From Fr Paul

We reflected two weeks ago that the feast of the Epiphany opened up a series of manifestations or revelations of Jesus to us: there was the Epiphany feast of the Magi coming to the Christ child, followed last week by the Baptism of Jesus and today by Jesus' appearance at Cana.

Cana is not merely the story of a village wedding. For John, the story is rich in symbolism. Jesus is the host and bridegroom at a wedding feast between God and his people, and God is the one who provides "choice wines." Jesus is beginning his ministry, but he is also giving us a glimpse into the end times when we shall be at a banquet with our God and one another. At the wedding feast John tells us Jesus "revealed his glory" to his disciples, and they "began to believe in him."

In the Bible, glory refers to a person's inner quality or power that evokes respect from others. Glory is most appropriately attributed to God as we acclaim in the Sunday Liturgy, "Glory to God in the highest" – the prayer of the first Christmas.

The miracle at Cana reveals the inner qualities and true identity of Christ. It also helps us see the presence of God's glory in him. John is promising us there will be more to come, more "signs" (a word he uses often) that will manifest God's glory in Christ. We can read John's Gospel - with the gift of sight our baptism gives us — all the way to the glory revealed to us by Christ on the cross. So, when John tells us at the close of the Cana account, that Jesus revealed his glory to his disciples, he is already linking us to the passion narrative, when Jesus' "hour" comes.

John says at the end of his Gospel, my purpose in writing is that 'you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." (20.31)

May this prove true in each of our lives and in the life of Holy Name Parish. Every blessing as we get underway with the new year ahead.

What do the Readings say to us today?

First Reading (Isaiah 62:1-5). We hear of a new wedding feast between God and his people.

Second Reading (1 Corinthians 12:4-11). Though there are many spiritual gifts, they all come from the same Spirit, and should be used for building up the community.

Gospel (John 2:1-12). Jesus fulfils the prophecy of Isaiah. The changing of water into wine is a symbol of the old order yielding to the new.

The **First Reading** contains a message of hope for God's people at one of the lowest moments in their history. Jerusalem lay in ruins. The city's plight reflected that of the nation as a whole. Israel, once God's bride, was now like a widow bereft of children. However, God has not forgotten her. There will be a new wedding feast, and God and his people will enter into a new wedding covenant.

This prophecy was fulfilled in Jesus, who replaced the old order with the new. This is symbolized by the changing of water into wine, as in today's **Gospel**. The miracle of Cana links this Sunday with the feast of the Epiphany and with Jesus' Baptism - all are epiphanies (or manifestations) of his glory.

John depicts Mary as involved at the beginning of Jesus' ministry, and again at the end of it when she is present at the foot of the Cross. Mary is thus associated with the whole of his ministry. Her role is always to be seen in relation to that of her Son.

Reflection/Quote for the Week

John is careful to note that Jesus' first miracle (at Cana) is done in response to Mary's intercession (John 2:1–11). Mary, the icon of the bride and the counterpoint to Jesus the groom, is exactly the "persistent supplicant" Jesus tells us he is looking for in the Parable of the Unjust Judge (Luke 18:1–8).

She doesn't take "no" for an answer, but first taps Jesus on the shoulder and says, "They have no wine" and, after a seeming rebuff, goes with perfect trust to the servants and tells them, "Do whatever he tells you."

The bride—the second Eve confronting the second Adam —seeks the new wine of the kingdom. Indeed, she does so with just the 'stick-at-it-ness' her Son urges all his disciples to have. And the result is precisely what she sought: "This, the first of his signs, Jesus did at Cana in Galilee, and manifested his glory; and his disciples believed in him" (John 2:11).
