How Wonderful!

his week we're introduced to the "wise men", often described as Magi or astrologers, who are seeking out a foreign king. In many ways, this is a microcosm of God's plan for humanity.

The Old Testament reveals how God chose Israel to be especially his own, a priestly people, a holy nation. But the reason for this choice was not to glorify Israel over against the other nations, rather, it was to make of Israel a beacon to the world, so that through Israel all might be gathered to himself.

Similarly, the wise men are seeking a king, born for the Jews, but he wouldn't be for the Jews alone. This Messiah would be the King of kings, a light to all the nations.

How wonderful that the sign of this King's birth should be a star, something that can be clearly seen by every nation and from any nation. And when the Magi saw it, they were willing to leave their own country behind.

Then, after greeting the newborn King, they went back to their own country, but they went back by a different route. This is a biblical sign that they were changed.

They would remain Babylonians, but they had become citizens of a higher country. They couldn't return by the same path.

Five Lessons of the Magi

The unforgettable story of the journey of the Magi, as recounted in the Gospel of Matthew, is an artful summary of the principal dynamics of the spiritual life. Watching the night sky with scrupulous attention for signs of God's purpose, the Magi evoke the importance of alertness in the spiritual order. We must keep our eyes open to see what God is up to. For far too many people, the spiritual life never gets underway, precisely because they don't pay attention.

Once they saw the star, they moved, despite the length of the journey and the dangers of the road. Sometimes people know what God wants them to do, but they don't act, either out of fear or laziness or the influence of bad habits. In their confident journeying forth, the Magi teach us not to miss the propitious moment. They teach us to move.

When they entered into Herod's territory, the Magi caught the attention of the king. And when they spoke to him of the birth of a new King of the Jews, Herod became frantic and tried to use them in order to destroy the baby. A third lesson: when you walk the path that God has laid out for you, expect opposition. We live in a sinful, fallen world, and there will always be forces at cross purposes to God.

Refusing to cooperate with Herod's game, the wise men came to Bethlehem, found the child, and gave him their precious gifts. When you come to Christ, don't give him your second best; break open the very best of yourself and make it a gift for him. Finally, they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod and so "they returned to their home country by another route."

As Fulton Sheen commented so magnificently: of course they did; for no one comes to Christ and goes back the same way he came!

The journey of these wise men is a metaphor for the spiritual journeys that all of us must make. Like the magi, we must be attentive; we must be willing to act; we must expect opposition; we must give our best to Christ, and finally, we must be willing to change, "to go back by a different route." *appleseeds.org* Bishop Robert Barron

Captivated

In the Gospel we see the juxtaposition of King Herod and the mysterious Magi from the East. History tells us that Herod was the consummate political survivor, a canny realist who had, through threats, murder, and corruption, found his way to the top of the political ladder.

But while he was fussing around, desperately trying to maintain himself in power, figures from a distant country were blithely indifferent to politics and games of domination. Instead, they were intensely surveying the night sky, looking for signs from God.

And they found one. As these Magi crossed the border into Herod's country, they came onto Herod's radar screen. Who were they? Spies? And whom were they seeking? A newborn king? To Herod, that sounded like a threat, it sounded like treason.

So under the pretense of piety, he called the Magi to himself and inquired after the star's first appearance, getting the time coordinates, and then he asked them to go to Bethlehem and find the exact locale. Why? To stamp out this new baby king, this king who threatened to undermine Herod's tyrannical rule.

Herod was afraid of Jesus and responded with violence; the Magi were captivated by Jesus and responded with worship.

Jubilee Year - Pilgrims of Hope

 \mathbf{I} n the Catholic Church, a Jubilee or Holy Year is a special year of forgiveness and reconciliation, in which people are invited to come back into right relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation.

A Jubilee Year is celebrated by the Church every 25 years. This has been the case since 1470, when Pope Paul II changed it from every 50 years.

A Pope can also proclaim an Extraordinary Jubilee, like the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy which Pope Francis inaugurated in 2015.

The theme is Pilgrims of Hope. Pope Francis has invited Catholics to renew our hope and discover a vision that can "restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone". We are also invited to rediscover a spirituality of God's creation in which we understand ourselves as "pilgrims on the earth" rather than masters of the world. The Jubilee Year concludes 6 January 2026.
