Last Wednesday 21 August was the **104th anniversary of the opening of our church!** We celebrate that our church continues to be a living building, noting the renovations and improvements that are currently underway. We have now returned to our ordinary Holy Water fonts, too!

This weekend, our Diocese of Broken Bay celebrates a very special occasion: the Ordination to the Priesthood of Deacon Hien Vu. Bishop Anthony ordains Hien at Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral, Waitara, on Saturday 24 August at 11.00am. Everyone is welcome. Hien has been with us now for some 7 years, hailing originally from the Diocese of Xuan Loc in Vietnam where his family still lives. Sadly, Hien's mother passed away just a few months ago, and his father is not well. So, it will be an occasion of many mixed emotions. We embrace him as his new family with hearts full of gratitude to God for gifting our Church with a new priest. Fr Hien will celebrate a Mass of Thanksgiving at St Thomas' Willoughby on Sunday 25 August at 6.00pm. Again, all are welcome to be present. We will seek an opportunity to invite Fr Hien to celebrate Mass with us in the not too distant future.

On the last Sunday of August, the Church in Australia marks **Social Justice Sunday.** The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference Social Justice Statement 2024–25 is "Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World".

In the 2024 – 2025 Social Justice Statement, Australia's Bishops scrutinise the signs of our own troubled times, observe the violence around us, and ask why it is so. They also ask what is needed if there is to be peace. In a world full of pessimism, they put their faith and hope in the possibility of peace. Using Scripture and the guidance of Pope St John XXIII's Pacem in Terris and Pope Francis' Fratelli Tutti, we learn that peace is possible if we put our trust in Christ who is the way, the truth and the life and the Prince of Peace. It is from him that we learn about the architecture

of peace. From him, we learn a commitment to the culture of encounter, the value of dialogue at all levels and the importance of seeing everyone as our sister, our brother. The Gospel calls us to embrace the fundamental truth that every person on earth has a God-given dignity which cannot be taken away or ignored. From this truth flows the realisation that there is no 'us' or 'them'. Everyone on earth, whatever our race or creed or status, is a sister, a brother. We are all children of God. Keeping this truth before us is the key to overcoming violence and conflict. Armed not with guns and missiles, but with love for our sisters and brothers, we are invited to speak of peace and to take action to promote peace in a violent world. On this Social Justice Sunday, let us re-commit ourselves to cultivating a culture of peace by following Jesus who is the way, the truth and the life and the Prince of Peace.

As we shared recently, Bishop Anthony has initiated a **North Shore Pastoral Discernment Project.** A number from our Parish recently attended a Briefing Circle event. We have now been invited to nominate a Parish Consultation Facilitator, or small team, and our Parish Animation Ministry Circle, which has carriage of our Parish-in-Council, will take up this for us. A Project Brochure will be delivered to all parishes and schools in the North Shore Deanery in the coming weeks to introduce the journey more fully. On 12 September there will be an online formation opportunity for Consultation Facilitators. They will be provided with the resources to lead our local parish and school listening and dialogue forums. This will be followed on 20 September by a Community Forum (time and venue to be confirmed)

which will be an in-person gathering, for all in the community, to hear what the data is saying, learn of the guiding themes and questions for consultation, and hear of the methodology that will be used to guide community listening and dialogue conversations.

And from this, there will be the invitation to parish and school communities to gather and participate in local consultation forums at the service of shaping a Pastoral Discernment Submission for Bishop Anthony's consideration. Submissions will close on 12 November.

Next Sunday 1 September at our 10.30am Mass we will introduce and commission a number of our parish family who are travelling in September to Europe with Fr Marek Woldan on pilgrimage. We wish them every blessing as they prepare for their trip and pray that Mary, our Mother, keeps them safe.

Through this **Year of Prayer**, I have presented a number of videos on aspects of prayer in our Catholic Tradition. The eighth and final one which summaries Prayer and the Catechism is now available on our diocesan YouTube Chanel or by going to https://tinyurl.com/3kd63s8f.

Also, our Parish Director of Music, Titus Grenyer, recently featured in a Veritasium science video about sound illusions, at Sydney Town Hall. It's a fascinating look into sound and the organ. The video has amassed more than 2 million views, and can be viewed at: https://tinyurl.com/mruampvs.




The firstfruits of hope (Rom 8:19-25)



SECOND READING

Eph 5:21-32

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians.

This is the great mystery, it applies to Christ and the Church.

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body - and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, whom shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'LORD, TO WHOM **SHALL WE GO?**

We come to the end of the five weeks with the Gospel of John', chapter 6. As it concludes we could imagine ourselves standing with the disciples complaining that the teaching was too difficult. The Judeans had twice confronted Jesus on this teaching. Now we hear, 'The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life.' If it is hard to understand these words, then for some it would be hard to believe, and that is acknowledged by Jesus.

We are affirmed in that, as the narrator advises, Jesus knew from the beginning that some would not believe, and who would betray him. This is a crisis moment. We can remember that in the first part of this chapter, aligned to Passover and with the miracle of the loaves, the crowd was looking for signs. At this point, we can see that the reinterpretation of the Mosaic law caused upset and division. With many disciples leaving, Jesus challenges the Twelve: 'do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter speaks up as leader and representative of the Twelve. Those, called by Jesus, recognise that his words are 'spirit and life.'

What about us? Do we find believing too hard? Or do we line up with Simon Peter affirming our faith and saying 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.' We are in this for the long haul.

SAINT MONICA **MEMORIAL 27 AUGUST**

- Saint Monica was born in Thagaste (modern-day) Algeria) in North Africa around 331 AD.
- Saint Monica is famous for her unwavering prayer life. She prayed for nearly 17 years for the conversion of her son, Saint Augustine, who later became one of the greatest theologians in Church history.
- Saint Monica is often invoked as the patron saint of mothers, particularly those who are concerned about their children's spiritual welfare, due to her own experience of praying for her son's conversion.
- Saint Monica is also considered a symbol of patience, having endured many hardships with her husband and son, both of whom initially rejected her faith.
- Saint Monica's feast day is celebrated on August 27th, the day before the feast of her son, Saint Augustine, highlighting the close relationship between mother and son.
- Saint Monica's persistence and influence led not only to her son's conversion but also to that of her husband, Patricius, who was baptised shortly before his death.

SAINT AUGUSTINE MEMORIAL 28 AUGUST

- Before his conversion, Saint Augustine lived a rather wild and indulgent life. He was known for his love of partying and even had a child out of wedlock. His early years were marked by a search for truth in all the wrong places.
- Augustine's conversion is one of the most dramatic in Christian history. After years of searching, he heard a child's voice telling him to "take and read." He opened the Bible to Romans 13:13-14, which led to his decision to fully embrace Christianity.
- Augustine is one of the most important Christian theologians and philosophers. His works, especially "Confessions" and "The City of God," have had a lasting impact on Christian thought and Western philosophy.
- Augustine's "Confessions" is often considered the first Western autobiography. In it, he reflects on his life, his sins, and his journey to faith, providing a deeply personal account of his spiritual journey.
- After his conversion, Augustine became a priest and later the Bishop of Hippo (in modern-day Algeria). He served as bishop for 34 years, where he became a key figure in the Church.
- Saint Augustine is one of the 36 Doctors of the Church, a title given to saints who have made significant contributions to theology or doctrine. His influence on Christian theology, especially regarding concepts like grace and original sin, is profound.
- Augustine is the son of Saint Monica, whose persistent prayers were instrumental in his conversion. His relationship with his mother is a beautiful testament to the power of prayer and maternal love.
- Augustine is the patron saint of brewers! This unusual patronage is due to his life of parties and worldly excess before his conversion. His transformation is seen as a model for those struggling with addiction or vice.
- Augustine did not initially want to become a priest. According to tradition, he was essentially drafted into the priesthood by the people of Hippo, who recognized his abilities and insisted he take up the role.
- Augustine famously wrote, "Our hearts are restless until they rest in You, O Lord." This quote encapsulates his belief that true peace and fulfillment can only be found in God.

LITURGICAL LIVING: WAYS TO CELEBRATE SAINT AUGUSTINE


- Attend a special Mass dedicated to Saint Augustine. Offer your prayers for his intercession, particularly asking for guidance in personal growth and wisdom.
- Saint Augustine's Confessions is known for its deep personal reflection and repentance. Use this day to examine your own spiritual journey and seek areas for growth.
- Consider making a donation to a cause that supports education or spiritual growth, reflecting Saint Augustine's commitment to learning and faith.
- Engage in creative activities that honor Saint Augustine, such as drawing or painting, and incorporate symbols associated with him, like the heart, flame, or the Book.
- Spend time in Eucharistic Adoration, reflecting on the transformative power of the Blessed Sacrament, like Augustine's own transformative encounter with God.
- Who in your life is struggling with faith and worldly temptations? Pray for them particularly and invite them to go to church with you for Mass or prayer.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

A REFLECTION ON JOHN 6:60-69 OF ST JOHN PAUL II 21 AUGUST 1991, EXCERPT, TRANSLATED FROM ITALIAN

Saint John, in today's Gospel passage, at the end of Jesus' speech on the "bread of life" (cf. John 6:35), continues: "many of his disciples, after listening, said: "This language is harsh; who can understand it?". And he adds with a note of sadness: "from then on many of his disciples withdrew and no longer went with him" (Jn 6, 60.66). In reality the Gospel is demanding and demanding. Faced with rejection, however, Jesus does not compromise. He reminds everyone of their responsibilities by asking: "Does this shock you? What if you saw the Son of Man go up where he was before? It is the Spirit that gives life, the flesh is of no use; the words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life" (Jn 6, 61-63). These words highlight the supernatural character of the Revelation of Christ: through faith and listening to his word, men are exhorted to personally encounter the incarnate Word, with the awaited Messiah, the only mediator between God and 'humanity.

The acceptance of faith brings with it immediate consequences in the moral behavior of the believer: there is no doubt that following Christ is not an easy task. Christian ethics in fact indicates an arduous path, it invites us to enter through the narrow door, the only one that leads to true life.



The text of the letter to the Ephesians, proposed by the liturgy of this twenty-first Sunday of ordinary time, illustrates, for example, what the way Christians should behave in the specific field of the family. The apostle Paul underlines the mutual love between husband and wife, united not by a simple promise of fidelity, but by an indissoluble bond elevated to a sacrament, a sign of the union of Christ with his Church. He then points to the search for mutual spiritual edification and sanctification as the ideal of family life, so that the family can shine as a "domestic church". This is certainly a high and difficult ideal that requires a continuous response of enlightened, profound and convinced faith. An effort to be renewed every day.

Reflection Questions



- This Sunday's Gospel talks about difficult teachings. What teachings of Jesus do you find difficult to accept or understand? How do you approach these challenges in your faith?
- In verse 67, Jesus asks the Twelve, "Do you also wish to go away?" How do you respond when your faith is challenged? What keeps you anchored in your belief when faced with doubt?
- Peter responds in verse 68, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life." What does this statement mean to you personally? How do you experience Jesus as the source of "eternal life" in your own life?
- In verse 63, Jesus talks about the power of the Holy Spirit in giving life. How do you see the Holy Spirit at work in your life, especially in understanding and living out difficult teachings?



PASSION OF ST JOHN THE BAPTIST MEMORIAL 29 AUGUST

- The Passion of Saint John the Baptist, is one of the few feasts in the Church that commemorates a saint's martyrdom rather than their birth or death in heaven.
- King Herod Antipas actually respected and feared John the Baptist, knowing he was a righteous and holy man. However, Herodias, Herod's wife, harbored a grudge against John because he condemned their unlawful marriage.
- John the Baptist's death was triggered a dance. Herodias's daughter, traditionally named Salome, danced so well at Herod's birthday banquet that Herod rashly promised her anything she wanted. At her mother's urging, she asked for the head of John the Baptist on a platter.
- The relics of John the Baptist, have been claimed by various places throughout history, including Rome, Jerusalem, and even Damascus.
- John the Baptist has multiple feast days in the liturgical calendar. Besides the Passion, his Nativity is celebrated on June 24th, and the First and Second Findings of his head are commemorated on February 24th and May 25th.
- The story of John the Baptist's beheading has inspired countless works of art, including paintings, sculptures, and even operas. The image of John's head on a platter is a powerful reminder of the cost of discipleship.
- According to tradition, Herod was deeply troubled after ordering John's execution. Some sources suggest that Herod experienced nightmares and guilt over John's death, indicating that even he recognized John's righteousness too late.
- Because of his fearless stand against Herod's immoral marriage, John the Baptist is often invoked as a patron saint of those who need courage to speak the truth, especially in difficult situations.

LITURGICAL LIVING: WAYS TO CELEBRATE SAINT MONICA

- Pray a Novena to Saint Monica: This nine-day prayer, which can be started before her feast or on it, is particularly powerful for those praying for the conversion of loved ones. One you might like to use is available at https://tinyurl.com/bdfbyzk2
- Incorporate Patience and Perseverance in Your Day: Reflect on the virtues of patience and perseverance that Saint Monica exemplified and what this means for the way she loved, trusted, and worshipped God. Consider how you can embody these virtues in your own life, whether through acts of kindness, offering up daily annoyances, or renewing your commitment to long-term prayers for others.
- Mother-Child Bonding: Since Saint Monica is renowned for her role as a mother, consider spending quality time with children or family. Engage in activities that strengthen your relationships with mothers and children.
- Eat North African Food: Since Monica was from North Africa, you might try cooking a dish inspired by North African cuisine, like a tagine, couscous, or a dessert using dates and honey.

St Vincent de Paul Society needs some extra volunteers who can help collect the unsold Bread from Bakers Delight Chatswood Chase at closing time and deliver it to Mathew Talbot Hostel in Woolloomooloo on a Monday 5.30pm.

The quantity of daily unsold items from Bakers Delight is so essential and useful to the Hostel which houses and feeds more than 100 homeless men every day of the year as well as food assistance to families in need. Without our volunteers this unsold produce would end up in the garbage bin. You will need a car to collect and deliver. The amount you collect in special food bags we provide will usually fill your boot and the back seat of your car.

Several of our volunteers by way of example like to collect with their children or grandchildren as helpers.

We normally only expect you to be rostered at most for one Monday approximately every 6 weeks. It's a flexible system of rostering where you nominate your availability that is organised through a WhatsApp group.
