FROM FR DAVID

Dear friends,



Again, the deepest gratitude to all who made our celebration of the **Reception of our relic of Carlo Acutis** so beautiful last weekend. It truly was a memorable occasion and one which, I believe, will define our church in new ways as we journey forward. To help us underscore our new Eucharistic Chapel we have a special opportunity to gather online this Wednesday 23 October at 8pm. What does Adoration mean for our lives? How can it help us? As we celebrate our new Adoration altar, **Father Robert Rieger will kindly join us from Medjugorje to share some thoughts on Adoration.** Father Robert is a Kiwi priest who first visited Medjugorje some 36 years ago – and it changed his life forever. Father Robert now welcomes thousands of pilgrims to Medjugorje every year from all around the world – including our own pilgrims from Chatswood and Manly, who met with Father Robert in Medjugorje just a few weeks ago. Father Robert leads the Oasis of Peace community in Medjugorje, and their chapel offers Adoration around the

clock, 24 hours a day. But as Father Robert will tell us, Adoration is not about the hours. It's about opening our hearts to the Lord and letting Him do something within us and for us – rather than just assuming that it's all about us doing something for him. It's His work within us that will truly change our lives. Do see the bulletin for the details.

Our **new seating for the northern transept** has arrived! The chairs interlink to form rows, but they can also be used individually. This will give us great flexibility in the use of this area, and we hope that, in particular, it will become a family friendly place where children will have the carpet on which to play during Mass. We have also tidied up the corners of both the southern and northern



transepts. We have placed some of our statutes in these corners in temporary fashion but in time will create more permanent shrine

Last Wednesday a heavily changed version of Alex Greenwich's "Equality" Bill was passed by the NSE Legislative Assembly (the "lower house"). The Bill was supported by Labor and the Greens, and opposed by the Liberals and Nationals. What is in the final Bill? As Mike Southon from Freedom for Faith writes, the good news is that the vast majority of the Bill has been removed. This includes:

- * All changes to the anti-discrimination act that would have stopped faith organisations and schools from requiring staff to live according to their faith in matters of sexuality and gender.
- * Provisions allowing children to bypass their parents to get medical treatment including puberty blockers.
- * Changes to definitions of sex and sexuality throughout the law
- * Elevating prostitution to a "protected category" in discrimination law
- * Most of the changes to prostitution laws

Some controversial issues remain in the Bill. The most significant is the "sex self-ID" section, which allows a person to change their sex on their birth certificate. However, even this part of the Bill has been improved from its initial version:

- * The age to be able to make a change easily has been raised from 16 to 18
- * The process for under 18s has been made more rigorous it is harder to bypass parents, requires support from a qualified counsellor, and requires the District Court to make the final ruling.

Most significantly, the Bill now states: "Nothing in this part changes access to toilets, change rooms, sport, allocation in correctional facilities, women's refuges or any other place." Time will tell how effective these protections are. Religious institutions and faith-based schools will still be able to treat people according to their biological sex, because the exemptions to the Anti-Discrimination Act still remain.

We are grateful to those who have engaged the proposed legislation to amend the initial drafts.

A word of thanks to those who could gather last Monday night to consider the discernment into which Bishop Anthony has invited us to consider the pastoral opportunities and challenges facing the North Shore region of our Diocese. Individual submissions are still welcome.

This Sunday we welcome Catholic Mission with us for their annual appeal to assist the developing Church.

GOSPEL REFLECTION



We all love to receive invitations:

"Can you come to my birthday party?"

"I have two tickets to the cricket; can you make it?"

"We're going on a boat trip next week. Do you want to join us?" But then we have to decide which one, if any, we will accept.

However, there is one invitation that we should find very hard to refuse: "Can you come to the throne of grace?" Every day, God invites us to come and receive gifts from him. Today's reading from Hebrews mentions specifically the gifts of mercy and help in time of need, but God's invitation includes a much wider array of gifts than the ones we seek at crisis points. Every day, he wants to give us gifts like peace, encouragement, hope, joy, grace to forgive, and insights into his path for our lives. There is no end to the gifts God wants to give us!

In 2012, during the Year of Grace and Year of Faith, the Australian Catholic Bishops and Pope Benedict invited all of us to pass through the "door of faith" each and every day

and come to the throne of grace. The key question we faced then and now is this: With all that I have to do each day, why should I carve out time to do this? Will I find anything special on the other side of this door? The reading offers us an answer: "We have a great high priest" whom we can "confidently approach" to receive all the grace we need to live in this world. There should be no greater encouragement to us as Christians than that of the mercy and grace God promises to us, mercy and grace that are based on Christ having loved us enough to identify with us to the point of suffering and death.

It doesn't matter how complicated, how desperate, perhaps even hopeless our life has become. No matter how overwhelmed we may feel by our problems, if our trust is in Jesus Christ, we can be sure that he is praying for us now and through that prayer he will provide for us the resources to bring us relief or enable us to carry on. We won't be disappointed if we come to him.

But if God is so generous, and if his invitation is so warm and open, why do we hesitate? Could it be fear? In the ancient Near East, it was often considered dangerous to approach the throne of a king. And certainly, God is more awe-inspiring and fearsome than an earthly emperor! The Book of Esther reflects a Persian tradition that daring even to come into the king's presence could lead to death. It's instructive that the warning didn't stop Esther: She took the risk in order to intercede for her people. And the king heard her, granted her request, and even raised her above all other people.

This is how it will be for us when we accept God's invitation and place ourselves in his presence. We don't have to risk our lives to come to him. Because when we do, He will put his arms around us, draw us to himself, and ask us what we need. Then, with a knowing smile on his face, he will open his box of treasures and give us exactly the right gifts—even gifts we didn't think we needed.

He is not one to dole out harsh punishments or make impossible demands. Rather, he offers love and mercy at every turn. He is moved by our weaknesses, and he will never abandon us! So, what are you waiting for? On this day of blessing, don't be afraid to approach Almighty God. After all, He is our Father!

VINNIES CHATSWOOD SEPTEMBER REPORT

Chatswood received 15 requests for help in September, 4 of which we could not contact and 6 were new to us. Of those assisted 3 had suffered DV and were sorting out new accommodation and adjusting to new circumstances. Furniture and whitegoods were the concern of most of those assisted including removal expenses in one case. sought assistance person with organising convalescing after an operation, another with power bills and two with health-related issues. Some \$3500 of material assistance was provided as well as advice.

The afternoon will feature lunch, thought-provoking conversation, the opportunity to meet new people, and for each and every one of our voices to be heard.






- One ticket equals one candle.



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

BEING SERVANT AND SLAVE

Our first reading is from the fourth 'servant song' or poem of Isaiah. The imagery of the suffering servant is juxtaposed with 'the Son of Man [who] came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as ransom for many.' Just prior to today's Gospel reading, there was the third passion prediction. Jesus and the disciples are on the way to Jerusalem toward his passion and death. James and John, sons of Zebedee, open the scene. They were among the first called by Jesus and they are among the closest of his companions. What might we think would be on their minds? How taken aback will we be when they come to Jesus and say: 'we want you to do for us whatever we ask.' They are looking for their reward in places of esteem and honour. The brothers failure to understand angers the other ten.

Jesus makes clear that their orientation and that of anyone who wishes to be great is to be servant. This is their lesson and ours. Still today this is countercultural. In our Church we are invited to walk the way in synodality: praying together, listening deeply to one another, listening to the Spirit, walking together in the Spirit, asking what we are called to do, not only what Jesus will do for us. How will we be servant to one another, walking together in humility, this week?

Intro to the Theology of the Body







 John of Capistrano is often known as the "Soldier Saint" because of his role in leading Christian troops during the Siege of Belgrade in



- The city of San Juan Capistrano in California is named after him. It's famous for its historic mission and the annual return of swallows that attract visitors from around the world.
- Before joining the Franciscan order, St. John was a successful lawyer and governor in Italy. He had a promising career in politics, but after being imprisoned during a political conflict, he had a vision of St. Francis of Assisi and decided to become a Franciscan friar.
- Due to his involvement in military campaigns and his leadership, he is considered the patron saint of military chaplains and soldiers. His legacy continues to inspire those who serve both spiritually and in defense of their country.




