Dear friends



Fr Joey, Fr Anselam and I have now returned from our annual diocesan Clergy Conference at Wyong on the Central Coast. It was an enriching week on the theme of "Towards a Synodal Church." We were joined by Fr Eamon Conway, an Irish theologian, who has been one for the consultants for the Synod of Bishops. Fr Eamon led us into an understanding of the scriptural and theological bases for a synodal way of being, and helping us to understand the opportunity and challenges of putting this into practice. We were also joined by Brendan Malone from New Zealand who led us into a spirited analysis of contemporary society. It was a privilege for me, too, to present to all the clergy what we were undertaking here in our own parish of Chatswood. However, one of the most important aspects of the week is the fraternity shared with each other and with Bishop Anthony. I am pleased to share that the spirit amongst the clergy is very good and full of hope.

A very special thank you to Fr Joe and Fr Matthew who celebrated the 12.30pm Mass for us each day whilst we were away, and to the parish team for all their work in the

background over the days we were away.

As we may recall, during the month of May, along with every other parish in Australia, we take a record of our Mass Attendance each weekend. Our own number holds very steady from last year! In 2022 we had an average of 1,010 people attending, in 2023 we had 1,193 and in 2024, 1,163. This renders us the largest parish for Mass Attendance in our diocese. Overall, the figures across the Diocese have hope, as 2024 represented a 7% increase across all parishes. Some 15,600 people gather for Mass each weekend across all of our Diocese. However, this but represents 7% of those identifying as Catholic on the census. So, we have much to do to continue to reach out with invitation.

Thomas More, a brilliant lawyer and statesman, is perhaps best known for his literary masterpiece, "Utopia," and his role as Lord Chancellor of England. Despite his deep loyalty to King Henry VIII, More's commitment to his faith led him to oppose the King's separation from the Catholic Church.

This courageous stand cost him his life, yet his famous last words, "I die the King's good servant, but God's first," echo through history as a testament to his fidelity to God.

John Fisher, a revered scholar and the Bishop of Rochester, also faced the ultimate sacrifice for his beliefs. Known for his defense of Catherine of Aragon and his resistance to Henry VIII's ecclesiastical changes, Fisher's steadfastness was honored by his elevation to cardinal even as he was in prison.

Both these saints were imprisoned in the Tower of London and executed for their refusal to compromise their faith. Their shared feast day on June 22 commemorates their martyrdom and the shared stand they took against the King's policies. Canonised together in 1935, their legacy continues to inspire those who value integrity and courage.

In reflecting on the lives of St. Thomas More and St. John Fisher, we are reminded of the importance of standing firm in our convictions, even in the face of great personal risk. May we always prioritize our faith and principles.

In today's Gospel passage (cf. Mk 4:26-34), Jesus speaks to the crowd about the Kingdom of God and the dynamics of its growth, and he does so by recounting two brief parables. In the first parable (cf. vv. 26-29), the Kingdom of God is compared to the mysterious growth of the seed, which is cast upon the ground and then sprouts, grows and produces ears [of grain], independent of the care of the farmer who, when it is fully grown, sees to its harvest. This is the message that this parable conveys to us: through Jesus' teaching and action, the Kingdom of God is proclaimed, has burst into the field of the world and, like the seed, grows and develops by itself, through its own strength and according to humanly incomprehensible criteria. In its growth and development in history, it does not depend much on man's doing, but is above all an expression of the power and goodness of God, of the strength of the Holy Spirit who brings forth Christian life in the People of God.

At times history, with its events and its protagonists, seems to go in the opposite direction of the design of the heavenly Father, who wants justice, fraternity and peace for all his children. But we are called to live out these periods as seasons of trial, of hope and of vigilant expectation of the harvest. Indeed, yesterday like today, the Kingdom of God grows in the world in a mysterious way, in a surprising way, revealing the hidden power of the little seed, its victorious vitality. Within the folds of personal and social events which at times seem to signal the failure of hope, it is important to remain confident in God's subdued but powerful way of acting. For this reason, in moments of darkness and of difficulty we must not lose heart, but remain anchored in faithfulness to God, to his ever-saving presence. Remember this: God always saves. He is the Saviour.

In the second parable (cf. vv. 30-32), Jesus compares the Kingdom of God to a mustard seed. It is a very small seed, yet it grows to become the greatest of all the plants in the garden: an unforeseeable, surprising growth. It is not easy for us to enter this logic of the unforeseeable nature of God and to accept it in our life. But today the Lord exhorts us to an attitude of faith which exceeds all our plans, our calculations, our predictions. God is always the God of surprises. The Lord always surprises us. It is an invitation to open ourselves more generously to God's plans, both on the personal level and on that of the community. In our communities it is important to pay attention to the little and big occasions of goodness that the Lord offers us, allowing ourselves to engage in his dynamics of love, of welcoming and of mercy toward others.

The authenticity of the Church's mission does not come through success nor through the gratification of the results, but by going forth with the courage of trust and the humility of abandonment to God. Going forth professing Jesus and with the power of the Holy Spirit. It is the awareness of being small and weak instruments which, in God's hands and with his grace, can accomplish great deeds, advancing his Kingdom which is "righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit" (Rom 14:17). May the Virgin Mary help us to be simple, to be attentive, to cooperate with our faith and with our work to develop the Kingdom of God in hearts and in history.

VINNIES CHATSWOOD MAY REPORT

May was a busy month with 12 requests for help received. Four of these involved people or families moving into new digs; three of these involved people with mental difficulties including children with autism.

Two well known clients with severe depression were helped with food and medical bills. We assisted a homeless lad, again with difficulties, with advice on available services including free dental, clothes and food. We provided transport to one medical appointment for a disabled chap and food in lieu so he could afford a taxi to another. A lady with complex problems was helped with food and advice on on available cheaper food sources locally. We helped a DSP to move and a single fellow with health problems to sort out his rent arrears and restabilise his day to day living with advice and food. We are continuing to work with another to achieve life goals.

Some \$4500 was expended as well as providing clothes and donated furniture.

Pray the Rosary Daily

This was the request of Our Lady when she appeared to the three children at Fatima in 1917 calling herself the Lady of the Rosary.

The rosary has long been a feature of the Catholic faith reflecting the honour we give to Our Blessed Lady and her intercession with her divine son on our behalf. Today, in a world that has become more and more irreligious, the need for Our Lady's intercession is even greater than previous times.

Parishioners are invited to respond to Our Lady's request by their own personal rosary but also by joining with others in saying this prayer. The rosary is recited after daily Mass and those who are able to are encouraged to join in this prayer.

The rosary is a prayer that lends itself to group participation in which members encouragement and fellowship by joining with the others and benefit from unity collaboration in response to Our Lady's request. With advances in modern technology, individuals who may be living some distance from others can come together to join the rosary via Zoom which allows participants to come together while remaining in the comfort of their own homes. Our Zoom rosary is recited on Tuesdays and Saturdays at 7.30 pm and at 8 pm on other days of the week. Obviously people have other obligations on their time but all are invited to join the Zoom rosary on any day in which they are able to do so. SAINT ALOYSIUS GONZAGA

FEAST DAY 21 JUNE

Aloysius was born into a noble family in Italy. He was expected to follow a military and political career, but instead joined the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) at the age of 17. His father initially opposed his decision but eventually gave his consent. During a plague in Rome in 1591, Aloysius served the sick and dying. He contracted the disease himself while caring for plague victims and died at the age of 23 on June 21.

Jesus said to the crowds: This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time: he starts to reap because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, he spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything to his disciples when they were alone.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

EXPLAINING THE UNEXPLAINABLE

How do we understand the kingdom or reign of God? The Gospel of today brings two examples and a word about understanding parables. This passage is preceded by Jesus telling the parable of the sower and explaining it to his disciples. We have the inside running on this as we hear and read what Jesus explains, for we too are disciples. Today's first example tells what the kingdom of God is like, continuing the theme of the sower. We see the imagery of the kingdom of God as something that is not static but growing. It takes time to flourish and bring a harvest. Those on the land know this is an ongoing process season to season, sowing and harvesting. The kingdom of God is like this, growing wherever it is planted and harvested.

Then Jesus asks, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God or what parable will we use for it?' What follows expands further on the kingdom of God. It is like the smallest of seeds that will grow to become the greatest of shrubs giving shelter for further life and growth in its branches and shade.

It seems a mystery that Jesus used many parables like this to speak the word to them, 'but he explained everything in private to his disciples'. Jesus entices the crowd with images of what the kingdom of God is like. Jesus explains the meaning to those who believe. This echoes Paul's words in the second reading 'for we walk by faith, not by sight'. How would you explain the kingdom of God today?





The evening commences with Mass at 6.00 PM followed by a light meal and a short meeting.


