## *20th November – Our Lord JESUS CHRIST, KING of the UNIVERSE*

*From Fr Paul*

On this last Sunday of the Liturgical year, the Church celebrates the **Feast of Christ the King**, officially called the **Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe**. The Feast was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 with his encyclical *Quas primas*, to respond to a world that was rejecting Christ and was being dominated by Secularism and Communism.

Pope Pius hoped that the establishment of this feast would bring about the following:

- That this annual celebration would assist the faithful to gain strength in their true King, Jesus Christ;
- That leaders and nations would recognise that they are bound to submit and give respect to Christ the King;
- That nations would see that the Church has the right to freedom, and immunity from the state.
- That the faithful should honour and recognise Jesus as their 'Sovereign King' and emulate his total gift of self, perfectly embodied on the Cross. In imitation of their crucified King, believers can help bring love and relief to those who suffer, and help to proclaim the Good News of Christ in the world today.

Jesus' kingship is in the hearts and minds of those who have accepted him as their Lord and Saviour. Its driving force is love. Thus, wherever a believer is, there Jesus is, too, influencing our every thought, word and action. In these times when we are challenged in our faith, let us remember that Jesus Christ is our King who reigns forever and invites us into his Kingdom which will have no end.

To mark the Solemnity of Christ the King, we shall have a Procession as part of the 9.30am Mass on Sunday morning. We shall have Wine and cheese (and soft drinks) **after the 5:30 pm Mass** on the Solemnity of Christ the King.

A reminder we are marking these two Sundays as Family Masses:

- Family Mass - Prouille Yrs 2, 3, 4 joining us 9:30am THIS SUNDAY
- Family Mass - Prouille Kindergarten, Yrs 1, 5 and 6, 9:30am SUNDAY 27<sup>th</sup>.

## *Readings for Week 34 - Year C*

### *The Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe*

**First reading (2 Samuel 5:1-3).** We see how David became king of a united country. His kingship prefigures the universal kingship of Christ.

**Second reading (Colossians 1:11-20).** Christ is not only head of the Church but Lord of all creation.

**Gospel (Luke 23:35-43).** Christ reigned from the cross and brought salvation to one of the thieves crucified with him.

David had already been anointed King of Judah by his own people at Hebron. Now we hear how the northern tribes also acknowledge him as their king (First Reading). Thus, David became king of a united country. His kingship prefigured the universal kingship of Christ.

The Second Reading is essentially a liturgical hymn in praise of Christ. The first part speaks of his role in creation; the second of his role in redemption. On this feast we acclaim Christ as head of the Church and ruler of the universe.

In the Gospel we see how the inscription over the cross, and all those who witnessed the crucifixion (the crowd, the rulers, the soldiers, and the thieves) unwittingly proclaim the true identity of Jesus. The irony is that the titles which are pronounced in mockery are true: Jesus is both Messiah and King.

## *Saints we remember this week*



**St Cecilia—Feast Day 22 November** St. Cecilia, Cecilia also spelled Cecily, one of the most famous virgin martyrs of the early church. She is a patron saint of music and of musicians.

According to a late 5th-century legend, she was a noble Roman who, as a child, had vowed her virginity to God. When she was married against her will to the future saint Valerian, then a pagan, she told him that an angel of God wished her to remain a virgin. He promised to respect this wish if he were allowed to see the angel. She replied that he would if he were baptised.


On his return from baptism he found Cecilia talking to the angel. She then converted his brother Tiburtius, who also saw the angel. Both men were martyred before she was. She distributed her possessions to the poor, which enraged the prefect Almachius, who ordered her to be burned. When the flames did not harm her, she was beheaded.

## Preparing for Advent and Christmas

Though the civil New Year begins on January 1st, **next Sunday (27<sup>th</sup> November) the Church begins the Advent season** of preparation for the special coming of Christ into our community at Christmas: the feast on which we celebrate the most momentous moment in human history – the birth 2000 years ago of Jesus of Nazareth.

Each season has its special grace, and the special grace of Advent is to prepare our world, our nation, our city, our home, and our heart, for the one who is always coming to us to heal us and to make this world a sanctuary in which God's loving will is done.

Our Advent tree will be put up for the first Sunday of Advent and our nativity scene and further decorations will be on display for Advent Week 3.

On the 17th December the Holy Name Carols bus will be making its way around the neighbourhood. The bus carries a group of parish singers who will visit homes in the parish and sing a few favourite carols before moving on to the next home.

- \* *We will need volunteer drivers for the buses.*
- \* *Good singers who can hold a tune a cappella.*
- \* *Households willing to host fellow parishioners and neighbours where the carols bus will stop.*
- \* *Households will need to be within a 2 kilometre radius of the church and have enough room for the choristers to assemble in the front garden or inside if the weather is inclement. There can be up to 20 of them.*

We can visit five (5) homes at most and will choose locations based on the most practical itinerary if we are oversubscribed with host homes. The bus will travel between 6.30pm and 9pm.

### *Saints we remember this week*

**St Andrew Dung-Lac (1795-1839) Feast Day 24 November** He was a Catholic convert ordained to the priesthood, martyred in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862. He was canonised during the papacy of Saint John Paul II.

Christianity came to Vietnam through the Portuguese. Jesuits ministered to Japanese Catholics who had been driven from Japan. In 1832, Emperor Minh-Mang banned all foreign missionaries, and tried to make all Vietnamese deny their faith by trampling on a crucifix. Many hiding places were offered in the homes of the faithful. Persecution broke out again in 1847.

The last of the martyrs were executed in 1862. France guaranteed religious freedom to Catholics, but it did not stop all persecution. By 1954, there were over a million Catholics in the north. Buddhists represented about 60 percent. Persistent persecution forced some 670,000 Catholics to abandon lands, homes and possessions and flee to the south. In 1964, there were still 833,000 Catholics in the north, but many were in prison. In the south, Catholics were enjoying the first decade of religious freedom in centuries.
