



It has been very poignant to experience the joy and excitement in response to the news that our parish is to receive the relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis, to be canonised in the Year of Jubilee in 2025. This has also attracted national attention; <a href="https://cathnews.com/2024/07/17">https://cathnews.com/2024/07/17</a> And already we have been receiving inquiries from people across Sydney about how they can participate in the visitation of the relic.

This week we publish the story of how we came to receive Carlo's relic.

Further, it has been overwhelming to experience the generosity of people to assist in the refurbishment of the alcove in our church to become a chapel of Eucharistic Devotion and the place for Carlo's relic. In this last week alone, since the announcement, we have received \$25,000 from the most generous parishioners. Thank you! We welcome any donation that may assist us in making our chapel as beautiful as it can be.

Our gratitude extends for the most generous way everyone has responded to our annual Pastoral Works Broken Bay appeal. Our total for 2023/2024 was \$74,158.28 – some \$9,000 over our obligated \$64,000. This is simply astounding. On behalf of our devoted Catechists in particular, thank you! This provides so much encouragement to them all as they share our Catholic Faith with nearly 700 Catholic children in our six public schools.

Our Young Vinnies wish to thank everyone, too! At the bake sale last weekend, they raised \$1,001- that's 10 children who can now go to school. Everyone was so kind and generous. We really appreciate the support!

We have only just discovered that one of our great parishioners, Dr Eileen Gallery was the recipient of the King's Birthday Honors for 2024! Eileen received the Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in the General Division for services to nephrology, obstetric services, and tertiary education. # SAINTS JOACHIM & ANNE FEAST DAY 26 JULY

- Saint Anne is the patron saint of mothers, women in labor, and miners, while Saint Joachim is the patron saint of fathers, grandparents, and married couples.
- The name "Joachim" means "God prepares" or "God will establish," and "Anne" (or "Hannah") means "grace" in Hebrew.
- Saint Anne conceived Mary through an immaculate conception, meaning Mary was conceived without original sin. Joachim and Anne were childless for many years before an angel appeared to them, announcing that they would have a child. This miraculous event is celebrated in the Protoevangelium of James and other apocryphal texts. It also mirrors how their daughter, Our Lady, would come to know she was preganant with Jesus.

#### THE STORY OF CARLO ACUTIS AND CHATSWOOD

On 23 April 2024 Fr David Ranson, Parish Priest of Our Lady of Dolours Chatswood, received an email from Olivia Lee in the Parish Office forwarding information from Elizabeth Chung, a wonderful parishioner, with the research that she had undertaken as to how to procure a relic of Blessed Carlo. Olivia proposed that perhaps Fr David commence a process to obtain a relic. Appreciative of the information, Fr David, however, was reluctant to act, unsure of the context by which such a devotion might be received and practiced at Our Lady of Dolours in Chatswood.

Then on Thursday 1 June 2024, Fr David, late at night, read an article on Carlo by Catherine Pepinster, "The price of sainthood" The Tablet (1 June 2024, p12). In the week prior, the Vatican had announced that a second miracle had been attributed to Carlo, this paving the way for his canonisation. In the article, Fr David read that Carlo had been baptised in the Servite Parish of Our Lady of Dolours Chelsea, in London. He immediately recognised this as a coincidence that could not be ignored. The very next day on 2 June 2024, he initiated the process to procure a relic.

Meanwhile, in the parish of Our Lady of Dolours in Chatswood, an ordinary journey turned out to be collaborative of an extraordinary event. Four devoted parishioners—Kaini Kaje, Virginia Purpura and Henry and Ditas Naguit—had embarked on a pilgrimage in May 2024, joined by Ditas' best friend from college, Corazon Sim. Their journey commenced with a visit to Rome, but it was in Assisi that their serendipitous experience of Blessed Carlo Acutis unfolded.

Kaini, harbouring a quiet hope, knew that Blessed Carlo's incorruptible body was in Assisi, though the exact location eluded her. Remarkably, Corazon, unaware of this detail, booked their accommodation directly across from the Sanctuary of the Spogliazione, where Blessed Carlo's body lay. This fortuitous booking allowed the five pilgrims to venerate Blessed Carlo.

Corazon returned to Rome and the four pilgrims journeyed on to other holy sites in Italy, France and Belgium. Corazon, initially planning to visit Pisa, felt an inexplicable pull to return to Assisi. That decision proved providential.

On 1 June 2024, as Corazon arrived in Assisi, the pilgrims landed in Sydney. The following day, Ditas shared their Assisi experience with Fr David Ranson. He disclosed his plan to request for a First Class Relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis but mentioned that it would need to be collected in person. The pilgrims felt they had missed the chance to bring it back. Fortunately, Corazon who was back in Assisi agreed to collect the relic on behalf of Fr David, despite her plans to return to Rome in a few days.

In the days that followed, events seemed divinely orchestrated. On 3 June 2024, Fr David quickly obtained the official letter of request from Bishop Anthony Randazzo, who was most encouraging and supportive of the endeavour, and by 4 June the formal request for a First Class Relic had been sent to the Postulator General, Centro Carlo Acutis, granting Corazon the authority to collect the relic.

Unfortunately, it turned out that this was not the office that handled such requests. Acting with urgency, Corazon sent the correct link where the request was to be sent through the office of the Bishop of Assisi.

On the 5 June 2024, Fr David sent a new formal request to the office of the Bishop of Assisi with authorisation from Bishop Randazzo. When Corazon earnestly followed up this request, she was informed that it would take at least six months to secure the relic, considering the many requests already received. Nevertheless, she was asked to return the following day.

Corazon proceeded to the relevant office on Thursday 6 June 2024, but not before appealing fervently to Blessed Carlo for his intercession. To the amazement of all, she was able to collect the First Class Relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis that very same morning – barely 24 hours from when the request was officially received by the office of the Bishop of Assisi! And within one week of Fr David having first initiated the process.

Normally, obtaining such a relic is a lengthy process, often taking months. Yet securing the relic for Our Lady of Dolours was expedited with astonishing swiftness, underscoring how miracles manifest through the faithful in the most extraordinary of ways.

On 1 July 2024, Pope Francis presided at an Ordinary Consistory of Cardinals, approving the canonisation of 15 people, including Blessed Carlo Acutis.

On the 5 July, Corazon Sim personally handed over the First Class Relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis to Fr David in Sydney, marking the culmination of a journey that - though initially unplanned and filled with unexpected turns – was a

profound testament to faith, providence and divine intervention.

Even more extraordinary is that through its innovate development of being a Parish-in-Council, responding to the invitation of being a synodal Church by Pope Francis, our community had discerned "Igniting Young Hearts' as one of its five pastoral priorities for 2024 at the service of its mission, Bringing the Light of Christ to the City. Indeed, it had already been envisaged that this would be the prime topic of the next Parish-in-Council on 31 August 2024. The receipt of the relic of Carlo brings to this pastoral discernment incredible impetus.

The Parish of Our Lady of Dolours Chatswood now looks forward to the installation of Carlo's relic on his feastday, Saturday 12 October 2024.

# LIKE SHEEP WITHOUT A SHEPHERD

Our readings for this Sunday call to mind our need for God across the ages. The daily news often depicts a world out of control, wracked by war, aggression, violence, sadness and fear. Yet we know God reaches out in every age with love.

In Jeremiah we hear that the Lord gathers up the remnant of the flock bringing them into the fold where they will be safe. God will not abandon them but will raise up David as king who will bring Judah and Israel to safety. Our psalm response is a mantra for all ages: 'the Lord is my shepherd, there is nothing I shall want.' The Letter to the Ephesians speaks of Christ as 'the peace between us' and offers us the comfort that he 'came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off

and peace to those who were near.'
As we focus on the Gospel of Mark, we find Jesus calling his disciples together and inviting them to 'come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' Recognising their need for rest after being on mission, Jesus still has his eye to the crowds who are like 'sheep without a shepherd.' Today we can see the constancy of God's care for us in the midst of all that might overwhelm us. There is invitation both to find time for rest and reflection on the gift of the Lord as shepherd and Christ who is peace, as well as for sharing this gift with all in

need.

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#### GOSPEL REFLECTION



We have all seen pictures of Jesus as the good shepherd, rescuing a lost lamb and placing it on his shoulders. It is a moving image of a loving God that refutes every distorted idea of God as a distant, uncaring deity who pays attention to us only when we need correction.

The image of Jesus as a shepherd comes from Jesus himself. Both in his preaching and in the way he lived, Jesus showed himself to be someone whom people could follow without question. He showed that we could all have the same security as trusting sheep who know the voice of the one who cares for them.

Look at any passage from the gospels and watch how Jesus sought to lead his people with strength and wisdom, tending to their needs and lifting them on his shoulders. Notice how, even as he dealt with those who had "strayed," he risked everything — even his own life — in order to bring them home with him.

In today's gospel, Jesus dealt compassionately with a huge crowd, even though they had interfered with his plans to rest with the Twelve. Seeing how lost and aimless they were — like sheep without a shepherd — he set aside his plans and taught them about God's reign.

In a sense, you could say that the "compassionate" Jesus overruled the "practical" Jesus. He saw beyond his needs and the needs of his disciples and focused instead on the needs of the people coming to them. You could say that his eyes were opened to a much wider picture.

The apostles' eyes were opened as well. They gave up their plans for rest so that they could minister to the people. Jesus wants to do the same for us. He sees us searching for fulfillment but finding things that only lead to more thirst and hunger. He wants to guide us toward his Father, who alone can give us the life that we long for.

He is ever available to us, ready to feed us with his truth in Scripture, with his body and blood in the Eucharist, and with his love through brothers and sisters.

In the Gospel we see that Jesus feeds the crowd first with his teaching and only later with the loaves and fish. He does the same in our celebration of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Word comes before the Liturgy of the Eucharist. We don't approach the table of the Lord until our minds have been filled with his truth. How vital it is that we pay close attention to the word of God and thoughtfully reflect on the Scriptures! Experiencing God's love is vital, but it's only part of the equation. We humans are intellect, emotion, and will, and unless our minds are fed, we won't know how to fight the fight against our fallen nature.

We won't know how to discern the ways God is working in our hearts and in the world. It's not enough just to get touched by God. We also need to learn his ways and learn how to conform our lives to his teachings.

Jesus wants us to know his teachings so that we do not become just passive recipients of his love.

The key is learning how to sense the Spirit's promptings so that what is practical and planned doesn't overshadow what is compassionate and spontaneous. You may sense a prompting to speak to someone after Mass or in the grocery store. You may sense that God wants you to put your arms around your husband or child or that you should put aside what you are doing and read Scripture for a few minutes.

Whenever something like this happens, try to act on it. He wants to make us into men and women who bring his love to others.

So let us allow the Good Shepherd to care for us and through us to bring God's love to others in the world. You never know what miracles may result!

# SAINT JAMES FEAST DAY 25 JULY

- Saint James the Greater is the patron saint of Spain, pilgrims, and laborers. He is called "the Greater" to distinguish him from the other apostle named James, who is known as James the Less.
- The famous pilgrimage route, the Camino de Santiago, leads to the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela in Spain, where his remains are believed to be buried. His emblem is the scallop shell, which is also a symbol of the Camino de Santiago. Pilgrims often wear or carry scallop shells on their journey.
- Saint James was the first apostle to be martyred, executed by King Herod Agrippa I around AD 44.
   According to legend, after his martyrdom, his disciples placed his body in a stone boat that miraculously sailed to Spain, where it was discovered by a local queen.
