#### From Fr Paul

Dear Parishioners.

Even with the current lockdown and stay-at-home orders, I hope most of you have been able to appreciate the wonderful weather and the other blessings of the week.

I acknowledge that across **our Holy Name community**, there are a range of ways people are affected by the pandemic and the current lockdown. Many of us are experiencing it through the inconvenience and restrictions on our way of life, more than through the experience of illness or sickness in the family. Nevertheless, there are many in our parish and nation who are 'doing it tough'. May we continue to reach out to one another and pray for one another.

We continue to offer our support to parish and local **school students** (K-12), and their parents and families, as they continue with home-based and online learning. We appreciate the special demands on our 2021 Year 12 students. This week Deacon Sam, Fr Anselam and I sent out a video Message to the **St Edmund's** students, families and staff, wishing them well and reflecting on St Mary MacKillop and the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary this weekend. Please continue to pray for our three deacons (Sam, and his companions Aldrin and Roger) who are preparing for their Ordination to the Priesthood. Originally Bishop Anthony planned for an Ordination at the Concourse at Chatswood, where approximately 1,000 people could attend. This is no longer possible. # What do the Readings say to us this Sunday? The Solemnity of Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

**This Sunday 15th August** we celebrate the Solemnity of the **Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary**. She who appeared to be a simple, "poor and lowly" young woman from an obscure village accepted the call of God to be Mother of the Saviour: "be it done unto me according to your Word". She is the highest honour of our race, the One whom all generations will call "Blessed" - recognised as Mother of God and Queen of Heaven.

#### Apocalypse (or Revelation) 11.19, 12.1-6, 10

The last book of the Scriptures presents an image of "a woman, adorned with the sun, standing on the moon, and with the twelve stars on her head for a crown." This regal woman of great beauty and great power brings forth "a male child into the world, the son who was to rule all the nations." And a voice cries from heaven: "victory and power and empire forever have been won by our God, and all authority for his Christ."

#### 1 Corinthians 15.20-26

Saint Paul teaches that, just as all die in Adam, so "all are brought to life in the risen Christ, the new Adam, but all in their proper order". Mary is the new Eve, the one who is without sin and who lives in perfect obedience to the will of God. She shares with Christ in the great work of redemption, reconciling us with God and destroying even death itself. It is only right that she should be the first to share in the fruits of the Resurrection. Saint Paul reminds us that Jesus Christ is the eternal king, who has done away with "every earthly sovereignty, authority and power". His is a Kingdom that will have no end. Mary is mother of God and Queen of heaven. And we see in Mary the hope of that to which we are all called.



#### Luke 1.39-56

Following his account of the Annunciation, St Luke recounts the Visitation; in one sense, it celebrates a beautiful and apparently ordinary event in the life of Mary as she goes to spend time with her cousin, Elizabeth.

More than this, the Visitation celebrates two great women of Salvation History: Mary, mother of the Saviour and Elizabeth, mother of the great prophet, John the Baptist. Three times in this encounter Elizabeth describes Mary as "blessed". John leaps for joy in the womb of his mother.

Mary then prays the great prayer of the Magnificat: "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, and my sprit rejoices in God my saviour."

Having acknowledged the greatness and supremacy of God, Mary knows that her extraordinary calling and mission means that she will always be held in a place of honour: "And all generations shall call me blessed." In Luke's Gospel, we have Mary being honoured in the life of the infant Church, and she will be honoured for all generations to come.

# The Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Sunday, 15th August

**On November 1st 1950**, Pope Pius XII defined as a dogma revealed by God and therefore as of divine and Catholic faith "that the Immaculate Mother of God, Mary ever Virgin, when the course of her earthy life was finished, was taken up body and soul into the glory of heaven." (DS 3903; see LG n.59 and Catechism of the Catholic Church n.966).

The importance of the expression "**body and soul**" is to insist that the whole of Mary's humanity - all that it means to be a human person - is transformed by grace and enjoying the fullness of life in communion with God. She is not some kind of disembodied soul awaiting the resurrection. Through God's loving grace and because of her union with her Son, she is enjoying now the complete human communion with God which is the goal of every person's existence, and for which we all long.

St Paul says: The wages of sin is death. We recognise Mary as "full of grace", free of Original Sin and without sin in her entire life. As the sinless one, and Mother of the incarnate Word, it is only right that, when the course of her earthly life had ended, she would be assumed, body and soul, into communion with God.

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**The Second Vatican Council** reminds us that: "In Mary the Church ... joyfully contemplates, as in a faultless image, that which she herself desires and hopes wholly to be"(SC n.103). And, with special reference to the Assumption, the same Council states: "The Mother of Jesus in the glory which she possesses in body and soul in heaven is ... a sign of certain hope and comfort to the pilgrim people of God"(LG.n.68). As the Catholic Catechism states: "The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is a singular participation in her Son's Resurrection and an anticipation of the Resurrection of all Christians"(n.966).

At the same Council, the bishops wrote in "The Dogmatic Constitution on the Church" that Mary's Assumption offers both a **reminder and hope** of the bodily resurrection of all people at the end of time (Catechism of the Catholic Church 366) and comfort now for those grieving the death of a loved one:

"In the bodily and spiritual glory which she possesses in heaven, the Mother of Jesus continues in this present world as the image and the first flowering of the Church as she [the Church] is to be perfected in the world to come. Likewise, Mary shines forth on earth, until the day of the Lord shall come (cf. 2 Peter 3:10), as a sign on sure hope and solace for the pilgrim People of God." (No. 68)



The Praises of Mary - "Assumption"

Poem by Saint Anthony of Padua (1195-1231) Doctor of the Church

O how wondrous is the dignity of the glorious Virgin! She merited to become the mother of Him who is the strength and beauty of the angels and the grandeur of all the saints.

Mary was the seat of our sanctification, that is to say, the dwelling place of the Son who sacrificed Himself for us.

"And I shall glorify the place where my feet have stood."

The feet of the Saviour signify His human nature. The place where the feet of the Saviour stood was the Blessed Mary, who gave Him His human nature.

Today the Lord glorifies that place, since He has exalted Mary above the choirs of the angels.

That is to say, the Blessed Virgin, who was the dwelling of the Saviour, has been assumed bodily into heaven.

#### Saints we remember this week

#### St Bernard (1090 - 1153) - Feast Day 20 August

St. Bernard of Clairvaux, is a Doctor of the Church thanks to his writings and sermons which greatly influenced Europe during the 12th century.

Bernard spent his early years near Dijon, France before leaving to joining the Cistercians at the age of 22. He was well educated and so passionate about his faith that he convinced his brothers, his uncle, and many of his friends to join him at the abbey. Three years later he was sent with 12 other monks to establish another monastery in the Diocese of Champagne. The monastery came to be known Clairvaux (Valley of Light). He led the other monks there as the Abbot for the rest of his life.


St. Bernard knew how to harmonise the contemplative life with important missionary work, . However, the saint's strict observance of silence and contemplation did not impede him from living a very intense apostolic life. His humility and his commitment to tame his impetuous temperament were exemplary.

St Bernard focused on the truth that God, who is love, created humankind out of love and that man's salvation consists of adhering firmly to Divine love, revealed through the crucified and risen Christ.

"The richness of St. Bernard's preaching and his theology were not in pursuing new paths," Pope Benedict XVI said, "but in succeeding to propose the truth of the faith in a clear and incisive way so as to fascinate the listener and lead the person to prayer."

St. Bernard is also well-known for his Marian devotion, especially in using and promoting the "Memorare" prayer. He became widely known throughout Europe and was consulted by Popes and political leaders. He was canonised in 1174.

In August 2008, Pope Benedict spoke of the saint during his weekly general audience. He recalled that Pope Pius VIII labelled the "Honey-Sweet Doctor" for his eloquence and that he travelled throughout Europe defending the Christian faith. Benedict XVI added, "He was also remembered as a Doctor of Mariology, not because he wrote extensively on Our Lady, but because he understood her essential role in the Church, presenting her as the perfect model of the monastic life and of every other form of the Christian life."



#### St Pius X (02.06.1835 – 20.08.1914) Feast Day 21 August


Giuseppe Melchiorre Sarto, nicknamed "Bepi" by his family, was born on June 2, 1835 in Riese, Italy, a farming village near Venice. He was the oldest of nine children. We know him today as Pope Saint Pius X.

When he was 11 years old, he told his father that he wanted to become a priest. Giuseppe graduated first in his high school class at the age of 15 and immediately entered the seminary in Padua. He graduated from the seminary first in his class in 1858 and was ordained a priest. He was devoted to the Eucharist, enjoyed preaching and loved young people.

He was named Cardinal and Patriarch (Archbishop) of Venice in 1893, and he was elected Pope on August 4, 1903.

He is often called the Pope of the Eucharist because he made Holy Communion available to younger people "at the age of reason".

Pius X died on August 20, 1914, in Rome, Italy. He was canonized as a saint on May 29, 1954. His feast day is celebrated on August 21.
