

The gospel reading is Mark's account of the Last Supper (14:12-16,22-26), which was also read in the longer form of the Passion on Palm Sunday. It gives the context as the first day of Unleavened Bread (the Passover), directions for the meal's preparation, and then, omitting the section foretelling betrayal, it moves to what we call the institution narrative of the Eucharist. The ritual (of taking, blessing, breaking and giving) has already been encountered in each of the gospels in the narratives of the feeding with the loaves and fishes, but here it is distinguished by the inclusion of a cup and the interpretive words "This is my body" and "This is my blood". The continuing words over the cup in verse 24, "the blood of the Covenant, which is to be poured out for many", contain two links to the first reading (Ex 24:3-8); first and most obvious is the whole phrase in Exodus 24:8, "This is the blood of the Covenant", and second, the verb in verse 26 translated as poured out is in both the Greek and the Vulgate a compound form of the one used in Exodus 24:6 when Moses cast the blood of the sacrifice over the altar. All but a few of Scripture's thirty-five instances of that Hebrew verb pertain to sprinkling blood in sacrifices. Attempts to conflate by creative interpretation the former sacrifices with that of the Mass, and the two priesthoods, are problematic. The interpretive words of Mark's narrative do draw from the language of the Mosaic sacrifice sealing the Covenant, and those sacrifices it stipulates, but this was not in order to "reveal" later Christian priests to be like the former sacrificing ones, as the letter to the Hebrews makes clear. The opening lines of the letter emphasise that Christ is something other and infinitely higher than anyone preceding him; what he brings is new and far surpasses the former. Later it dismisses any precedent for Christ's priesthood being found in that of the descendants of Levi, for while they served in the Temple, Christ is The Temple, but it does see in the enigmatic Melchizedek a figure for Christ as eternal priest. According to the letter to the Hebrews, all is achieved in his person who is the eternal priest, the perfect sacrifice, the altar and the temple, but each is unlike the former. Thus, in today's pericope we are told that Christ "brings a new covenant".

This weekend we welcome representatives of the Legion of Mary to our Masses. The Legion of Mary was founded in Dublin, Ireland on 7th September 1921. It is a lay Catholic organisation whose members are giving service to the church on a voluntary basis in almost every country. The object of the Legion of Mary is the glory of God through the holiness of its members developed by prayer and active cooperation in Mary's and the Churches work. The Legion sees as its priority the spiritual and social welfare of each individual. The members participate in the life of the parish through visitation of the sick, both in their homes and in hospitals and through collaboration in the apostolic and missionary undertaking by the parish. Every legionary is required to carry out a weekly apostolic work in the spirit of faith and in union with Mary. The unit of the Legion of Mary is called a praesidium, which holds a weekly meeting, where prayer is intermingled with reports and discussion. Our parish already enjoys one praesidium in our Indonesian community. However, we can develop as many as there is interest. Do give some thought to becoming part of this international association which aims both to develop our personal lives spiritually and also our parish, pastorally.

Thank you to all those who have contributed to our Foodbank Appeal for Jesuit Refugee Services. The items will be delivered to Hunters Hill between 9am and 11am on Wednesday 9 June. Might you have a couple of spare hours on that morning to assist with the delivery? We would need to load up our vehicles soon after 9am! Do let our parish office know if you can assist.
