SELF REFLECTION: COMPASSION

This Sunday's Gospel, Mark 6:30-34, Jesus said to His disciples: "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves.

Jesus is inviting us to come away from the busyness of our life and to go into that quiet space so that we can be with Him. He always listens to our prayer and invites us to share our hopes, concerns and dreams with him.

- Am I ready to walk with Jesus away from the life's distractions?
- Does my life centre around Jesus?
- Do I chat with Jesus about what I have done and what I might do in all my situations?



Jesus, look at me with compassion, see how I need shepherding and care. Allow the flock of my concerns to be recognised and held in your healing gaze. Amen.

First Reading: *Jeremiah 23:1-6 (JB)* A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

The remnant of the flock I will gather to me, and bring them back to their pastures.

'Doom for the shepherds who allow the flock of my pasture to be destroyed and scattered - it is the Lord who speaks! This, therefore, is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says about the shepherds in charge of my people: You have let my flock be scattered and go wandering and have not taken care of them. Right, I will take care of you for your misdeeds - it is the Lord who speaks! But the remnant of my flock I myself will gather from all the countries where I have dispersed them, and will bring them back to their pastures: they shall be fruitful and increase in numbers. I will raise up shepherds to look after them and pasture them; no fear, no terror for them any more; not one shall be lost - it is the Lord who speaks!

'See the days are coming - it is the Lord who speaks - when I will raise a virtuous Branch for David, who will reign as true king and be wise, practising honesty and integrity in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel dwell in confidence. and this is the name he will be called:

The Lord-our-integrity.'

Second Reading: *Ephesians 2:13-18 (JB)*A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians *Christ, our peace, has made us one.*



In Christ Jesus, you that used to be so far from us have been brought very close, by the blood of Christ. For he is the peace between us, and has made the two into one and broken down the barrier which used to keep them apart, actually destroying in his own person the hostility caused by the rules and decrees of the Law. This was to create one single New Man in himself out of the two of them and by restoring peace through the cross, to unite them both in a single Body and reconcile them with God. In his own person he killed the hostility. Later he came to bring the good news of peace, peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near at hand. Through him, both of us have in the one Spirit our way to come to the Father.

So they went off in a boat to a lonely place where they could be by themselves. But people saw them going, and many could guess where; and from every town they all hurried to the place on foot and reached it before them. So as he stepped ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd, and he set himself to teach them at some length.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Sunday, July 21 Jeremiah 23:1-6 Psalm 23:1-6 Ephesians 2:13-18 Mark 6:30-34

His heart was moved. (Mark 6:34)

Anyone who is a parent or caretaker of young children can relate to the dilemma Jesus' apostles faced in today's Gospel. They had just returned from their first attempts at preaching the good news and healing the sick (Mark 6:30). It must have been so exciting seeing God work so powerfully through them. But missionary work is demanding, so they were probably bone tired as well. They must have appreciated Jesus' suggestion: "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while" (6:31).

But their plans were disrupted when a huge crowd showed up. They must have felt the way exhausted parents can feel when everyone in the house has come down with the flu: stretched beyond their limits and more than a little dispirited. Some of them might have even wished that the people would go home—and take their diseases, their demons, and their troubles with them.

But not Jesus. In contrast to his apostles, he put aside his hopes for some R&R and devoted his whole day to teaching them "many things" (Mark 6:34). He saw a need and he met it—immediately and unquestioningly.

What a marvel Jesus is! We all get tired at times, and some of us are *always* tired. But the God of Israel "never slumbers nor sleeps" (Psalm 121:4). Jesus never gets worn out. He never complains, and he never feels sorry for himself. Just as he did throughout his life, and especially on the cross, he continues to give without counting the cost.

Hold this image of Jesus close to your heart as you celebrate Mass today. Believe that, in the midst of all the other prayers arising to him right now, he still sees you and hears you. He is never too tired for you; he always has time for you. So quiet your racing heart and let him minister to you. Bring him your needs, and wait patiently to hear what he has to say to you.

"Jesus, I am amazed at your tireless, endless love for me!"





SAINT OF THE WEEK

SAINT CHARBEL MAKHLUF, Priest, Hermit

Feast Day: July 24 c. 1828-1898

Patron Saint of Lebanon

Yousef (Joseph) Antoun Makhlouf was born in Bekaa Kafra, North Lebanon and baptized in the Catholic Church's Maronite Rite. His family of seven lived in Lebanon's highest mountain village. After Yousef's father, a mule driver, died when Yousef was only three, his mother remarried. His stepfather was later ordained a priest, in accord with the Maronite custom of a married priesthood. From a young age, Yousef lived a holy and devout life, inspired by the example of two uncles who were hermits. As a boy, he tended the cattle and spent long periods of prayer in the wilderness while his cattle grazed. Devoted to the Blessed Virgin Mary, he set up a shrine to her in a nearby cave.

In 1851, at age twenty-three, Yousef entered the Monastery of Our Lady in Mayfouq, of the Maronite Rite. As a monk, he took the name Charbel, after Saint Charbel the Martyr, a second-century military officer, martyred in Antioch during the reign of Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius. For the first twenty-four years of his religious life, Brother Charbel's superiors required that he live in community. After finishing his studies in theology and philosophy, he was ordained a priest in 1859, at age thirty-one, and resided at the Monastery of Saint Maroun for the next sixteen years.

Father Charbel received permission to live as a hermit due to a miracle. Some of his fellow monks played a prank on him, filling his oil lamp with water. When he returned to his cell and lit his lamp, it burned. Father Charbel's superiors inspected the lamp and found it filled with water. They saw it as a sign of Charbel's sanctity and sent him to the Hermitage of Saints Peter and Paul where he spent the next twenty-three years in solitude, embracing a strict regime of daily prayer, manual work, and severe asceticism. In 1898, at age seventy, Father Charbel suffered a stroke while offering Mass, dying eight days later on Christmas Eve. He was buried without a coffin, per his order's custom.

After Father Charbel's death, his holiness became well known. A mysterious light shone forth from his grave, drawing villagers who braved the cold and snow to see it. After four months, Church authorities granted permission to exhume his body that was found to be incorrupt, his skin and joints still soft and flexible. Cleaned of the dirt and mud from his gravesite, he was placed in a coffin in the monastery chapel. Afterward, blood and sweat came forth from his pores, soaking his habit so that his clothing had to be changed twice a week. In 1927, two physicians from Beirut examined his body before it was placed in another coffin and sealed in a tomb inside the monastery wall.

In the 1950s, a blood-like liquid flowed from the wall behind which Charbel was buried, and his tomb was opened three times. In 1965, his body was found again to be incorrupt, exuding the same blood and sweat. In 1976, the year before his canonization, his body had finally decayed down to the bones, interestingly coinciding with the early days of the Lebanese civil war that broke out in 1975.

In the 1950s the monks began to track the miraculous cures attributed to Father Charbel's intercession. Within two years, the list included more than twelve thousand reported cures. Devotion to Charbel, along with reports of numerous miracles, led to a new evangelization across Lebanon.

Saint Charbel, you responded to the call to live the solitary life of a monk and then a hermit. You kept your eyes upon Christ who transformed your humble soul into a glorious beacon of light for the world to see. Please pray that I will receive the grace I need to be faithful to the vocation God has given me and that I will respond with the generosity and commitment that you manifested in your earthly life. Saint Charbel, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.


