
CLOSING PRAYER

Dear friends,

We have come to the **Third Sunday of Advent** – the Sunday known as Gaudete Sunday – the Sunday of Joy for which the colour is rose. Now, our waiting and watching for the Lord becomes filtered with joyful expectation. It is an invitation for us to remember that even in our sadness we can be joyful. This is because Christian joy is not a feeling: it is the knowledge that even in the midst of our struggles, and in the midst of the darkness, we are held by a Love which assures us that we are always more than what we are currently experiencing, and that there is always a new beginning.

In this third week of Advent, we will conduct the **Second Rite of Reconciliation on Thursday 19 December from 7pm.** Together, as a community, we will acknowledge our need for a renewed birthing of the Lord in our lives, and Confessions will be available through this time, too. Everyone is welcome to join us.

It has been a very active second week of Advent with our preparation for our **Carols on the Concourse this Saturday 14 December at 7.30pm.** We have been joined in this endeavour by many of our Christian Churches in Willoughby. A very special thank you to Olivia Lee for her marvellous management of this event, and to Titus our wonderful Director of Music for the occasion, bringing together over 120 singers. A very special word of gratitude to Marlisa Punzalan who is with us as a soloist.

Thank you, too, to Dom Tagle and his team who have our church looking so beautiful of an evening with the many coloured lights. It is quite special to see so many people who stop by to look, and even to come into the church attracted as they are by the nativity scene both outside on the forecourt and before the altar, clearly visible now all through the night through our new glass doors.

The continuous **enhancement of our church** occurs step by step. In January we would like to remove the "organ" in the choir loft. This is not an instrument but the façade of a storage room. Our choir has now grown that it is not good for them to be huddled in a corner of the loft. With the removal of the storage room, we will much greater room. It will also assist enormously with ventilation for during the summer months the air becomes stifling in the loft.

We also continue to be on the lookout for a **hospitality cart.** The procurement of this is one of the action items that has emerged from our Parish-in-Council sessions. We are looking for a cart in which can house a coffee machine, fridge and other services. We hope to 'store' it in the PEW café area for use there, but then be able to wheel it to the forecourt for various occasions. We have a few leads in regard to this, but we are wondering if anyone else may have familiarity with such equipment and know how it can be sourced.

Next year, for the **Jubilee Year of 2025**, we have the opportunity to form a **pilgrimage group to Rome and Assisi.** Already, a number of our community have expressed and registered their interest to be a part of the adventure. We leave on 3 November 2025 and have five nights in Rome and three in Assisi, with an optional extension to Medjugorje for five nights. For those who can come, we will certainly be carrying the intentions of all our parish community.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

John the Baptist may have lived in a world that was just as muddled as ours, but he was far less muddled than most of the people around him. If he were here today, he would tell us the same thing that he told the people of ancient Judea: We all need to look at how we integrate the gospel into our daily lives. And today's Gospel reading gives us a number of examples of John's teachings. Asked about the right way to live, he avoided lengthy theological discourses. Rather, he focused immediately on people's behavior. "Whoever has two cloaks should share with the person who has none. And whoever has food should do likewise". He told tax collectors to stop cheating people. He told soldiers to be honest and just and to stop bullying those weaker than they were. It seems that everything John said and did could be reduced to one command: Treat one another with the same love that God has for you! When the people heard how they should act, it must have felt like a dead end to some of them. They wanted to follow his preaching, but they knew it would be hard to change their behaviors—and in some instances, their jobs—in order to live out the justice he had proclaimed. But it seems clear from John's teaching that he was drawing a connection between reforming our lives and our ability to receive the Holy Spirit.

John knew that these types of personal reforms would open up their hearts to receive the one who was coming to baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire — Jesus, our Redeemer. John helped the people to see the reality of what was ahead by telling them that the Messiah was indeed coming—and that John, as great a prophet as he was, wasn't even fit to loosen the thong of his sandals. And clearly, no one had a hard time trying to figure out where John stood.

In fact, it was his blunt, no-nonsense approach to holiness that got him in trouble with King Herod and eventually cost him his life. When we look at the Sermon on the Mount, we find Jesus also telling us how we should live. He told us that anger, hatred, and resentment are just as serious as murder. He told us that lusting after someone is just as bad as committing adultery. He said that the "least" are those who disobey God's commands, while the "greatest" are those who keep them. So how are you living? Can your friends and neighbors see a change in you as Christmas approaches? Do they see more joy, more generosity, and more love?

If they do, then you also can count yourself among those who have heard the Baptist's call to repentance.

The family of the soldier who reformed his life after hearing John would surely have gone out to see this preacher who caused such a change in their son. Let us pray that our lives too will inspire others to seek and find this Jesus, who has so powerfully worked in us. As Christmas approaches, take John's advice and repent. Make sure to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation so that you can cleanse your soul of your sins and be ready to welcome Jesus with a heart as clean as John's.

Turn to the Lord, and let him answer the question: What then should I do?



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

SHARING THE EARTH'S GOODS

This Sunday's Gospel continues with John Baptist. His voice now becomes more demanding, urging his audience to live in ways typified by generosity. kindness and justice, themes which will appear throughout the Gospel. Those whom John addresses reflect the audience of Luke's Gospel, including tax agents and soldiers, with a focus on wealth. This will be a major theme in the Gospel. Luke intends to speak to those who have rank and influence, to bring about change and status reversal, themes that begin here in today's Gospel. John responds to his enquirers coming for baptism about how they are to live. He encourages them to share their clothing with those who have nothing and food with those who are hungry. This presumes that his audience (and Luke's Gospel audience) have possessions and food to share. They are not impoverished. When similarly asked by tax collectors—agents of Rome's imperial household—they are told not to extract taxes beyond what is due. In other words, they are not to become wealthy at the expense of others. Soldiers (again members of Luke's community) are told to act without violence and extortion, content with their pay.

All these that John addresses are invited on to a path of economic restraint and generosity. This will allow them to be ready for the coming of the one whom John prepares his audience for, and the focus of the second half of the Gospel. Today's Gospel offers us an Advent moment to reflect on our own use of Earth's goods and possessions and how we share them.



ST PETER CANISIUS **OPTIONAL MEMORIAL** 21 DECEMBER

• St Peter Canisius played a significant role in reevangelizing Germany during

the Reformation, earning him the nickname "the Second Apostle of Germany" after St Boniface.

- He wrote over 8,000 pages of letters, books, and catechisms in his lifetime. His catechisms were so influential that they were translated into multiple languages and used for centuries in Catholic education.
- Peter Canisius wrote a catechism that explained Catholic doctrine in a clear and accessible way, making it one of the most widely used teaching tools during the Counter-Reformation.
- Peter Canisius traveled over 20,000 miles on foot or horseback during his missionary journeys, tirelessly preaching, teaching, and ministering to people in Switzerland, Austria, and Germany.
- staunch defender Despite being а Catholicism, he was known for his kind and respectful approach toward Protestants, choosing to focus on clear explanations of the faith rather than harsh criticisms.
- Among his many students were members of European royalty, including Emperor Ferdinand I's children, for whom he served as a spiritual advisor and educator.
- Although he was widely venerated after his death in 1597, Peter Canisius was not canonized until 1925 by Pope Pius XI, who also declared him a Doctor of the Church. Known as the "Doctor of Catechetical Studies," St. Peter Canisius is celebrated for making Catholic teachings accessible and understandable to all, even children.

ST JOHN OF KANTY OPTIONAL MEMORIAL 23 DECEMBER

John of Kanty is the patron saint of teachers, students, and academics, reflecting his lifelong dedication to education as a professor of theology at the University of Kraków.

- Despite his prestigious academic career, John was known for his humility. He famously walked everywhere, even on long journeys to Rome, refusing the comfort of a horse or carriage.
- Known for his incredible charity, John gave away nearly all his possessions to the poor. He lived a simple and frugal life.
- Though humble, John of Kanty was known for miracles during his lifetime, including healing the sick and multiplying food for the hungry.
- John faced a false accusation early in his academic career and was removed from his position. Instead of becoming bitter, he humbly accepted a lesser role and worked his way back, showing resilience and trust in God's plan.
- John of Kanty had a special devotion to the Nativity and was known to preach beautifully about the humility and love of Christ's birth.
- Though highly intellectual, John was just as known for his warmth and care for others, embodying the idea that true wisdom is found in love and service.

ST STEPHEN FEAST 26 DECEMBER

- Stephen is honoured as the first Christian martyr (protomartyr), having been stoned to death for boldly proclaiming his faith in Jesus Christ.
- The Feast of St Stephen is referenced in the carol Good King Wenceslas, where the king goes out to help the poor "on the feast of Stephen." This song captures the spirit of charity associated with the day.
- In many countries, the Feast of St Stephen is a day to focus on charity. In some places, it's known as Boxing Day, traditionally a time to give gifts or donations to the less fortunate.
- Stephen was one of the first seven deacons of the Church, chosen to assist the apostles in caring for the poor and distributing alms.
- Stephen is the patron saint of bricklayers and stonemasons, likely because of the method of his martyrdom (stoning). He is also the patron saint of deacons and those who serve the poor.
- The Church places St Stephen's feast immediately after Christmas to emphasize the connection between Christ's birth and the sacrifices made by His followers.
- Stephen forgave his persecutors as he was being stoned, echoing Jesus' words on the cross: "Lord, do not hold this sin against them" (Acts 7:60).

REFLECTING ON THE GOSPEL:

John instructs tax collectors to collect only what is fair and soldiers to avoid extortion.

- How do I approach honesty and integrity in my work, school, or family responsibilities?
- Are there areas where I might be taking more than I need or acting unfairly?

John calls for repentance and living lives that bear good fruit.

- What are the areas in my life where I feel called to change or grow?
- How can I ensure my actions reflect my faith and love for God?
- Who might need my help or encouragement this week, and how can I reach out to them?
- What specific step can I take today to "prepare the way of the Lord" in my heart or home?
