Dear friends

This weekend, Thursday 15 August, we celebrate our annual Solemnity of the Assumption. This is a holy day of obligation given its significance for our life of faith and discipleship. Mary, the Mother of Jesus, is the first to participate in the mystery of the Resurrection and its promise. She who brought forward the Author of Life now enters the new life given us by his Resurrection. Mary comes to eternal life without the decay of death to show us all the hope which is our destiny. Assumed into heaven without the grave, she is the first to participate in the Resurrection of the Body. This understanding of Mary's exemplification of the destiny that awaits each of us has been part of the Church's Tradition from the beginning. It is interesting that, precisely for this reason, the Church in its long Tradition has never celebrated a relic, real or purported, of Mary.

It has struck me that we celebrate the Assumption of Mary at a beautiful time in our year in Australia. The light has changed, the wattles are beginning to bloom. For our aboriginal peoples, these signs represented a new year stirring. We too are celebrating that something remarkably new has happened in our world through Mary – the woman of Nazareth who always lived 'yes' to God's invitation.

We have many opportunities to come together for Mass on Thursday 15 August: 7.00am, 9.00am, 10.30am (Pius College Mass), 12.30pm and 7.00pm. We also have the opportunity to come together on the evening of Thursday 15 August at 8.00pm to pray the Rosary online. The details are in our bulletin.

Our preparation for the Feast Day of Carlo Acutis (12 October) continues. Given multiple factors, however, we have now determined to hold the Mass of the Feast Day on its eve, Friday 11 October at 7.00pm. This will be followed by the opportunity of veneration of his relic, and Eucharistic Adoration through the night until our 9am Mass on Saturday. Do put the date in the diary! In the meantime, we are packing up the parish library this weekend so that work on its renovation might commence in the coming weeks. We will put the books in storage until we can put them on the shelves of our new library in our church foyer.

Fr Anselam is currently on his annual leave, having returned to India last week where he is visiting his family. We keep him our prayer, praying for his safe return to us at the end of August.

In today's reading, St. Paul guides us in living as a new creation in Christ. His letter to the Ephesians calls us to honour the transformative power of Christ's

presence in our lives and urges us to live in ways that do not grieve the Holy Spirit. To grieve the Spirit means to cause sorrow, pain, or distress through our actions that deviate from God's hope for us. Understanding this, we recognise the importance of aligning our lives with the values and teachings of Christ, fostering a life of compassion, kindness, and forgiveness.

Paul's message encourages us to manage our emotions, not by suppressing them but by channelling them in ways that bring God into those moments. Bitterness and anger can corrupt our spirit and harm our relationships. Bitterness, characterised by a resentful spirit, hinders reconciliation and peace, which are core to Christian living. Anger, often a reaction to perceived wrongs, must be controlled to prevent actions that might harm others and our spiritual well-being. Through self-control, we honour God and reflect His love in our interactions.

One of the key traits Paul highlights is the importance of being kind, tender, and forgiving. These virtues are not just moral suggestions but reflections of Christ's actions

towards us. Jesus's forgiveness and sacrifice are the ultimate examples of love and compassion. By forgiving others as Christ forgives us, we participate in the divine act of love, offering a fragrant offering to God. This kindness and forgiveness are tangible ways to emulate Christ, extending grace even when it feels challenging.

The concept of "paying it forward" aligns beautifully with Christian charity. This practice involves doing good deeds without expecting anything in return, inspired by the hope that the recipient will continue the chain of kindness. This idea is a practical expression of God's love, shown in everyday acts of generosity and compassion. Stories of kindness, both grand and small, demonstrate the powerful impact of love and the potential to transform lives and communities. They remind us that despite the darkness we might see, there is a pervasive light of compassion in the world.

However, living out these virtues consistently can be daunting. We all experience moments when our capacity for kindness and forgiveness feels limited, often due to past hurts or personal struggles. St. Ignatius of Loyola offers insight into this through his concepts of consolation and desolation. Consolation, a state of feeling close to God, fills us with peace, joy, and love, making it easier to act with compassion. In contrast, desolation is marked by feelings of darkness

and discouragement, where our capacity for kindness is diminished.

Recognising these spiritual states is crucial. During times of consolation, we can embrace and extend our capacity for compassion. In moments of desolation, we need to seek God's grace through prayer, spiritual counsel, and acts of service. Helping others and paying it forward, even when we feel distant from God, can uplift our spirits and restore our sense of purpose.

In conclusion, St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians calls us to embody Christ's love through compassion, kindness, and forgiveness. By managing our emotions, practising self-control, and extending grace, we live out the new creation we become in Christ. The acts of paying it forward and recognising our spiritual states of consolation and desolation help us navigate our journey of faith. Let us strive to emulate Christ in our daily lives, offering our own fragrant offerings of love and compassion to God the Father, and inspiring others to do the same.

VINNIES CHATSWOOD JULY REPORT

Chatswood Vinnies received 18 calls for help in July, the highest number of monthly calls to date. 10 were from people unknown to us. Some had complex problems eg 4 were struggling DV victims, others were relatively easy to help with basic material needs such as a homeless family or newly released prisoner moving into public housing and others needing furniture, clothes, food or pressing bills. Complex problems we can only be supportive and help overcome pressing needs and provide local service options if needed. Problems encountered included need to remove to safe digs, unaffordable accomodation, lack of budgetary skills, mental health issues and cost of medical/pharmaceutical needs, impacts of legal problems and sudden loss of income. Most people on low income have limited ability to adjust to changed circumstances eg furniture replacement. In all we supplied over \$6 500 of material needs.

WHOEVER BELIEVES HAS ETERNAL LIFE. Throughout John's Gospel many people struggled to understand who Jesus was. Despite the signs he performed, they simply could not believe his claim that he has come from God. Certainly, this claim of Jesus is remarkable, even scandalous. We need the gift of faith to accept it. Our faith in Jesus, the Bread of Life, is expressed and deepened by our participation in the Eucharist.



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE LIVING BREAD

Today we continue the focus on the Bread from Heaven. In the first reading we see Elijah in the wilderness fleeing from Jezebel. He just wants to lay down and die but an angel of the Lord touches him twice repeating 'Get up and eat.' All there was to eat was a round flat loaf and water too, but it was enough for the 40 day/ night journey to Horeb, the mountain of God. God provided food for the journey as previously in the desert with Moses.

In the continuation of the Bread of Heaven discourse in John's Gospel, we find the Judeans are complaining about Jesus' claim to be 'the bread that came down from heaven.' They are grumbling and complaining like the Israelites in the desert. Jesus responds recalling the scriptures (Isaiah 54:13) that it is God who teaches them. The 'Amen, Amen' saying, translated as 'I tell you most solemnly,' emphasises the truth and faithfulness of this saying. In John's Gospel the double Amen appears 25 times, always uttered by Jesus. In this important statement there is to be no doubt that Jesus is the 'bread of life.' He is the bread that comes down from heaven, the 'living bread.' The final sentence indicates not only that eating this bread means eternal life but that the bread that Jesus gives for the life of the world is his flesh. We readily understand this as his crucifixion. Beyond this the Judeans will complain further. As we hear these words let us contemplate the gift that Jesus gave us.

- Ancient Tradition: The tradition of Mary's Assumption dates back to the early Church. While it was formally defined in 1950, belief in Mary's Assumption has been a part of Christian tradition for centuries.
- According to tradition, Mary's tomb was found empty. The Church of the Dormition in Jerusalem is believed to be the site where Mary fell asleep and was assumed into Heaven.

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
