WHAT IS ANZAC DAY

Anzac Day, 25 April, is one of Australia's most important national occasions. It marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.

WHAT DOES ANZAC STAND FOR?

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The soldiers in those forces quickly became known as Anzacs, and the pride they took in that name endures to this day.

WHY IS THIS DAY SPECIAL TO AUSTRALIANS?

The Australian and New Zealand forces landed on Gallipoli on 25 April, meeting fierce resistance from the Ottoman Turkish defenders. What had been planned as a bold stroke to knock Turkey out of the war quickly became a stalemate, and the campaign dragged on for eight months. At the end of 1915 the allied forces were evacuated from the peninsula, with both sides having suffered heavy casualties and endured great hardships. More than 8,000 Australian soldiers had died in the campaign. Gallipoli had a profound impact on Australians at home, and 25 April soon became the day on which Australians remembered the sacrifice of those who died in the war.

Although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives, the actions of Australian and New Zealand forces during the campaign left a powerful legacy. What became known as the "Anzac legend" became an important part of the identity of both nations, shaping the ways in which they viewed both their past and their future.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TODAY?

Australians recognise 25 April as a day of national remembrance, which takes two forms. Commemorative services are held across the nation at dawn – the time of the original landing, while later in the day, former and current servicemen and servicewomen, from all Australian and New Zealand services, meet to take part in marches through the country's major cities and in many smaller centres. Commemorative ceremonies are more formal, and are held at war memorials around the country. In these ways, Anzac Day is a time at which Australians reflect on the many different meanings of war.

A CHRISTIAN APPROACH TO WAR AND DEFENCE

Professor Tom Frame [Director, Australian Centre for the Study of Armed Conflict and Society (ACSACS)] said when he joined the Navy at age 16, he didn't consider the ethics of his decision much, but thinks differently and deeply about it now.

"I've gone through phases," he said. "I've never been a militarist, where might is right and if you've got power you should use it.

I did dabble with being a pacifist. But now, things like the genocides in Rwanda, Cambodia, and civil unrest in Somalia,

[have made me] think that there are circumstances when it appears unjust not to act – and just to act.

"I feel we need to restrain people who are inflicting violence on others.

"My position would not be too much different from the classical just-war position, which says that you can use force in certain circumstances."

He believes Jesus would want Christians to test their motives.

"You ought not use force to pursue your interests. But if we see someone being beaten up, and restrain them, we might stop them committing murder and prevent someone from being killed."

He added that he believed empathy, kindness and listening could create a society where terrorism and violence were no longer a threat.

"I think Abraham Lincoln was right when he said, 'I destroy my enemy by making him my friend'."

Should Christians Commemorate Anzac Day?

Did you know that in the 1920s after World War I, the original Anzac Day services were very much Church-led?

According to Professor Frame, in those days they were much like an annual funeral service.

"The [national] sense of mourning and grief was so acute. It was the right thing for the Churches to take a leading role in helping people come to terms with their grief.

"A lot of what sustained the Anzacs was the Christian story of suffering, redemption and resurrection – that there is a possibility that when bad things happen they can be redeemed for good.

"If Christian churches aren't able to put a good message in this context then I think a great opportunity has been overlooked."

Steps to Becoming a Saint

Being named a saint in the Catholic Church is a very high honor. It means the saint's name is added to the official catalogue of saints, and that Masses and feast days can be celebrated in his or her honor. Churches can then be dedicated in the saint's memory, and his or her name can be used in public prayers, such as litanies. What does it take for someone to be named a saint? The process is called *canonization* and it involves 4 major steps.

REQUEST FOR CANONIZATION At least five years after a person's death (unless a special

At least twe years after a person's death (unless a special exception is made by the pope), a formal request is made to consider him or her for sainthood. The people making the request are usually from the candidate's church or religious community. They submit their request to he bishop of the diocese where the person died. The request tells how the person lived a life of holiness and lists reasons for considering the candidate for sainthood. If the bishop believes there is enough evidence to consider the person for sainthood, he asks the Vatican for permission to open a special tribunal. Witnesses are then called to attest to the candidate's goodness, holiness, devotion to God, and other virtues. If a person passes this step, he or she is named a "Servant of God."



DETERMINATION

The bishop sends a formal report and request to Rome where it is reviewed by the Congregation for the Causes of the Saints. Nine theologians read the material and determine whether there is enough cause to pass it to the entire Congregation. If so, the candidate's writings and other aspects of his or her life are studied to make sure there is nothing that goes against the teachings and practices of the Church. As part of this investigation a person called a "devil's advocate" raises questions and objections to the candidate's sainthood. This is to make sure the final decision is complete and fair, and all evidence of the candidate's saintliness is assured. Once a candidate has been determined to be virtuous and heroic in his or her faith, he or she is declared "Venerable."



Beatification

The next step is beatification. If the candidate was a martyr, someone who died for their faith, he or she may be beatified and named "Blessed." Otherwise, a miracle brought about by the intercession of the saint must occur and be verified by the Congregation. Once the person is beatified and named "Blessed," he or she can be venerated, or officially honored, in his or her city, diocese, region, or religious community.

After being beatified, another miracle is required for the person to be canonized and officially declared a saint. Once again, the miracle must have occurred as a result of the person's intercession. The Prefect of the Congregation then sends the cause for canonization to the pope who makes the final decision. Once a person is canonized, he or she is officially declared a "Saint." The pope declares this in an official way at a special Mass in honor of the new saint.



VENERABLE FRANCIS JORDAN

Father Francis Mary of the Cross Jordan – founder of the Salvatorian Family was born as John Baptist Jordan on



June 16, 1848, in Gurtweil, Germany,

a small town in the Black Forest area of the southwestern part of the country, just a

few miles from the border of Switzerland.

Although he felt called to serve as a priest as an early age, the poverty of the family did not allow him to do the required studies. Instead he became an itinerant laborer and painter.

While working as a laborer and painter-decorator traveling throughout his homeland, Jordan became keenly aware of the difficult spiritual situation of the people in his homeland. Because the Church had been limited in its mission by the government (in what became known as the Kulturkampf) people were turning away from God and the practice of their faith. This only strengthened Jordan's faith and he began to sense a call to the priesthood.

He initially had private lessons from local clergy and then attended a secondary school in Constance. Despite his struggle with the sciences, he developed a talent for foreign languages. For his graduation examination, he presented one essay in eight European languages and another one in four other languages. Having successfully completed his initial studies, he then proceeded to enroll at the Albert-Ludwigs University in Freiburg to do his higher studies in the fields of theology and philology. After receiving his degree from the university, he enrolled in the nearby St. Peter Seminary

On July 21, 1878, he was ordained a priest in Freiburg, Germany, and because he had a talent for languages, his bishop sent him to Rome, and later to the Holy Land, for advanced studies. Jordan became fluent in many languages, including Syrian, Aramaic, Coptic, Arabic, Hebrew and Greek.

But Jordan was sensing that something else was in store for his future. He began thinking about ways to combat the growing disinterest in spirituality and religion. In September 1880, Jordan met privately with Pope Leo XIII in the Vatican, where he outlined his plan to begin a society devoted to spreading the teachings of the faith. The Pope gave Jordan his blessing to begin creating such an organization. On December 8, 1881, Father Jordan and two others professed private vows as members of the new foundation. They were soon joined by Therese von Wüllenweber, now known as Blessed Mary of the Apostles since her beatification in 1968. Membership in the new foundation grew, structures changed, and missionaries were sent out to all corners of the globe. In time, Father Jordan's and Mother Mary's communities evolved into the three branches that make up the Salvatorian Family: the priests and brothers of the Society of the Divine Savior, the Congregation of the Sisters of the Divine Savior, and the International Community of the Divine Savior (Lay Salvatorians).

The name "Salvatorian" comes from the Latin word < Salvator > meaning "Savior." With a bold, unique and forward-looking vision within the Church, Salvatorians – men and women, religious and laity – work together in mission to bring the Gospel of the Savior to all people throughout the world.

Father Jordan and Mother Mary fostered within their followers an unshakable trust in Divine Providence – that God would be with them and guide them in their variety of ministries. That trust remains strong in us still!

The Motherhouse of the Society is just down the street from St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. The Motherhouse of the Sisters is nearby, atop one of the great hills of the city. Globally today, more than two thousand Salvatorians – priests, sisters, brothers, and lay members – work to

continue the mission of Father Francis and Mother Mary:

``To proclaim the goodness of kindness of Jesus, the Savior, by all ways and means the love of God inspires."

Fr. Francis Jordan died in Tafers, Switzerland, on September 8, 1918, and was buried in the local church. In 1956, his body was transferred to Rome and is now entombed in a special chapel in the Motherhouse of the Society. On March 19, 1999, Pope John Paul II visited the community and prayed at the tomb of Father Jordan.

In 2011, the Vatican published the Decree on the Heroicity of His Virtues and declared Father Jordan "Venerable." On June 19, 2020, Pope Francis declared that a miracle in Brazil, gained through the intercession of Father Jordan, was authentic and his beatification was approved. As of May 15, 2021, he is "Blessed Francis Jordan."

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR VOCATIONS - GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY

2021 marks the 58th Anniversary of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations, which is held on Sunday 25 April.

World Day of Prayer for Vocations is an opportunity to celebrate vocations to ordained ministry and religious life in all its forms. While it is a chance to appreciate all vocations, the Church concentrates its attention this day on vocations to the ordained ministries (priesthood and diaconate).

On this day we hear Jesus saying "When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice" (John 10:4). Jesus has already called each one of you by name and you responded to his call. But his call is not simply something from the past and neither is your response simply a one-time decision that you have made. Rather he continues to challenge us to continue to follow his voice every day.

His voice is not always as loud and as clear as we may want it to be. In the words of Pope Francis "God comes silently and discreetly, without imposing on our freedom" (Message for World Day of Vocations), which means that one of the biggest challenges of our times is being able to hear that quiet, gentle voice of the Lord, especially when there is so much distraction competing for our attention.

This one day of the year is an excellent opportunity for you to inspire parents, families, and lay ecclesial ministers to really listen to the voice of the Lord by simply beginning a conversation with your young Catholic Parishioners and asking them to consider how they will live lives of holiness and sacred service. An opportunity to nudge (virtually or via telecommunications) inquirers and motivate discerners to learn more about living out God's invitation to be holy through ordained and religious life.



SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

The story in Acts follows a familiar biblical pattern: someone faces a challenge; at first the challenge is not met; a miraculous event occurs; a second chance is given. Here, the claims made by Jesus constitute the trial; the rejection is at the hands of the leaders of the people; the wonder is the healing of the crippled man; although rejection calls down judgment, God's judgment never precludes ultimate salvation. At the heart of Peter's message is the fundamental gospel formula: 'whom you crucified, God raised from the dead.' Jesus' resurrection became the fountain from which springs salvation of every kind. For the crippled man, salvation

Because the world refused to acknowledge took the form of healing; for others, it can take the form of spiritual transformation.

> The psalmist reminds a group of believers of God's faithfulness and calls them to give thanks. Two proverbs in the 'better ... than' form insist that trust in God far exceeds trust in mere human beings, even powerful princes. Next is a testimony of God's goodness addressed to the community. In it, God's attentiveness and saving intervention are acknowledged. In a reversal of fortune, the rejected stone becomes the most important stone. The psalmist claims that the one who comes in the name of the Lord is blessed or happy, regardless of what the surrounding society may think. The psalm ends with the summons to give thanks. The goodness of God has been profiled. Gratitude is the only fitting response.

> The point of the short reading from the Letter of John is the love that God has for believers. This love (agápe) is generative; it makes believers children of God. As God's children, they are a new reality; they no longer belong to the world, the old reality. The implications of this are clear. Believers should be prepared for the same kind of rejection, even persecution and death, that befell Jesus. A second theme, eschatological fulfilment, flows from the first. As a consequence of God's love, believers have already been reborn as children of God. However, their transformation is dependent upon a future manifestation. The 'now but not yet' of Christian eschatology is clearly seen.

> With words that suggest some kind of divine revelation, ('I am' ego eimi [cf. Exod 3:14]), Jesus identifies himself as the 'good shepherd'. He sketches the external behaviour of a good shepherd, and then he explains the reason for such unselfish attention. This becomes quite clear in the second section. Jesus is not like the shepherds condemned by the prophets (cf. Ezekiel 34). They failed their responsibilities and actually took advantage of their charges. On the other hand, Jesus is willing to protect his flock even to the point of risking his own life for them. The universality of Jesus' shepherding is clearly stated. He is willing to care for and die for other sheep who, though they are not yet included in his flock, are nonetheless his.
