What do the readings say to us this Sunday?

First Reading (1 Kings 17:10-16). In the middle of a famine, a poor widow shares the last of her food with the prophet Elijah, and far from losing by doing so, she is enriched.

Second Reading (Hebrews 9:24-28). Through his death Christ has taken our sins upon himself and has opened for us the door to salvation.

Gospel (Mark 12:38-44). In the eyes of others the offering of the widow was the least, but in the eyes of Christ it was the greatest.

In biblical times widows were among the poorest of the poor. The widow in the First Reading was gentile, and she had a son to support. She was down to her last handful of meal and drop of olive oil. After that she and her child must starve. Yet, by sharing it with the prophet, she has an never ending supply of flour and oil. She represents those people, who, despite poverty and oppression, place all their trust in God.

In the Gospel, Jesus' denunciation of the public display of the Scribes provides a background for an example of genuine religious behaviour on the part of a widow. Her example of true piety and devotion contrasts sharply with the counterfeit piety of the Scribes. The widow let go of every shred of security, and committed herself wholly to God. The story is as much about trust in God as about generosity. The widow's generosity results from her trust in God.

Reflection/Quote for the Week

Mother Teresa told a story how one day she was walking down the street when a person who was beggar came up to her and said, 'Mother Teresa, everybody is giving to you, I also want to give to you. Today, for the whole day, I got only thirty cents. I want to give it to you.'

Mother Teresa thought for a moment: 'If I take the thirty cents he will have nothing to eat tonight, and if I don't take it I will hurt his feelings. So I put out my hands and I took the money. I have never seen such joy on anybody's face as I saw on the face of that beggar man at the thought that he too could give to Mother Teresa.'

Mother Teresa went on: 'It was a big sacrifice for that poor man, who had sat in the sun all day long and received only thirty cents. It was beautiful. Thirty cents is such a small amount, and I can get nothing with it, but as he gave it up and I took it, it became like thousands because it was given with so much love. God looks, not at the greatness of the work, but at the love with which it is performed.'


The Community Forum is designed to make our community aware of a real injustice perpetrated by our Council of Ku-ring-gai. Ku-ring-gai is one of a very few Councils in Sydney that has not adopted an affordable housing policy let alone a plan for implementation. Affordable housing covers rental (and purchase if possible, which it generally isn't) accommodation for people on a moderate income ie. below \$80,000 – 100,000. This includes most of our key workers, nurses, police constables, young teachers, paramedics. The level below that, low income workers includes retail staff, old age workers, hospital cleaning staff and so on. Our Council has made no provision for any of these categories of workers because they say that Ku-ring-gai residents don't care, that our only interest is in seeing the value of our houses and our investment properties rise. Next door to us, Willoughby Council has been implementing an affordable housing strategy for years and is currently building a low-rise block of units at the back of their Library for key workers.

Why does it matter? Because women and children are trapped in violent home situations because leaving means taking their children out of their schools and away from their friends to a suburb far away at a time of trauma in their lives. They can only take refuge in a shelter for a limited period and while everyone is trying to find a place for them to go, they are preventing another family finding refuge. Or see how in our area, ageing parents don't have their children near them because of the cost of housing. Consider how far key workers have to travel to work if their job is in Ku-ring-gai. And the struggle that many businesses in the area have to find workers and how they are prevented from expanding because they can't get staff who can afford to live here. There are solutions, innovative solutions that only require the right zoning rules and do not require high-rise blocks of units. That can all be covered by a good affordable housing strategy. All that is missing is any will on the part of Council to make it happen.

We will all be voting on 4th December or before. Come along to the Community Forum and help us make affordable housing a commitment on every Councillor and Candidate's ticket.

Pope Francis has asked us to make the Covid pandemic crisis a motivation to create a better, more compassionate and less divided world. Do we really want Ku-ring-gai to be an exclusionary zone for Sydney's elite? What about our Catholic commitment to people on the margins? Who are we as Church if only Mercedes and Porsches are in our car parks? That's where we are headed unless Council takes action. Saints we remember this week

Saint Leo the Great - (c. 400 – 461) Feast Day—10 November
Also known as Pope Saint Leo I. His response to the call of the Lord transformed him into one of the greatest popes of Christian history. In fact, he was the first pope to be given the title "the Great." Details pertaining to Leo's place of birth are not known, but it is believed his ancestors come from Tuscany.

St. Leo the Great became a very well-known deacon of the Church by 431, serving the church under Pope Celestine I. Leo was widely respected for his love for the Lord, intelligence and persuasive nature. He was also gifted in bringing reconciliation between disputing groups of Christians. That is why he was often sent out to settle disputes, both secular and theological. Following Pope Celestine, the next Pope was Pope Sixtus III.

When Pope Sixtus III passed away, Leo was then elected as the next pope in 440. His swift election reflected the respect he had among the people from his service to the Lord and the affection the faithful had this pastoral and wise servant of the Lord.

Pope Leo was deeply dedicated to his service as pope. He saw himself as privileged to sit in the Chair of St Peter, as the servant of the servants of God. He worked diligently as "Peter's successor." Over time, Leo became known as one of the best administrative popes of the ancient Church. Leo died on November 10, 461. He wished to be buried as close as possible to St. Peter's tomb. His body was first laid in

the entrance of St. Peter's basilica but was later moved inside the basilica in 688.
