

COVID UPDATE

ST PATRICK'S PARISH IS NOW A NSW GOVERNMENT REGISTERED 'COVID SAFE' PARISH



We ask you to help us stay that way by:

Staying at home if you have any cold or flu symptoms

Sanitising your hands before entry into the church

Recording your name and contact details upon entering so that you may be contacted should we find we have to alert you to a COVID positive incident in the church.

Sitting in the spaces marked which indicate a safe 4m2 distance from those around you.

Staying 1.5m apart when queuing for communion or any other purpose.

To ensure we comply with the 1.5m distance rule, please do not congregate in the foyer before or after Mass.

When exiting the church, please maintain 1.5m social distancing rules.

Following the recommendation of our Premier, that masks should be worn in places of public worship, **a further** direction from the bishop's office states that masks SHOULD now be worn in the church.

We ask you to bring your masks due to the expense of supplying them free of charge.

A kind parishioner donated a limited quantity of masks, and we are offering these to those who don't have their masks. When the donated masks have run out, we ask you to supply your own.

EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS

Effective immediately, it will be necessary to wear a mask when distributing Holy Communion.

If you have a mask of your own you should bring that with you to Mass.

If you don't have a mask you can get one from the sacristy the first time and then keep that one as your own for future use.

OR DOES IT?

Restoring hope in life long marriage

There's a curious thing that happens when a divorce touches a community. Where once parents, friends and siblings believed in the power of love and the permanency of marriage, confidence gives way to cynicism and uncertainty.

Instead of believing that children do best when living in the same home with both their parents, we find ourselves saying: "The most important thing is that they know they are loved by both their parents; it doesn't matter if they all live together or not."

Instead of upholding the vision of a couple devoting their lives to each other and growing gracefully into old age, we say: "People live so long these days it's unrealistic to expect them to be happy with one person for their whole lives."

Some people would say that such changes in attitude are a positive sign of growth and maturity: we are moving from an unrealistic, idealised notion to one grounded in reality; we are moving with the times. Those who refuse to abandon their ideals are seen to be 'trapped in the past' or 'out-of-touch with reality'.

While this response is understandable, it is not helpful. Nor is it a mature one.

Misdirected compassion

Divorce creates a problem for us. On the one hand, we love and celebrate the optimism of weddings; we are filled with hope and good vibes as we witness the fervor of the bride and groom committing their lives to one another.

And so it should. Something important and profoundly sacred is happening. The couple is reaching for the divine, seeking to imitate God's love in their own lives. God's love is vast and unrelenting in it's fidelity. It's a beautiful thing and we join with all their family and friends in wanting to see them succeed.

On the other hand, a divorce contradicts this belief. Love is not permanent, vast, unrelenting, faithful. The hope we had is crushed by the reality of the disintegrating marriage.

This creates a cognitive dissonance for us; a mental contradiction that creates intense discomfort. It is a natural human reaction to

want to avoid pain and suffering. In the face of the discomfort of cognitive dissonance, we search for ways to reconcile the conflicting beliefs and alleviate our pain.

In our compassion for those divorcing, we don't want to add to their suffering or be judgmental. Nor do we want to stay in the uncomfortable space cognitive dissonance, of holding an ideal that is so hard for people to accomplish.

Redefining what is normal, or ideal, is one way of protecting ourselves from the discomfort of cognitive dissonance and from the fear of being perceived as judgmental.

Yet it is an immature and faulty reaction that ultimately leads to more divorce and more pain. It is immature because it denies the legitimacy of the pain we and our divorcing friends are experiencing.

Broken dreams hurt. There's a grieving that must take place. And it's painful, really painful. When we redefine the dream (or the ideal), we remove the legitimacy for our grief and bury the pain without allowing it to be processed.

In the short term, it feels like relief but this buried pain plays havoc with our subconscious and predisposes us to all sorts of hurt and self-harm in the longer term. We think we are being sensible and practical by moving on, but in reality, we are setting ourselves up for more pain down the track.

Restoring our Expectations for Success

If we don't expect marriage to last a life time, then we won't be disappointed when it doesn't. If we don't expect children to live with both parents, then we won't be disillusioned when they can't. These are self-protective strategies designed to deflect the pain of a divorce.

Unfortunately, this strategy usually delivers even more pain over the long term. Why? Because low aspirations lead to limited outcomes.

No successful athlete, artist, musician or business person has succeeded by aspiring to failure or mediocrity. If we don't expect our marriage to last, chances are it won't. If we don't aspire to providing children the stability of both parents in the one home, we can be almost certain that we won't.

The first step towards rebuilding marriage as a life-long commitment in our society is believing it is both possible and optimal. Pretending 'it doesn't really matter' is unhelpful, to everyone involved.

ST MARY OF THE CROSS

MARY MACKILLOP FEAST DAY; SAT, 8 AUGUST.

Mary Helen MacKillop RSJ was an Australian nun who has been declared a saint by the Catholic Church, as St Mary of the Cross. Of Scottish descent, she was born in Melbourne but is best known for her activities in South Australia. Wikipedia

As a child growing up into early adulthood in Melbourne, Mary showed she had a love of God and commitment to the church, wanting to server those in need.

Mary's father Alexander MacKillop was a man who tried many times to be successful but never was able to fulfill his desires of success. This lead to the family going through many hardships. Mary was the eldest of seven children and so, the burden of providing for the family fell to her and her next eldest brother. Mary at the age of sixteen was employed as a clerk in a stationary suppliers in Melbourne and supported her family from her wages.

Mary moved to Penola to take on the paid role of governess to her Aunts children. This gave Mary a steady income which was given to her mother in Melbourne to provide for the family.

While in Penola Mary met Fr Julian Woods, who was in charge of the Penola mission. Mary became active in the community, making a contribution to the mission. The Bishop of Adelaide requested Fr Woods to create a Catholic school where ever there was a Priest and a congregation let you make a commencement of a Catholic School.

After some time dis-paring about how to proceed with the task in such a remote part of the country Fr Woods asked Mary MacKillop to help him, even though Mary had moved to western Victoria to help her immediate family.

Together they planned for the establishment of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart. In late 1865 Fr Woods asked Mary to join him in Penola to take over running the Penola school following the resignation of the first two teachers who left to get married. Mary felt she could not abandon her family but sent her seventeen year old sister to help Fr Woods in the school.

By early 1866 Mary, by now 24 years of age, felt free to leave her family and join Fr Woods in Penola to take charge of the school. On the 19th of March 1866 Mary accepted the request of Fr Woods to become the first sister of St Joseph.

Fr John Woods and Mary devises a "Rule of Life" by which the Josephite's should live by.

- 1. Live poorly, owning nothing in their own right
- 2. Depend on Divine Providence for their subsistence
- 3. Go wherever they were needed
- 4. Do all the good they could, and never see an evil without trying to remedy it.

Later that year in August Fr Woods went to Adelaide to attend the consecration of Adelaide 3rd Bishop, Laurence Sheil. Fr Woods told the new Bishop of his plans for the school at penola. Without hesitation Bishop Sheil appointed Woods as his secretary and director of Catholic Schools and Inspector of schools for South Australia.

MacKillop traveled to Rome in 1873 to seek papal approval for the religious congregation and was encouraged in her work by Pope Pius IX. The authorities in Rome made changes to the way Josephite sisters lived in regards to their commitment to poverty and declared that the superior general and her council were the authorities in charge of the congregation. They assured MacKillop that the congregation and their "Rule of Life" would receive final approval after a trial period. The resulting alterations to the "Rule of Life" regarding ownership of property caused a breach between MacKillop and Woods, who felt that the revised document compromised the ideal of vowed poverty and blamed MacKillop for not getting the document accepted in its original form. Before Woods' death on 7 October 1889, he and MacKillop were personally reconciled, but he did not renew his involvement with the congregation.

Until her death Mary worked tirelessly to grow the Josephite order and establish schools throughout Australia and New Zealand.

CANONISATION AND COMMEMORATION

In 1925, the Mother Superior of the Sisters of St Joseph, Mother Laurence, began the process to have MacKillop declared a saint and Michael Kelly, Archbishop of Sydney, established a tribunal to carry the process forward. The process for MacKillop's beatification began in 1926, was interrupted in 1931 but began again in April 1951 and was closed in September of that year. After several years of

hearings, close examination of MacKillop's writings and a 23-year delay, the initial phase of investigations was completed in 1973. A longtime and prominent non-Catholic promoter of her cause was poet-bookseller Max Harris. After further investigations, MacKillop's "heroic virtue" was declared in 1992. That same year, the church endorsed the belief that Veronica Hopson, apparently dying of leukaemia in 1961, was cured by praying for MacKillop's intercession; MacKillop was beatified on 19 January 1995 by Pope John Paul II.

On 19 December 2009, the Congregation for the Causes of Saints issued a papal decree formally recognising a second miracle, the complete and permanent cure of Kathleen Evans of inoperable lung and secondary brain cancer in the 1990s. Kathleen Evans went on to publish in 2012 with Penguin Books, "The Story Behind Saint Mary MacKillop's second Miracle." Her canonisation was announced on 19 February 2010 and subsequently took place on 17 October 2010. This made her the first Australian to be recognised as a saint by the Catholic Church.

In the week leading up to her canonisation, the Australian federal government announced that it was protecting the use of MacKillop's name for commercial purposes. According to a statement from the office of the Prime Minister of Australia, Julia Gillard, the only other individual Australian whose name has similar protection is Australian cricket legend Sir Donald Bradman.[49] Australia Post issued an official postage stamp to recognise MacKillop's canonisation.[50]

MacKillop is remembered in numerous ways, particularly in Australia. Many things have been named for her, including the electoral district of MacKillop in South Australia and several MacKillop colleges. **

'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped. The men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.'

SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

Elijah's experience occurred on the mountain of God. Though in one tradition this mountain is Sinai (see Ex 19:1-6), this tradition identifies it as Horeb (see Dt 4:10-15a). Such a theophany was accompanied by spectacular phenomena. Perhaps the Israelites described it in this way to show that their God, not the god of the Canaanites, governed the powers of nature. Elijah witnessed the phenomena, but did not experience God within it. It was only when he heard a tiny whispering voice that he was gripped with the realisation of God's presence. No divine words were delivered. The voice itself was the experience. This suggests that the insignificant events of life can be the stage upon which God is

The psalm presumes a community waiting

for a prophetic oracle that will announce peace (v.9). The people's confidence in God rests in the conviction that they are God's own people. There is great expectancy here. The people have done what they can to get God's attention. The next move is God's. Lovingkindness, truth, justice and peace (v.11) are characteristics of the covenantal relationship. When they meet and embrace each other, salvation is complete, truth springs up from the earth, and justice comes down from heaven. All of creation, from earth to sky, shares in the benefits of the salvation by God.

Paul speaks of his ardent attachment to his Jewish compatriots. Though he devoted himself to the conversion of the Gentiles, he never ceased loving the people from whom he came. Distressed that they did not accept Jesus as messiah, he is willing to be considered cursed (anáthema) and cut off from Christ for their sake. Paul was not the first leader to be willing to forfeit his future with God for the sake of his own people. Moses made the same offer (see Ex 32:32). Paul lists seven prerogatives that his people enjoy as the chosen people of God. Interestingly, the greatest boast is that the Christ, the anointed one of God, came from their line

In the gospel account, Jesus addresses the terror that the disciples experienced in seeing him walking toward them on the water with a typical divine response: Do not be afraid! To this he adds the theophanic exclamation: It is I; I am (ego eimi)! By walking on water, Jesus assumes the role of the creator-god who alone governs chaotic waters. Peter's faith is not strong enough to overcome his fear of such waters, and so he sinks. Thus he is a model of both faith and lack of faith. Ultimately, it was faith that won out, for Peter is saved when he cries out to Jesus. Those in the boat then pay Jesus homage, identifying him as the Son of God. The entire event was a manifestation of the extraordinary power that resided in Jesus.

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Dianne Bergant CSA was a Professor of Biblical Studies at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, where she taught from 1978 to 2014. She holds a BS in Elementary Education from Marian College, Fond du Lac, WI; an MA and PhD in Biblical Languages and Literature from St Louis University. Amongst other things, she served as President of Catholic Biblical Association of America (2000-2001) and has been awarded honorary doctorates from several other universities. She was an active member of the Chicago Catholic/ Jewish Scholars Dialogue (1988-2017) and sat on the editorial boards of The Bible Today (1979-2005), Biblical Theology Bulletin (1990-2014), Catholic Biblical Quarterly (1992-2001), New Theology Review (1997-2003), Teaching Theology and Religion (2003-2005), and Chicago Studies (2003-2009). She has taught and lectured in many places in the United States and abroad and has written numerous books, articles and chapters in books.
