Dear friends




This weekend we welcome again our children receiving the Eucharist for the very first time. It is a great moment for them, and for the whole of our community. We rejoice with them at the completion of their Catholic initiation through the reception of Jesus' very life. We pray that this life may be sustained and grow in the years ahead as they come to appreciate all that Jesus offers us as promise.

As we may realize, Pope Francis has dedicated 2024 to the Year of Prayer in preparation for the 2025 Jubilee Year. He has called on us to "pray more fervently to prepare ourselves to live properly this grace-filled event and to experience the power of hope in God." The Holy Father said this year is dedicated "to rediscovering the great value and absolute need for prayer, prayer in personal life, in the life of the Church, prayer in the world." It is not a Year marked with particular initiatives, but a time to rediscover the value of prayer and the need for daily prayer in our Christian life. Pope Francis said; "I am happy to think that the year preceding the Jubilee event, 2024, will be dedicated to a great 'symphony' of prayer. First of all, to recover the desire to be in the presence of the

Lord, to listen to him and adore him." In light of this I have prepared a series of meditations on the various aspects of Christian prayer, produced by our Diocese. There are eight of these meditations to be released over the coming months. The first is now available on our Diocese's YouTube channel at https://www.bbcatholic.org.au/mission/year-of-prayer. Each one is only about some 20 minutes long and thanks be to the producer, Anthony Costa, they have been beautifully created. I hope they are beneficial!

From next Monday, all our priests and deacons will be at our annual Clergy Conference on the Central Coast. Our theme this year is "Towards a Synodal Church" as Pope Francis continues to invite us how we are to walk together, participating together in the Mission entrusted to us. We are blessed to have the Irish theologian, Fr Eamon Conway with us. Fr Conway is internationally renowned and has reflected a great deal on the topic of synodality. We will also be joined by Professor Renee Kohler-Ryan who is one of the Australian members of the current Synod of Bishops meeting again in October. And there will also be an opportunity to present on our own parish's experience of being a Parish-in-Council.

Please note that from Monday 10-Friday 14 June there will only be one Mass celebrated in our church each day at 12.30pm. There will be no daily 9.00am Mass or Wednesday 6.00pm Mass next week. There will therefore be no Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on Thursday morning next week, although our Holy Hour will continue on Thursday evening but without the availability of the Sacrament of Confession. We are very grateful to our brothers from the Prelature of the Holy Cross who can assist us in this way through next week. Please do keep our priests and deacons in our prayer through the coming week, that the time together will be one of much grace for us all.

Pray the Rosary With Us After 12:30pm Mass

We began praying the Rosary after the 12:30 Mass on May 1st, intending to continue only through that month of Mary. However, a dedicated group of 10 to 20 parishioners has faithfully gathered to pray together and wishes to continue this beautiful tradition daily.

Originally Named Joseph:

Saint Barnabas was not his original name. He was born Joseph, but the apostles gave him the name Barnabas, which means "son of encouragement" or "son of consolation," reflecting his supportive and encouraging nature.

Key Companion of Paul: Barnabas played a crucial

role in the early missionary journeys of Saint Paul. He introduced Paul to the apostles after Paul's conversion, vouching for his genuine transformation from a persecutor of Christians to a follower of Christ.

Patron Saint of Cyprus: Barnabas is considered the patron saint of Cyprus. According to tradition, he was martyred there around 61 AD. His tomb was discovered in 478 AD, and the Monastery of St. Barnabas was built near the site in his honor. Cyprus celebrates his feast day on

June 11th.



Jesus comes to break down the barriers created by culture, wealth, social class and race, in order to build up the Father's vision of one unified, reconciled human family. If a "house" is to stand strong, it must be constructed upon humility, forgiveness and acceptance. Indeed, the transformative power to recreate or restore comes only from the Spirit of God.

Connecting the Word

to family experience

The gospel opens with a begins with a fragment that is unique to Mark: Jesus' relatives come to seize him, saying, "He is out of his mind." The persecuted Christian community of the late first century, to whom Mark was writing, regarded faith in Jesus to be a stronger bond than blood relationships. Many early Christians left their families to join the group of Christian believers. Jesus was also misunderstood by his family, who clearly thought he was out of his mind. They come to bring him home and avoid further humiliation. Yet Jesus stays true to himself in the knowledge that the community he was forming was stronger than family bonds.

to culture

Today's gospel reminds us that Jesus did not have it easy. Are we expecting our journey as Christians to be easy? Jesus was misunderstood, not because he behaved in an aloof or obnoxious manner, or because he engaged in one-upmanship, but rather because he enjoyed the company of "sinners." He ate with those who were outcast, ostracised or held in disrepute. He openly attended dinner parties rather than fasting. His behaviour caused great embarrassment to his family and those who upheld cultural norms that kept certain people on the margins. Are we willing to act as Jesus did?

Understanding the Word

Family as a relationship which is defined by living the will of God

A recurring theme in Mark's gospel is the failure of Jesus' followers, particularly his disciples, to comprehend the real meaning of his words and actions. The declarations of the scribes, who attribute his power to demons, and the apologetic tones of his family reveal how misunderstood Jesus was by the people who were closest to him. The scribes could not comprehend Jesus' utter dedication to the will of God, nor his ability to heal people of their ailments, therefore they concluded he must be an agent of the devil. Yet Jesus probes them: "How can Satan cast out Satan?" Jesus' use of imagery paints the picture of Satan as a burglar who cannot steal a "strong man's" property unless he has tied up the person first. If a person is strong in faith, Satan cannot succeed.

Jesus then creates a sharp contrast between unclean spirits and the Holy Spirit, declaring that anyone who blasphemes against the Holy Spirit "is guilty of an eternal sin." When Jesus' mother and brothers arrive they attempt to bring him home. They are clearly concerned by Jesus' words and actions which challenged their most revered traditions and respected institutions. Yet Jesus unequivocally redefines the concept of 'family' as being a relationship which is centred, not in blood ties, but in living out the will of God.







As we have the same spirit of faith that is mentioned in scripture – I believed, and therefore I spoke – we too believe and therefore we too speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus to life will raise us with Jesus in our turn, and put us by his side and you with us. You see, all this is for your benefit, so that the more grace is multiplied among people, the more thanksgiving there will be, to the glory of God.

That is why there is no weakening on our part, and instead, though this outer man of ours may be falling into decay, the inner man is renewed day by day. Yes, the troubles which are soon over, though they weigh little, train us for the carrying of a weight of eternal glory which is out of all proportion to them. And so we have no eyes for things that are visible, but only for things that are invisible; for visible things last only for a time, and the invisible things are eternal.

Jesus went home with his disciples, and such a crowd collected that they could not even have a meal. When his relatives heard of this, they set out to take charge of him, convinced he was out of his mind.

The scribes who had come down from Jerusalem were saying, 'Beelzebul is in him,' and 'It is through the prince of devils that he casts devils out.' So he called them to him and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot last. And if a household is divided against itself, that household can never stand. Now if Satan has rebelled against himself and is divided, he cannot stand either – it is the end of him. But no one can make his way into a strong man's house and burgle his property unless he has tied up the strong man first. Only then can he burgle his house.

'I tell you solemnly, all men's sins will be forgiven, and all their blasphemies; but let anyone blaspheme against the Holy Spirit and he will never have forgiveness: he is guilty of an eternal sin.' This was because they were saying, 'An unclean spirit is in him.'

His mother and brothers now arrived and, standing outside, sent in a message asking for him. A crowd was sitting round him at the time the message was passed to him, 'Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you.' He replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' And looking round at those sitting in a circle about him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother.'

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

BELONGING TO JESUS

Just before today's Gospel, the crowds following Jesus continue to grow forcing him to preach from a boat on the Sea of Galilee. They come from far and wide, from Galilee and Judea. The mission is going well, so well that today's passage opens with the crowd gathering again 'so that Jesus and his disciples 'could not even have a meal'.

This Gospel takes the form of a 'Markan sandwich' with one story inserted in the middle of another. The opening lines link to the concluding lines. Common to the whole episode is the theme of belonging to Jesus.

It is unclear exactly who tried to restrain Jesus, convinced he was out of his mind. The Jerusalem Bible indicates this was his family, but the Greek is less clear about who 'they' are. It could be those inside the house with Jesus, the newly appointed Twelve plus other disciples. Or it could be people in the crowd outside preventing them from eating their meal.

Switching to the scribes from Jerusalem, who link to an earlier plot against Jesus, we hear them accuse Jesus of being possessed by Beelzebul. No wonder Jesus speaks of a house divided. He is not recognised as the Messiah by those who should accept him.

Returning to the house, the mother, brothers and sisters of Jesus have arrived, standing outside. Inside Jesus is encircled by a crowd. When advised his family is outside, he declares 'Anyone who does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother'. Across the stories, inside and outside, he marks out who is the new family of Jesus.

SAINT ANTHONY **OF PADUA**

FEAST DAY 13 JUNE

Quick Canonization: Saint Anthony was canonized at record speed. He was declared a saint by Pope Gregory IX less than a year after his death, in 1232, which one of the fastest canonizations church in history.

Bread for the Poor: In many cultures, there is a tradition called "St. Anthony's Bread,"

Feast Day: Celebrated 19 days after Pentecost, this timing emphasizes the connection to Jesus' Passion and His sacrificial love. June is known as the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The Promises of the Sacred **Heart:** Jesus made promises to those who honor His Sacred Heart, as revealed to Saint Margaret Mary. These promises include peace in families, comfort in times of trouble, and blessings upon the homes where an image of the Sacred Heart is displayed.

Sacred Heart and the **Immaculate Heart:** devotion to the Sacred Heart

where people donate bread to the poor in his name. This practice originated from a miracle in which a child drowned near his birthplace in Lisbon. After prayers to Saint Anthony, the child was revived, and in gratitude, the child's mother distributed bread to the poor.

Incorrupt Tongue: When Saint Anthony's tomb was opened 30 years after his death, it was discovered that his body had decayed, but his tongue remained incorrupt. This was seen as a testament to his gift of preaching his deep devotion spreading the word of God. His tongue is now enshrined in a reliquary in the Basilica of Saint Anthony in Padua.

Celebrate St Anthony by baking bread and sharing with someone in need in the community or your life.



THE MOST SACRED **HEART OF JESUS**

FEAST DAY 7 JUNE

is often linked with the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The two hearts represent the close connection between Jesus and Mary, and their shared mission of salvation and love for humanity.

First Fridays **Devotion:** Many Catholics practice the "First Fridays" devotion, which involves receiving Holy Communion on the first Friday of nine consecutive months. This practice is based on one of the promises given to Saint Margaret Mary, assuring the grace of final repentance.




