


POPE FRANCIS' PRAYER INTENTION FOR DECEMBER








Our parish quota for the 2024/2025 Pastoral Works Fund is \$36,919, and we are grateful to have already raised \$12,000!





DAY 1: TUESDAY 13 MAY 2025 - DEPART

DAY 2: WEDNESDAY 14 MAY - ARRIVE

Athens today is the thriving capital of Greece, the world of the New Testament where St Paul and his companions established the first Christian communities throughout his four missionary journeys.

On arrival in Athens we will be met and transferred to our centrally located hotel. Athens overnight (D)

DAY 3: THURSDAY 15 MAY - ATHENS AND ANCIENT CORINTH

Theme: The Athenians & The Corinthians When St Paul first came to Athens it was predominantly a city which worshipped pagan gods. St Paul was taken before the city council at the Areopagus Hill, a rough outcrop of limestone rock from which he preached the Gospel message to the Athenian philosophers

We begin our pilgrimage with a tour of Christian Athens including the Acropolis, the Areopagus where St Paul delivered his famous sermon about the identity of "the Unknown God" (Acts 17:15-34). View the Ancient Agora and the Plaka (Old Greece) and explore the Parthenon.

Also see the Kallimármaro Stadium, dating back to 330BC and restored for the first modern Olympic Games held here in 1896. Journey out to Ancient Corinth this afternoon where the apostle Paul lived for almost two years, teaching the people the

Word of God and converting many. Visit the ancient ruins and see the site where he preached the Gospel from the Rostrum. See the Peirene fountain, and the 6th century BC **Temple of Apollo** before an outdoor Mass in this stunning pilgrimage setting, Finally, we come to Cenchreae. the ancient port from where St Paul said farewell to the believers and departed for Ephesus (Acts 18:18). Athens overnight (BD)

DAY 4: FRIDAY 16 MAY - ATHENS TO

This morning we begin our day at the fascinating Acropolis Museum, built to house every artefact found on the rock of the acropolis and the surrounding slopes. We continue north today to Meteora and to the small town of Kalambaka built at the foot of the majestic grey rocks. Kalambaka overnight (BD)

DAY 5: SATURDAY 17 MAY - METEORA

Theme: The Monastics

We spend some time today marveiling at this unique phenomenon of nature - 24 perpendicular rocks where 600 years ago Byzantine monks chose to worship God and build their Monastic community of Meteora. We will visit some of these living monasteries and view the extraordinary collection of priceless religious frescoes and other treasures that will make this a

Enjoy some free time this afternoon. Kalambaka overnight (BD)

DAY 6: SUNDAY 18 MAY - KALAMBAKA

Theme: The Bereans & The Thessalonians Today we journey north by coach to Berea (modern Veria). The "Berna" - an impressive monument to Paul - is believed to incorporate the steps from the original synagogue from which he preached the gospel to the jews, who welcomed the word of God and began to study the Scriptures (Acts 17:10-12).

Continue on to Thessaloniki, Greece's second city, founded in 315 BC, and where St Paul preached during the winters of 49-50AD and wrote the two epistles to the ancient Thessalonians, it was here that he established the first Christian Church in Europe.

Our visit will include the ramparts of the city, the triumphal **Arch of Galerius**, as well as the **Rotunda** where we can see pieces of the pulpit from which Paul preached, View the Roman Agora where he also preached. Nearby we shall visit St Demetrios' Church dedicated to a Roman soldier who converted to Christianity and was later martyred. View its valuable mosaics and rescoes before descending into the crypt where we find the remains of some ancient Roman baths and streets.

Continue east along the ancient route of the Apostle Paul to the port city of Kavala (ancient Neapolis), once named "Christoupolis" after being the first European city to accept Christianity. It was here that St Paul, St Timothy and St Silas first landed from Troas (Acts 16:11), one of the great moments in the history of Christianity in Europe. Kavala overnight (BD)

DAY 7: MONDAY 19 MAY - PHILIPPI

Theme: The Philippians

Arise and journey along the ancient route of the Apostle Paul to nearby **Philippi**, named after Philip II, father of Alexander the Great, It was here that St Paul won his first European convert, a woman named Lydia, from the city of Thyatira (Acts 16:12-40). Visit the Baptistery of Lydia for a beautiful outdoor Mass on the River Zygaktis





and renew our Baptismal vows. Visit the marketplace (where St Paul and St Silas were brought before the rulers) and the cistern which tradition identifies as the place where St Paul was imprisoned. In the ancient theatre we will hear the story of Paul's arrest, imprisorment, and miraculous release.

DAY 8: TUESDAY 20 MAY - KAVALA TO

Today we are transferred to the airport for ur flight to Athe s. On arrival we will be transferred directly to the Athenian port of Piraeus to embark our boat transfer to the Dodecanese Island of Patmos, where St John the Beloved wrote the Book of Revelation. Island of Patmos overnight (BD)

DAY 9: WEDNESDAY 21 MAY - PATIMOS DAY

Theme: The Patmosians

Lying between the islands of Leros and fkarla is the 'ascetic shaped' Patmos, called the Jerusalem of the Aegean' due to the during the great celebrations of Christianity. We begin our day with a walking tour of the nain square of the village of **Chora**. This is the traditional settlement and capital of Patmos, where the narrow streets were designed to ward off pirates over the uries. Ascend to the Monastery of St John the Beloved, a huge fortress-like building dating from the 11th century, for a isit and celebration of Mass.

Our exploration of this living monastery will culminate with time in the actual Cave of Revelation where God chose to reveal to St John the mysteries of the last book of the

The cave is now at the foot of the monastery, which houses priceless icons and

manuscripts, sacred relics, and vestments embroided with silver or gold threads and bejeweled with precious stones.

Later continue to the active Convent of Evangelismos (Annunciation) built by the hieromonk Nikiphoros who was cured from the plague after praying to St Luke the Evangelist, Visit the Convent of Zoodochos Pigi with icons dating from the 16th to the 18th century. Finally, we will enjoy a short scenic tour of the island Island of Patmos overnight (BC)

DAY 10: THURSDAY 22 MAY - PATMOS TO

Today, we depart Patmos by ferry and make our way to the picturesque island of Samos, nestled in the heart of the Aegean Sea. Renowned for its lush landscapes pristine waters, and rich ancient heritage, it is a destination of both natural beauty and spiritual significance. Island of Samos overnight (BD)

DAY 11: FRIDAY 23 MAY - SAMOS TO

Depart Samos by Ferry to Kusadasi, doorway to Ephesus and the Churches of Revelation. On arrival in Kusadasi we will be met and transferred by coach to our centrally

Kusadasi overnight (BD)

DAY 12: SATURDAY 24 MAY - EPHESUS Theme: The Ephesians

We travel directly to Ephesus this morning, the most famous of the Seven Churches of Revelation (Rev 2:1-7) where St Paul spent more than two years in the course of his third missionary journey. It was to the Christian community of Ephesus that St Paul wrote his greatest and most challenging letter (the epistle to the Ephesians) and also

succeeded in converting many away from

worship of the god Artemis Our visit today will include the ruins where St Paul lived and preached. See

the prison of St Paul; walk through the ancient marble streets founded in the 10th century BC and see this most 'complete' Roman city providing us with an excellent window into Imperial Rome. Pass the Temple of Hadrian, the Library of Celsus, the enormous amphitheatre (Acts 19:29–31), and finally come to the ruins of the Christian Basilica where the Third Ecumenical Council took place in 431AD, and where Our Lady was proclaimed "Mother of e ascend the hill to the House of the Virgin Mary where it is said Mary spent the later years of her life. We celebrate our group Mass here in one of the chapels. Finally, we visit the restored remains of the 6th century Basilica of St John at Celcuk where a small church was originally built over the tomb of St John the Evangelist. Kusadasi overnight (BD)

This morning, we set out towards Izmir once the site of ancient Smyrna, one of the Seven Churches of Revelation (Rev 2:8-11). After Mass, we are transferred to Izmir airport for our flight to Rome, the Eternal City, rich in the traditions of our Church, and the focus of many Jubilee Holy Year activities.

Then we visit the Vatican Museums, home to one of the world's greatest art collections, and Michelangelo's breathtaking Sistine Chapel Then, we are back at St Peter's Basilica for a guided tour of the largest church in Christendom, built over his tomb, where we can spend a few moments to pray at the tomb of late Pope John Paul II.

This afternoon enjoy a walking tour of the historical centre of Rome. See some of the most famous sites in the Eternal City - the Pantheon (outside), the Spanish Steps, Trevi Fountain, Piazza Navona, Piazza Venezia, the Colosseum (outside). Rome overnight (BD)

DAY 15: TUESDAY 27 MAY -- ROME JUBILEE*

The journey this afternoon will take us to the Walls. Originally consecrated in 324, the aint's tomb is visible now under the Papal Altar. We will celebrate Mass here as a special tribute to the Church's greatest evangelist. Continue then along the ancient Applian Way, the oldest road from Roman times to

the ancient Catacombs for a memorable guided tour to marvel at these underground burial tunnels for Christians and Hebrews. Rome overnight (BD)

DAY 16: WEDNESDAY 28 MAY - ROME

We will return to the Vatican and join with pilgrims from around the world for a memorable General Audience with Pope Francis (subject to the Pope's presence in Rome) We continue on this afternoon with Mass and a visit of the impressive St Mary Major Basilica, followed by the Basilica of St John in Lateran, the first papal residence. nt are the Holy Stairs, which w brought from Jerusalem to Rome in 326AD by St Helena. From here we visit the Basilica of Santa Croce in Gerusalemme with its extraordinary collection of relics from the

God had long ago promised his people And thirdly, John exhorted his listeners to be for great in your midst is the Holy One through the patriarchs of the old covenant content with what they had and to avoid (Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob), and through the prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Zephaniah, etc.) and rulers of Israel (Moses, David), that he would send them a Redeemer who would save them from their sins, free them from oppression, fill them with the joy of his presence (Zephaniah 3:17), and bring them his everlasting kingdom of peace and righteousness.

> John brought 'good news' to the people The people recognized that John was an extraordinary man of God and a true prophet who spoke in God's name. They came out to hear the "good news" (Luke 3:18) which he preached to them. And they willingly submitted to his baptism of repentance at the River Jordan where he preached. John's task was to wake people up from spiritual sleep and indifference, and to turn them back to hear God's voice and obey his commandments. John wanted the people to be in a good place to receive the Messiah and follow him.

Luke mentions two groups in particular who came to John for spiritual renewal - tax collectors and Jewish soldiers who belonged to the Roman peace-keeping force. Both groups were regarded as being spiritually unfit and unclean by the Jewish authorities and were treated as outcasts. John welcomed them with open arms along with all the multitude of people who came to hear the "good news" and be baptized in the cleansing waters of the River Jordan.

John's message of repentance

John's message of renewal and repentance was very practical. He told the people three things: First, every follower of God must share what they possess (their personal goods and resources) with their neighbors, especially with those who lacked the basic necessities of life. John recognized that this was a key duty for every individual and an outward expression of the great commandment to love one's neighbor as oneself (Leviticus 19:18).

Second, John pointed out the sacred duty to give each and every person what is their due and to not take from them what rightfully belongs to them. God commands that each person be treated with respect and that honor be given where honor is due. John told the tax collectors that they must not coerce people to pay more tax money than what was rightfully due. (Tax collectors often made handsome profits for themselves by overcharging other people.) John instructed soldiers to not abuse their authority or power to compel people to give or do things for them beyond what was people to carry their heavy equipment for not tell them to leave their profession, but to be good, honest, and respectful soldiers.
