GOSPEL REFLECTION

More and more people were following Jesus. Because he reverenced God, taught with authority, and healed everyone who came to him. And the more the people wanted to make Jesus their king, the more his enemies wanted to trap and destroy him.

Then came the moment when some of the Pharisees caught Jesus' disciples eating food with unwashed hands. And as many mothers will tell you this is the sin above all sins. The washing of hands mattered to many Jews because this good human tradition had taken on significant meaning as a symbol of purity and detachment from the world. In fact, many Jews believed that this human law had a binding force equal to that of the Torah, the Law of Moses.

Answering the accusations of the Pharisees, Jesus told his disciples that it is not any food that we consume that makes us unclean in God's eyes. What really matters is what is in our hearts — and the behavior that flows from our hearts.

Through their traditions the Pharisees had become accustomed to focus on outward signs of ritual purity. But Jesus went straight to the heart of the matter. Sin and holiness

lie inside the human heart, not in the digestive tract. So what about us? Do we pay close attention to our religious observances to the exclusion of the inner life of our hearts? It can be tough to do at times, but God does want us to examine how the attitudes of our hearts are expressed in the ways we treat other people.

Rules and observances are helpful to a life of holiness, but they should never be the sum total of our Christian life. That's part of the reason why Jesus poured out his Spirit: so that we could be renewed in our inner selves and begin to manifest the love, power, and compassion of Christ to the world. It's not always easy to confront the sin that is within our hearts, but we need not fear. Jesus came to save us, not to condemn us. He is for us, not against us. He knows the condition of our hearts — far better than we do — and no matter how bad it may be, he will never turn away from us. Rather, he waits with outstretched arms of mercy for us to come to him just as we are, with our sins, to receive grace and mercy. Jesus is the Great Physician who offers us healing and forgiveness, comfort and aid.

During this Mass, ask him to search and examine your heart. Open yourself to his gentle probing so that he can identify the sickness of sin and apply the healing power of his cross. Let him create a clean heart in you so that you can bring forth good fruit in holiness and righteousness. Remember, we can be like those Pharisees, often without even realizing it. It is easy to go through the motions at Mass: saying the prayers, standing and kneeling at the appropriate times, singing out loud, receiving communion, and staying until the end. But these outward displays may or may not reveal what is on the inside. For instance, we may be distracted, tired, preoccupied, holding on to some sin, or just attending this tradition because it is the right thing to do. What does Jesus want us to have on the inside? **Love.** He wants his love to be the fire in our hearts that moves us to kneel in humble adoration, to sing with joy, to listen attentively to his word, and to greet everyone with a true desire for their peace and well-being. So during the rest of Mass, look up at Jesus and see how he loves you. See how his body was broken so that you might be made whole.

See how he was put to death so that you might have new life. See how he was enslaved so that you might be set free. Meditation on Jesus will lead you to love him in return for all he did for you. What other response could there possibly


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REFLECTING ON THE GOSPEL

REFLECTING ON THE GOSPEL AS A FATHER:

- How do your actions and decisions reflect the teachings of Jesus about inner purity? How can you teach your children about the importance of what's inside the heart through your example and guidance?
- How can you support your family members in their spiritual and personal growth? What practical steps can you take to create an environment where everyone is encouraged to cultivate purity of heart and sincere faith?

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without

washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me.

The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'LISTEN TO ME'

Returning to the Gospel of Mark this week, we have an edited version of a dispute raised by the Pharisees and some of the scribes from Jerusalem about some of Jesus' disciples eating loaves with unwashed hands. Particularly in light of our recent pandemic experiences, we may have some sympathy with them. Yet as the narrative unfolds, we are given further background, that this is but one of the observations of their tradition. The prescriptions about washing do not stem for the Torah, the Law, but are local interpretations by specific groups.

Importantly we can join the extended crowd to hear Jesus say, 'Listen to me.' The same words are used by the prophets to call the people of Israel to listen to the word of God. Here it is a call to pay attention to Jesus' words that 'nothing that goes into a person from outside can defile.' It is from within, from the human

heart, that evil intentions can grow.

Today let us pick up on Jesus' call to 'listen to me' as we read and pray with the scriptures. Let us also hear Pope Francis reminding us, 'The believer does not turn to the Holy Scriptures to support his or her own philosophical and moral view, but because he or she hopes for an encounter; the believer knows that those words were written in the Holy Spirit, and that therefore in that same Spirit they must be welcomed and understood, so that the encounter can occur.'



SAINT GREGORY THE GREAT

MEMORIAL 3 SEPTEMBER

Gregory is often credited with organizing the style of church music that bears his name, Gregorian Chant. Although he didn't compose it, he promoted its use in liturgy.

• Gregory initially resisted becoming Pope, preferring a life of quiet monasticism. However, he accepted the role and became one of the Church's most influential leaders.

- Stories of miracles attributed to Gregory, such as the time he prayed for rain during a drought and it came, have contributed to his status as one of the Church's greatest saints.
- Gregory is the patron saint of teachers, reflecting his dedication to educating both clergy and laity through his writings and reforms.
- Gregory was the first Pope to use the title "Servant of the Servants of God," emphasizing the humility and service he believed were essential to his role..
- Gregory implemented significant reforms in the Church, including the administration of the Church's lands and the liturgy, which had a lasting impact on the Catholic Church.
- He was deeply committed to helping the poor and hungry. Gregory used the Church's resources to provide food and care for the needy, setting an example of Christian charity.

SAINT PETER CLAVER OPTIONAL MEMORIAL 9 SEPTEMBER

- He is the patron saint of slaves and the missions.
- Saint Peter Claver is often referred to as the "Slave of the Slaves" because of his dedicated work with African slaves. He devoted much of his life to caring for enslaved people brought to the Spanish colonies in South America.
- Saint Peter Claver was known for his innovative approaches to providing care. He organized the care of the sick and wounded, administered the sacraments, and established a systematic method of providing food, clothing, and medical care to the enslaved people.
- Claver learned several African languages to better communicate with and serve the enslaved people.
 His ability to speak multiple languages helped him provide spiritual and practical support more effectively.
- Despite his significant impact, Claver lived a humble and austere life. He dedicated all his resources and efforts to the service of others, embodying the Jesuit commitment to poverty and humility.
