Dear friends,



We have come to the weekend for which we have been working for some months: the formal reception of the relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis into our church. This has occasioned the renovation of our former parish library on the side of the church into a Chapel of Eucharistic Adoration in which also the relic will be permanently placed. That we have been able to bring the project to this stage of development within this time is something quite miraculous itself. There are still some aspects of the project that await completion: the installation of two stained glass panels, the statutes of Carlo and the Virgin Mary, and a crucifix. Two kneelers will be integrated into each side of the chapel, too. However, the basic structure of the chapel is now complete. For this we owe an enormous debt of gratitude to our architect and project manager, John O'Brien who is the real miracle underneath it all. John has brought his many years of experience as a liturgical and church architect both to conceive and execute the project, presenting an outcome of undeniable quality and beauty. He has been diligent throughout, generous, and gracious. It has been a privilege for me to work with him and, on behalf of our entire parish, I express my deepest gratitude and highest esteem to John. We look forward to

continuing to work with John as we progress our exploration of how best to refresh and renew our entire church building in the coming year.

As we receive the relic of Blessed Carlo, I express our gratitude, too, to Elizabeth Cheung who first inspired such an opportunity. And to Ditas and Henry Naguit who facilitated our collection of the relic of Blessed Carlo in Assisi. Their friend, Corazon Sim, who personally conveyed the relic from Assisi to us in July, has returned to be with us this weekend. We are so grateful to her, too, for her kindness in being back with us for this special occasion. So many people have worked hard in the background to make this weekend as special, particularly our parish staff for all the organisation and

communications. Our Parish Director of Music, Titus Grenyer, has written a unique Mass setting for the weekend and has worked tirelessly with our Parish Choir to make our Vigil Celebration as beautiful. Our flower team have decorated our church in the most majestic way. This has taken them many, many hours and we are deeply grateful. Fr Joey has been working with our servers from SEEK in preparation for the liturgy.

A word of gratitude, too, to our Youth Minister, Bettina Ignacio who worked with Ditas Naguit and Yvonne Corpus in the conduct of our online nightly novena since 3 October in anticipation of the Feast Day of Blessed Carlo. Each evening, we had between 55 and 72 screens in this prayerful preparation.

And so, we welcome Carlo, through his relic, to our own church of Our Lady of Sorrows which bears the same name as the church in which he was baptised in 1991, so that forever now he will be a part of the life of our community. This is the power of the relic. It makes present the one whom we remember. They are not just an idea, a thought. They are someone with a body, a tangible life we can see and can touch; they become physically present in our midst. And with this presence they are now our intimate friend, our inspirer, and our intercessor. The need for such a model for all of us, and especially for our young, is real. May Carlo whisper his friendship with us deep in our hearts. May call us to live our lives in the fullest way possible, and may he be there always to support us, and pray for us, before the God in whom are all in communion.

This weekend, we also are joined by **Fr Biju Jose OSH to give a series of three seminars on the literature of St Paul.** Fr Biju is Parish Priest of Ku-ring-gai Chase and holds a doctorate in the New Testament from the Gregorian University in Rome. Everyone is welcome to join the seminars on 12, 19, and 26 October, commencing at 3.00pm. Bishop David then offers us a series of seminars on the Confessions of St Augustine in November 16, 23 and 30. Wonderful opportunities to grow in our faith.

A warm welcome back to our students who next Tuesday return to Term 4! We are mindful of our students commencing their HSC and pray that the Spirit of God guide them through these next weeks.

On the evening of Monday 14 October, we invite as many to gather in Harrington Hall for dinner from 6.30pm for participation in our **North Shore Pastoral Discernment**, called by Bishop Anthony. This is a unique opportunity for us to contribute as a parish to this discernment on the challenges and opportunities, pastoral and social, facing our parishes across the Deanery of the North Shore. Do see the bulletin for further details and registration. And then on the evening of Tuesday 15 October at 6.30pm we have a special **Footprints Mass for those who have suffered miscarriage and stillbirth.** Please spread the word and please feel welcome to come together in such a prayerful moment to remember, to hold and to treasure.

GOSPEL REFLECTION - AN UNFINISHED STORY

In this Sunday's Gospel, we encounter a rich young man who sincerely seeks eternal life but walks away when Jesus invites him to go further in his faith by giving up his wealth. Did you, like me, automatically judge this young man because he left the encounter with Jesus in sadness? Did you assume that his sorrowful departure meant he chose to keep his wealth rather than follow God? Did you view him as selfish, weak, pitiful for struggling to obey God? Why are we so quick to write the end of his story when the Gospel leaves it open?

We know that this young man left in sadness, but we have no idea if he eventually returned to God in joy and glory. Instead of concluding his story based on our own experiences or assumptions, let's appreciate the beauty in how Jesus let him walk away, honouring his freedom. God allows us the space to make our own choices, even if that means stepping back for a time. God knew that the decision to give up wealth would be difficult for this young man, but He didn't say it was impossible...as long as came back to God.

The unresolved ending of this man's encounter with God reminds us that many stories in life don't have neat, clear conclusions. We often face situations where we are left wondering what happened or what could have been. And, just like the rich young man, we face situations of deep sadness when we realise God is asking us to give up everything that makes us feel rich and valuable. The Gospel acknowledges this reality, offering us a space for our own experiences of uncertainty. It invites us to trust that even when the outcome is unclear, God is still present, working in ways we cannot see.

By not revealing the rich man's final decision, the Gospel turns the focus back to us. It challenges us to stay present in our own journey and take responsibility for our own choices. The open ending encourages us to embrace the process of discipleship, understanding that it may take time, and we may need multiple attempts before we fully say "yes" to Jesus's invitation to go further in our faith.

The rich man's story is left unfinished, just like ours, but our God is patient and always invites us back. Whether we take the first step today, tomorrow, or even after a long journey, the door remains open. What will you do with the unfinished story of your life? How will you use your freedom to write your own ending—one that leads back to the arms of Christ, who understands the difficulty of detaching from the things that bring us comfort and security, yet waits for us with hope and love.





BLESSED CARLO ACUTIS MEMORIAL 12 OCTOBER

- Carlo was a talented computer programmer and web designer. He used his skills to create websites to promote the Catholic faith, particularly focusing on Eucharistic miracles.
- Carlo passed away from leukemia at the age of 15 in 2006. His unwavering faith during his illness and his commitment to God inspired many, leading to his beatification in 2020.
- Despite his holiness, Carlo was a typical teenager who enjoyed playing video games and spending time with friends. He believed in balancing his leisure activities with his spiritual life.
- Carlo attended Mass every day, even if it meant making sacrifices to fit it into his busy schedule. He emphasised the importance of the Eucharist in his life.
- Carlo is often referred to as a patron saint for young people and the internet, as he showed that it is possible to be deeply spiritual while engaging with modern technology.
- He was known for his generosity and kindness, often helping those in need. Carlo would invite friends who felt lonely or left out to join him, promoting inclusivity.
- Carlo had a close relationship with his family. His parents described him as a bright and joyful child who often brought happiness to those around him. They shared many family outings and experiences, which were important to Carlo.
- Carlo was a big fan of superheroes, particularly Spider-Man. He admired their courage and ability to help others, reflecting his own desire to make a positive impact on the world.
- Carlo Acutis was beatified on October 10, 2020, making him one of the youngest individuals to be beatified in the Catholic Church.





BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'FOR GOD ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE'

Many of us find it impossible to see the eye of a needle and the previously discarded needle threader is once again an essential tool. Indeed, many no longer bother with sewing or darning. So, the idea of a camel squeezing its gangly legs and neck and robust body through a tiny aperture is just absurd, never mind impossible. But wait, could that 'eye of the needle' be an opening enabling passage among rock formations, offering a possibility akin to an Indiana Jones adventure in the desert? No, it's not.

If we begin with the wisdom of the first reading, 'I prayed, and understanding was given to me; I called on God, and the spirit of wisdom came to me' we have some perspective on today's Gospel. If we team this with the words of Hebrews 'the word of God is living and active' we take another step on the journey. The Gospel begins with Jesus proceeding on a journey and we might contemplate elements of synodality with prayer, calling on God and travelling with the spirit of wisdom on a journey. Any of us could be that person who seeks the answer to the question of eternal life. We all lead good lives. This person fails the discipleship request to sell everything and give the proceeds to the poor. Is entering the kingdom of God so impossible? No, 'for God all things are possible'. Our journey with God, in prayer and with the spirit of wisdom in the company of others on the mission to which we are called, is the way of life that leads to eternal life. Let's go!



ST IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH


MEMORIAL 17 OCTOBER



- St. Ignatius was one of the earliest Church Fathers and served as the bishop of Antioch in the early second century. He played a crucial role in shaping the early Christian community.
- He was martyred for his faith around 107 AD. According to tradition, he was arrested and taken to Rome, where he was thrown to wild beasts in the Colosseum.
- Ignatius is known for his seven letters, which he wrote while being transported to Rome. These letters address various Christian communities and provide insight into early Christian beliefs, church hierarchy, and the importance of unity among believers.
- St. Ignatius is often referred to as "Ignatius Theophorus," which means "God-bearer."

SAINT LUKE FEAST 18 OCTOBER

- Luke is known as both an evangelist and a physician. He is the author of the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, and he is often referred to as the patron saint of physicians and surgeons.
- Unlike most of the apostles, St. Luke is believed to have been a Gentile, which makes him unique among the Gospel writers. His perspective often highlights the inclusivity of Christ's message.
- Luke is traditionally credited with being an artist as well, and he is often depicted in Christian art as a painter. Some traditions hold that he painted the first icon of the Virgin Mary.
- St Luke includes several parables that are not found in the other Gospels, such as the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. These stories emphasize themes of mercy, compassion, and forgiveness.
- In Christian art, St. Luke is often symbolized by an ox or calf, representing sacrifice and service. This symbol reflects the themes of sacrifice found in his writings.
