SELF REFLECTION: LOVE GOD LOVE OTHERS

This Sunday's Gospel, In Mark 12:28-34, a scribe asks Jesus which commandment is the greatest. Jesus replies that the most important commandment is to love God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength. He also says to love your neighbour as yourself.

- How can I deepen my love for God in my daily life?
- In what ways do I show love to my neighbours and those around me?
- Are there any barriers that prevent me from loving others as myself?
- What specific actions can I take this week for these commandments?

Thank you for reminding me of the greatest commandments: to love You with all my heart, soul, mind, and strength, and to love my neighbour as myself. Help me to live these truths daily. Grant me the strength to deepen my relationship with You and the compassion to serve those around me. May my actions reflect Your love and grace. Amen.

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

Hear Israel, you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart.

Moses said to the people: 'If you fear the Lord your God all the days of your life and if you keep all his laws and commandments which I lay on you, you will have a long life, you and your son and your grandson. Listen then, Israel, keep and observe what will make you prosper and give you great increase, as the Lord God of your fathers has promised you, giving you a land where milk and honey flow.

'Listen, Israel: The Lord our God is the one Lord. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength. Let these words I urge on you today be written on your heart.'

The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.



Responsorial Psalm:

R. I love you, Lord, my strength.

Second Reading: Hebrews 7:23-28 (JB)

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

This one, because he remains for ever, has an eternal priesthood.

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high



priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

Gospel Acclamation

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark This is the first commandment, and the second is similar to it.



One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Sunday, November 3

Deuteronomy 6:2-6 / Psalm 18:2-4, 47, 51 / Hebrews 7:23-28 / Mark 12:28-34

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart. (Mark 12:29)

Higher-end cameras have a setting called "portrait mode," which focuses only on the face of the individual you are trying to capture while blurring out everything in the background. In today's Gospel, Jesus congratulates a scribe who has come to see God in this way. The scribe understands that *loving* God and his people is the most important thing he can do. Everything else is background—not erased, of course, but secondary when compared to the main picture!

You can probably recall times when you have lost your focus on the Lord. Maybe your gaze was fixed on a new car or some other pricey object you wanted to buy. Perhaps duties and deadlines pulled your vision away. Or maybe there have been times when you approached your spiritual life as routine and focused on secondary tasks and needs instead. This doesn't usually happen all at once, and sometimes we aren't even aware that it has happened until some challenge wakes us up to our predicament.

So how can we keep our focus on the Lord as this scribe did? How can we make sure that we are placing a priority on loving him? We can remember to dedicate even the ordinary parts of our days to the Lord. We can make a morning offering to him every day when we wake up and try lifting up some spontaneous prayers at different times during the day. We can invite the Lord into a stressful meeting, look for him in our fellow commuters, or pause to acknowledge the Holy Spirit at the kitchen sink.

Loving God with all our hearts doesn't have to be an intense, all-day prayer marathon. Sometimes all it takes is a glance toward heaven to refocus our hearts on him. The more you do this, the more you'll find your preoccupations and worries fading into the background—and Jesus, your loving Savior, filling your heart and your vision!

"Jesus, draw my eyes to you more and more as I offer you this day and all that it brings!"



FEAST OF THE WEEK

DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA

Feast Day: November 9



The most important temple is that of a person's soul. In the secret center of our being is the sacred sanctuary where we meet God. In addition to the temple of the soul are other sacred places—shrines, churches, basilicas, grottos, and cathedrals set aside for the worship of God. They are to be a Heaven on earth, a place where we join the Seraphim, Cherubim, and Thrones in their angelic praises of the Most Holy Trinity. Today's feast commemorates one such place.

Rome is home to four major basilicas. The first three are Saint Peter's Basilica in Vatican City, the Basilica of Saint Paul Outside the Walls, and the Basilica of Saint Mary Major. The fourth is the Archbasilica Cathedral of the Most Holy Savior and of Saints John the Baptist and John the Evangelist in the Lateran, also called Saint John Lateran, or the Lateran Basilica for short. Of the four major basilicas, Saint John Lateran is the oldest and most important. Though the pope lives next to Saint Peter's Basilica, Saint John Lateran is the official cathedral of Rome. Saint John Lateran is the mother church of the Archdiocese of Rome and the mother church of the entire world.

In AD 64, Roman Emperor Nero blamed a devastating fire in Rome on the Christians. In retaliation, he ordered the execution of many Christians, including Saints Peter and Paul. In 65, Counsel-designate Plautius Lateranus (Lateran) was part of a conspiracy to kill Nero. When Nero learned of the plot, he beheaded Lateranus and confiscated his home, the Lateran Palace. Over the next 250 years, Roman emperors used the palace in various ways. In 312, Constantine the Great became the sole ruler of the Western Roman Empire and took possession of the Lateran Palace. In 313, after issuing the Edict of Milan with Eastern Emperor Licinius, Constantine donated the Lateran Palace to Pope Miltiades who first used it for a synod of bishops before constructing the first Basilica in Rome. Upon its completion in the year 324, it was dedicated by Pope Sylvester and given the name the "House of God," with a special designation to Christ the Savior.

Constantine the Great greatly helped the Catholic Church flourish after legalizing its practice. He had the Lateran Basilica beautifully decorated with gold and silver. He built churches in Rome, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and Constantinople. After centuries of persecution, the Church had its first cathedral in the heart of Rome, beautifully decorated, with the Roman emperor's full support.

Though the basilica was dedicated to Christ the Savior, in the tenth century Pope Sergius III added a new baptistry and rededicated the basilica to Saint John the Baptist. In the twelfth century, Pope Lucius II dedicated the basilica to Saint John the Evangelist. Today, the basilica honors Christ the Savior first and the two Saint Johns as the co-patrons.

The Lateran Basilica has remained the pope's cathedral from the time of its dedication, and the Lateran Palace, next to the Basilica, was the papal residence from 324–1305. In 1305, Pope Clement V refused to move to Rome after his election, moving the entire papal court to Avignon, France in 1309, where it remained until Pope Gregory XI returned to Rome in 1377. By then, the Lateran Palace was in disrepair due to two fires. The pope built a new palace next to Saint Peter's on Vatican Hill, where every subsequent pope has resided until today.

Christ our Savior, through the intercessions of Saints John the Baptist and John the Evangelist, I pray for the Church. I pray for your abundant mercy upon every sinner whom you are calling for reconciliation. I pray for my local parish, diocese, country, and the Universal Church headed in Rome. I especially pray for the Holy Father, the pastor of the Lateran Basilica and shepherd of the whole Church. Draw him close to You, make him holy, and use him to draw many people to Yourself. Saints John the Baptist and John the Evangelist, pray for us. Jesus I trust in You.
