FROM FR DAVID

Dear friends



Our school children are now on **school holidays**, and we pray that this time for them and their families are safe.

Our special **prayers go to Terence Turton** who last weekend lost his dear mother, Tess after a very short and unexpected illness. Terence had lost his father just four months ago. At such a sad time, we pray the gentle peace of the Risen Christ for Terrence and his family.

These last days have seen new outbreaks of **war in the Middle East**. We are mindful of all those who are caught up in the violence. Especially, are we mindful this weekend of our Jewish friends on the anniversary of the atrocities of 7 October 2023 which catapulted us into such protracted war which seems now to have no end. The suffering of the Palestinian people and now the Lebanese people is also in our hearts.

From Rome, Bishop Anthony has asked that we gather as a Diocese and pray for

peace. He urges us to invoke the intercession of Mary, Mother of the God, by **praying the Rosary** individually, in families, groups, and communities.

To this end, on behalf of Bishop Anthony, I will lead a **Vigil of Prayer for Peace** at Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral, Waitara on the evening of Monday 7 October at 8.00pm. It is the feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary. The Vigil will include the Rosary.

However, we also have the opportunity to join our own scheduled online parish Rosary on Monday 7 October at 7.15pm. Whichever way is open to us, let us turn to Mary, the Queen of Peace, and pray that the violence

might end and that we find a new way forward that no longer relies on war.

We owe John O'Brien, our architect for our **new Eucharistic Chapel**, an enormous debt of gratitude for the way in which he has prepared this space ahead of our celebrations on Friday 11 October when we will formally receive the relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis. John has managed each stage of this project so superbly. There will be things for us to complete after 11 October – the installation of statutes and stained glass, the receipt of a permanent reliquary – but the main features of the Chapel will shortly be completed. Thank you, John!

Following 11 October, we will turn our attention to the fitting out of the new library space in our church foyer – and then to a complete refit of our Piety Store. So, our enhancement of our church continues.

In the meantime, our preparation for Friday 11 October - **vigil Mass for the feast of Blessed Carlo Acutis** - gathers speed. In anticipation we have begun a nightly online novena at 8pm to which everyone is welcome to join.

Next Saturday 12 October we will be joined by Fr Biju Jose OSH to give a series of **three seminars on the literature of St Paul**. Fr Biju is Parish Priest of Ku-ring-gai Chase and holds a doctorate in the New Testament from the Gregorian University in Rome. Everyone is welcome to join the seminars on 12, 19, and 26 October, commencing at 3.00pm. Bishop David then offers us a series of seminars on the Confessions of St Augustine in November 16, 23 and 30. Wonderful opportunities to grow in our faith!

GOSPEL REFLECTION



We have just heard in the Gospel Jesus say "Let the children come to me." This is a theme that Jesus has used previously. Two weeks ago Mark gave us another example of Jesus welcoming, and using little children to teach his disciples. He told them that if they welcomed a little child then they would be welcoming him and his father. And our Popes have continued this message in some of their letters to the church.

In his apostolic letter introducing the Year of Faith in 2012 - 13, Pope Benedict XVI wrote that "faith commits every one of us to become a living sign of the presence of the Risen Lord in the world". We have to be those that bring people, either children or adults, to Jesus by our words and our actions. We must never say or do anything that may keep people away from him. When Jesus entered into the world he came to save all people, and while on earth he mixed with the poor and rich, the religious leaders and the general population, adults and children. So it's no wonder that the disciples actions caused Jesus to "became indignant" when they, with good intentions, tried to keep people from bringing little children to him. They had decided that Jesus was only here for the adults, not for children.

I quite often use this passage at Baptisms and I ask the people who had heard the comment "little children are meant to seen but not heard". Most people have and it appears the disciples worked under the same principle. But in deciding who was worth Jesus' time, the disciples weren't being a "living sign" of God's presence. This wasn't the first time the disciples did the wrong thing with deep sincerity. Peter tried to convince Jesus that he didn't have to die. James and John asked Jesus to reward their devotion with a privileged place in heaven. And Martha asked Jesus to make her sister help with the cleaning. And in each case, Jesus rebuked them and tried to set them on the right path. The best part is that none of these people gave up. In fact, Peter probably received more rebukes than anyone elsebut he ended up becoming the "rock" on which Jesus built his Church!

All these people kept learning from their mistakes, and that made them all into bright signs of God's presence. We too will make "sincere" mistakes—if we haven't already! We will say or do something that we think is helpful, but poses an obstacle in our lives or keeps someone else from drawing closer to the Lord.

How encouraging it is, then, to remember that we're in good company! Like these disciples, we too can learn from our mistakes if we remain open. The apostles loved Jesus—and so do we. Still, his ways are not always our ways.

But the good news is that Jesus wants to show us where we went wrong and encourage us to try again. So don't give up.

Jesus is with you, always helping you to become a living sign of God's presence. So at Mass today ask him to show you any areas in your life that may be keeping people from meeting him and then show you how you can change.

OUR LADY OF DOLOURS CHATSWOOD TERTIARY EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP TIMOR LESTE

Sally Bracken was a much loved Parishioner, founding member of the Social Justice Ministry Group and a catechist.

She generously bequeathed donation to support education for the girls living at Maubara and Fatuhada.

The extraordinary history of the neighbour on our door step... and links with Our Lady of Dolours, Chatswood... Your friends do not forget you.

Two weeks ago the Pope visited Timor Leste and what a reception he received from the country where 95% identify as Catholic, the highest proportion of Catholics outside of the Vatican.

The Pope's 3 day visit was described as the biggest event in the nation's short history. Indeed, many Australians remember the scenes on our televisions just 25 years ago.

Friday 30 August 2024 Timor Leste celebrated the 25th anniversary of the referendum that set the country on its path to independence and the restoration of democracy. Despite widespread intimidation and violence, the referendum took place successfully, with 98.3 % of the eligible population, many walking for days from faraway villages and coming out of hiding in the hills, to cast their vote.

The overwhelming wish of the people for Independence unleashed a new wave of violence and senseless destruction of the country's infrastructure. Australia led an international peace keeping force to help stabilise the situation and assist Timor Leste achieve independence 2 years later.

However, Australia's close ties with Timor Leste (then known as East Timor) began in the 1940s. Australians owe a great debt to our Timorese friends who sheltered, fed and cared for Australian forces whilst risking their own lives. (40,000 to 70,000 Timorese lost their lives in WW2) When the Australian unit withdrew from East Timor, the RAAF dropped leaflets from the Australian government saying, "Your friends do not forget you".

Twenty years ago Our Lady of Dolours Parish Social Justice Ministry put a vote to Parishioners to choose an International Outreach project for our Parish. Maubara Orphanage run by the Carmelite Sisters in Timor Leste was the project chosen. Since that time, the Parish has helped support in a very small way the children and those who survived the traumatic years of 1990s. Initially this support was in the form of financial aid to improve the living and educational amenities of Maubara Orphanage and Fatuhada Convent in Dili, and in later years in the form of scholarships for tertiary education as the orphans and impoverished children progressed through their education. To date, 3 young women have completed tertiary studies and are now pursuing career opportunities and the fourth has commenced her studies this year. This has been made possible through the generosity of our parishioners.

During these 20 years the Social Justice Committee has benefited from the knowledge, experience and advice from ATLAS (Australia Timor Leste Advancement Society) a charity formed by Catholics with close ties to communities in Timor Leste.

As the Social Justice Ministry Group in OLD has changed and evolved over the years, it was deemed necessary, for better governance of our funds, to enter into a partnership with ATLAS. In February 2024 the Parish signed a Memorandum of Understanding with ATLAS to formalise our partnership. This relationship has greatly facilitated communication with the Timor Leste community, administration of the scholarship and fundraising opportunities to grow our scholarship fund.

We visited the holy town of Medjugorje and it is one of the world's most famous pilgrimage sites. There's lots of interesting and very beautiful places to spend time in prayer like the outdoor 14 stations, the Queen of Peace statue or the statue of the Risen Christ. People all over the world come here for confession.

Each evening we attended the Holy Mass with the Prayer Program at the outdoor altar. The radio broadcasts simultaneous translation of the services from Croatian into many languages.

Everything so normal and yet, so special: the exposition blessed sacrament on the monstrance, the violinist and the musical group - all touches my heart deeply. The kneeling of the pilgrims, the burning of the incense, reading of the holy scripture during adoration, benediction and blessing of the people with the monstrance, the pilgrims leaving quietly after benediction, St James Church - I do not know what it is that pulls me back to want to be there again but I was happy to have visited leading me to encounter the Lord Jesus in the Eucharist, in Adoration, in Confession, in scripture passages, in silent prayer and the Rosary – a time of grace for me as I can never thank God enough for his grace. I have returned home stronger in my faith and determined to put our Blessed Mother's messages and directions as five stones to save souls. They are: daily prayer, fasting, reading the Bible daily, confession regularly and to receive Holy Communion, and when possible, going to daily Mass.



This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.



Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?'

'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'LET THE CHILDREN COME TO ME'

Today's Gospel has three scenes. The first brings a challenge to Jesus from the religious leaders who 'came to test him'. Their question is politically, socially and religiously loaded. We recognise this as like today's investigative journalism. We observe the skill of politicians, religious the leaders and spokespeople taking measure of the challenge and deciding how to deal with it. The question here is, 'Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?' Jesus recognises the challenge that is one sided, complex and about the law. Jesus' reply is a question 'What did Moses command?' He has engaged the challenge but put the ball back in their court. The answer is given still from a single perspective of the male. Jesus then delivers his parting shot, implying that this commandment was given because of 'hardness of heart' and then quotes from scripture of God's intention in creating male and female. To this there is no further response from the religious leaders: they are silenced.


The scene moves into the house with the disciples where they pursue the question. Jesus answers deliberately for both men and women. The scene changes quickly to people bringing children to Jesus and the disciples turning them away. Jesus' words 'Let the children come to me' gives space for another 'Amen' or 'Truly' saying that is not just about this most recent challenge but connected to our two previous weeks: allowing those who are open and receptive to the message of Jesus to come to him. Where is our receptivity – in listening and openness or in challenge and rebuke?



USED MOBILE PHONE COLLECTION

The Season of Creation ends on Friday 4th October, the Feast Day of St Francis of Assisi. Thank you to everyone in the parish who contributed to our celebration this year including those who worked on our Laudato Si Action Platform, those who lent their plants to greening the church, those who came to the seminar by Fr Chima and those who joined in our bush walk and liturgy. Now there is one last task for us to complete. That is a collection of no-longer-needed mobile phones. Mobile phones require cobalt which is largely provided by child slave labour in the Congo. Apple and other makers of mobile phones are well aware of how problematic this is. That is why it's important to recycle mobile phones. Apple now gets more than 50% of the cobalt it needs for its phones from recycling. But even better is what we are doing at Our Lady of Sorrows for the Season of Creation. We are giving used mobile phones to DV Safe Phones, a community organisation in Queensland that repairs them and gives them to police, hospitals and Women's refuges to distribute to women and children fleeing We will keep a mobile phone domestic violence. collection box in the Church foyer for the next two weeks. Please bring in any unwanted mobile phone and put it in the box and also, ask your family and friends to hunt for unused phones in drawers and cupboards. We will get them to DV Safe Phones for you if you act now.

MEMORIAL 7 OCTOBER

- The feast of Our Lady of the Rosary is celebrated on October 7th. It was originally instituted to commemorate the naval victory at the Battle of Lepanto in 1571, where Catholic forces defeated the Ottoman fleet, a victory attributed to the intercession of the Virgin Mary through the praying of the rosary.
- Pope St. Pius established the feast as "Our Lady of Victory," later changed to "Our Lady of Rosary," as he credited the victory at Lepanto to the power of the rosary prayers.
- The word "rosary" comes from the Latin word meaning rosarium, "crown of roses." The prayers of the rosary were often seen as offering a spiritual bouquet to Mary.
- many Marian apparitions, like those in Fatima (Portugal) in 1917, Mary emphasized the importance of praying the rosary daily for peace and conversion.



MEMORIAL 11 OCTOBER

- **SAINT JOHN XXIII** John XXIII was affectionately called "Good Pope John" because of his warmth, humility, and the personal connection he made with people during his papacy.
 - Elected in 1958 at age 76, many expected him to be a "caretaker pope" with a short, uneventful reign. Instead, he surprised everyone by convening the Second Vatican Council (Vatican II), which brought major reforms to the Church.
- St John XXIII was famous for his sense of humor. Once asked how many people worked at the Vatican, he reportedly quipped, "About half of them!"
- Before becoming pope, John XXIII had a background in diplomacy and communication. He even kept a personal journal for many years, which was later published under the title "Journal of a Soul," offering deep insight into his spiritual journey.
- His papal motto was "Oboedientia et Pax," meaning "Obedience and Peace."


