#### **OLD TESTAMENT COMMENTARY**

Isaiah 62:1-5

This prophecy is located towards the end of the book of Isaiah, in a section that is believed to be a late addition (chapters 56-66). The purpose and destiny of Zion/Jerusalem and the Davidic dynasty that ruled there are a major focus of the book of Isaiah. Earlier chapters warn Zion that she has become corrupt and that the Lord has resolved to do something definitive about it (a prophecy of the Babylonian exile?). Chapters 40-55 prophesy a glorious future for the city after her purge, and that she will be reunited with her children (the exiles). Our passage is preceded and followed by a series of texts that reflect division and corruption and the call for repentance and renewal, despondency and despair and the call to hope in God. It would seem that as time went on after the exile and the prophecies of Zion's glorious future were not fulfilled - in the eyes of the beholders - disputes erupted and people lost hope. Our passage seeks to bolster this flagging faith and put an end to disputes by reaffirming God's unswerving commitment to Zion. People may give up ('be silent') and 'grow weary' but God doesn't.

The restoration of Zion is an integral part of God's purpose for all of humanity and creation; hence her integrity and salvation is to shine out 'like the dawn', like the 'flames of a torch' and all the nations will see it. The prophecy focuses on two things in particular. One is that Zion and her land will receive new names that will completely replace/erase the mocking names that both have presumably had to bear - 'forsaken' and 'abandoned' during the period of tribulation. The new names point in turn to the second focus of the prophecy, namely the wedding that is about to take place between God and Zion in the land. The marriage metaphor provides a rich vein for reflection on the covenant relationship between God and Zion and probably borrows from the earlier prophet of the northern kingdom, Hosea. In response to the challenge posed by the Canaanite fertility god Baal, Hosea claimed that YHWH is the real source of fertility in the land and among the people, and that Israel is YHWH's wife. It is noteworthy that when faced by a challenge from the surrounding world and culture, Hosea was inspired not to flee from it but to confront it, to 'steal' and reshape its theology. It looks like Isaiah applied the metaphor to describe the relationship between YHWH and Zion/Jerusalem, which was believed to be the city that God chose out of all the tribes for the central temple of worship.

The Mt Zion-Davidic dynasty tradition may have originated independently of the Sinai-Moses one and may even at times have been a rival. Each locates God on a mountain communicating to a chosen 'disciple'. Eventually of course the two traditions needed to be related and the relationship, as found in the canonical text of the Bible, is well expressed by the Jewish scholar Jon D. Levenson, who states:

'God's continuing availability is at Zion, not Sinai, but the canonical division of the Pentateuch from the rest of the Hebrew Bible, adumbrated in Deut 34:10, insures that the heir will be eternally subordinate to the testator, Zion to Sinai, David to Moses.'

#### Psalm 95:1-3, 7-10

The responsorial psalm can be read as the faith response of those who accept the prophecy of the book of Isaiah and its assurance. Within this context, one could say that what works for one will work for all. If we believe that God is looking after tiny Israel and its equally tiny capital Jerusalem, then God is looking after all peoples and cities. Otherwise, God is a fake or divine power is sorely limited. Based on this conviction, the psalm urges all the earth to sing praise to God and this proclamation should be made unceasingly ('day by day') and everywhere ('among all the peoples'). The second stanza takes this a step further; given that God looks after one as much as God looks after all, then all the peoples are both one and many - hence the address to 'you families of peoples'. The final stanza plays on this relationship between the one and the many, the particular and the universal, from another angle. In a bold piece of poetry it pictures the earth (the universal dimension) as a humble, trembling supplicant entering the temple (the particular dimension) and worshipping there. The message is that the whole earth should do this gladly because the king who is present there is the righteous one who 'will judge the peoples in fairness'. It is only when we know the truth about ourselves and others that true relationships and true peace can be established.

#### What are some benefits of going to confession?

Confession helps us to better "know myself." Confession brings us peace. Confession helps us become more saintly, more like Jesus. Confession makes our will stronger.

#### **Five Steps for a Good Confession**

- Examine your conscience
- Be sincerely sorry for your sins
- Confess your sins to a priest
- Resolve to change your lite
- After your confession, do the penance the priest assigns

#### How often should I go to confession?

According to the Church's command, "after having attained the age of discretion, each of the faithful is bound by an obligation faithfully to confess serious sins a hi t least once a year."Anyone who is aware of having committed a mortal sin must not receive Holy Communion, even if he experiences deep contrition, without having first received sacramental absolution, unless he has a grave reason for receiving Communion and there is no possibility of going to Confession.

Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1457

#### What is a sin?

Sin is an offence against God, His love and His law and turns our hearts away from Him. Mortal sins destroy the grace of God in the heart of the sinner. Mortal sin cuts our relationship off from God and turns us away from Him.

Mortal sin is committed with full knowledge of the sinner.

Mortal sin is committed with full consent of the sinner.

This means that mortal sins cannot be done "accidentally." A person who commits a mortal sin is one who knows that their sin is wrong, but still decides to commit the sin anyway. This means that mortal sins are rejection of God's law and love. Venial sin - is committed without full reflection and consent and doesn't cut us off from Christ. It weakens union with God.

#### What is the Catholic definition of scrupulous?

In Catholic moral teaching, scrupulosity defines the spiritual and psychological state of a person who wrongly believes he/she is often guilty of mortal sin and therefore not often in a state of grace.

#### How do you know if you're being scrupulous Catholic?

A scrupulous person has difficulty making choices and decisions even though he desires above all else to please God and to follow God's law." A scrupulous person on the other hand does not really know what sin is, at least in his own case. He is always uncertain. He Is troubled with incessant doubt. He cannot be sure whether or not this particular act is a sin. Or, if he knows that the act is a sin, he cannot be sure whether or not he was guilty of it. Someone suffering from scrupulosity has obsessions, feels compulsions, has anxiety, feels distress, and it often affects most other aspects of normal life.

#### How to identify scrupulosity

Some obsessive intrusive thoughts a person with scrupulosity might include: Repetitive thoughts about being sinful, dishonest, or lacking integrity. Ruminating about past mistakes, errors, or possible sinful behavior. Excessive fear of the possibility of committing blasphemy.

#### How to overcome scrupulosity as a Catholic?

- 3 Tips for Overcoming Scrupulosity
- 1. Practice radical abandonment to the mercy of God. Fact: God loves you and is actively working to lead you to heaven to be with Him forever! ...
- 2. Don't go overboard in the confessional. The Sacrament of Confession is the font of God's mercy. ...
- 3. Find a spiritual director.



For only then will you be in love with life. You will find that to be happy is not to have a perfect life. But use the tears to irrigate tolerance.


Use your losses to train patience.

#### **SECOND READING**

#### 1 Corinthians 12:4-11

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of

service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. One may have the gift of preaching with wisdom given him by the Spirit; another may have the gift of preaching instruction given him by the same Spirit; and another the gift of faith given by the same Spirit; another again the gift of healing, through this one Spirit; one, the power of miracles; another, prophecy; another the gift of recognising spirits; another the gift of tongues and another the ability to interpret them. All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, who distributes different gifts to different people just as he chooses.

When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said, 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come vet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for ablutions that are customary among the Jews; each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water,' and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now' he told them, 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from - only the servants who had drawn the water knew - the steward called the bridegroom and said, 'People generally serve the best wine first,

and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink, but you have kept the best wine till now.'

This was the first of the signs given by Jesus: it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him.
