From Fr Paul

Today is the third Sunday of Easter. **Eastertide** refers to the 50 days (7 weeks) between Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday (5th June), a time of joy as we celebrate the risen Christ. C.S. Lewis wrote: "I believe in Christianity as I believe that the sun has risen: not only because I see it, but because by it I see everything else."

Thank you for your contribution to the **Holy Land Collection** which took place on Good Friday. Holy Name Parish raised \$2107.70. This collection for the Holy Land originated in the wish of the Popes to maintain a strong bond between all Christians throughout the World and the Holy Places. It is the main source for the support of the life of the Holy Places. Thank you for your generosity.

Thank you to the Benedictine Fathers (from Arcadia) who celebrated Masses last week-end while Fr Sam and I attended the Bishop's Retreat. We returned to find further **heavy branches had fallen** while away, damaging the fence and storage shed near the Priory (see Page 2). I am grateful to the SES who helped cut up and remove the branches and secure the shed for now. Kuring-gai Council has given us permission to remove branches from some trees on the property; this work will be done on 17th May.

What does the Word say to us this Third Sunday of Easter—Year C?

First Reading (Acts 5:27-32, 40-41). The apostles courageously witness to the resurrection of Jesus and gladly suffer for it.

Second Reading (Revelation 5:11-14). A hymn in praise of the crucified and risen Christ.

Gospel (John 21:1-19). This relates an appearance of the risen Jesus to seven of his apostles on the shore of the lake of Gennesareth. The incident is built around Peter.

The First Reading tells of the opposition the apostles encountered from the Jewish authorities. Persecution did not come as a surprise: Jesus had predicted it. (Luke 21:12-13). It became an opportunity for the apostles to bear witness to him. They refused to be silenced. Always the central point of their witness is the resurrection of Jesus. Far from being demoralized, they were glad to suffer for the sake of Jesus.

The Gospel shows that a constant feature of the resurrection stories is that Jesus is not recognized at once; it takes some word or familiar gesture for him to be known. This illustrates that the resurrection is not a return to earthly life - Jesus has risen to a new life beyond death. He is the same Jesus, yet transformed.

The miraculous catch of fish symbolises the mission of the apostles to be 'fishers of men'. The large catch shows how successful the disciples can be with Jesus' help. The meal symbolises the Eucharistic meal in which Jesus is present among them and feeds them. Peter, who three times denied his Master, is now given three chances to profess his love, and then is given a mandate to care for the Lord's flock – "feed my sheep". In giving authority to the man who denied him, Jesus shows that he was establishing his Church not on human strength, but on the strength of his love and faithfulness, and the life of the Holy Spirit.

Reflection for the coming week:

The Prayer of St Patrick begins with the affirmation: "I rise today with a mighty strength."

The words of the prayer then cascade with all of the ways that God is present with us right here, right now, for the living of the day: God's strength to uphold me, God's wisdom to guide me, God's hand to keep me. The strength of Christ's baptism and crucifixion and burial and resurrection. The strength of heaven, swiftness of wind, depth of sea, firmness of rock. Christ above us, Christ beside us, Christ within us. In this Easter season, let this be our prayer...

because it is true:




Pastoral Works Broken Bay-Final Appeal for 2021/2022 Financial Year


Saints we remember this week

St Athanasius 295-373 Feast Day 2 May

Athanasius was born of Christian parents in Alexandria, Egypt, about 295. As a young man, he spent four years in prayer and solitude in the desert. After he left the desert, Athanasius became a priest and was appointed secretary to Alexander, bishop of Alexandria.

At a Church Council at Nicaea in 325, the bishops composed the Nicene Creed, often recited at Mass to this day.

Athanasius, who had attended the Council of Nicaea, was deeply impressed by the bishops. For the rest of his life, he defended all the doctrines of the Church. When he became bishop of Alexandria in 328, it was the beginning of almost 50 years of persecution at the hands of Arian heretics, who had become very popular. During these long years, Athanasius was unjustly accused of crimes, was deliberately misunderstood and humiliated, and was exiled several times. The last few years of his life were rather peaceful, and he died in his native city in 373.



Sts Philip and James—apostles Feast Day 3 May

Philip and James were both apostles, and both served Christ faithfully during the very early days of the Church.

Philip seems to have been an enthusiastic person. He was the one who brought his friend Nathanael to Jesus, insisting to Nathanael that he had found the person about whom Moses had written. Some years later it was Philip who made arrangements, with the help of Andrew, to have a group of Greek Gentiles brought to Jesus. Philip the apostle is not to be confused with the deacon Philip of Acts 8, who preached in Samaria and baptised the Ethiopian, although some writers say that they are the same person. Philip also had a practical, down-to-earth mind. He was the apostle who commented that it would take a considerable amount of money to feed a crowd of more than 5,000 hungry men, women, and children.

It was Philip who asked to see the Father when Jesus spoke about him at the Last Supper.

James was the son of Alphaeus and it is thought he was born in Caesarea. He is mentioned less frequently in the New Testament than Philip. Sometimes James is called the Less, which might be a hint that he was a short person or else that he was younger than the other apostle named James.

After Jesus' death James continued to preach the Gospel and is believed to have become the first bishop of Jerusalem. Assuming that James and the first bishop of Jerusalem are one and the same person, then he met his death as a martyr in that city about the year a.d. 62. Tradition identifies James as the author of the epistle associated with his name.

Last Thursday, 28th April, we celebrated the Feast Day of St Peter Chanel, Patron Saint of Oceania.
