This Sunday's Gospel opens with a conversation between Jesus and his most trusted disciples. Jesus asks them, "Who do people say that I am?" (8:27). Their response at first is to say what others have been saying about Jesus, that he might be John the Baptist returned from death, for John is killed in chapter 6 of the Gospel of John, or Jesus might be the prophet Elijah, who was taken into heaven in a fiery chariot and who has returned to usher in the new era of the Messiah. Then Jesus makes his question more direct: "Who do you say that I am?" (8:29). Peter, as the spokesperson for the group, responds, "You are the Messiah" (8:29). Jesus sternly forbids the disciples to tell anyone of his true identity as Messiah. The he explains to the disciples that even though he is the Messiah, he will have to suffer greatly and be killed but will rise from the dead after three days. What Jesus tells the disciples about what is going to happen is inconsistent with their understanding of what the Messiah would be. For Jews at this time, the Messiah is envisioned to be a worldly leader that will free them from any oppressive foreign government and restore the kingship of Israel. How could it be possible that Jesus, the Messiah, would have to die? Peter rebukes Jesus, for he is challenging his understanding of what the Messiah is to be. In turn, Jesus rebukes Peter by calling him Satan, which means "obstacle" or "adversary." Peter challenges Jesus to embrace the concept of the Messiah as the world leader, which would put the key disciples in powerful positions of this world leader. Jesus is clear in letting Peter know that his understanding is incorrect and that indeed the Messiah is going to experience death but also resurrection.

The Gospel ends with the core message of Mark's Gospel: "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me" (8:34). Disciples of Jesus will also have to endure pain and suffering in their lives. They will not be exempt from the process. Salvation comes by embracing what the Gospel demands of a disciple, even if it means the individual will have to die for the sake of Gospel values.

From Fr David

Dear friends,

With the government's announcement this Thursday on the roadmap out of our lockdown at long last we have a flicker of hope! May this be fanned into flame in the weeks ahead! Let us pray that it will not be too long now before we come back together.

I wish again to take this opportunity to offer my profound gratitude for those who, in the meantime, lead our online initiatives that keep our bonds of community alive. Last night we had a maximum of 100 people join us online to celebrate the feast day of the Birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Thorough these remarkable opportunities for shared payer the flame of our faith has been kept burning through these difficult times. We owe an immense debt of gratitude to those who have facilitated these.

These opportunities continue. Of course, we could not let the feast day of our parish, Our Lady of Sorrows on 15 September, go without celebration. So, next Wednesday we will have a range of possibilities open to us to mark this important annual occasion: an online reflection on the feast day for our children which will be available on our parish YouTube channel; the praying of the Rosary at 12.30pm; a special feast day celebration of Mass which will be broadcast at 5pm; and then at 8pm a virtual pilgrimage in celebration of Mary through the various cultures that make up our family of faith. These occasions will be available through our parish website under online gatherings

September is also a month in which we are mindful of our responsibility for the safeguarding of our children. On our parish website and bulletin are listed the different ways that our Diocese is attending to this obligation in a particular way through the course of this month. Tonight, 9 September, Bishop Anthony leads us in our annual Liturgy of Lament for the hurt that people have experienced in our community. I invite you to go on to our diocesan website this evening to join our Bishop as he acknowledges our guilt, and commits us to cultivate communities of safety and care.

Towards the end of September, from Wednesday 22 September, Anthony Seeto is introducing to us an extraordinary opportunity for our formation in faith, called Exploring the Faith. Have you ever thought Why is the Old Testament so important to our Faith? What really is the Good News? How can we be so confident in the Resurrection? Why do we need prayer? What takes place when we receive the Sacraments? How do we fit in the universal Church? Exploring the Faith is a 30 week course that explores these things and more. There are no

And last Friday 3 September was the 25th anniversary of Bishop David's ordination as a Bishop. It will be sometime yet before we see Bishop David again. However, we send him our affection and prayer at this significant milestone in his life of ministry and priesthood.

Continue to stay well everyone and do be sure to arrange your vaccination. This is the single most important factor that will enable us to come back together again. May we hasten now towards this day!
