of you

to guard you, and again:

They will hold you up on their hands in case you hurt your foot against a stone.'

But Jesus answered him, 'It has been said: You must not put the Lord your God to the test.'

Having exhausted all these ways of tempting him, the devil left him to return at the appointed time.

## GOSPEL REFLECTION Sunday March 9, 2025 Luke 4:1-13

## Catechism Theme: The Proliferation of Sin (CCC 1865-1869)

What would have happened if Jesus gave into the temptation in the desert? Sin would have grown. And salvation would have been denied.

We face the type of choice Jesus faced. Do we choose for God and others? Or, do we choose for the self? Both choices have effects. The choice for self, sin, fuels the growth of vices (also called the "deadly sins"): pride, avarice, envy, wrath, sloth, lust, and gluttony. These attitudes fan the flames of sin and help to destroy a sense of morality on an individual and communal level. Through our acts, our omissions, or our approval, sin weaves its way into the structure of society. Evil can grow beyond the power of the individual to control it. At that point, we can speak of social sin.

However, one choice for others can help tear down social sin. One choice for good can help change the world. The desert choice of Jesus made that hope a reality. When he denied the devil's sense of Messiah, he took one more step to reveal himself as God's Messiah. And our Savior.

Have you ever seen personal sin grow, like a disease? Have you ever seen sin stopped by the choice of one person? What happened?

The choice lies before us. Do we choose the self? Or others? Do we choose self pride? Or, pride in others? Choosing the self points toward a downfall. Choosing others eventually chooses toward God.

Jesus had the same choice. Self or the Other? Ultimately, he chose between what he could have vs. what he could give. He chose to give. He gave of himself so all could live. That is the reason he is Lord. Not the mob, not military power, not the following of the faithful. He is Messiah because of his gift, his grace.

What can you give to others this week? How can you set aside your pride for the good of others? Choose one way and act on it.



## RCIA - RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION RITE OF ELECTION AND FIRST SCRUTINY



This Sunday, the Rite of Election, a pivotal moment in the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) process, will be held at the Waitara cathedral. During this ceremony, the catechumens—those preparing for baptism—will be formally presented to the Church as candidates for initiation. It marks the beginning of their final journey toward becoming fully initiated members of the Church at the Easter Vigil.

Following the Rite of Election, the Creed and the Lord's Prayer will be presented, followed by the three scrutinies. This is one of the traditional rites that help prepare our catechumens and candidates spiritually for the Sacraments of Initiation. The Scrutinies are prayers of healing and strengthening, as they continue to grow in their faith and deepen their relationship with God. These rites focus on the call to conversion, self-examination, and preparation for the mysteries of the faith.

During this holy season of Lent, let us remember those who are preparing for full initiation into the Church, and offer our prayers for them as they grow in faith, hope, and love, ready to receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

This Lent, we're invited to Unite Against Poverty with Caritas Australia's Project Compassion. This year is especially significant as we celebrate the Jubilee Year - a time of renewal and solidarity.

Project Compassion 2025 shares three stories from around the world. We'll meet Toefuata'iga - (Toy-foo-ah-tah-ing-ah) a young student from Samoa who faced severe water shortages at her school. Thanks to Caritas Australia and the generosity of supporters like you, her school now has a 10,000 L water tank, improving access to clean water and allowing teachers to prioritise education

We'll get to know Lam from Vietnam. Born with short stature, Lam faced social exclusion and limited employment opportunities. Through the I-SHINE program, Lam completed a course and is now a freelance graphic designer.

And we'll meet Irene from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) who faced immense challenges after losing her father to war and raising her children in poverty. With support from Caritas Australia, Irene received vocational training in sewing and farming and can now support her whole family.

## SAINT OF THE WEEK

## Saint Frances of Rome C.1384–1440 Patron Saint of motorists and widows

Born into an aristocratic family in Rome, Frances was drawn to God's service from an early age. At age eleven, Frances told her father that she wanted to become a nun, but her father replied that he was giving her hand in marriage to Lorenzo Ponziani, an aristocrat and commander in the papal army. Bowing to God's will, Frances was married at the age of twelve.

For the next forty years, Frances wholeheartedly embraced her marriage. The couple loved one another with humble affection and devotion. Though drawn to a life of prayer, Frances often said, "A married woman must, when called upon, leave her devotions to God at the altar to find Him in her household affairs." One day, called away to tend to family affairs four times while praying the psalms, Frances returned to find the psalm's words written in gold as a sign that God was pleased with her fidelity to the duties of her vocation.

Though Frances was of the noble class, she embraced a life of simplicity, including bodily penance, fasting, and prayer. She abstained from meat, exchanged her delectable food for the dry and mouldy bread of poor beggars, and dressed in coarse garments.

When plague took two of her children at a young age, Frances joined her sister-in-law to begin an outreach to the sick and poor. The women visited hospitals, nursed the sick, and distributed food to the hungry. After exhausting her own money and possessions, Frances begged other wealthy families for more resources. Soon, more noblewomen joined Frances and her sister-in-law in their work.

In 1413, invaders exiled Lorenzo from Rome, seized his property, destroyed the couple's home, and detained their only living son as a hostage. Through it all, Frances prayed with the suffering Job, "The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; blessed be the name of the LORD!" (Job 1:21). Within a few years, Lorenzo was able to move back to Rome and regain his possessions. Frances turned the ruined family home into a hospital to care for the sick, devotedly helping Lorenzo recover in mind and body. During this time, Frances began having visions of her guardian angel, who gave her advice. These visions continued until Frances' death.

In 1425, Frances organized a lay association of Benedictine Oblates for single and widowed women to expand their work for the poor and infirm. The women lived together, embraced Benedictine spirituality, and served the poor and ill. From this time, Lorenzo and Frances abstained from intimacy until Lorenzo's death in 1436.

Widowed at the age of fifty-two, Francis walked barefoot through the city to the monastery of oblates, prostrated herself, and successfully begged for admission. Soon after, she was named superior, finally realizing her childhood desire for religious life. For the next three years, she devoted herself to her community's work until joyfully surrendering to death. In 1925, Pope Pius XI declared Frances the patron saint of automobile drivers because her angel always went before her, lighting the way, as headlights illuminate the way for a car.

Saint Frances of Rome, you loved and served God at every stage of your life. Please pray that I may serve God within my vocation, seeking only His holy and perfect will. Saint Frances, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.
