What do the readings say to us this Sunday?

First Reading (Daniel 7:13-14). The prophet Daniel foresees the coming of One who will have dominion over all peoples. Christians see this as a reference to Christ, the Universal King.

Second Reading (Rev 1:5-8). Christ will take full possession of his kingdom only at the end of time.

Gospel (John 18:33-37). Jesus declares before Pilate that he is indeed a King, but that his kingdom is not like kingdoms of this world.

On the last Sunday of the Church's liturgical year, we think of the end times and of judgement. The apocalyptic vision from the Book of Daniel sets the tone. It talks about the coming of 'a son of man', a title for the future redeemer. Jesus referred to himself as 'Son of Man', and the early Christians spoke of Jesus as the 'Son of Man' who would come again in glory. Basing itself on this same test from Daniel, the Book of Revelation (Apocalypse) looks to Jesus' coming at the end of time, when he will take full possession of his kingdom.

On this great feast we rejoice in calling Christ our King. We owe him an allegiance we would not give to any other power on earth.

Reflection/Quote for the Week

"The Feast of Christ the King allows us to reflect on two basic questions which have grave implications in our lives: Is Christ really king? If so, what kind of King is He?

Jesus' kingship is in the hearts and minds of those who have accepted His gift of Himself. Its driving force is love.

Thus, wherever a believer is, there Jesus is, too, influencing his every thought, word and action towards

his and society's transformation.

No power can be greater than this."

Appearing to the Apostles after he had risen, he said:
"All authority has been given to me both in heaven and on
earth" (Mt 28: 18): this power flows from the love that God
manifested in its fullness in the sacrifice of his Son.

Saints we remember this week

The Church celebrates the *Feast of Christ the King*, also called the *Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe*, on the last Sunday of the Liturgical year.

The Feast was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 with his encyclical *Quas primas*, to respond to a world that was rejecting Christ and was being dominated by Secularism and Communism. Pope Pius hoped that the establishment of this feast would bring about the following:

- •That this annual celebration would assist the faithful to gain strength in their true King, Jesus Christ;
- •That leaders and nations would recognise that they are bound to submit and give respect to Christ the King;
- •That nations would see that the Church has the right to freedom, and immunity from the state. In these times when we are challenged in our faith and our ability to worship together, let us remember that Jesus Christ is Our King who reigns forever.
- •That the faithful should honour and recognise Jesus as their 'Sovereign King' and emulate his total gift of self, perfectly embodied on the Cross. In imitation of their thorn-crowned King, believers can help bring love and relief to those who suffer and help to proclaim the Good News of Christ in the world today.



St Cecilia—**Feast Day 22 November St. Cecilia**, Cecilia also spelled **Cecily**, (flourished 3rd century, Rome [Italy]; one of the most famous virgin martyrs of the early church. She is a patron saint of music and of musicians.

According to a late 5th-century legend, she was a noble Roman who, as a child, had vowed her virginity to God. When she was married against her will to the future saint Valerian, then a pagan, she told him that an angel of God wished her to remain a virgin. He promised to respect this wish if he were allowed to see the angel. She replied that he would if he were baptised.

On his return from baptism he found Cecilia talking to the angel. She then converted his brother Tiburtius, who also saw the angel. Both men were martyred before she was. She distributed her possessions to the poor, which enraged the prefect Almachius, who ordered her to be burned. When the flames did not harm her, she was beheaded.

St Andrew Dung-Lac (1795-1839) Feast Day 24 November

He was a Catholic convert ordained to the priesthood, was one of 117 people martyred in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862. Many converts in Vietnam gave their lives for Christ in the 17th, 18th, and 19th centuries, and received beatification during four different occasions between 1900 and 1951. All were canonised during the papacy of Saint John Paul II.

Christianity came to Vietnam through the Portuguese. Jesuits opened the first permanent mission at Da Nang in 1615. They also ministered to Japanese Catholics who had been driven from Japan.

In 1832, Emperor Minh-Mang banned all foreign missionaries, and tried to make all Vietnamese deny their faith by trampling on a crucifix. Many hiding places were offered in the homes of the faithful. Persecution broke out again in 1847.



The last of the martyrs were 17 laypersons, one of them a 9-year-old, executed in 1862. That year a treaty with France guaranteed religious freedom to Catholics, but it did not stop all persecution. By 1954, there were over a million Catholics—about seven percent of the population—in the north. Buddhists represented about 60 percent. Persistent persecution forced some 670,000 Catholics to abandon lands, homes and possessions and flee to the south. In 1964, there were still 833,000 Catholics in the north, but many were in prison. In the south, Catholics were enjoying the first decade of religious freedom in centuries.
