Our Hope

ope is a powerful motivating force for life, and both the First Reading and the Gospel offer hope. In Daniel's day, the people were being persecuted and put to death for their beliefs. In Mark's time, those who chose Jesus were also being driven from the temple, persecuted and killed. Both readings offer hope to the people - and to all who presently choose to follow God. Persecution of Christians continues, and we know that life can be tough: illness, violence, loneliness, etc. Wherein lives hope for us? Well, from Daniel, 'your own people (those whose names are recorded in the Book) will be spared', and from Mark, 'my words will not pass away', and that he, the Son of Man 'will send his angels to gather his chosen'.

And even though there are frequent prophecies about the ending of all we know, Jesus says that 'nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; only the Father'. Hope reminds us that by being attentive to the signs of the times, we will recognise that 'he is near' in the changing seasons, in the presence of those we love and in the wonder of all of creation.

World Day of the Poor

Today, we remember the poor people of this world, conscious that poverty can also be unrelated to finance. A student car park attendant commented that some of his clients receive cars from parents who otherwise remain uninvolved in their children's lives. Busy drop-in cafes and libraries support customers who long for company and recognition. Some torn-apart families struggle to heal the wounds of division. Tragically, we've witnessed families who, through war, lose everything they possess – but discover the riches of love, hope and courage. Sometimes affluence and destitution walk together. Today we pray for all those who experience poverty in whatever form, that they will find the security and hope for which they yearn.

Ever practical, Pope Francis has supplied the homeless people of Rome with showers, a change of clothing, haircuts, food and somewhere to sleep. He also organised for many to enjoy a day out at the seaside and a pizza meal on the way home. "Why not?" he asked. "We all like a day beside the sea." Simple things can touch the hearts and lives of the poorest people and situations. Of course, in situations of war, there is often very little that we can do, and yet there is also a contribution to world peace which all of us can make, enriching the lives of those around us. There is nothing to stop us closing a door quietly or finding something good to say about even the most irritating person. Even when we are busy, we can become an island of peace which can radiate to other people. We don't need to become messengers of doom and gloom. Some of the most materially poor people in our world are also the most generous because, having suffered themselves, they learn empathy and strive to lessen the sufferings of others. Today, as we celebrate the World Day of the Poor, we pray for those who are in need and don't know where to look for support. They don't need to feel that they stand on the edge of disaster.

A Foretaste

The earth-shattering events which killed the dinosaurs failed to destroy crocodiles and cockroaches. Although the eruption of Vesuvius killed many inhabitants of Pompeii, some survived. Throughout history false prophets have foretold the date and time of the end of the world. To their surprise and embarrassment, it hasn't happened and life has continued, seemingly unchanged.

At this time of year, the Gospel often carries tales of doom and gloom. Today appears to be no different as we hear about stars falling from the sky – and yet we are offered hope. Jesus foretells the end of the known world and presents something beyond anything we can imagine – everlasting life. False prophets can only indicate a vantage point for their followers to watch the world's destruction before they die. Jesus declares that, yes, the world will end, but life will continue and he can guarantee it. He uses a tree and time-limited human words to teach his listeners that, as the eternal Word, he will accompany them forever and always. In the same way, Jesus' words will go beyond heaven and earth, into eternity. Our beautiful planet Earth is only a foretaste of the good things to come.
