FROM FR DAVID



PP VG Parish Priest Dear friends,

The greatest thank you to all those who made our fifth time of gathering as a **Parishin-Council** so effective last Sunday, 10 November. There was such an energy and vibrancy in the forum. I am firmly convinced that each time we gather in this way, the bonds of our community before the Spirit of God deepen and widen. It was a special pleasure to see new faces among the participants, and indeed many young people. We also had a number of observers with us from other parishes – including all the way from the Cathedral Parish of Armidale. We will soon be able to share with everyone the discernment from the occasion which will hopefully foster our sense of shared stewardship for our parish community.

Last Sunday we also shared the discernment from the fourth time we gathered as a Parish-in-Council last August, focussing on **Igniting Young Hearts.** Having listened again to the conversation of the day and taking further consultation I have now adopted a list of practical steps that might assist our community to be responsive to our younger members. Do have a look further on in the bulletin for the list of those

decisions and actions. A significant response to our August discernment will be taken up especially in the Jubilee Year of 2025 and as we celebrate the canonisation of Carlo Acutis toward the end of April.

Recently, our parish has participated in the **Pastoral Discernment Project of the North Shore** called by Bishop Randazzo. We might recall that a number of us gathered on the evening of Monday 14 October. Our Parish Report, formulated from the outcomes of our conversation, has now been submitted. Also the English Translation of the **Final Document of the Synod of Bishops: "On Being a Synodal Church"** is now available online at https://tinyurl.com/2s4vt9fx I encourage us to read this document as it firmly grounds all that we are seeking to undertake as a Catholic parish community.

Fr Joey is now in the United States on annual leave. To assist us in his absence we have the joy of **welcoming Fr Sam French with us for several weeks.** Fr Sam will be well known to us as he enjoyed a pastoral placement at Chatswood prior to his Ordination. We thank him for his generosity of service to be here with us until 5 December.

However, with a heavy heart, I share that our beloved **Bettina Ignacio**, our Youth Ministry Officer for the past 18 **months**, will be leaving us. Bettina has been offered a full-time position in the field of her professional endeavour with the Murray Darling Basin Authority in Canberra, commencing in early February 2025. We will be very sad to see her go from our parish community, but we also wish Bettina the very best in this exciting new opportunity in her professional career. Bettina will be on leave from 14 December to 13 January. She will return to us for the end of January, completing her time with us on 31 January 2025. We will shortly commence recruitment for a replacement and hopefully have this person chosen by year's end so that there can be a period of induction/transition in the final weeks of January. Please join with me in expressing our profound gratitude to Bettina for the marvellous contribution that she has made to our parish family. Our Youth Ministry has grown so strongly by Bettina's beautiful presence and diligence.

With a happier heart, I am also able to share with you that, after much discernment and discussion, Olivia Lee has accepted a new position in our parish team as **Parish Services Lead in place of Manager of Parish Operations.** This new position carries over a number of areas in which Olivia has already demonstrated excellence but adds some further ones, especially that of Retail Management as we bring our Piety Store and PEW store into a single entity. The new position removes, too, some of the more administrative aspects of Olivia's previous role. Olivia's new hours will be 10am-6.00pm Monday to Friday. We express our gratitude to Olivia for accepting this new position. Please note that whilst Olivia retains responsibility for ordering office/church supplies etc, Maintenance and Facilities management, as well as IT management, will come to me. If any maintenance issue arises, please do let me know.

During the week, our church was recipient of some **beautiful new developments**:

- The donation of a very beautiful sculpture of Our Lady of Sorrows hand carved in Bethlehem, Israel from olive wood – gift of the Chow family. We thank them profoundly for this extraordinary generosity. The sculpture has been placed at the northern entrance. However, we will attend to the background with a new curtain to highlight further the beauty of the sculpture.
- Our elegant statutes for our Acutis Eucharistic Chapel have now been installed.
- We have replaced the front wooden doors with glass ones, so that when our church is locked late at night we will still convey a sense of invitation and welcome with the tabernacle and crucifix clearly visible from the street.
- The timber from the old pews removed from the northern transept has all been stripped by students from Pius X College who have now made garden beds from them to establish our new community garden to be placed in raised beds on the northern side of our church. We look forward to sharing the vegetables we grow!
- In our Parish Office we have also now had the southern wall of the Print/Workroom repaired, as well as our driveway into our parish office carpark.

We are wishing to commence the opportunity of **Morning Tea each Sunday after the 10.30am Mass**, as well as our 9.00am Mass. If you are able to assist our 10.30am hospitality crew, we would love to hear from you! Do contact our parish office.

Our **Pastoral Works Fund Appeal** for our financial year 2024/2025 is now open with envelopes available in our church each weekend through November. This is the diocesan fund that resources our wonderful catechists bringing our Catholic Faith to our children in our six public schools of our neighbourhood. The Fund trains our catechists and provides all the texts for our students. Your generosity in contributing to the Fund directly helps our children. Please give generously to the Appeal over the coming weeks. We now have a dedicated TapnGo machine in the church foyer for the Fund, which may be a more convenient way to donate. If you use this TapnGo machine please ensure you take your receipt if you wish to claim a tax deducation. Donations over \$2 are tax deductible. Our Parish is obligated to contribute \$73, 000 to this find in the current financial year.

And lasty, we have a very special event occurring on Saturday 14 December. **Just as we brought the Stations of the Cross to the Concourse last Good Friday, this Christmas we are bringing carols!** And we will be joined by many of the other Christian Churches of our region, too. This is a brand-new initiative and way of bringing Christmas into the city through song and prayer. The performance is on Saturday 14 December at 7:30pm, with a rehearsal from 10:00am-1:00pm in the church. The carols service will comprise a number of famous Christmas carols, plus two choral items: O Holy Night and Handel's Hallelujah Chorus. The choir will be accompanied by the Salvation Army band, and we are also blessed to have guest singer Marlisa Punzalan (former winner of the X Factor Australia) joining us! I will be conducting the event. If you have not signed up yet to sing with us, there's still time. Please reply by email to our Parish Director of Music, Titus Grenyer with confirmation + numbers. GOSPEL REFLECTION



As we near the end of another church year, our attention is drawn more and more to the end of time, that final day when Jesus will come again.

We don't know when and in today's Gospel Jesus tells us: "But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father".So even he does not know when he will come back.

So we need to be very wary of those who say they have worked it out and tell us Jesus will come when such and such a thing happens. But we can all be assured that Jesus will return at the end of time. We may not understand all the details of his return, but we can be confident that it will happen.

For us it is less important to know the exact time that Jesus will come again than it is to make sure that when he does come, we won't be taken by surprise. So how should we react to this knowledge? What should our attitude be? Put briefly, Jesus wants us to be confident and secure in him every day of our lives.

Above every responsibility we have in this world, the one that is most critical is for us to be able to say: "I am right with the Lord. If he comes now, I am ready."

He also wants us to have the security to move out into the world, offering those around us the same reasons for confidence that we have.

A common philosophy in the world is that basic goodness is sufficient grounds for us to be confident of our place in the heavenly home: I haven't killed anyone; I haven't told any outrageous lies; I haven't stolen huge amounts of money. So, what's the problem?

Even among believers, there can be a sense that God's love is so gentle and forgiving that he will overlook our sins and our lack of readiness and just let us into his kingdom anyway.

While it is true that God is rich in mercy, we also need to be alert to the fact that he is a God of justice and righteousness. That's why today's Gospel reading is a call to make sure we are ready for the end. It is easy to fill our attention with less important issues, such as the clothes we wear or the way we are going to spend our free time. But our spiritual state is far more important. Simply assuming that we are bound for eternal life without checking ourselves may work out, but the consequences of being wrong are severe.

Do you know if your name is written in the book of life? Do you know that it's written in the blood of Christ and cannot be erased? Do you know that salvation is a promise from God for all who are baptized into Jesus and who are striving to follow him? Forgiveness of sins has occurred, and it is always available, so you're very safe. But we need to remember that Jesus is the author and perfecter of our faith—not ourselves. He has won our salvation, and he will keep it safe so long as we stay close to him. The security of our life rests in Christ and our faith in him. We need to make sure that we are secure in our faith. We need to "confess" and "believe" in Jesus each day.

We should examine our conscience every day and let no grave sin remain. And if in doubt go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We should also do our best to care for the outcast, the lonely, and the marginalized.

As we await the return of our Messiah, let's share our joy and hope. Let's reach out in faith and invite people into the kingdom of God. Whenever the signs of Jesus' second coming occur, let's stand secure, peaceful, and joyful. As we do, we will become pillars of strength for all those who don't yet know the salvation that's available to them!

Nothing has a more powerful effect on people than the witness of someone whose life has been touched and lifted up by the love and presence of Christ.

PRESENTATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY MEMORIAL 21 NOVEMBER

- The Presentation of Mary isn't found in the Bible but comes from an ancient tradition recorded in the Protoevangelium of James, an apocryphal text from the second century.
- According to tradition, Mary's parents, Saints Anne and Joachim, brought her to the Temple in Jerusalem at the age of three to dedicate her to God as a sign of gratitude for her miraculous birth.
- The feast originated in the Eastern Church and was introduced to the Western Church in the 11th century, becoming universally celebrated in 1585 under Pope Sixtus V.
- Tradition holds that Mary remained in the Temple for several years, praying, learning scripture, and serving, which prepared her for her role as the Mother of God.

Adopted actions from Parish-in-Council IV

On Saturday 31 August we came together as parish community for our Parish-in-Council IV. Our focus was to discern how God might be calling us to ignite young hearts and help them to feel a true sense of belonging in our parish. Directly arising from the table discernments, we are excited to share the following adopted parish actions across our Ministry Circles...



Igniting Young Hearts

- Along with our active WhatsApp chat groups, we will introduce a TikTok parish account with clips focused on young people.
- We'll continue to encourage active involvement of youth in every parish Ministry Circle.
- We will enter the Jubilee Year 2024 as a designated Shrine of Hope for Young People with a focus on opportunities to engage the inspiration of Carlo Acutis, celebrating his canonisation in a special way for young people in the first week of Term 2, 2025.
- We will stage a further Praise and Worship event in the first half of 2025 after Easter, and if possible, again in the second half of 2025.



Growing in Faith

- Once a term, we will offer to all our schools the experience of an 'educational Mass' for students by which they are led into the structure and theology of the Eucharist.
- We will seek to support initiatives that are happening in our secondary schools for the formation in faith of our young people, such as Alpha and Altaration. If possible, we will facilitate parish participation at such events.
- From the parish office, we will publish a monthly newsletter of faith opportunities occurring in the parish that we consider may have benefit for young people and ask that this newsletter be physically distributed to students.

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Worshipping Together

- We will seek to have consistency for each of the weekend Masses. As from Sunday 27 October we have implemented a new style for the 9 am Family Mass, ensuring much greater participation of children in a variety of ways.
- We have established a family friendly space in the northern transept of the Church.
- We will continue to encourage young Welcomers to join our Welcoming Team.
- We will seek to expand our younger music groups that play at our 5.30 pm Mass on the first and second Sundays of the month.



Animating our Future

- Working with our schools and the Igniting Young Hearts Ministry Circle, we will engage young people through Youth in Councils, surveys, and discussion groups to better understand and respond to young people's needs.
- We will offer mentoring and training opportunities for our emerging young leaders
- We will consider how to involve young people in future Parish-in-Councils with wider participation, including mixed seating at tables.



Parish Staff

- We will seek to add a visit to the church to School Open Days.
- We will ask that a Parish Welcome Pack be included in School Open Day folders.
- We will seek to promote parish events towards families, through a monthly newsletter to be distributed to parents at schools.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

TIMES OF GREAT DISTRESS

The time we live in could be described as a time of great distress. News of wars, destruction, floods, fires and so much more assail us. There are still some who stand on street corners with a sign proclaiming, 'The End Is Nigh'. Still others raise alarms on websites and social media. Our first reading today, taken from the last chapter of Daniel, presents Michael the Archangel warning of the end, of a time of great distress. He recounts the resurrection of the dead where those sleeping in the dust will be separated: some will be awakened 'to everlasting life' and others 'to shame and everlasting contempt'.

Paralleling this, in the Gospel of today, Jesus speaks to his disciples as his Passion looms. He speaks in apocalyptic, endtimes, language of 'a time of distress' when the lights in the sky will fall. These events hail the coming of the Son of Man who will gather his chosen. This is the hope of what will come beyond the trials and crucifixion of Jesus, an assurance of God's presence echoed in Jesus' words, 'Heaven and earth will pass away, but my

words will not pass away'.

In days of distress we, like the disciples, can hear Jesus' words, the Good News, if we remain faithful. The emphasis is not on what will pass away but on the saving grace of God who has sent his son, Jesus, and will raise him for the salvation of all. The end is not the end for those awakened

to everlasting life.



- **MEMORIAL 22 NOVEMBER**
 - When her tomb was opened in 1599, her body was found incorrupt, which means it had not decayed, a sign of her holiness.
- Though there's no historical evidence that Cecilia was a musician, she became the patron saint of music because of a legend that she "sang to God in her heart" during her wedding.
- · Cecilia survived multiple attempts on her life, including being suffocated and then struck with a sword three times. She lived for three days afterward.
- Cecilia is often depicted in art with a musical instrument like an organ, harp, or lute, symbolizing her patronage of music and musicians.
- Cecilia was one of the first women in the church to be venerated as a saint, highlighting her courage and devotion during the early days of Christianity.
- Her steadfast faith converted her husband, Valerian, and his brother, Tiburtius, both of whom became martyrs for the Christian faith.
- The name Cecilia comes from the Latin caecus, meaning "blind." This was often interpreted spiritually, signifying seeing with the eyes of faith rather than physical sight.
- The Basilica of Saint Cecilia in Trastevere, Rome, is said to be built on the site of her home and remains a place of pilgrimage.
