POPE FRANCIS PROCLAIMS "YEAR OF ST JOSEPH"


With the Apostolic Letter "Patris corde" ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis recalls the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To mark the occasion, the Holy Father has proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph" from today, 8 December 2020, to 8 December 2021.

In a new Apostolic Letter entitled Patris corde ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis describes Saint Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father; a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows.

The Letter marks the 150th anniversary of Blessed Pope Pius

IX's declaration of St Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To celebrate the anniversary, Pope Francis has proclaimed a special "Year of St Joseph," beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2020 and extending to the same feast in 2021. The Holy Father wrote Patris corde against the backdrop of the Covid-19 pandemic, which, he says, has helped

COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS UPDATE

It was welcome news over the weekend that the Northern end of the Northern Beaches were officially out of lockdown on Sunday 10 January, meaning Pittwater Parish was able to open again and join the rest of Greater Sydney with the restrictions put in place on 2 January.

The following measures for Greater Sydney (including Wollongong, Central Coast and Blue Mountains) were effective from 2 January.

Face masks are mandatory in the following indoor settings: shopping (retail, supermarkets and shopping centres), public/shared transport, indoor entertainment (including cinemas and theatres), places of worship, hair and beauty premises.

Places of worship and religious services limited to 1 person per 4sqm up to a maximum of 100 people per separate area.

Congregational singing is not to be encouraged. However, music provided by an organist and a cantor is recommended.

Weddings and funerals limited to 1 person per 4sqm up to a maximum of 100 people.

Please remember, that each time the restrictions are altered, we must update our COVID-19 Safety Plan to reflect the changes.

As always, we will keep an eye of the situation and if restrictions change, we will let you know.

Thank you once again to all our parishes, especially those on the Northern Beaches that were unable to celebrate Christmas as a community. It has been the most trying of times, and we appreciate your patience and being able to adapt at short notice to the ever-changing restrictions.

IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN -

The season of joy and gluttony. By the time Christmas day is over, our refrigerator will be filled with yummy, delectable left-overs.

Unfortunately, not all left-overs are so delicious. Too often in a marriage, instead of our best selves, we serve up the less than appetising left-overs. VOX POPULI -

THE VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

The first Vox Populi message of 2021 comes from Peter Rodrigues. Peter is a parishioner at St Agatha's Church, Pennant Hills along with his wife Marilyn and their children, Naomi, Hannah, Joachim, Jacob and Isaac. Peter and Marilyn also both work for the Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney.

THE PEOPLE WHO BRING US TO JESUS BY PETER RODRIGUES

Growing up in a traditional Catholic family, I always felt a strong affinity for my patron saint, St Peter. I liked that I had been named after the one that was first among the apostles, the one Jesus gave the keys of the kingdom to, to lead the Church.

But at Masses with my family when I was young I wasn't so keen on hearing the stories about how he betrayed Jesus, how Jesus once called him 'Satan', and having to listen to St John crow about how he was "the one that Jesus loved" (presumably, the best!). I wanted St Peter to be the best, always right and perfect, the first among the apostles in every way.

This weekend we hear St John's account of the calling of Andrew and Simon (Peter). In this story St Peter is honoured, but he's not doing anything especially great. It's Andrew who responds to Jesus' invitation to "Come and see", with great enthusiasm, and immediately seeks out his brother Simon and takes him to Jesus.

It doesn't matter to me now that St Peter wasn't always the first and best. I know now, as he learnt, what is more important than always being right or a success in the eyes of the people around me.

How did I find out? It took a while of searching as a young adult. University was eye opening, and that world challenged me. I was hungry for information that would somehow justify my faith and my beliefs which deep down I knew to be true, but struggled to explain to others.

Marilyn, who had already begun to find some answers to her own search for authentic faith, invited me with some others from our parish young adults group to a retreat run by a Discalced Carmelite priest at the Mt Carmel Retreat Centre at Varroville.

From that weekend, a friendship developed with the order and especially the founders of its reform St Teresa of Avila and St John of the Cross. These saints taught that life as a Catholic Christian is ultimately grounded in a real friendship with God. A God who, through our baptism dwells within us.

Through them I realised what I was actually looking for. It wasn't "what", but "who". Just as Andrew took his brother Simon to Jesus, these people brought me to Jesus. They helped me to realise that great prowess in evangelising others wasn't what I needed. I needed to experience the total love of God, who dwelt in me, and was waiting for me to respond more fully every day to his invitation to friendship.

My parents had me baptised and faithfully formed me to the

point that I was able to recognise Jesus when I met him in this deeper way as an adult with responsibility for my own life and faith. Marilyn and I have tried to do the same for our children. We know the most important thing we can do as parents is to bring our children to Jesus Christ to the best of our ability. And we trust, as in our case, that He will take care of the rest

Dear God, i tried my best, but if today i lose my hope please tell me that your plans are better than my dreams. Amen.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

They saw where Jesus lived and they stayed with him.

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.' Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,' – which means Teacher – 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' – which means the Christ – and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' – meaning Rock.

SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

Samuel was a person destined for great

things. There is disarming innocence in his mistaking the voice of God for that of Eli. It is curious that the priest Eli misunderstood, not once but twice. Since the ark was a sign of God's presence in the midst of the people, Eli should have expected an occasional communication from God. The fact that God called the inexperienced Samuel rather than the seasoned priest Eli may mean that something new was happening, that a new period in the history of the people was opening, that a new day was on the horizon.

The psalm response contains thanksgiving for release from some difficulty, dedication to God who is the saviour, and personal witness in the midst of the community. Though in distress, the psalmist waited in expectant hope and with patient trust. After God drew the suffering believer out of the troubling situation, the cry for help was replaced by a grateful song of praise. What appears to be a dismissal of the ritual really indicates that rather than public worship, God requires an interior commitment that will result in a life of righteousness and faithful worship. The psalmist then publicly proclaims the justice or righteousness of God.

Paul contrasts the sanctity of the human body with sexual immorality. According to him, since it is through one's body that union with Christ is possible, this same body is to be revered. Sexual immorality has no place in the kingdom of God, because it defiles the intimate bond that exists between Christ and every Christian. It is through our bodies that we are members of Christ and so joined we become one spirit with Christ. Paul further asserts that our bodies are temples of the Spirit, the same Spirit with whom we are one through our union with Christ. As temples, our bodies should be kept sacred, free from whatever might defile or debase them.

Not jealous of his own importance as a preacher and religious leader, John the Baptist identifies Jesus as the Lamb of God and directs two of his disciples to follow him. The designation suggests the Suffering Servant who, though innocent of transgression, gives his life as an offering for the sins of others (cf. Isa 53:7). Jesus is also called Rabbi, meaning religious teacher, and Messiah, a reference to 'The Long Awaited One'. Initially it was John who pointed to Jesus. Then it was Jesus who invites John's disciples to follow him. Andrew is the one who recognises something in Jesus, and Jesus interacts with Peter only after Andrew has brought his brother to him. The faith of another begins his journey to discipleship.


