What do the Readings say to us today First Sunday of Advent, Year A?

Advent is divided into two parts. The first part, which runs from the beginning until December 16, focuses on the final coming of Christ. The second part, which runs from December 17 to December 24, focuses on the first coming of Christ at Bethlehem.

First reading (Isaiah 2:1-5). All of the First Readings of the Advent Sunday Masses for Year A are taken from Isaiah, the greatest of the messianic prophets.

Today's passage contains a vision of a world at peace under God. The most compelling image here is of nations turning their weapons of war (swords and spears) into farm implements (ploughshares and sickles). But this can happen only when all nations come to the mountain of the Lord - Mount Zion in Jerusalem.

It is Israel's task to focus attention on Yahweh, the merciful God who desires the unity of the nations. Hence, the reading ends with a call to Israel to 'walk in the light of the Lord'. It also makes clear that the messianic blessings are meant, not just for Israel, but also for all nations.

Second reading (Romans 13:11-14). The theme is that of the Second Coming, which the first Christians believed was imminent. Paul urges the Romans to turn away from the darkness of evil, and to walk in the light of Christ. The reading thus continues the theme of walking in the light of the Lord of the First Reading.

Gospel (Matthew 24:37-44). The Gospel is a brief extract from Jesus' discourse concerning the Parousia, the Second Coming. The emphasis is on readiness. Since the exact time of the Lord's coming is not known, the disciples are urged to be ready to greet him at any time. The phrases 'stay awake' and 'stand ready' convey a sense of being prepared to receive the Lord.

Quotes for Reflection: Week One of Advent


Contrary to what we experience in the secular world, the Church's observance of Advent is not a type of "pseudo-Christmas" but is characterised by <u>distinctive elements that help us prepare</u> physically, emotionally and above all, spiritually, for the joyous celebration of Christmas. Advent is a season of:

Waiting & Expectation. Recalling his birth, we prepare our hearts for his coming at Christmas and wait patiently for Christ's glorious coming as the Lord of History. Making time for prayer, even in the midst of frenetic days, is an essential element of preparation.

Conversion. The prophets Isaiah and John the Baptist call for our conversion of heart, away from sin and darkness to embracing the love and light of Christ.

Joyful Hope. All around us, the world groans through poverty, illness, conflict and division. Creation's groaning is suffused with a longing for peace and joy. Christ's peace and joy is given us through the salvation that he has already won. The presence of his saving grace in the world will flower in fullness, so that, as promised, we shall finally experience, in all its wonder and glory, the peace and joy of life through Christ in God.

"When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Saviour's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming. By celebrating the precursor's birth and martyrdom (ie John the Baptist), the Church unites herself to his desire: "He must increase, but I must decrease" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 524).

Saints we remember this week



St Andrew - 30 November

St Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, was born in the Galilean village of Bethsaida. Originally a disciple of St. John the Baptist, Andrew then became the first of Jesus' disciples (John 1:35-40). His name regularly appears in the Gospels. It was he who first introduced his brother Simon (later Peter, the Rock) to Jesus (John 1:41-42).

He was, in a real sense, the first home missionary, as well as the first foreign missionary (John 12:20-22). Tradition says Andrew was martyred by crucifixion on a cross in the form of an X. In AD 357, his body is said to have been taken to the Church of the Holy Apostles in Constantinople and later removed to the Cathedral of Amalfi in Italy. Centuries later, Andrew became the patron saint of Scotland. St. Andrew's Day determined the beginning of the Western Church Year, since the First Sunday in Advent is always the Sunday nearest to St. Andrew's Day.

Preparing for Advent and Christmas

Though the civil New Year begins on January 1st, this Sunday (27th November) the Church begins the Advent season of preparation for the special coming of Christ into our community at Christmas: the feast on which we celebrate the most momentous moment in human history – the birth 2000 years ago of Jesus of Nazareth.

Each season has its special grace, and the special grace of Advent is to prepare our world, our nation, our city, our home, and our heart, for the one who is always coming to us to heal us and to make this world a sanctuary in which God's loving will is done.

Our Advent tree will be put up for the first Sunday of Advent and our nativity scene and further decorations will be on display for Advent Week 3.

Saints we remember this week

St Francis Xavier - (1506 - 52) Feast Day 3 December

The Jesuit priest Francis Xavier was a Spanish missionary priest who spent 11 years preaching and teaching in India and Japan. He became known as the Apostle of the Indies and was eventually canonised as a saint of the Catholic church. As a boy, he was first taught by his father's chaplain, and later he entered the University of Paris. In 1530 time Xavier met Ignatius of Loyola. Ignatius often quoted to him Jesus' saying, "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" The words inspired Xavier. In 1534 he joined Ignatius and others in forming the small group that Pope Paul III sanctioned in 1540 as the Society of Jesus, better known as Jesuits. He became a priest in 1537. He studied medicine, cared for the sick in hospitals, and preached wherever people would listen.

He was sent to preach in India. He landed at Goa on the west coast of the subcontinent and preached there for several months, baptising tens of thousands of people. Then he began a series of journeys that carried him across all of India, the islands along the coast, Malacca and Spice Islands, far to the east. Finally he went to Japan, where he stayed for more than two years. He died on December 3, 1552. He was canonised in 1622 by Pope Gregory XV as St. Francis Xavier.
