COMPASSION

In biblical times, leprosy covered a wide range of skin diseases. Fear of contagion forced victims to live outside the community and endure the most frightful and humiliating form of isolation imaginable. Lepers were treated as outcasts, pariahs, untouchables. The miserable plight of lepers was made even worse by the ingrained belief that their disease was a punishment from God for sin. Thus, to their physical affliction was added the psychological and mental torment of feeling rejected not only by society but even by God. As our first reading from the Book of Leviticus makes clear, a leper was declared 'unclean' by one of the priests, compelled to wear 'his clothing torn and his hair disordered', to 'shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean", and to 'live outside the camp' (Lev 13: 45-46). Moreover, Jewish Law forbade anyone from approaching or touching a leper under the pain of incurring ritual defilement. Hence the life of a leper at the time of Jesus was nothing short of a 'living hell'. Death would have been preferable. This context makes the story of Jesus' cure of a leper in today's gospel quite remarkable. First, there is the extraordinary courage and faith of the leper. In spite of the frightful stigma he had to endure, he still has the courage to approach Jesus, trusting that he will accept and cure him. To come close to Jesus he had to risk the anger of the people around Jesus and the likelihood of been chased away with stones. With an exemplary combination of faith and humility he goes down on his knees before Jesus and pleads with him in words that must have wrung the very heart of Jesus: "If you want to, you can cure me" (Mk 1:40).

Even more extraordinary is the response of Jesus, especially the manner in which he cures the leper. Moved with compassion for the leper, he says: "Of course I want to. Be cured" (Mk 1:41). And, with a gesture not only forbidden by the Mosaic Law but profoundly counter-cultural, he reaches out and touches the leper with his hand. This gesture – touching the untouchable – spoke more eloquently than any words could and brought spiritual as well as physical healing to the unfortunate man. And despite Jesus' warning, the healed leper cannot keep the good news of his cure to himself. He must speak of it to everyone he meets with the unfortunate consequence that Jesus has to leave town and go to place where nobody lived.

Today's gospel reminds us that touch is one of our most fundamental human needs. Far more than words, touch conveys concern, empathy, support and affirmation. As disciples of Jesus we are called, like St Paul, to model our lives on Christ, to reach out to others with compassion and love, especially to those who are rejected and stigmatised in any way. The love of God impels us to imitate the example of Jesus and bring his compassionate and healing touch to the lepers of our time, the many isolated, despised and broken men and women longing for acceptance and love.

Humility According to St. Francis de Sales: At the core of St Francis de Sales' teachings on humility is the recognition of God's sovereignty and the understanding of one's own limitations in comparison to the divine. St Francis de Sales draws inspiration from the teachings of Jesus Christ, particularly the Beatitudes, where Christ extols the virtue of humility, stating, "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth" (Matthew 5:5). For St Francis de Sales, humility is not self-deprecation or a false sense of inferiority but rather an honest assessment of one's gifts and limitations in relation to God. He encourages individuals to cultivate a spirit of gratitude for the talents and virtues bestowed upon them while recognising that these gifts ultimately come from God.

One of his key teachings is the importance of self-awareness. St Francis de Sales encourages individuals to reflect on their thoughts, words, and actions regularly, examining their motives and intentions. Through this self-awareness, one can identify moments of pride and arrogance, seeking to replace them with a humble and charitable disposition. This process of self-examination and repentance aligns with St Francis de Sales' belief in the transformative power of God's grace in overcoming human weaknesses. St Francis de Sales also highlights the significance of embracing humiliations with grace and patience. He recognises that life is full of challenges, criticisms, and setbacks, and he advises his followers to accept these with humility rather than resentment. By doing so, individuals align themselves with Christ's example, who endured suffering and humiliation for

Moreover, St Francis de Sales emphasises the importance of simplicity in thought, speech, and action. He cautions against the complexities of pride and the desire for worldly recognition. Instead, he encourages a childlike simplicity that finds joy in the ordinary and delights in serving others without seeking praise or approval. In cultivating this simplicity, individuals can detach themselves from the trappings of ego and open their hearts to the genuine pursuit of virtue.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron, "If someone has on his skin a scab or pustule or blotch which appears to be the sore of leprosy, he shall be brought to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests among his descendants. If the man is leprous and unclean, the priest shall declare him unclean by reason of the sore on his head. "The one who bears the sore of leprosy shall keep his garments rent and his head bare and shall muffle his beard; he shall cry out, 'Unclean, unclean!' As long as the sore is on him, he shall declare himself unclean, since he is in fact unclean. He shall dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp."

He said to him, "See that you tell no one anything, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer for your cleansing what Moses prescribed; that will be proof for them." The man went away and began to publicise the whole matter. He spread the report abroad so that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places, and people kept coming to him from everywhere.
