



#### **GOSPEL REFLECTION: GATHERING THE STORIES OF FAITH**

Who's is someone you love deeply? What's a story you could tell me about how they bring God to your life?

In this Sunday's Gospel (Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21), Luke begins his account with humility and care, recognising that the story of Jesus has already been told by those who walked with Him and witnessed His life firsthand. Yet, Luke sees his role as something unique: to gather these accounts, to order them, and to present them to Theophilus—a name that means "lover of God."

Theophilus is not a name just for one person; it is a title we all bear. We are all Theophilus. We are all lovers of God, seeking to make sense of the story of salvation, to see how it speaks to our lives and our hearts. Luke's purpose is to ensure that these stories, these truths, are not lost or scattered but arranged in a way that brings clarity and certainty to all who love God and long to know Him more deeply. Luke is writing here for you.

Luke's work reminds us that faith is not a solitary journey. It is shaped and strengthened by the stories of those who have gone before us—stories of courage, doubt, trust, and transformation. His role was not to add to these stories but to make them accessible, to weave them together so that they illuminate the beauty and depth of God's work in the world.

This reflection invites us to consider the stories around us. Who are the witnesses of faith in our lives? What moments of grace, told by others or lived in our own hearts, are waiting to be ordered and shared? Like Luke, we may be called to gather these fragments and offer them as a gift to others.

In doing so, we become storytellers of faith. It is an intimate act—listening to the whispers of God in our lives and arranging them so they might speak clearly to others. It is a reminder that our love for God compels us not only to receive His truth but to share it, to make it known in ways that resonate with those around us.

So to you Theophilus, my fellow lovers of God, let us embrace this calling. Let us honour the stories of those who have come before, look for God's hand in the lives of those around us, and have the courage to order and share these moments of grace. In doing so, we carry on Luke's work, helping others see the face of Christ and find certainty in His love.

#### Matteo Ricci 利瑪竇, |利玛窦 (1552 - 1610) Missionary of Cultural Dialogue

Matteo Ricci was the first Jesuit missionary who was able to enter the Chinese Empire in 1583 during the Ming Dynasty and to reach the capital, Beijing where he stayed from 1601 to 1610, establishing there a Christian presence that exists to this day. Known as 'Li Madou' to the Chinese, he Is widely recognised and admired by Chinese people for his cultural achievements, and by Chinese Catholics for his missionary approach.

Matteo Ricci was born in Macerata, Italy in 1552. At the age of 18 Ricci entered the Society of Jesus at the Roman College, where he studied mathematics and physics in addition to theology and philosophy. He requested to be part of a missionary expedition to the Far East. In 1580 he was ordained a priest, and two years later travelled to Macau, a Portuguese settlement on the southeast coast of China. There Ricci began learning the Chinese language and customs, and eventually mastered Chinese classical script.

From Macau Ricci travelled to Guangdong province in southeast China, where he and another Jesuit were allowed by Chinese officials to set up a mission. There he lived for over 10 years, applying himself to learning Mandarin (the language of the intellectual elite). Journeying on, eventually he adopted the garb of a Chinese scholar.

As he learned more of the beliefs of the Chinese and talked with Chinese scholars, he found that the teaching of Confucius was in part consistent with Christian philosophy. To explain Christian concepts, he began presenting them in a light consistent with Confucianism, drawing on the parallels between the teachings.

Ricci travelled northwards to Nanchang and finally reached Beijing in 1601. On the long and arduous northward journey to Beijing Ricci worked assiduously to set up missionary residences, and trained fellow-missionaries to continue the work in the cities he left. Thus in 1601 the mission included, besides Beijing, the residences of Nanjing, Nanchang, Suzhou, and Shanghai.

In Beijing he presented gifts of a clock and a harpsichord to the emperor and undertook the care of these gifts. When the clock wound down, Ricci was called into the Forbidden Palace, the first European to be given the honour. Ricci remained in Beijing for the rest of his life, where he continued tirelessly his Christian teaching and interpretation of Confucian wisdom.

His years in Beijing were his most prosperous. Ricci employed a missionary approach adapted to the Chinese culture and socio-political reality. In the beginning, he devoted himself to showing Western science and technology to attract attention of the curious, and to engage in dialogues with the educated elite. Ricci's accurate prediction of eclipses and other astronomical events (necessary for the preparation of the imperial calendar) gave him access to the inner court of the emperor. He was highly esteemed and gained many deep and valuable friendships, often accompanied by conversions. His circle of close friends convinced and helped him to translate into Chinese language several Western scientific and mathematical works. Ricci's also wrote a comprehensive presentation of Catholic doctrine, in the literary style of Confucian classics.

In 1610 he fell ill and died soon after. His burial in Beijing was authorized by imperial decree – something that had never happened until then for a foreigner. Ricci had lived 28 years in China. He left a profound legacy, both in laying the foundation for a stable presence of the Church in China and building a bridge between Christian orthodoxy and the philosophical wisdoms of the Chinese, between European and Chinese cultures, and between the East and West.

For centuries after his death, the memory of Ricci's missionary achievement was eclipsed, partly because of the fallout from the 'Chinese rites' controversy - a debate over whether the Confucian traditional rituals of veneration of ancestors were compatible with Christianity. ....continued after Our Sunday Celebration

Seeing that many others have undertaken to draw up accounts of the events that have taken place among us, exactly as these were handed down to us by those who from the outset were eye-witnesses and ministers of the word, I in my turn, after carefully going over the whole story from the beginning, have decided to write an ordered account for you, Theophilus, so that your Excellency may learn how well founded the teaching is that you have received.

Jesus, with the power of the Spirit in him, returned to Galilee; and his reputation spread throughout the countryside. He taught in their synagogues and everyone praised him. He came to Nazara, where he had been brought up, and went into the synagogue on the sabbath day as he usually did. He stood up to read, and they handed him the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Unrolling the scroll he found the place where it is written:

The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me.

He has sent me to bring the good news to

the poor,

to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour. He then rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the assistant and sat down. And all eyes in the synagogue were fixed on him. #### **BREAKING OPEN THE WORD**

#### **GOD'S SPIRIT-FILLED AGENT**

This Sunday we read the opening four verses of Luke's Gospel (1:1-4), skip over Jesus' birth narrative (chapters 1 and 2), Luke's introduction of John the Baptist (3:1-20), Jesus' baptism (3:21-22), a genealogy (3:23-38) and Jesus' temptation (4:1-13)—stories which will emerge at various times during this year—and move to a defining moment set in Jesus' hometown synagogue in Nazareth (4:14-21).

This event lays out the full meaning of Jesus' future ministry in the Gospel. Luke presents Jesus, the faithful Jew, at his local synagogue for the Sabbath Scripture, choosing to read from the prophet Isaiah. Luke brings together two parts of Isaiah, edits them and rearranges them to have Jesus pronounce the two key messages the evangelist wants the Gospel audience to hear: that Jesus is God's Spirit-filled agent (confirming his status from earlier scenes) whose sole intent is to lead God's people, especially the poor, oppressed and spiritually blind, to freedom; and that the God of Jesus is not a God just for the Jews, but for all people irrespective of social or

#### ethnic status.

It is this last point that attracts ire from his co-religionists and introduces a theme of opposition that will emerge as the Gospel unfolds. Evident in the Nazarethevent is Luke's freedom, clear from the opening verses of today's passage, to reshape the biblical tradition (Isaiah) and the story of Jesus to speak freshly to the Gospel's Greco-Roman audience. Luke thus provides a pattern for contemporary theological reflection and church teaching.

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Pope Pius XII 'definitively closed' the 'Chinese rites' controversy on Dec. 8, 1939, when he issued a decree authorizing Chinese Catholics to observe their ancestral rites.

The cause of beatification of Matteo Ricci (originally begun in 1984) was reopened on January 24, 2010. Recently Pope Francis signed a decree (proclaimed on December 17, 2022) which recognised Ricci as a Servant of God and declared "venerable", thus setting in motion the process for his beatification.

Chatswood Vinnies received 8 calls for help in the period up to Christmas. One is still ongoing involving a replacement refrigerator for a young mother previously known to us.

An unusual request for help came from a husband and father, temporarily, we hope, estranged from his family and living on the streets on account of being unexpectedly out of work.

A homeless rehab patient sought help with setting up her newly allocated government housing, we have provided some help with kitchenware and her case is also ongoing.

A recently bereaved widower sought some Christmas cheer and we provided a hamper.


An asylum seeker sought help with phone, food and scripts. The other three were from previously known people and help for holiday-caused expenses, furniture and food was provided. Some \$600 was expended.

Supposedly, despite his brilliance, his classmates at the University of Paris nicknamed him "The Dumb Ox" because he was quiet and large. His teacher, St. Albert the Great, defended him, saying, "his doctrine will one day resound throughout the world."

- Thomas's family opposed his decision to join the Dominican Order and go into religious life. To stop him, his brothers kidnapped him and locked him in a tower for over a year. During this time, they even sent a woman to tempt him, but he chased her away with a burning log from the fireplace!
- Toward the end of his life, after completing much of his theological work, Thomas had a mystical vision of Christ. After this experience, he said, "I can write no more. I have seen things that make my writings like straw."
- Thomas Aquinas's remains are housed in the Church of the Jacobins in Toulouse. His tomb is a site of pilgrimage for many who revere his contributions to the Church.


