
My eyes are always on the Lord, for he rescues my feet from the snare. Turn to me and have mercy on me, for I am alone and poor.

- Am I open to God's patience, allowing it to inspire change within me?

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Help me to reflect on my life and actions, and grant me the grace to bear good fruit. Teach me to live with repentance and humility, using the time you've given me wisely. Guide me to live each day with purpose and love, always striving to honour you. *Amen.*

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

First Reading: Exodus 3:1-8, 13-15 (Year C) (JB)

A reading from the book of Exodus

This is what you must say to the children of Israel: I Am has sent me to you.

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am,' he answered. 'Come no nearer,' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God.

And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.'

Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you." But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?' And God said to Moses, 'I Am who I Am. This' he added 'is what you must say to the sons of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is my name for all time; by this name I shall be invoked for all generations to come.'

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12 (Year C) (JB)

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

All this that happened to the people of Moses in the desert was written for our benefit.

I want to remind you how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea. They were all baptised into Moses in this cloud and in this sea; all ate the same spiritual food and all drank the same spiritual drink, since they all drank from the spiritual rock that followed them as they went, and that rock was Christ. In spite of this, most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert.

These things all happened as warnings for us, not to have the wicked lusts for forbidden things that they had. You must never complain: some of them did, and they were killed by the Destroyer.


All this happened to them as a warning, and it was written down to be a lesson for us who are living at the end of the age. The man who thinks he is safe must be careful that he does not fall.

AM WHO I AM.

Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices. At this he said to them, 'Do you suppose these Galileans who suffered like that were greater sinners than any other Galileans? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.'

He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down.""

GOSPEL REFLECTION Sunday March 23, 2025 Luke 13:1-9

Catechism Theme: Suffering and the Test of Faith (CCC 163-165)

Faith gives us the first taste of the afterlife. In faith, we have a vision of life with God. An existence in pure justice and, at the same time, pure mercy. We will know ourselves as we truly are, but through the divine eyes of Love.

This time on earth, however, is a time of test. Not just against evil. But for faith. The problem of suffering presents us with such a test. Suffering is more than an intellectual puzzle to be solved. It challenges us to act. Either we reach out in the belief that God will help us on the path. Or, we fade into cynicism.

Others have walked the path of the test before us. Abraham, Mary, and Jesus himself. If we only look to their example, we can find inspiration and real help. Yes, suffering may shake us. But others have suffered and remained faithful. So can we.

What story of suffering and faith has inspired you? Why has it inspired you?

When we suffer, when others suffer, the choice of faith arises. Jesus used two reports of death to show the choice given. We might not know why suffering exists. But we can use suffering as a bridge to change. A chance to get closer to God.

As the parable of the fig tree implies, we not only have a choice. We have a helper. Someone to care for us during our struggles and our suffering. Someone greater than we, who came to serve us.

How do we answer the critic about the problem of suffering? With the choice of faith and the face of Christ. God does not abolish suffering to keep us at a distance. No, he allows suffering to bring us closer. And so his Son may be revealed to all.

So, the next time the problem of suffering raises its head, let us look to the cross. The sign of faith. And the sign of the Savior.

What pain do you suffer from? Place that hurt in God's hands just for a few moments this day. And see what happens.



SAINT OF THE WEEK



Saint Turibius of Mogrovejo, Bishop

Feast Day: March 23

C.1538-1606

Patron Saint of Peru, Latin American bishops, native people's rights

Toribio Alfonso de Mogrovejo (Turibius) was born of noble parents in the town of Mayorga, northwest Spain. Turibius was a devout child with a heart for the poor. As a young man, Turibius' brilliance in his studies led King Philip of Spain to appoint him as the Grand Inquisitor in Granada in 1571, when he was just thirty-three years old.

During this time, the Spanish conquerors of the newly colonized lands of Peru were in dire need of moral reformation. Many generals acted as tyrants and plunderers, cruelly oppressing the indigenous peoples. Aware of the moral chaos, King Phillip II knew he needed to send his best bishop to Lima. He needed a saint knowledgeable in the law, who could bring reform, preach the Gospel with zeal, and establish communion between the settlers and natives. At that time, the King of Spain had the responsibility to appoint bishops whom the pope would approve or reject. King Phillip chose Turibius for the task. Turibius was not even a priest, however; he was a layman. Over the next two years, Turibius prepared for ordination, served as a priest, and then was ordained a bishop. He was installed as archbishop in Lima on May 24, 1581 and served in that office for twenty-five years.

The archdiocese stretched about 400 miles along the coast and included three main cities, many towns and villages, and many more rural homes scattered throughout. The people Turibius shepherded included Spanish settlers, soldiers, and the indigenous population. Within a month of his arrival, Turibius held an archdiocesan synod and later oversaw the Third Provincial Council of Lima. This council addressed various abuses among the clergy and laity, promoted evangelization of the natives, taught that the Spaniards and indigenous were equal in dignity, and commissioned the first book printed in South America, *Doctrina Christiana, y Catecismo para Instrucción de los Indios*, a trilingual catechism written in Spanish, Quechua, and Aymara. Other trilingual works were also commissioned to assist the clergy with confession and preaching in the native tongues. The acts of that council were confirmed by the Holy See in 1588 and later implemented throughout all of South America. In 1590, Archbishop Turibius founded the first seminary in South America, and in 1591 and 1601, he held two more provincial councils, as well as numerous synods within his own archdiocese.

In addition to his administrative efforts, Turibius spent seventeen of his twenty-five years as archbishop journeying on foot to every parish and community on three separate occasions. He traveled through difficult terrain, snow-covered mountains, rain, heat, and cold. He went to confession and offered Mass every day, learned the native languages, got to know his people, and made sure that every parish adhered to Church discipline. He built many churches, baptized and confirmed half a million people, had a passionate zeal for every soul, and cared for the Spaniard and indigenous equally. From his flock would emerge three saints whom he confirmed: Saint Rose of Lima, Saint Martin de Porres, and Saint Juan Masías. He also became good friends with the great Franciscan missionary Saint Francis Solano, who was said to have had the gift of tongues, by which the indigenous understood him in their native languages.

Saint Turibius, you devoted yourself wholeheartedly to the salvation of every soul. Please pray that I may imitate you and become a better instrument of the Gospel, reaching people in ways that will more fully open their hearts to Christ. Saint Turibius, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.

24 HOURS FOR THE LORD The "24 Hours for the Lord" was introduced by Pope Francis in 2014 and has been held every year since. It is a Lenten initiative of prayer and reconciliation. It is celebrated on the eve of the Fourth Sunday of Lent each year. Its intention is to put the celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation at the centre of the pastoral life of the Church. Parishes and communities can implement this initiative taking care to adapt it according to local needs and customs.


