Community Dinners: Sadly, one piece of parish life which we can't continue at present is our Community Dinners. Although we recognise the need for connection is all the more vital at this time, the present 1.5m distancing requirements will make gathering people from different households around a table impossible for the time being. We look forward to the time when we can recommence and relaunch this wonderful piece of parish outreach and community. .

Sanitising the church: We are frequently sanitising all touch surfaces in the church including pews and door handles. Thank you to Andrew, Yvonne, Maureen, Chris, Rose and others who have been helping with this in recent weeks. You'll see bottles of sanitiser and both cloths and squeegees in the foyer and on the front pew – feel free to come and help any time you're able.

Cancelling a booking: Last weekend our vigil, 9am and 10.30am Masses were fully booked with one hundred people! This is wonderful, and a great sign of people's faithfulness and eagerness to celebrate the Eucharist together. Sadly though, it also means that other people who may have wanted to book are unable to. There are always some people who, although booked, cannot make it, often due to caution if they or someone they have been in contact with has virus symptoms. If you do know in advance that you will be unable to come to Mass which you have booked, please use the "return tickets" function so that someone else may take your place. It's near the bottom of your confirmation email from Trybooking.

PARISH MEETING ROOM TOILET CHANGES:

For everyone's protection, a change is being implemented immediately with the Toilets at the Parish Meeting Rooms.

Firstly, we must clarify that the 2 end toilets with signs Parishioner and Atrium Children are for the parish use and are the only toilets that can be used by church parishioners. The other toilets marked Mercy College Students Only are for the school use only and must not be used under any circumstances by parishioners or visitors to the Atrium.

In future, the parishioner and Atrium toilets will be locked at all times. If the toilet is needed and you are attending a group in a meeting room or the Atrium, keys to the toilets are available in each parish room. Please use these to open and lock again after use. The only exception to this is if a large group function is happening, the toilets may be unlocked by the Group Leader for the duration of that function but must be locked at the completion of the function. If you are attending the church, you must use the toilets at the rear of the church. You **must not on any occasion use the student toilets**. Student toilets will be locked after school finishes and on weekends.

We hope you understand the importance of this change in protecting everyone under the COVID-19 situation.

HALLELUJAH GROUP

Parishioners are warmly invited to join a new group in the parish – the Hallelujah group – which as the name suggests has as its purpose to praise God. WHAT'S ON, WHAT'S NOT: Last Saturday we recommenced our Parent Connect gathering and Baptism Preparation gatherings in person. As you can see from the picture we kept physical distancing and wore masks.

During the week some bible studies met in person,

some online. First Communion preparation groups met, again, some in person, some online. The Children's Atrium and Children's Liturgy are meeting again, though with smaller numbers. In recent weeks Fr Jim and Fr John have been able to celebrate Mass for the residents of St Peter's Green, Archbold House and Dougherty Centre, though these aged care centres are again closed down to visitors.

Our Ministers of Communion to the Sick are continuing to take Communion to people in their homes. And our Catechists are again teaching in all 6 of our local state schools.

DUTIES OF PEOPLE WITH A WORKING WITH CHILDREN CHECK:

Nearly 200 of our parish volunteers have a NSW Govt *Working With Children Check* (WWCC), which is a background check to exclude people with certain criminal offences from working with children. Those volunteers have given their WWCC number to the parish for verification. New legislation means that all WWCC holders now have an obligation to report any suspicion that a child is at risk of significant harm, or that an adult has put a child at risk of serious harm. All WWCC holders are now "Mandatory Reporters" of such suspicions, just as clergy, teachers and social workers have been for some time.

Fr Jim will be writing to all WWCC holders to explain their obligations, which will also include a short online safeguarding course. If you do not receive a letter from Fr Jim by the end of the month please contact the parish office. For more information see bbcatholic.org.au/safeguarding.

JOB VACANCY - Catechist Coordinator, Lower North Shore Parish - Casual Role: 4 - 10 hours per week

The Catholic Parish of Lower North Shore requires a committed person to lead the Special Religious Education (SRE) ministry in the Parish. This involves supporting the catechists; coordinating classes and resources; communicating with the various stakeholders at the schools, Parish and Chancery; and looking after the administration of the ministry in the Parish.

A PRO LIFE PERSPECTIVE

As we all know, the coronavirus epidemic has had a huge impact on society as it struggles to deal with the great danger to life and health of the community. Governments have responded with a raft of stringent measures designed to combat the virus, measures which in other circumstances would be regarded as quite intolerable.

At the same time the Black Lives Matter movement has emerged as a powerful influence on society. No reasonable person could argue against the premise that lives and welfare of black people are equally important to all other lives.

Red Nose Day has highlighted the devastating impact of sudden infant death syndrome (SID) in claiming the lives of many babies and infants.

All these matters are predicated on the premise of the primary importance of the lives and welfare of human beings.

But What About the Unborn?

A very good question. While the Government is busy instituting many measures to stop the spread of the coronavirus and to deal with its impact on the health and lives of the public as well as its economic repercussion, thousands of unborn babies are each year deliberately destroyed under legislation passed by Parliament to permit this very attack on human life.

History gives us many examples of instances of certain sections of the population being regarded as sub-human and dispensable. Instances of this include human sacrifice, slavery, the holocaust, ethnic cleansing and genocide all of which we would rightly regard as repulsive and utterly evil. Yet our contemporary society has seen fit to enshrine in law the right to terminate the lives of one of the most vulnerable sections of our population -why doesn't this place our contemporary society in a comparable situation to those mentioned above?

Catholics recognize the human person as being made in the "image and likeness of God", a body/soul composite endowed by God with enormous dignity and destined for eternal union with Him. This applies to all human beings from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death and allows for no exception based on development, physical or mental capacity, race or gender. For Catholics a death as a result of the coronavirus is a tragedy in the same way as the death of an unborn baby through abortion.

A Pro-Life Response

- Many if not all of us have complied with government-imposed restrictions and our own instinct to safeguard ourselves and others from the coronavirus. But as Catholics we should think about being just as vigilant and active in protecting the lives of the unborn. We warmly invite YOU to join our parish pro-life group in supporting actions to uphold the lives of ALL and in particular the lives of the unborn who have no capacity to protect themselves.
- Supportive action takes many forms including constant prayer, outreach to those facing difficulties as a result of unwanted or unplanned pregnancies, outreach to those who have suffered an abortion and who need God's healing in their lives or those of their loved ones (in this regard we highly recommend the loving ministry of Rachel's Vineyard – T 0400 092 555 – info@rachelsvineyard.org.au), standing up for laws that would protect the rights of the unborn and standing against laws that do not respect the lives of the unborn or the elderly or terminally ill. We ALL need to stand up and be counted if we want our contemporary society to truly recognize and safeguard the dignity, value and loving presence of God in all human beings from their moment of conception until their natural death.
