From Fr Paul

Dear Holy Name Parishioners

I am very sorry to inform you that I have been asked to transfer from Holy Name to take up the position of Vice Rector and Pastoral Director at the Seminary of the Good Shepherd at Homebush, in the Archdiocese of Sydney, effective from January 2023. (This is the Seminary attended by most men preparing for the priesthood in NSW, including our seminarians for DBB).

While I am humbled to take on this important position, I am disappointed not to stay on and complete my term with you as Parish Priest. Bishop Anthony is most conscious that my going will be a source of disappointment for many. Fr Kelvin Lovegrove, an experienced and respected pastor has been appointed next Parish Priest (See page 5 for Bishop Anthony's letter about these appointments). I would very much like you to join me *after the 9.30am Mass on Sunday, 18th December for a Farewell Morning Tea.*

We are nearing the conclusion of various end-of-year events, such as Graduation Masses, whole school Masses, concerts and celebrations. We wish all the schools of our Parish well with Graduations and this final week of school.

What does the Word of God say to us this Sunday Year A—Advent Week 3

First reading (Isaiah 35:1-6, 10). This contains a message of hope for God's people in exile. The prophet assures them that God himself is coming to their rescue and will lead them back to Zion. He uses the image of the desert, made fertile by rain, to portray the confident hope that God would restore his people, crushed by misfortune. Their most crippling disabilities - blindness, deafness, and lameness - will be relieved when God sends salvation to his people.

Second reading (James 5:7-10). St James is talking about the second coming of Jesus. He urges the kind of patience and hope farmers show in waiting for the harvest, and which the prophets of old showed as they waited for the promises to be fulfilled.

Gospel (Matthew 11:2-11). John the Baptist's image of the Messiah was that of a stern judge who would execute a fiery judgement. Jesus did not fit this image. This may account for John's doubts about him. Jesus dispelled John's doubts by showing that he was doing precisely the kind of things that had been predicted for the messianic times (by prophets such as Isaiah). Once again, Matthew presents Jesus as the one who fulfils the messianic prophecies.

Jesus goes on to praise John, declaring him to be a true prophet. He is more than a prophet: he glimpsed the age of fulfilment. As the forerunner of the Messiah, he was in a very privileged position. Yet he himself did not belong to the kingdom. Jesus says that 'the least in the kingdom is greater (more privileged) than he'. Far from diminishing John's role in God's plan of salvation, this increases his heroism in that he prepared the way for a kingdom that he himself would never enter (on earth).



Quote for the week - reflecting on John the Baptist

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. John was "filled with the Holy Spirit even from his mother's womb" by Christ himself, whom the Virgin Mary had just conceived by the Holy Spirit. Mary's visitation to Elizabeth thus became a visit from God to his people. n717

John is "Elijah (who) must come." The fire of the Spirit dwells in him and makes him the forerunner of the coming Lord. In John, the precursor, the Holy Spirit completes the work of "[making] ready a people prepared for the Lord." n718

From Bishop Anthony Randazzo: Appointment of Fr Paul Durkin as Vice-Rector of the Good Shepherd Seminary.

As the year comes to its conclusion and as the new year approaches, some changes in the personnel of our Diocese are before us.

Tonight, I share with you that, upon the request of Archbishop Fisher, I have assented to the appointment of Fr Paul Durkin, currently Parish Priest of the Parish of Wahroonga, as Vice-Rector and Director of Pastoral Formation at the Seminary of the Good Shepherd, Homebush in the Archdiocese of Sydney. The appointment is initially for three years, effective in mid-January 2023.

Archbishop Fisher and I have recently been in dialogue regarding emerging needs in the Seminary. However, it is only in these last several days that the consideration has been able to find its determination.

The appointment of Fr Paul to this significant role in priestly formation is a sure tribute to his priestly integrity, his pastoral competence, and the calibre of his vocational accompaniment for which he is well known, especially by those with whom he has journeyed in his capacity as my Diocesan Director for Vocations. I am confident that Fr Paul will now place these unmistakable attributes to special benefit at the service of the formation of our clergy of the future, not only for our own Diocese but for all those associated with the Seminary of the Good Shepherd.

I take this opportunity to thank Fr Paul sincerely for his generosity in assuming this new appointment and for the remarkable ministry he has exercised as Pastor, and in the ministry of vocations promotion in our Diocese over the last six years.

Fr Paul will depart Holy Name Wahroonga soon after Christmas, enjoying a short break before taking up residence at the Seminary.

It is my pleasure to share with you that Fr Kelvin Lovegrove, of the Archdiocese of Sydney, will join us in the Diocese of Broken Bay. I have appointed him to succeed Fr Paul as Parish Priest of the Parish of Wahroonga. Fr Kelvin was born in Glebe, Sydney and ordained to the priesthood in 1990, while a deacon in Meadowbank Parish. He has served as priest in the parishes of Bankstown, Strathfield, Kogarah, and St Mary's Cathedral and was Parish Priest of the Miranda/Sylvania parishes for 12 years after serving as Parish Priest in Bonnyrigg. Since 2015 he has been the Vicar for Clergy in the Archdiocese of Sydney and has been Administrator of the Parish of Maroubra Bay-Beach since 2019. Therefore, Fr Kelvin comes to us with considerable pastoral experience and much experience in leadership. When I was Auxiliary Bishop in Sydney, I had the pleasure of working closely in ministry with Fr Kelvin. We look forward to welcoming him to our presbyterate and to our Diocese.

In due time, I shall announce changes to the diocesan bodies on which Fr Paul has served such as the Council of Priests, the College of Consultors, and the Vocations Ministry Team, along with those further required by various circumstances through our Diocese.

Please join me in praying for Fr Paul as he assumes this new contribution to the life of the Church.

Saints we remember this week

St Lucy (283-310 AD) - Feast Day 13 December

Italian **Santa Lucia**, Lucia was born to an honourable family around the year 283.

- Lucia's father was a Roman. He died when she was five years old.
- The name Lucia means light (Lux, lucis).
- Saint Lucia is a Sicilian saint who endured death in Syracuse, Sicily around 310 A.D.
- Lucia sought help at the shrine of Saint Agnes for her mother's longterm disease. Lucia's mother was cured there and Lucia convinced her mother to donate a major portion of her wealth to the poor.
- Saint Lucy refused to compromise her virginity in marriage and was betrayed to the Roman authorities by the man she would have married. According to the legend, Lucy was threatened to be taken to a prostitute house if she did not abandon her Christian beliefs.
- One of the soldiers stabbed a spear through her throat. She was willing to suffer for what she believed.
- Saint Lucy died when she was given the Christian sacraments.



St John of the Cross (c. 1542-1591) - Feast Day 14 December

John's father was disowned by his wealthy Spanish family when he married a poor weaver rather than a woman of equal economic status. Living in poverty proved to be too much for him, and he died shortly after John was born. John spent much of his youth in an orphanage, where he was clothed, fed, and given an elementary education.

At the age of 17, he found a job in a hospital and was accepted into a Jesuit college. In 1563 he entered the Carmelite Order. Eventually he enrolled in another university, where he did so well that he was asked to teach a class and to help settle disputes.

When he met Teresa of Ávila and learned from her about the reform of the Carmelite Order, John decided to help with it. As part of this decision, he wore sandals instead of shoes and lived very simply in prayer and solitude. In 1577 the attitude toward the reform shifted.

John was caught up in a misunderstanding and imprisoned at Toledo, Spain. He was locked in a cell six feet wide and ten feet long for nine months, with no light except that which filtered through a slit high up in the wall. During those months of darkness in that little cell, he had many beautiful experiences and encounters with God in prayer. He later forgave the men who had imprisoned him. How could he do that? He explained, "Where there is no love, put love, and you will find love."



In 1578 John escaped to southern Spain to join the reformed Carmelites. There he held leadership positions and wrote reflections on his experiences, which showed his deep spirit of prayer. When he became ill, he chose to go to the city of Ubeda, where no one knew him. It was there that he died.
