From Fr Sam

Last Saturday, Bishop Anthony Randazzo celebrated Mass here at Holy Name for the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. Bishop Anthony will preside at a special Mass St Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral on Thursday 26th May. This is to celebrate the vocations of our 8 seminarians and our 4 diaconate aspirants and the 40th anniversary of the charter of the Serra Vocations Ministry in Broken Bay. I've have just passed 6 months as a priest. On page 7 you will find a short reflection on my experiences as being newly ordained and how it relates to the Eucharist, God's love, and the Christian vocation in general. I hope you find it edifying.

The Sacramental Program for Reconciliation has commenced. Mrs. Sally Oong and I hosted preparation classes at Prouille on Thursday this week with great success and engagement from the students. Saturday afternoon classes have also commenced for our other students, and naturally flow into 5:00pm Mass. This week all students learned about God's unbreakable love for them, the 10 Commandments, and the importance of good moral choices. We will be welcoming the students at all our Masses over the weekend, and offering hospitality with a sausage sizzle after the Saturday 5pm Mass.

Speaking of sausage sizzles, you may have noticed that members of the men's Bible study have been behind the BBQ after 9:30am Mass on the first Sunday of each month. If you, as a family, or other group in the parish, would like to volunteer facilitating morning tea or a BBQ on other weeks of the month, please contact the parish office.

We continue to build our parish relationship with surrounding schools in the area. This week I celebrated Mass at St Leo's College on Friday afternoon and will celebrate our usual Sunday evening Mass for the boarders at Loreto.

Fr Paul and I have been given the responsibility for Southern Cross Care Nursing home(s) in North Turramurra. We are on call to provide anointing and pastoral care for all those who request our presence, and Last Wednesday I was able to celebrate Mass for the Catholic residents.

We offer our warm congratulations to Sarah Maiolo and Chris Demery who were married here at Holy Name on Saturday, 14th May.

As mentioned last week, May is the month dedicated especially to Mary. Last Friday, we celebrated the memorial of Our Lady of Fatima, where we remember the six-month period beginning on May 13, 1917, when Our Lady appeared to the three children - Francisco and Jacinta Marto, and Lucia dos Santos. Mary's message for the world was simple - if we desire true peace, we should continue to pray fervently (especially the Rosary) and offer penances to God.

You may have heard the sad news that the Euthanasia bill passed into NSW's law on Wednesday night. This is in direct contradiction to Catholic teaching on the inviolable dignity of human life. Archbishop Anthony Fisher has released a statement echoing the sentiments of Pope Francis, that Euthanasia is a mark of "throwaway culture" where the forgotten, downtrodden, poor, and elderly will ultimately suffer. I have provided full copies of the Archbishop's statement in the back of the Church. Please pray for our elected officials, doctors, families, and those whose lives will be directly affected by this law.

CAUTION: Please be aware that tree lopping will take place on Tuesday this week, to cut back the gum tree which caused damage to our shed and fences recently, as well as 'dead wooding' any other dangerous branches around the Parish grounds.

What is the Word of God say to us this Sunday, 5^h Sunday of Easter?

First Reading (Acts 14:21-27). Paul and Barnabas retrace their steps, encouraging the little communities of Christians they had founded.

Second Reading (Revelation 21:1-5). Taken from the final part of Apocalypse, this opens with the vision of a new world and the new order of things inaugurated by Christ.

Gospel (John 13:31-35). During the Last Supper Jesus gives his apostles a new commandment - to love one another as he has loved them.

In the Gospel the scene is the Last Supper. Judas has departed and Jesus is alone with his own. Jesus is going forward to the cross. By so doing, he is giving glory to God, who in turn will give glory to him. The apostles can't follow him yet. In the meantime they are to live by a 'new commandment' - the commandment of love. It is new only in the sense that it sets a new standard - 'as I have loved you'. The world will know that they are his disciples by their fidelity to this commandment.

The Second Reading, which comes from the final part of The Book of Revelation, is one we frequently hear at funerals. The final part of Revelation opens with a vision of a new heaven, a new earth, and a new Jerusalem. This glorious future to which God is leading us will be fully realised only in the hereafter.

Quotes for the Week Reflecting on the Resurrection from Acts and the Catechism

"What shall we do to these men (the apostles)? for indeed a known miracle has been done by them, to all the inhabitants of Jerusalem: it is manifest, and we cannot deny it.

But that it may be no farther spread among the people, let us threaten them that they speak no more in this name [that of Jesus of Nazareth] to any man ..." (Acts 4:16-17).

Sts. Peter and John answered that they must continue to "speak the things which we have seen and heard [regarding Christ]." (Acts 4:20). St. Peter was eventually crucified for sticking to his story. In response to his request, he was crucified head downward, as he felt unworthy to be crucified in the same manner as his Lord.

The wise Pharisee Gamaliel gave the following advice to his fellow members of the Jewish council: "And now, therefore, I say to you, refrain from persecuting these men, and let them alone; for if this council or this work be of men, it will come to naught: but if it be of God, you cannot overthrow it, lest perhaps you be found even to fight against God." (Acts 5:38-39)

Christ's Resurrection was not a return to earthly life, as was the case with the raisings from the dead that he had performed before the Easter event: Jairus' daughter, the young man of Naim, Lazarus. These actions were miraculous events, but the persons miraculously raised returned by Jesus' power to ordinary earthly life. Christ's Resurrection is essentially different. In his risen body he passes from the state of death to another life beyond time and space.

At Jesus' Resurrection his body is filled with the power of the Holy Spirit: he shares the divine life in his glorious state, so that St. Paul can say that Christ is "the man of heaven".



My First Months as a Priest

I have only been ordained a priest for 6 months now, so I'm no expert in the field, but I have been reflecting on my experiences thus far, and decided I might share a few thoughts.

Priesthood is not what I expected. I don't mean this in a negative way, but in the same way I suspect everyone feels when they commit themselves to a life-long vocation. When I joined the seminary 7 years ago, I had an almost cartoonish idea of priesthood in my mind — somewhat similar, I imagine, to the romantic expectations of endlessly wedded bliss hoped for by young couples.



Even though years in the seminary managed to bring my expectations closer to reality, I still experienced an initial wave of exhilaration upon entering priesthood. The day of my ordination, after all, was the culmination of 6 years of intensive prayer, discernment, study, and formation. It was a day of nervous excitement, untold heavenly graces, with all the fanfare and subsequent celebrations to boot. There was the shock of suddenly being called "father" by everyone (even – somewhat awkwardly – by my own parents!) Most frighteningly there was the ever-deepening realisation that God had chosen me, His unworthy servant, to the dignity of the ministerial priesthood. In a way, my whole life's work was decided that day – to proclaim the Gospel of truth, to serve as a conduit of divine mercy, and to faithfully lead God's people in worship at the altar.

I knew of all these duties intellectually, but what I didn't expect, was how hard it would actually be. I'm beginning to realise, that when it comes to any Christian vocation, God is not asking for our spare time – He is asking for everything! After all, our vocation is the principal means by which we love God in this life, and work out our salvation. True love is self-sacrifice. Self-sacrifice will bring suffering. Every Christian knows this when they look honestly at the Cross. When God calls us to our vocation, He is asking us to follow Him without reserve – to use every ounce of our time, talent, and resources to give glory to God and love our neighbour.

I realised this the hard way about a month ago at Wednesday morning Mass. I had been called to three hospital emergencies the night before to administer the Last Rites for the dying. Despite my willingness to do this task, I was so sleep-deprived the following morning I could barely think straight; I was nursing a terrible headache and didn't have the time to prepare a homily. But when I went to the altar that day, I saw the Eucharist in an entirely new light. As I spoke aloud the words of consecration: "This is My Body, which is given up for you" – I heard my own voice echoed in the Lord's. The Lord had given everything for me, and He was asking me to give everything back. I saw that day, clearer than ever, Christ's own love revealed for us in the Eucharist, and how His Body and Blood is the nourishment we need to keep loving as He loves – regardless of our vocation.

Please pray for me that I remain faithful to my priesthood, and ever responsive to God's call to love without reserve. I will pray the same for you. Fr Sam
