



This week marks the beginning of our four child/parent group sessions, preparing for the celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation on Saturday 14 September.. Over the coming 4 weeks at the Vigil and 9am Masses we will have a Mass Ritual for these children. We welcome our children and their families into this special journey which brings to completion what was begun at their Baptism. This weekend the Mass Ritual entails the children being presented to the parish community and to ask the parishioners to take a "Pray for me" card to pray for a child during the program.

One of the very exciting things that we are currently working on together is a grand Christmas Carols on the Concourse at 7.30pm on Saturday 14 December! We are envisaging a choir from across our Churches that fills the steps of the Concourse. It will be a most amazing way to

bring the celebration of Christmas to our city!

Bishop Anthony extends an invitation to the People of God in the North Shore Deanery to participate in a pastoral discernment process for our region. This is an opportunity for everyone to engage in the conversation to discern the particular needs of the community on the North Shore. The Pastoral Discernment project is an invitation to walk together, listen deeply to one another, and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our collective discernment. Every voice is an essential part of this shared journey. An online formation and information session is being planned for 2pm-5pm on Friday 23 August, with Mr Andrew Spiteri. Andrew, who will join us from Rome, has actually worked with our own parish team for our Parish-in-Council. The online gathering with him on Friday 23 August is open to all diocesan members, leaders, and Consultation Facilitators of the North Shore Deanery. Registrations for the 'A Synodal Church' formation gathering with Mr Andrew Spiteri can be made here: A Synodal Church Formation gathering. Then, during September we will have opportunity to come together as a parish community to engage more directly in the process, ultimately sharing a report of our perspectives to the Bishop. In the weeks ahead there will be more information about the journey to which our parish, along with all the parishes of the North Shore, will contribute.

The work of maintenance never ceases. In the last week, we have had to attend to the discovery of a crumbling sewage line along the southern side of the Parish Office that extends to the main sewer line down Archer Street. This has been an expensive operation, costing us an unexpected \$40,000. We are grateful that we have the funds from which to draw to attend to this critical infrastructure repair.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Imagine entering a restaurant where the owner promises, "Our food will give you so much vitality that you'll never go hungry again.

Not only that, you'll never weaken, or get sick, or even die!"

Wouldn't you think that the owner was either a con artist or deranged?

Yet, in a spiritual sense, this is the claim that Jesus made when he said that he was "the bread that came down from heaven..... The one who eats this bread will live forever".

"This bread" that Jesus is talking about is his very life, the life that he makes available to us every time we celebrate the Eucharist. He is the food that makes us immortal, the drink that quenches our thirst forever. Sound impossible? Not for anyone who believes Scripture's statement that "for God all things are possible"!

When we hear these words, we tend to focus our attention on the teaching that the Eucharist is the true presence of Christ. But Jesus placed just as much emphasis on the promise that those who ate of him in faith will live forever: "I will raise them up on the last day".

Eternal life through the Eucharist comes as we connect what we eat with how we live. The first and second readings allude to this. As beloved children of God, we should be


"making the most of the time". We should be taking care that our days are filled with praise and worship of the Lord and that we are constantly seeking more of the Holy Spirit. We should be seeking wisdom from God for our future and healing from God for our past. Everyone wants to be eternally youthful, but Jesus' promise, of raising us up on the last day, far surpasses our wildest dreams.



Imagine, we will have a glorified body that will radiate the very holiness and power of our God! This promise of the Second Coming is so closely linked to the Eucharist that it pervades the celebration of the Mass as well.

The Nicene Creed, for instance, states that Jesus will "come again in glory." In the Sanctus, we proclaim, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." The First Memorial Acclamation that we used in the old translation was emphatic: "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again." This short prayer, in fact, sums up the entire gospel message — and one-third of that message is the Second Coming.

At every Mass, we are reminded that Jesus will return, whether it be today or a million years from now. The exact hour is hidden in God's design, yet we can be certain that he will come again as the King of Love. For this, we should always give praise! At Mass and in prayer today, dwell on these truths. Let them sink into your heart. And even more importantly, let the Holy Spirit fill you with a deeper desire to be in complete communion with Jesus.

SAINT BERNARD

MEMORIAL 20 AUGUST

 Saint Bernard is known as the "Doctor Mellifluous" because of his eloquent

and sweet-sounding preaching and writing. "Mellifluous" means "flowing with honey," reflecting his ability to communicate in a beautiful and accessible way.

- Bernard was the founder and first abbot of Clairvaux Abbey in France. Under his leadership, the abbey grew rapidly. At its height, it had over 700 monks.
- Legend has it that on Bernard's feast day, the bees of Clairvaux Abbey would produce honey that was especially sweet and abundant. This miracle was seen as a sign of God's favor and Bernard's nickname, "Doctor Mellifluous."



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

LIVE FOREVER

What does it mean for us to live forever, to abide in Christ and have Christ abide in us? This is the question that lingers for me. I invite you to ponder too.

The reading from Proverbs brings an invitation from Wisdom to a banquet where a question is raised: Will you leave the way of ignorance and join the way of insight? This is the only way forward to life. This snippet links to the Gospel where the Bread of Heaven discourse continues by reiterating the final sentence from last week's Gospel. We observe that 'Whoever eats of this bread [the living bread from heaven] will live forever' is replicated in the last line, 'But the one who eats this bread will live forever.' These sentences frame the 'Amen. Amen' ('I tell you solemnly') saying given in response to the Judeans dispute about eating Jesus' flesh. Life, eternal life, is only possible for those who partake of Jesus' flesh and blood.

These readings remind us how difficult it must have been for first century followers to understand fully who Jesus is and what he offered. For the Johannine community the reinterpretation of the Mosaic Law to a new understanding of the Christ causes distress. It isn't that easy for us to understand today. What we might understand is our deep need to be in communion in the body and blood of Christ in the community. How much we missed that during the pandemic. Blessed, broken, shared and given: the body of Christ, Amen.



Yes, emails need to be checked, and there's always work to be done, but when someone needs you, that's what matters most in that moment. It's these moments that breathe life into your work, transforming it from a series of tasks, into a vocation of love and service.

SAINT BARTHOLOMEW FEAST DAY 24 AUGUST

- Saint Bartholomew, also known as Nathanael, was one of the twelve apostles chosen by Jesus. His name "Bartholomew" is believed to be derived from "Bar-Tolmai," meaning "son of Tolmai" in Aramaic.
- When Philip brought Bartholomew to Jesus, Christ remarked, "Here is a true Israelite, in whom there is no deceit" (John 1:47). This statement highlights Bartholomew's honesty and integrity.
- Saint Bartholomew is the patron saint of tanners, leather workers, and bookbinders. This association comes from the tradition that he was martyred by being flayed alive, making him a symbol of those who work with leather.

SAINT PIUS X





- Pope of the Eucharist" because he lowered the age for First Holy Communion to 7 years old, emphasizing that young children should receive Jesus in the Eucharist as soon as they reach the age of reason.
- Born Giuseppe Melchiorre Sarto in 1835 in a small village in Italy, Saint Pius X came from a humble background. His father was a postman, and his family lived in modest conditions. Despite this, he rose to the highest office in the Church, becoming pope in 1903.
- Despite his high office, Pius X was known for his simplicity and humility. He insisted on continuing to live modestly even after becoming pope, rejecting many of the luxuries that came with the papal position.
- When Pius X was canonized in 1954, he became the first pope to be declared a saint since Pope Pius V, who was canonized in 1712. This highlighted his significant impact on the Church during his papacy.
- Pius X had a deep devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. He consecrated the world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and encouraged the faithful to pray the Rosary.
- Pius X's papal motto was "Instaurare omnia in Christo" (To restore all things in Christ). This reflected his mission to renew the Church and society by bringing them closer to Christ.
- Saint Pius X was dedicated to teaching the faith. He wrote the encyclical Acerbo Nimis, which emphasized the importance of catechesis, and he personally oversaw the creation of a new catechism to help the faithful.


